Organize Combined Campaign

Organization of an Eastland Community Chest is scheduled for the night of Tuesday, May 3.

Sentiment favoring such a consolidation of fund campaigns for charitable organizations has been growing here for some time.

Virgil Seaberry Jr., president of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, recently appointed the following committee to explore such a project: Tom Wilson, chairman; Frank N. Sayre, Hubert Westfall and Floyd W. Casebolt.

Subsequently leaders in the movement were addressed on the subject by R. L. Beale of Big Spring, Texas Electric Service Company district manager there, who has set up such units in a number of Texas cities. Mr. Beale gave many pointers on how to proceed.

Then members of the committee contacted a considerable number of firms and individuals, asking their feeling concerning such a project and received much encouragement toward going ahead with it. Several charitable agencies have also given encouragement to the movement.

The committee has invited Dan Eddy of Dallas, widely experienced in such affairs, to speak to the gathering at the organizational meeting and conduct a round-table discussion.

"The object of the project, of course, is to combine the campaigns of a half-dozen or more charitable agencies into one big drive and thus save duplication of time and effort," said Chairman Wilson. "We believe that if properly presented and understood by our people they will adequately support it and a vast number of man hours expended on the numerous campaigns."

Sgt. Davidson In Apple Jack Test In Wash.

Sgt. Charles E. Davidson, 23, son of Mrs. L. S. Sutherland, Rising Star, is among 26,000 soldiers slated to participate in Exercise Apple Jack during May at the Yakima Firing Center, Wash.

Apple Jack will test the efficiency of infantry and support units in mountainous and desert terrain. The simulated use of atomic weapons will be one of the conditions of the exercise.

Sergeant Davidson, a policeman with the 2d Infantry Division's Military Police Company, entered the Army in 1951. Last stationed in Korea, he is a 1950 graduate of Royalty High School at Grandfalls.

Hollywood Co. To Resume Work Here On May 9

During a movement from Kansas City to Dallas, with a big operation, a temporary stoppage — of two weeks — in the operation here in Eastland began today at the Hollywood Corset Company. Also, this is the slow season and the plants here temporarily were "caught up" with their work.

The company has just completed a large warehouse-plant in Dallas and their Kansas City operation is being transferred there.

Resumption of work at the plants here in Eastland is due to begin May 9, it was learned.

Captain Sayre Is Pleased With His Guard Unit Call Response

Capt. Frank N. Sayre of Eastland, commanding officer Battery A, 648th Field Artillery Battalion, Cisco, said today that he is "quite pleased" with his unit's response in the test mobilization this week.

Despite the fact that several communities are represented in the membership of the guard unit at Cisco — following Gov. Allen Shiver's issuance Wednesday of the call at 6:10 — by 7:15 Battery A was at 85 per cent of its

strength. Within two hours, it was at 96 per cent.

The men reported for duty at the armory in Cisco.

Membership of Battery A includes seven Eastlanders.

Over the state more than 8,000 members of the 49th Armored Division, commanded by Maj. Gen. Sidney Johnson of Dallas, were called to duty by the directive originating from General Erickson in the Pentagon.

Operation Minuteman was designed by the National Guard Bureau of the Department of Defense to demonstrate that the nation has a civilian military organization that can speedily be called to duty in event of emergency, civil or military.

The call to Texas units was issued through the office of the state adjutant general under orders of the Governor.

The Battery A Guardsmen, complying with division instructions were poised at the following places during the alert, Cisco Lake dam, water pumping and filtering plants, all communications centers and vital utilities locations.

Safety was stressed by all commanders. The exercise was conducted without ammunition and there was no interference with normal civilian movements.

Irish Drilling Office Opened In Eastland

The Irish Drilling Company of Lubbock, which has been operating in the Eastland County field since December, has leased the building at 208 W. Commerce St. and established an office there.

H. W. Porter of Lubbock, general manager of Irish Drilling Co., and who spends considerable time in Eastland, was reared in Hillsboro, Tex., was educated in Texas A&M College and the University of Pittsburgh and has been in the oil business about twenty years.

Lowell F. Suttle, Jr., of Lubbock, also a stockholder, who has been in the insurance and investment business about ten years, has also been in the oil business and associated with Mr. Porter about two years. P. A. Wheeler, well-known production man in this area, is seeing after production. Ewell Whitsett, in charge of the rig operation, was born and reared near Olney, has been drilling wells more than twenty years and he and his wife have moved to 1201 S. Seaman, Eastland.

The Irish Drilling firm has its own drilling rigs and other equipment. They are oil well contractors, also take leases and drill on them for their own account, or take interests in them, and are interested in talking with people who want wells drilled.

Irish Drilling brought in another well Thursday night on the Holcomb Heirs tract, about 2 miles east and a mile north of Eastland — the third there. They brought in their first Holcomb well in February, with what they described as a potential of about 150 barrels per day. On the second one, they do not know the amount as they have had a temporary permit to produce through the casing and have not been able to kill the well to set the tubing, it was learned from members of the firm.

When Irish company bought the J. W. Courtney lease six miles northwest of Eastland from Max Clairfield of Houston the well was pumping less than 60 barrels a month but after it was worked over it is now doing 65 barrels a day on a test, company officials said.

"We went 1,500 feet south on the same lease and hit the same pay."

"We are having trouble with one of the Holcomb Heirs wells because it is making so much oil and flowing through the casing, unless we shut the valves at the storage tank," Mr. Porter said.

"On another lease, the B. E. Matthews, near the city lake here, we drilled near two wells abandoned in 1931, and now we are running a potential on the new well, which looks to us like about a forty-barrel well. These wells were farmed out from Frank Day, one of the oldest operators in Eastland.

"We have just drilled another well, on the J. V. Harbin acreage near Morton Valley, and are putting it on pump now."

Mr. Porter said he and his associates are pleased with Eastland as a town in which to live and operate a business.

Langer Bill's Passage Urged

The Rev. and Mrs. Roy Turner stated today that they are in receipt of information regarding legislation the W.C.T.U. strongly urges be adopted. The statement follows:

"The National W.C.T.U. has announced that it will join other groups for the passing of the Langer Bill to outlaw liquor ads on radio and TV. Mrs. Glenn G. Hays, president said that over half the U.S. voters are 'solidly in support' of the Langer bill. Mrs. Hays predicts that the Langer bill will reach the floor this session 'with good chance of enactment.'"

"There is little doubt," Mrs. Hays added, "that drink consumption and alcoholism, now at all time high would drop one-half were people not persuaded to drink by radio and TV commercials, as well as by ads glorifying drink in the slick magazines."

"Mrs. Hays said the liquor traffic was warned after hearing in the Interstate Commerce Committee last year that unless the traffic cleaned up its advertising over the air, the job would be done for the traffic."

"Prewers have generally defied this warning," Mrs. Hays said. "There is growing sentiment that the people should not be pressured to drink and that alcohol should not be advertised to the home and children."

They also urged that citizens plead with their congressman and senators to pass the Langer bill, which they said was identical with the bill introduced last year, and ask congress not to destroy the Federal Bureau of Narcotics.

Desdemona Wins From Scranton By Score 8-2

In a conference baseball game played on the Scranton diamond the Desdemona Boys High School team was the winner by the score of 8 to 2. For Desdemona Harold Lewis was the pitcher and Leon Rodgers was catcher and for Scranton Jimmy Blackwell was pitcher and Billy Parks, catcher. The game was a close one for each team for the first four innings as Desdemona scored their first two runs in their half of the fifth inning, with Scranton scoring their first in their half of the fifth with Desdemona scoring five in the sixth and one in the seventh with Scranton scoring one in the seventh.

This win gave the Desdemona team a total of five wins in eight games. Harold Lewis of Desdemona extended his strike-out record to twelve, making a total of seventy-three for seven games. The result of this game placed Carbon, Scranton and the Desdemona teams in a three-way tie in the district race as each team has won and lost one game each.

With Billy Graham Speaker Reaches 30,000,000 Persons Nightly During Scottish Crusade

PERTH, Scotland — There's fire on the heather in Scotland. This expression, used for years by Scots to describe unusual religious moments, is being heard throughout the country again.

Evangelist Billy Graham's All-Scotland Crusade, now past the halfway point of its six-week schedule, has reached the cities, towns and remotest hamlets of the highlands.

The most popular topic of conversation — on the streets, in nightclubs, shipyards and civic luncheons — is Jesus Christ and Billy Graham. Members of the Scotch clergy have stated that such a situation has never existed in the present generation. A vast majority of the talk is favorable, but the loud minority, always present, serves to keep the subject alive.

The 17,000 people who attend services each night in Kelvin Hall form only a small part of the crusade. With modern amplification and electronics, Billy is now addressing the entire nation each night on a special relay system.

Beginning next week the whole of England will join the system. People gather in hundreds of halls and listen to the services from Kelvin. Without even seeing Billy Graham they make decisions for Christ by the thousands. Scores of Scottish pastors who had never in their ministry given an invitation for people to come forward at services are present at the relay points to give the invitations.

Long after Billy Graham has departed from Scotland these ministers will continue to give the invitation at their own churches. They have sensed the mood and hunger of the people.

Every medium of transmission has been opened to the popular American evangelist. Millions of people have been reached on radio and television. On one night Billy preached to an estimated 30,000,000, possibly more than Dwight L. Moody reached in his entire lifetime.

A young millionaire in the highland city of Inverness was stretched out on his bed on Sunday morning. Everything he touched had turned to gold. He later confided that he had everything and didn't need God. For no particular reason he reached over and flicked on the radio at the side of the bed. Billy was speaking over BBC and said, among other things, "What shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul? You can take every dollar in the Bank of England and all the treasures of Europe, but God says they amount to nothing in comparison with one human soul."

The young man got out of bed and dressed. A few minutes later he walked into church and took a seat in front of his brother. The brother tapped him on the shoulder and said, "John, I'm glad to see you here. I've been praying for you a long time." The man turned and said, "You're going to see me here a lot from now on. I realized while listening to a man on the radio a little while ago how futile my life has been."

A doctor was driving from Edinburgh to Glasgow and turned on his radio. Again Billy was speaking. "Only Christ can give you eternal life but he also provides victory over every temptation in the life you have on earth." The doctor wrote that he had been a slave to alcohol but found a whole new existence as he rode along the highway.

A converted businessman in Sussex, England, has revolutionized his business with God as the senior partner. Together with his employees he begins each business day with a prayer meeting.

Scores of similar events are happening throughout Great Britain every day. The Rev. Tom Allan, chairman of the All-Scotland Crusade, said, "It is impossible to realize the impact this campaign has had on the life of Scottish people at every level. And the most wonderful thing about it is that people are not talking about Billy Graham. They are talking about Jesus Christ. I am convinced we are standing on the threshold of the greatest religious movement in the history of the Christian church."

Over 300,000 have attended services to date in Kelvin Hall, with more than 8,000 decisions. But when he is not at Kelvin, Billy can usually be found at some other point in Scotland. Other team members also fan out in every direction, taking the message to as many people as possible.

On Easter Sunday Billy preached to an overflow congregation in Perth's famous St. John's Kirk (Church). It was from the same pulpit that in 1899 John Knox preached with such fervor that a riot ensued, sparking the reformation.

The traditional old church, which was founded in 500 A. D., played an important part in the national heritage of Scotland. The names of kings and queens are woven in the fabrics of its story. Edward I of England worshipped there. One of the congregation's most treasured possessions is a communal chalice reputed to be the gift of Mary of Guise, mother of Mary Queen of Scots. A beautiful baptismal basin, dated 1649, was given by Charles II. In 1644, 800 covenanters were imprisoned there by Montrose after the Battle of Tibbermuir. The Earl of Cornwall was slain before the high altar by his brother, King Edward III, in 1335.

Standing there knee-deep in history and tradition, Billy told the congregation, "You will never see the kingdom of Heaven unless you are born again through faith. In Jesus Christ." He quoted St. John 11:25-26, "Jesus said unto her, I am the resurrection, and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live: and whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die. Believest thou this?" And many believed.

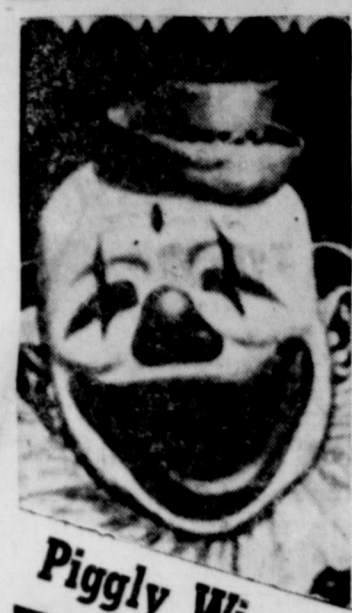

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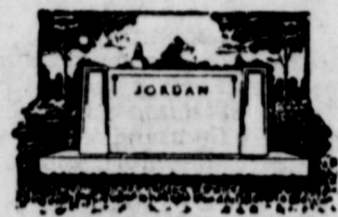

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Thursday Afternoon Club To Bring Albany's Fandangle Sampler To Eastland Free to the Public

The Fandangle Sampler, a miniature edition of Albany's summer show, The Fort Griffin Fandangle, will be presented in Eastland, free to the public, under sponsorship of the Thursday Afternoon Study Club, at 8 p.m. Thursday in the Eastland High School Gymnasium. It is expected to draw a minimum of 500 people to its Eastland performance.

The Fort Griffin Fandangle, of which the Sampler is a part, was first presented in 1938. Since that year there have been 10 productions, each different, though the theme of each show is based on the history of Fort Griffin, the army outpost established after the Civil War 18 miles north of Albany to protect early settlers from the Indians. The Sampler which will visit Eastland contains selections from the eleventh production now in preparation and will serve as a preview of next summer's show. The Thursday Afternoon Club has named the City Commissioners and Eastland school children as honored guests for the Eastland show.

The Sampler is just what its name implies, a sample of the Fandangle proper. It lasts about forty minutes, contains songs and dances which give an idea of what the full length Fandangle is like.

About 80 people, high school students and adults, form the Sampler company. Under leadership of Robert Nail, Fandangle author and director, they are organized into a singing and dancing unit, take to the highways, giving free performances in neighboring towns.

The unit carries an electric organ, played by the Fandangle music director, Alice Reynolds, and its own lighting and sound equipment. The performers appear in costume.

Folk ballads and breakdowns compose most of the music in the Sampler, though this year's edition, Miss Reynolds, says, also includes some original music. Fandangle dances are all based on the squares, schottisches, polkas and other dances of this area's pioneers.

The performers in the Fandangle are all natives of Albany. The cast is restricted to those who were born, at one time lived or now live in Albany. It is strictly a made-in-Albany product.

It is produced by the Fort Griffin Fandangle Association, a non-profit corporation without stockholders. All earnings from the big show are plowed back into the project to make the next year's show bigger and better. No person is paid for being in it and even the director and musical director work without remuneration.

The Sampler has made appearances in cities as distant from Albany as Lubbock to the north and College Station to the south. It was telecast by WBAP-TV in 1952 as part of a series, picturing outstanding creative activity in Texas.

Dates of the Fandangle proper in Albany are June 23, 24 and 25 in Albany.

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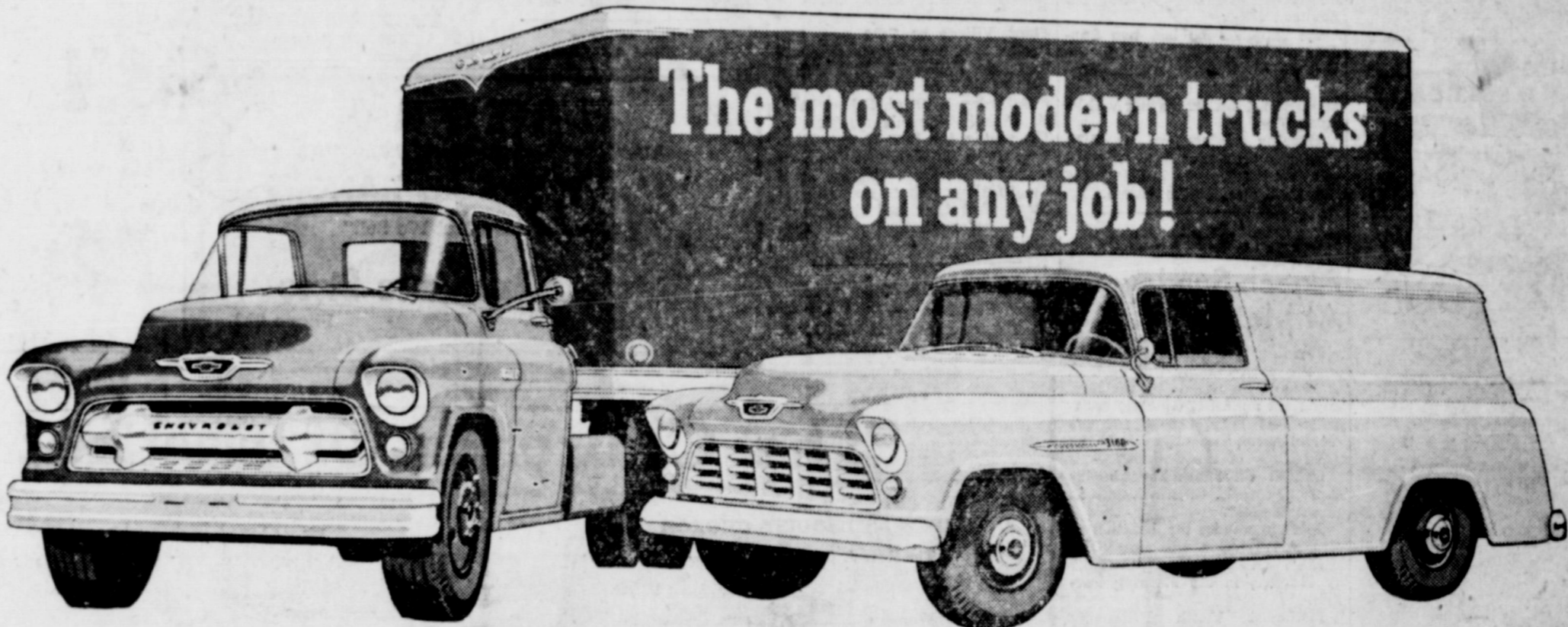
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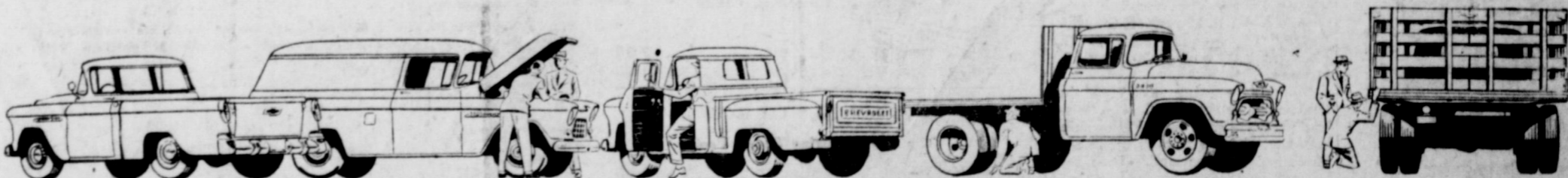
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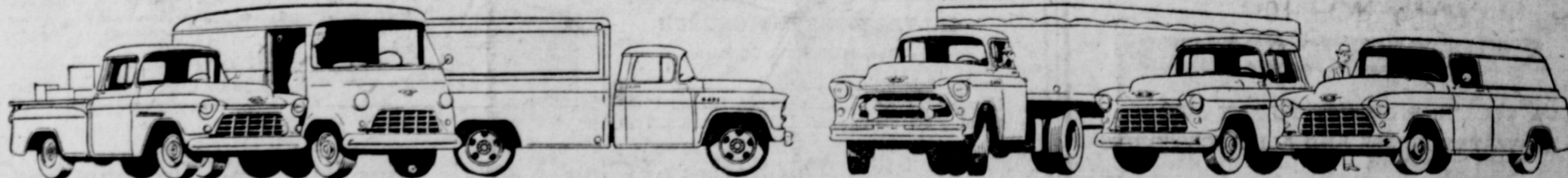
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
