Senator Caraway Scores Wickersham Commission

Hoover Accused of Being Vague and Undetermined On Prohibition Question.

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By LYLE C. WILSON. Special Press Staff Correspondent. WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Senator Caraway, Dem., Ark., described the Wickersham crime commission today as a cold storage device created by President Hoover to escape taking a definite position on the prohibition question.

"It is a cold storage commission," Caraway said, "and it is determined on prohibition during the campaign. He is suspected now by both the dry and the wet that the president wants to keep this question on the ice until he decides there is a settled public opinion with regard to it. And he believes he would be satisfied with a question after that.

Two Amendments To Be Proposed In Constitution

AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 28.—Two constitutional amendments will be placed before the state legislature in January with proposals that they be submitted to popular vote. Representative Walter Beck of Fort Worth is preparing one to permit large counties to frame their own charters, just as large cities now are permitted to do under the home rule act.

A committee appointed by the president of the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce is assisting Beck in drafting his amendment for county home rule, and investigations also are being made by the bureau of municipal research at the University of Texas, which have been put at Representative Beck's disposal.

Kellogg Is Given The Nobel Peace Prize For Year

LOSLO, Nov. 28.—Frank B. Kellogg, former secretary of state of the United States and co-author with Aristide Briand of France of the Kellogg-Briand pact to outlaw war, has been awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for 1929.

The award gave the United States her third Nobel prize this year. Sinclair Lewis won the 1930 prize for literature and Dr. Karl Landsteiner of the Rockefeller Institute in New York, received this year's prize for distinguished work in medicine.

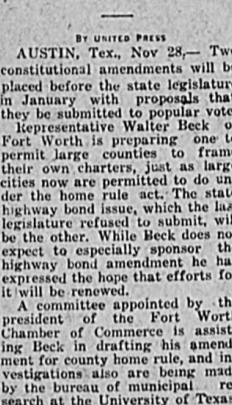
Sheriff Captures Still And Makes Arrest Wednesday

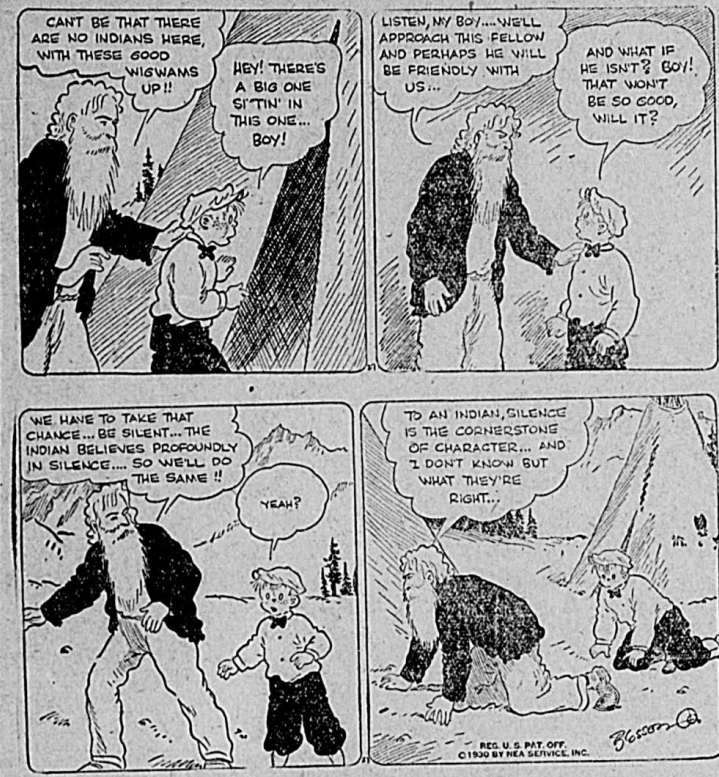
Murder at Bridge

Teachers Of Texas To Hear Arctic Fairy Tales Exploded

Vilhjalmur Stefansson, Explorer, Will Say Flowers Bloom and Bumble Bees Buzz Along Northern Coasts.

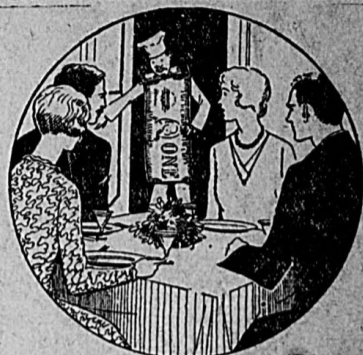
HOUSTON, Nov. — Vilhjalmur Stefansson, explorer, will dispel some of the myths about the Arctic in an address before the Texas State Teachers' Association at its convention here Nov. 28, the program committee announced today. "Abolishing the Arctic" will be the title of Stefansson's address.

Among the points the noted explorer will make are: No place in the Arctic has six months of daylight and six of darkness as commonly supposed; the thermometer reaches 90 and 100 degrees in the shade in many places inside the Arctic Circle; flowers and bumblebees are to be found on the coasts of the most northern lands in the world.

Stefansson has lived with the Eskimos 11 years. His explorations began in 1904 with a trip to Iceland, and continued with three expeditions to the far Arctic. Scientific organizations and geographic societies have honored him, and the Canadian government has given him a vote of thanks.

Three prominent educators also will be among the highlights of the teachers' convention. Dr. Chas. H. Judd, University of Chicago, will talk on social instruction in the schools.

Dr. C. D. Strayer, Columbia University, will deliver an address.
