# **OIL WELL IS SAVED FROM** DESTRUCTION

Fires Still Continue Near Enough To Endanger Lives Of All Who Go Near Well.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 1.—
The wild Morgan oil gusher which has threatened the entire city for the past two days by spraying oil over the city, was temporarily saved from destruction late today when a thousand workmen and National Guardsmen extinguished a waste oil fire that spread to within a few yards of the roaring gusher.

While workmen beat out the fire in an adjacent field expert oil men poured chemicals on the surface of the Canadian river, which separates the burning area from the gusher and which had become covered with burning oil.

The danger had not subsided, however. Small blazes kept breaking out and grimy fire fighters rushed about in frantic efforts to control them.

Colonel Turner Roark, commander of the National Guard, issued a warning for all city residents to stay at home. He issued the following warning to the residents of the community:

"You take your life in your hands when you come into the eastern part of the city."

Roark said the fire was extinguished the instant the chemical was poured on the surface of the Canadian river. The origin of the fire was reported to be unknown.

WASHINGTON—Washington was bearing up nicely under the various South American revolutions right up to the time Brazil's rebels ended theirs with unexpected suddenness by seizing Rio de Janeiro.

The State Department had recognized the new governments of Peru, Bolivía and Argentina just at the psychological moment. It saw a more friendly regime established at Buenos Aires, as demonstrated by the prompt appointment of an ambassador to Washington after a long period in which President Yrigoyen had emphasized his dislike for us by appointing none. It was able to get Capitain Grow released by the new Peruvian leaders after they had threatened him with, court-martial for-anti-rebel activities.

The upsets had all happened so quickly that the department had had no time to make any mistakes and thus avoided getting its fingers burned.

Similarly, the diplomats representing the countries involved had survived their periods of worry.
