

Jack Frost Chosen To Bar Position



JACK FROST

Jack Frost, well-known Eastland attorney, has been appointed along with John Alvis, Abilene lawyer — to a three year term on the 17th Congressional District Grievance Committee, according to President Maurice K. Bullock of Fort Stockton, president of the state bar of Texas.

Mr. Frost, Eastland - reared, son of Mrs. Cyrus Frost and the late Mr. Frost, also a prominent attorney, is a graduate of the University of Texas School of Law. He has served as vice-president of the State Junior Bar Association, is on the board of directors of the Brazos River Authority and is active in many civic enterprises.

The committee serves as a watchdog over the portion of the state's 12,000 lawyers who practice in the 17th Congressional District.

Each congressional district in the state has at least one grievance committee, members of which are recommended by a member of the board of directors of the State Bar Association living in the district.

President Bullock pointed out that even though the legal profession is a highly honorable one, with the large number of lawyers in Texas it is necessary to have some sort of policing action to keep everyone in line.

Any citizen is invited to take their complaints to the grievance committee in their district and it in turn will investigate the complaint and take the proper action on it, Bullock said. The complaints must be justified and if so will receive the immediate attention of the state association, he asserted.

Lions Told About Schools By Supt.

Eastland High School with an enrollment of slightly under 200 offers a course of study comparable to any school in the state with an enrollment as high as 500, School Superintendent Wendell Siebert told members of the Lions Club at their weekly luncheon Tuesday.

Mr. Siebert was principal speaker at the luncheon, for which Ed Freyschlag was program chairman. Speaking on the subject of

Eastland High School in general, the superintendent passed out mimeographed sheets showing the courses of study offered by the average high school in the state with an enrollment under 200, and compared it to the Eastland course of study which offered three times as much to students in this school system, equally as much as in districts with a high school enrollment in excess of 500.

The superintendent said further that Eastland had as high a percentage of teachers with master's degrees as any school in the state. He pointed out that it took a quarter of a million dollars annually to run the Eastland system. This year there will be a total of 48 on the payroll, 33 of whom will be teachers.

Mr. Siebert said Eastland is confronted with the same major school problem as every other district in the state and that is overcrowding and inadequate facilities. He said the citizens of this area might as well prepare themselves for it because sooner or later a new building program would be inevitable.

At a short business meeting the Lions Club voted to sponsor an entrant in the Bathing Beauty Contest to be held at the opening ceremonies of Lake Leon on September 3 and 4.

It was also announced the Club luncheon will be held at the Connellee for the next two weeks.

Gulf Terminal Operation Due To Start Monday

A \$1,500,000 installation, the Gulf Oil Corporation Eastland Terminal, just east of the bifurcation of the road from Cisco, and Eastland to Breckenridge is due to open for operation Monday.

Principal units of this establishment include a loading rack, a parking area for trucks, two steel storage tanks for gasoline—one for 37,500 barrels; the other for 27,000 barrels.

The terminal reportedly will handle between 7 and 9 million gallons of gasoline monthly, the fuel reaching here by pipeline from Port Arthur.

The operation is expected to bring in about fifteen or more families.

Bollworms In County Offer Crop Threat

Heavy infestations of bollworms in cotton in various parts over the county pose a threat to the potential yield, according to word at the county agent's office in Eastland.

Yields on much of the 7,500 acres of cotton over the county will likely be reduced unless control measures were started in time. The boll worm, it was explained, was considered the worst of the cotton insect pests in this area.

The cotton boll worm is the same worm as the corn ear worm, more commonly known as the roasting ear worm. It has shown up in parts of the county feeding on both peanut vines and on grain sorghums, besides cotton.

A mixture of toxaphene and DDT as a spray is being used in most instances. Other recommended sprays are Endrin and Endrin and DDT mixture.

It is very important according to County Agent J. M. Cooper, to spray three times, five days apart in order to break up the life cycle of the bollworm. Sprays applied seven and eight days apart have not proved effective.

The worm has a pinkish cast as it grows older and larger and some are confusing it with pink bollworms. A generation of this worm may be completed in 30 days with four to six generations annually. The worm in the larvae stage of its life cycle feeds upon the cotton squares and the cotton bolls.



JUDGE CLYDE GRISSOM, Chief Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals, 11th Supreme Judicial District, says the next arguments in his court are slated for Sept. 9 and invited us to attend anytime court is held. . . so we plan to go. . . Nice up on the 5th floor at the Court House and we enjoyed a tour there conducted by MISS NORMA VICKERS, Deputy Clerk of the Court of Civil Appeals, and visiting also with MISS EUNICE NALL, Court Stenographer.

When JUDGE GRISSOM attended the Texas Civil Judicial Council, he saw J. IRVIN CORNWELL and DISTRICT JUDGE A. ROYCE STOUT, both of Waxahachie, long - time friends of the writer, and JUDGE W. C. MATHES of Los Angeles, formerly of Plainview — all there for the State Bar Association convention.

It was the first time since Judge Grissom joined the Army in February, 1918, that he had seen Judge Mathes and it had been many years since he had seen Mr. Cornwell, both of whom were Delta Tau Deltas with him at Texas U. and they discussed the days when they all lived at the Delta Tau house.

The Texas Civil Judicial Council is made up of 16 men; Judge

Grissom, vice president of the group, presided in the absence of Judge Gordon Simpson of Dallas who was in Spain at the time.

"U.S. District Judge Mathes," said Judge Grissom, "tried 14 of the leading communists of the United States at Los Angeles in a trial that lasted six months," and it was interesting to hear his old friend tell about that experience.

C. L. ROGERS, deacon, Baptist Church at New Hope No. 2, in The Telegram office to announce a revival beginning there Friday night, gave us the real low down on farming out his way. . . Crop Outlook Better As Rain Pelts Area

Eastland County, the state's third highest peanut producing area in the state, yet has excellent prospects for one of the best crops in recent years.

With nearly 35,000 acres in peanuts this year, the prospects have grown brighter in recent days with a few scattered and light but life-giving showers within the county, and more promised this week.

T. C. Wylie of the Ranger Peanut Company has said that the outlook at this time is better than at any time during the past five years, but that one more general rain would be needed for an outstanding harvest.

The U. S. Weather Bureau has brightened the picture with a forecast of additional moisture as lazy, dark clouds rolled over the area the past two days dumping some showers.

The Southwestern Peanut Growers Association has reported that the loan advance to growers would be \$228 per ton on 70 base grade peanuts in this area. The support price is expected to amount to about the same as the loan advance.

County Agent J. M. Cooper has urged the spraying of cotton fields with the recent arrival of the flea hopper, bollworms and bollweevils. The county agent said that advanced feed crops were developing rapidly and that pastures were in fairly good shape. Farm stock tanks also hold an adequate supply of water from rains that fell in the spring.

Over most of the large expanse of Texas, the crop and pasture situation was generally the same as Eastland County with prospects brightening as showers and heavy rains drenched some portions.

Upper costal and trans-Pecos counties received scattered light to torrential showers. In other parts of the state, moisture was getting away fast as temperatures began hitting the 100-degree level.

As August rolled around, the first load of rice had been delivered to the dryer and considerable additional acreage was approaching maturity. Cotton harvests pushed northward into south central counties and sorghum combining was started as far north as Denton in the blackland and the Haskell-Aspermont area in the low rolling plains.

In the plains and trans-Pecos area, third cuttings of alfalfa were being baled. On the high plains, most wheat land has been turned preparatory to seeding and timely showers were beginning to germinate the volunteer crop.

Harvest of corn extended into southern blackland counties. Corn in northern blackland counties was making good development. Combining of grain sorghums was past the peak in south central Texas. Condition of the crop in the northern low rolling plains were remaining very good with irrigated sorghams showing promise of excellent yields.

Harvest of a light crop of peanuts continued in south Texas.

Back in Eastland County, watermelon farmers in the Rising Star area are winding up the harvest of what may be the largest harvest in the community's history.

Hot, dry weather in the past few days in that area have pushed the

per acre yield below pre-drought marks but the acreage, about 1,500 acres, is the largest ever reported.

Most of the crop has been gathered, and will be completed in about two more weeks.

Farmers estimated that the yield averaged about \$50 to \$100 per acre, although some made a bit more than that.






