Lobos, Who Open In Eastland, Will Start Work Monday

Cisco's Lobos, who open the season in Eastland with the EHS Mavericks, Sept. 9, have been called for practice in the 1955 season Monday.

Coach Jay Williams has instructed all candidates to meet him and Assistant Coach George Owens and B Team Coach Bill Tate at the field house and receive equipment and begin work.

Coach Williams will be faced with the chore of shifting his team to fill vacancies in the backfield created by graduation. Only two of last seasons regular backs are returning for the 1955 team. They are Tommy Reynolds, quar-

terback, and Benji Lipsy, halfback. John Carlile, last season letterman fullback, will be ready for action this season.

The possibility of moving some of the linemen to backfield slots is being discussed as is the possibility of using some freshmen members.

The line is in better condition than the backfield with some 11 lettermen returning from last year's team. They are Ends Bill Smith, Johnny Trigg and J. M. Branton; tackles, Ed Bernie, Lavere Adams and Carrol Thames; Guards Joe Farrow, Tommy Collier, Kenneth Penn and Frank Walton and Center Ronnie Qualls.

Don Meir, Robert Fletcher, Lee Swindle and Rodney Callaway, squaden and "B" team members, were expected to bolster the line. There are no members of the "B" team backfield available for "A" team competition this season.

Several members of last year's "B" team, including Charles Lavery, Carson, Donica and others will help round out the team along with several players from last year's Midget team and transfers from other schools.

Coach Williams said that plans call for holding two drills daily until school begins on August 31. Drills will be held at 8 a.m. and 5:30 p.m. each day.

Preparation Of Food To Be Shown Here

Latest methods of preparing foods for freezing will be presented in the Texas Electric Service Company office, Tuesday, August 23, it was announced by F. N. Sayre, manager.

Miss Elizabeth Gunther and Mrs. Frances Rooney, TESCO home service advisors, will conduct two demonstrations at 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. They will demonstrate the preparation of foods for freezing, the newest materials available for packaging, and the cooking of frozen foods.

Miss Gunther will display a food freezer with food arranged according to four classifications.

A picnic shelf will include sandwiches, meats, salad and cup cakes. The party shelf will include a frozen salad, cake, fruit juice ice cubes, tarts and sherbet.

A meat shelf will include a variety of frozen meats, eggs, bread, baked-stuffed potatoes and doughnuts. The fourth section will be an array of commercially frozen foods available in most food stores.

Miss Gunther will demonstrate the preparation of a vegetable for freezing and the proper packaging of fruits, vegetables and meats. As she packages and prepares one meat dish, she will take the frozen meat previously prepared for the freezer and cook it. Electric table appliances, including the deep fat fryer and the electric skillet will be used in the demonstration.

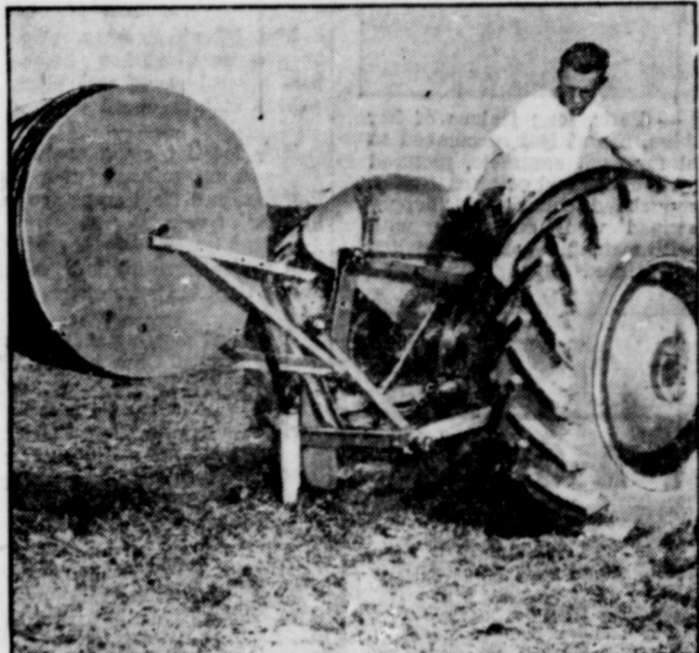
Relative Judge Boggus Buried Sat. Afternoon

Disposable reels holding up to 600 feet of piping are attached to the machine, which is constructed for a three-point hitch, but which is adaptable to any farm tractor, according to the manufacturer. Operating at tractor speed, it is designed to uncover a trench, lay pipe 14 to 20 inches deep and back-fill after itself, at the rate of 100 feet per minute.

Service hours in the revival meeting at the Olden Baptist Church which opens Sunday have been announced.

They will be at 8 p.m. and 7 a.m. each week-day. The Rev. Oral P. Bowman will bring the messages.

Thanks to the Eastland Quarterback Club, the Eastland High School Mavericks will enjoy football training facilities this year second to none in the State of Texas.

Latest project of the Club, which includes 300 members consisting of Eastland citizens and Maverick boosters, is completion of the beautiful new practice field off the high school campus.

This field was originally dreamed up by James Brock, who was Junior High School coach several years ago, but since it was an expensive undertaking the Quarterback Club took over the project and brought it to completion this year.

Approximately \$1,500 has been spent on the field by the Quarterbackers. After the surface was all leveled out by extensive grading, the field was covered with 700 yards of rich soil and commercial fertilizer and sowed with Bermuda grass seed. After careful watering all summer long the turf is as beautiful and healthy as that in the Cotton Bowl in Dallas.

The football field is also surrounded by a 440-yard track with a 220-yard straightaway. The Quarterback Club has not yet decided whether to cover the infield with cinders or oil, but one or the other will be decided upon before track season opens and the final surface will be applied.

The proximity of the practice field to the school campus makes it handy to the storage rooms, lockers and showers, and the condition of the turf allows the boys to practice on the same kind of field they would find in regular season games.

Another outstanding contribution to the team this year was the purchase a few days ago of a Bell and Howell 70DL movie camera with telephoto lens. This camera, with extra equipment, cost the club \$450. It will allow the Maverick to take pictures of their own games whereby mistakes can be pointed out and corrected, and it can also be used for scouting the games of future opponents.

Movies taken by the camera on Friday nights can be sent to Dallas for developing and be back ready for showing by Sunday night.

Although nothing definite has been announced, the Quarterback Club plans to meet each Monday night during football season, but this is a matter that will have to be worked out and announced later.

Frank Hightower is president of the club, with Brandy Humphreys vice president and Clyde Manning secretary and treasurer.

Members of the board of directors include Wells Dalton, Jack Chamberlain, Joe Stephen, Tom Lovelace and Clyde Young.

Both School Superintendent Wendell Siebert and Coach Carrol Shelton were lavish in their praise this week of the work done by the Quarterback Club and said that Eastland owed the organization a debt of gratitude that would be hard to repay.

Uranium Dirt Sit Industry Into County

"Uranium dirt sitting" has become so popular in Comanche County that the installation of a similar sitting house is being planned near Rising Star in Eastland County.

Construction of the "sitting house" is planned on the Carl H. Dunn ranch six miles east of Rising Star.

Sitting benches are being built on a concrete floor under an aluminum covered roof 25 feet high, and a portion of the seats are slatted and covered with upholstery material to prevent soiling the clothing of sitters.

In others the dirt will be exposed for the benefit of those who prefer contact with the radiating earth. Each section now being built will accommodate about 20 persons, in the 110x54 foot building, which will have ample space for enlarging if necessary.

A public address system will be installed and provisions made for playing music. A refreshment bar is also planned.

Dunn, who is engaged in the pipeline contracting business makes his home in Fort Worth and commutes by air between his headquarters and the modern, well-improved ranch which was his boyhood home. power. The first piece of power equipment was a Model T Ford truck with pumping equipment. Tune said. The department never used horses to draw any of the equipment.

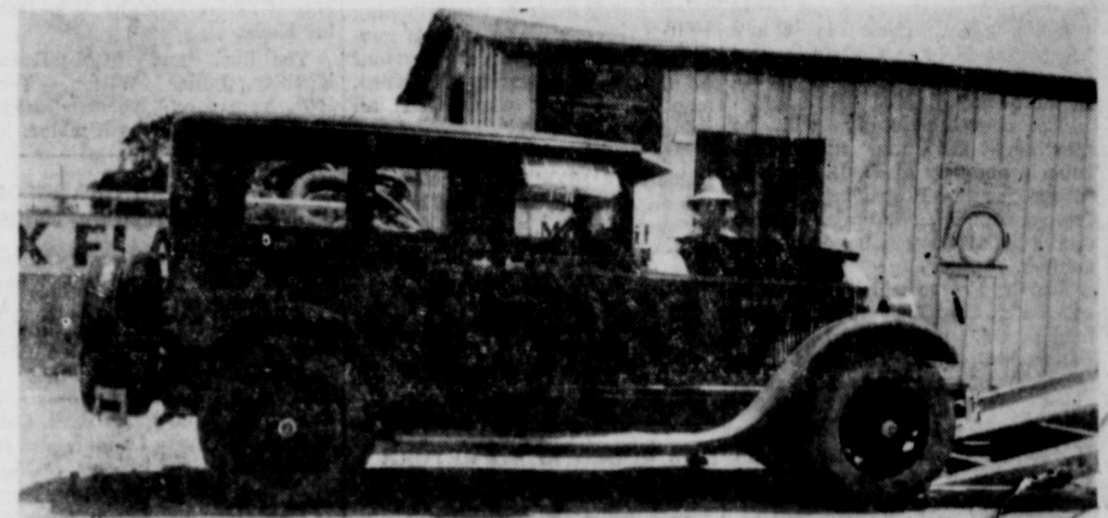
