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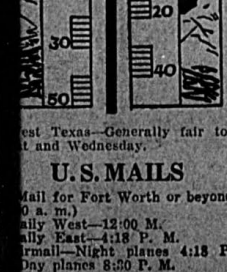
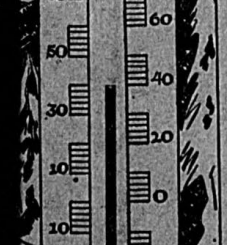

Hoover Delivers His Message To Congress Today

By PAUL R. MALLON United Press Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—President Hoover asked congress today to appropriate at once \$100,000,000 to \$150,000,000 to aid employment...

Recognizing the necessity for these increased expenditures, Mr. Hoover said at the same time cautioned the house and the senate about the condition of the federal treasury, depleted during the business depression.

Indirectly he assumed the 1 per cent tax reduction could not be continued and directly he advised the most rigid economy in order to avoid the necessity of any increase in taxes.

Prohibition was not mentioned by the president, who based two-thirds of his message under the heading "economic situation" and "agriculture."

That cooperation requires that every individual should sustain faith and courage; that each should maintain his self-reliance; that each and every one should search for methods of improving his business service; that the vast majority whose income is unimpaired should not hoard out of fear but should pursue their normal living and recreation; that each should seek to assist his neighbors who may be less fortunate; that each industry should assist its own employes; that each community and each state should assume its full responsibilities for organization of employment and relief of distress with that sturdiness and independence which built our great nation.

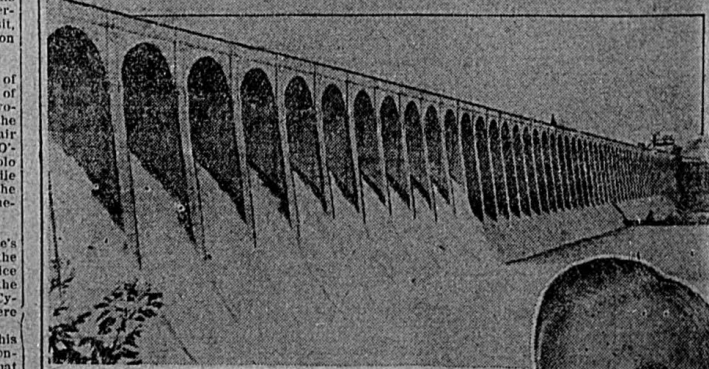

CAPITOL'S SOCIAL SEASON OPENS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2—The great glass doors of the White House will be thrown open tonight for the first event of the official social season—the cabinet dinner.

The ten heads of government departments with whom President Hoover works daily in affairs of State were the invited guests of the first state affair.

This morning the same group gathered with him around the work table of the cabinet room in the executive offices. Tonight they will forget business and assemble under the gleaming chandelier of the state dining room.

It is the first of 14 dinners and receptions to be held at the White House before the lenten season. There will be two new faces in the group since the dinner last year. William N. 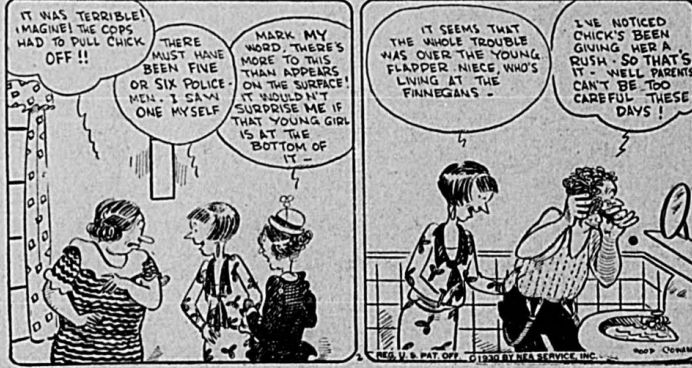
CHARITY GAME ON DEC. 14

FAMILY MENU

ALTHOUGH the rich English plum pudding usually is associated with Christmas there are other puddings of the "plum" type that are suitable for Thanksgiving.

The ages and tastes of her guests will enable the hostess to choose the pudding best suited to her needs. A rich plum pudding served with a rich sauce is not suitable for children, but there are plenty of delicious puddings that will please both children and adults without danger of over-taxing small digestions.

Stale bread or biscuit crumbs can often be used to advantage in fruity puddings. Cracker crumbs are also frequently used with the result that the puddings are very light and fluffy.

Fig Pudding

One-half pound dried figs, 1-2 cup sugar, 1 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 2-3 cups biscuit crumbs, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-2 cup sweet milk, 1 teaspoon baking powder.

Put figs and suet through food chopper. Add sugar and work until creamy. Add eggs well beaten, biscuit crumbs and salt. Mix and add milk with baking powder dissolved in it. Mix thoroughly and turn into a buttered and floured mold. Steam three hours and serve with whipped cream.

Thanksgiving puddings uses cracker crumbs to make pudding not too rich for older children.

Thanksgiving Pudding

Four cups milk, 1-1/2 cups broken crackers, 4 tablespoons molasses, 1 cup sugar, 4 eggs, 1 teaspoon salt, 4 tablespoons melted butter, 1-2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 teaspoon nutmeg, 1-1/2 cups seeded raisins.

Scald milk and pour over crackers. Let stand until cool. Pour boiling water over raisins, cover

and let stand until plump. Pour off any water not absorbed by fruit. Beat eggs lightly and add to cracker and milk mixture with sugar, molasses, salt, butter and spices. Mix well and add plumped

raisins. Pour into a well-buttered baking dish and bake very slowly for two and one-half hours. Stir twice during first half hour to prevent raisins from settling in the bottom of the dish. Serve with hard sauce or sterling sauce. The next pudding is ideal for small children.

Graham Cracker Pudding

One pound graham crackers, 1 pound dates, 1-2 pound marshmallows, 1 cup nut meats, cream. Wash and stem dates. Any kind of nuts except peanuts can be used. Put crackers, nuts, dates and marshmallows through food chopper, alternating ingredients to prevent chopper from becoming clogged. Turn into a large mixing bowl and work with a wooden spoon, adding cream to make mixture moist enough to hold together. Shape into a roll about three and one-half inches in diameter and put on a platter. Place in the refrigerator to chill and become firm. Let stand at least twelve hours before serving. Cut in slices about one-half inch thick and serve with a garnish of whipped cream.
