WHY WOMEN LEAVE HOME.

The "economic independence" of women has gone farther than most of us have suspected. A census bureau report just published shows that in 1920 there were 24 per cent of all our women engaged in gainful occupations, and women were 20 per cent of the whole working population. Almost one-half of the single women were earning their living, or a considerable part of it, and two married women out of every nine were working outside of the home.

The proportion is greater now. The movement is far too strong to be stopped—if it were desirable to try, which it isn't.

Criticism of women for "leaving home" is beside the mark.

mark.

As Dr. Joseph A. Hill, the census expert who made this study, remarks, it's the home that is leaving the women. Economic necessity and industrial progress drive them from home employment, or from home idleness, as the case may be.

GERMAN RADICALISM.

The radicals had a regular field day in the German national election. There was a political overturn so amazing that the victors themselves are still dazed by it. The Socialists lead, with the Fascists second and the Communists third, in a long list of parties. The two leading groups, both standing for the overturn of the German republic, could control the government by hanging together. Or the first and third might control by hanging together.

It is not likely, however, that the republic will be overthrown. Socialists and Fascists do not mix well. Neither do Socialists and Communists, nor Fascists and Communists. With all the talk of "radicalization" of Germany, the radical leaders who talked so loudly during the campaign will be less radical when they take the helm. Germany is an orderly country, not given to sudden overturns and rash experiments. Governmental forms and national policies will not change overnight there, any more than in England.

COURAGE TO TURN BACK.

"Be bold, be bold,—but not too bold!" was the famous advice given to the medieval knight. Our knights of the air are learning that lesson.

It takes courage, along with intelligence, for an aviator en route from Japan to America on a great pioneer flight to turn back to Tokio when nearly one-third of the way across. It would be easier for most men to keep on. Many a pilot, indeed, has yielded to that temptation since ocean-flying began—and his bones rest in the sea.

Bromley and Gatty lost nothing in public esteem by acting from judgment rather than desire. And they had good precedent. Coste, the great French flyer, on his first trial of the Atlantic, turned to flee from head winds when half way across. With the life and the ship he'saved thereby, he triumphed later. Bromley and Gatty may do likewise.

Most states and communities are still priding themselves on their stop-and-go traffic lights, but Pennsylvania has gone beyond that. It is abolishing such highway ornaments as rapidly as it can. The other day the state highway department announced proudly that it had got rid of 500 of them. As a result, there is now only one traffic light to every 33 miles of highway.

At first useful, and still useful in reasonable numbers and at the right places, these automatic signals have become nuisances by their excessive use. In many cases they are found to be obstacles to traffic rather than aids. Sometimes they cause accidents. The whole spirit of present-day traffic regulation is to keep motor cars moving except when there is some good reason for stopping them, so in Pennsylvania the obstacles are removed to let the stream flow unimpeded.

\*\*NEWSLESS NEWS REELS.\*\*

A plea for news reel pictures that offer news is voiced by Robert Littell, writing for the New York World.

"More and more am I aware," he says, "of the fact that what I see is not life, not events as they happen, but a palpable pre-arrangement, a deliberate staging of effects." He observes that the celebrities supposedly caught in action by the camera man have really been posed by a director, made to say lines prepared by a publicity man, probably rehearsed ahead of time for this appearance."

This, he exclaims, is nothing but canned news. He, and a lot of other persons, would rather have it fresher.

Perhaps it is better to see statesmen, athletes and other mortals suitable for news reel material, posed than not to see them at all. Much can be learned from their bearing regardless of the coached smile and studied demeanor, for after all these people are not trained actors. Yet the criticism is just. There's too much posing and artificiality in the news reels. Some genius will reap a large reward by introducing news pictures truer to their name.
