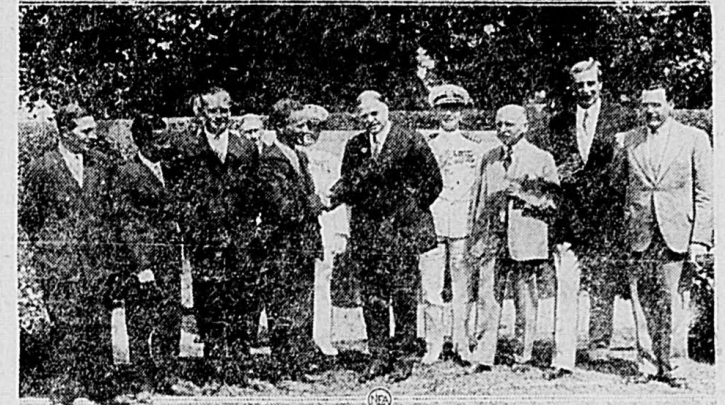

A RUM POLL BY BAR ASSOCIATION

The first asks the lawyers if they favor a poll on the prohibition question, and the second if they favor adoption of a resolution by the American Bar association to stand for repeal of the national prohibition amendment. 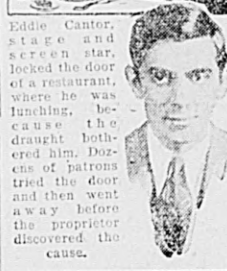

Indiana Man's Diary Kept Complete For 57 Years

LEBANON, Ind., July 7.—All of the joys and sorrows, gladness and tragedy, of the past 57 years of David Cohee's life are in an open book for those who care to read.

Since 1873, Cohee has chronicled the daily happenings of his life and the visitors to his marriage, Boone county farm, four and one half miles north of here, are invited to read what he has put into the 57 volume "library."

He has lived here all but one of his 77 years and the incidents recorded day by day were not the momentous events of the world, politics, wars, and economic strife—but rather were the personal, human things of which all lives are made.

One can scan the pages to read the story of Cohee's youthful days, his early years, his marriage, the purchase of his farm, and later the poignant story, day by day, of his wife's illness and finally her death.

One reads of a clear, cold day in January, when young David went a-courting his bride-to-be and the terse little notation in his diary of "we sat and talked for a while—quite a while."

In the volume of 1876, one reads of his marriage and the purchase of his farm. There are stories of a young farmer struggling to get along.

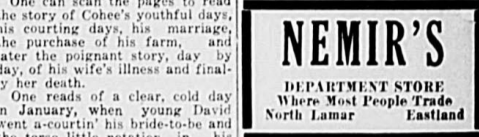
"Helped Jane's Pa butcher today and got a hog that weighed 115," one page reads. "Weather cool, rained at sundown."

The story is complete, and the reader gets a clear picture of the joys and trials involved in raising six children. One reads the joy at the arrival of the first grandchild and the cohees first great grandchild.

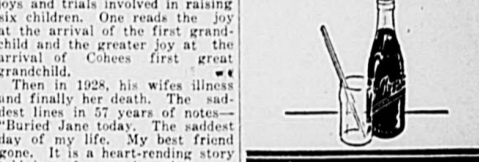
Then in 1928, his wife's illness and finally her death. The saddest lines in 57 years of notes—"Buried Jane today. The saddest day of my life. My best friend gone. It is a heart-rending story told in a few words; the companion of 52 years gone; children married and an empty farmhouse."

Cohee was born Oct. 1, 1853, in Clinton county. The following year his father moved to Boone county and David has lived here since. He has six children, 16 grandchildren and seven great grandchildren and the annual reunion of the family is an affair that draws everyone of the Cohees of the county.

Cohee can trace the records of his family back to 1788, 12 years after the signing of the Declaration of Independence, when Benjamin Cohee was born in Delaware on Sept. 10, 1788.

King And Queen Of England Are Wed 37 Years

Royal Couple Able to Look Back on Life Crammed with Great Events.

LONDON, July 7.—Thirty-seven years of married bliss, an example to husbands and wives all over the world, was completed yesterday by King George and Queen Mary.

In the calm which comes with age—the King is 65 and the Queen two years younger—they can look back on a lifetime crammed with events; events common to all—births, deaths, marriages, and events peculiar to royalty—a coronation, the responsibility of their empire in the throes of war, the never-ending state functions.

Their married life has been one long romance. Even their wedding was romantic, a film story in an age when cinemas were unknown.

Queen Mary was destined to become the consort of the Empire's ruler. Daughter of the Duke and Duchess of Teck, she was almost from birth educated for the position which her mother dreamed she eventually would hold.

In the course of time Princess May, as she was known then, became engaged to the Duke of Clarence, elder brother of King George, and heir to the throne after his father, King Edward VII, then Prince of Wales.

Opinions differ whether the betrothal of Albert and May was a love-match or an affair of state. But the facts are these:

The Duke of Clarence died suddenly in 1892, following a cold while shooting at Sandringham. The court was plunged into mourning and Princess May was stated to be prostrate with grief. Yet no sooner had the year of official mourning ended, than the world was startled by the announcement of the betrothal of Prince George and Princess May, to be quickly followed by their marriage, July 6, 1893, just over a year after the Duke of Clarence's death.

The private affairs of royalty are sacred and no breath of the usual domestic squabbles has ever become known. It has always been said that the King and Queen are an exceptionally affectionate couple.

After the marriage, they set up house at White Lodge, Richmond Park, Surrey, as the Duke and Duchess of York, and there led the life of an ordinary, more or less obscure, royal husband and wife.

A son was born to them a year later, the infant who is now the Prince of Wales, to be followed by another son, the present Duke of York, the year after, and then by a girl, Princess Mary, in 1897. Two more sons were born in 1900 and 1902, Prince Henry and Prince George.

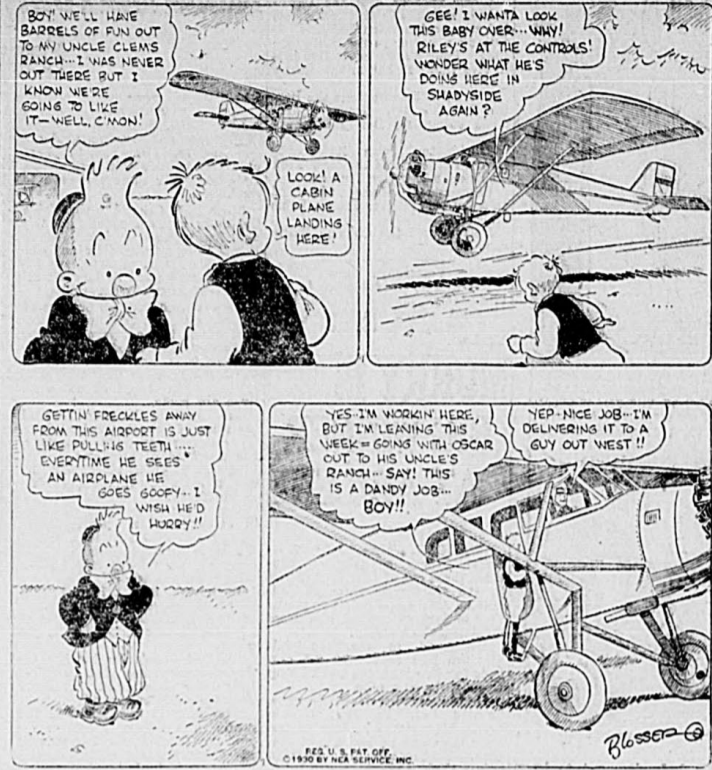
By this time King Edward had come to the throne on the death of Queen Victoria, and the Duke of York had been made Prince of Wales.

It was in 1910 when King Edward died, that George became King of England, and Mary Queen Consort. In the following year, little Prince David was made Prince of Wales with traditional ceremony at Carnarvon castle, Wales.

Cisco Man Locates Buddy Of Army Days 16 Years Ago, Through Photo

A news photograph published in a county newspaper was instrumental in the renewal of the friendship of two former "buddies" in the United States army after a period of 16 years during which neither knew the whereabouts of the other.

Some time ago John G. Reanan, city engineer of Cisco, saw a picture of Walter Dunden in the newspaper. Dunden was president of the Polar Bear association and headed the group which went to Russia and located the bodies of 86 American soldiers who fell in the expedition to Siberia shortly after the close of the war.

Not the least of events in the lives of the King and Queen was the nearly fatal illness contracted by the King in November, 1928. The deep devotion of the royal couple was never more marked than during the critical period of the King's illness during the Christmas of 1928. Such was the attention that the Queen lavished on the King then, that she herself had a slight breakdown in health due to over-work and worry.

Yesterday, King George and Queen Mary looked back on 37 years of harmonious, if not altogether placid, married life, and will look forward to many years unmarred, so far as human prophesy can tell, by any calamities.

WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON—The British embargo on American apples, which is causing such acute sorrow to our apple growers, is one of those trade barriers. There are several kinds of trade barriers and this particular variety is known as the horticultural type of trade barrier which rises when one country says some fruit, vegetable or grain from another country is afflicted with a disease or insect and hence may not be imported.

as are imported almost exclusively from the United States, such as automobiles, can be soaked with stiffer duties, although the new duties will apply to any other country's automobiles.

Trade barriers may be explained because of the possibility that we will hear much more about them, are any artificial regulations or requirements which interfere with the passage of goods between nations. Import duties are the most important and most common trade barriers. Pure food laws and horticultural restrictions are another class. Some countries may require import licenses permitting importation in stipulated quantities, thus controlling the importation of a given commodity at all times.

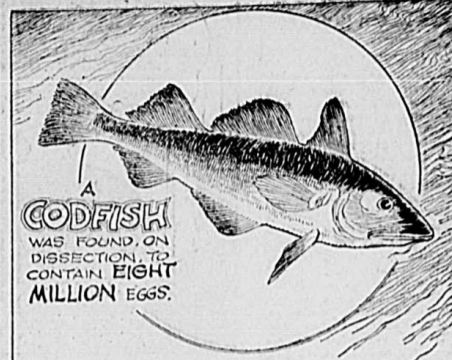

Let Hot Sandwiches Help Keep Friendships Warm

THE little suppers we serve twice a week drop in informally to pass the evening, can be made most on a hot sandwich. The food served does not need to be elaborate, but the menu should be carefully planned so it will be attractive without requiring too much preparation.

Hot sandwiches are especially good to serve on such occasions, and they can be made very easily and quickly. Served with Spanish Queen Olives, pickles and relishes, such sandwiches form a complete party meal, though crisp cups of lettuce, filled with Chili Sauce, Sandwich Relish or cole slaw, are favored by many hostesses as a delicious accompaniment.

Serve some of these appetizing sandwiches at your next party, for everyone is sure to like them:
Open Club Sandwich: Cut bread 1/3 inch thick and toast quickly so it will not be hard and dry. Then butter each slice. On one slice place a lettuce leaf, and then a slice of tomato. Spread with Salad Cream, and a tart spicy dressing, which is perfect for this type of sandwich. Next add two slices of crisp bacon. On a second slice of buttered toast place a slice of chicken or other cold meat—it may be veal or pork, or in an emergency, a layer of devilled ham. Sprinkle with shredded lettuce or watercress, and top with a spoonful of Sandwich Relish. Arrange the two slices of toast on a plate, and garnish with slices of tomato or Fresh Cucumber Pickles.

Toasted Ham and Olive Sandwich: Boiled or baked ham (or you could substitute bacon for the ham). Then add a cup Stuffed Spanish Olives, sliced, and heat in the hot fat.
Supper Sandwich: Slice one white bread 1/4 inch thick and spread each slice with a thin layer of Prepared Mustard Sauce. Flake the contents of one can of tuna fish, and mix with Sandwich Relish, using half as much Sandwich Relish as Fish. Spread generously between slices of bread, and press firmly together. Dip in slightly beaten egg to which has been added 1/2 cup milk, and salt and pepper to season. Brown quickly in a skillet with several tablespoons butter, and drain on unglazed paper. Serve very hot, garnish with watercress, or a tiny lettuce cup filled with India Relish.
Peanut Butter, Bacon, and Chili Sauce Sandwich: For each sandwich spread two slices of bread on one side only. Spread the untoasted slice with Peanut Butter blended with Chili Sauce. Place slices of crisp bacon on the untoasted side of the other slice, and put the two together. Garnish with Preserved Sweet Pickles.
Double Decker Sandwich: Cut rye, white or whole wheat bread in thin slices, allowing 3 slices for each sandwich. Spread with Prepared Mustard Sauce. Place a leaf of lettuce and a thin piece of American Cheese spread with Prepared Mustard Sauce on one slice, and cover with a second piece of bread. On this lay boiled ham or tongue, and spread generously with Sandwich Relish. Place a leaf of lettuce and a thin piece of bread on top, and press firmly together and cut in half diagonally. Place a Pickle Pan on top each half. This may be served with cole slaw.
To Make Pickle Fans: Using Preserved Sweet Pickles—cut very thin parallel sections almost the length of each pickle. Then carefully spread out the sections like a fan.
