Annual Need of Highways

The state highway commission has let it be known that if the program of highway development is to be speeded up to meet the general demand, the annual income of the state highway department from state sources ought under no circumstances to be less than \$30,000,000.

In addition to this the highway commissioners said the people of this commonwealth have an investment of not less than \$1,000,000,000 in motor vehicles and that these are of value to their owners in proportion to the condition of the highways or roads over which they are operated.

These commissioners of highways take the position that material reduction in the motor vehicle license fee will seriously cripple the work of the department and that a 50 per cent cut would be ruinous.

They advanced the argument that the people are not clamoring for a large reduction in license registration fees, but are seeking good roads and properly maintained highways. There is another side of the picture, according to the lawmakers. They say that the owners of motor vehicles are demanding a sweeping reduction.

They say that the highway department has expended \$86,000,000 in two years and five months and instead of a fund shortage they have approximately \$15,000,000 in the treasury strong-box subject to check.

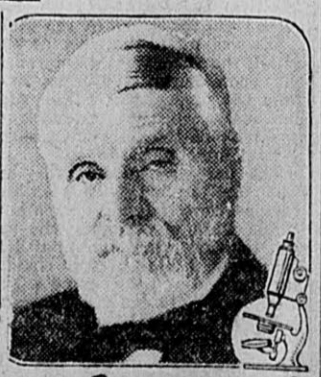

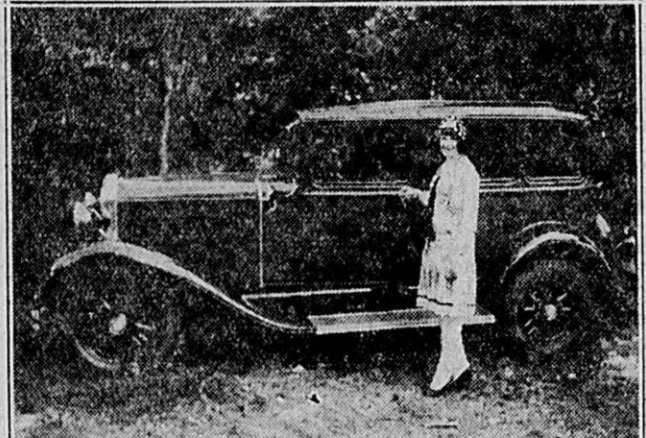
