# CISCO MAN NEAR DEATH FROM GUNSHOT WOUNDS

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McKenzie has been granted three reprieves since his death sentence for killing Detective Chief Sam Street of San Antonio.

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The fear that the youth would get a cool reception here for endangering the lives of the three fliers on their hazardous journey across the Atlantic by adding his extra weight to the ship was quickly dispelled soon after the Yellow Bird made its landing. In the language of Schreiber himself—

"I'm sittin' pretty."

Because of the rain and the uncertainty of the hour of arrival there was only a handful of persons at Le Bourget field when the plane made its landing last night. But Laurent Eynac, French administrator, was among the 300 at the hangar and he personally expressed France's forgiveness to Schreiber.

"I know nothing about aviation," Schreiber said. "I only knew that the plane was there and that it was going to Europe. I honestly did not know I was endangering the lives of the three French fliers."

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Crowds of Sunday night pedestrians passed within a few feet of the bandit when he shoved a gun through the ticket window of the Princess theatre and forced Miss Freda Bogel to hand over part of the night's receipts amounting to only \$22.

The bandit followed the same tactics at the community theatre but there secured \$250.

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No bond has been set in Looney's case. Looney was shot with a .35 automatic pistol. He was brought to the hospital by Oscar Corner. A bullet of the same calibre wounded Wise, who told officers that he emptied his pistol with his left hand while sitting in his car.

Wise is a former ranger and is also employed by the Texas Cattle Raisers association. Trouble had first occurred between the two men about a year ago when Wise undertook to arrest young Looney at a dance at Moran, according to Wise. Early Sunday morning Wise on his way to Breckenridge stopped in Cisco for a few minutes and while talking with Deputy Sheriff Wilson on the street young Looney came up. Some words were spoken in a jocular vein, officers said, and the men parted with no indication of trouble.

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IS U. S. A. DEMOCRACY?

Mrs. Gann started something recently when she demanded recognition as official hostess to her brother, Vice President Curtis. She turned the spotlight of public curiosity on the most amazingly rigid and intricate social system in the western world.

Chief Justice Taft can never meet a foreign ambassador at dinner, because social tradition ranks them as equals and there is no way of deciding which should sit at the hostess' right.

Congressmen are not of equal rank. They are seated according to their length of service. If two began their terms at the same time, he whose state was admitted first is given precedence.

Among congress members from the original 13 states precedence may be a matter of five minutes. Their states were admitted practically simultaneously, but the delegates were sworn in a few minutes apart.

A member of the official set does not dare call on a cabinet member's wife on any day but Wednesday, nor on the wife of a foreign diplomat except on Friday.

Guests are not only seated at dinner according to rank, but they must depart in order. The honor guest must always leave first. To leave before him, even if you have an urgent engagement, is to violate the code.

How seriously intelligent people regard these innumerable rules is shown not only by the Gann case but by many others. Admiral and Mrs. Dewey once left a white house dinner in dignified dudgeon because she felt that she had not been accorded her proper place. A supreme court justice has done the same. And a senator's wife left a luncheon because an ex-senator's wife was given the place to the right of the hostess.

Callahan County Pioneer Buried

BAIRD, June 16.—W. O. Maltby, 60, prominent pioneer stockman and farmer, died here Saturday morning about 11 o'clock. He was a son of the late Capt. Maltby, noted ranger captain and Indian fighter who came to Callahan county 52 years ago from Burnett county.

W. O. Maltby had been married 33 years, and is survived by his widow, two sons, two daughters, and several brothers and sisters. He was a member of the Baptist church for the past 12 years.

The funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at Admiral cemetery in the Admiral cemetery, Bird Lodge No. 271, I. O. O. F., of which he was a member, had charge of the burial services.

Finding on his desk at the executive offices this morning a telegram from a group of citizens at International Falls, Minn., asking for "protection" against over-zealous border patrol officers, the chief executive dropped all legislative and administrative business for a time to give personal attention to disposal of the message.

The present enforcement trouble has confronted President Hoover with precisely the situation he sought to avoid at the outset of his administration. He declared emphatically soon after his inauguration that his administration policy on enforcement would be to avoid all dramatic or sensational acts and check at every opportunity the acts of over-zealous agents. He declared again in his New York speech of April 22 that care should be exercised by all enforcement officers to keep within the law. The enforcement of law never justified the breaking of other laws, the president said on that occasion.

SIX ARE INJURED AT LAKE WORTH

PORT WORTH, June 17.—An accident on the miniature railway at Lake Worth came near being disastrous for six pleasure seekers Sunday when one car jumped the track and hurled its occupants along the right-of-way.

Three of the party, Mrs. W. T. Tuffly, 58, Fort Worth, H. J. Tuffly, 58, Dallas and Mrs. M. C. Hall, 55 Eryan suffered serious injuries and were rushed to a hospital in ambulances. The other three, W. J. Tuffly, 60, Mrs. H. J. Tuffly, wife of the Dallas man, and their son, Harry, two years old, escaped with cuts and bruises.

Robison Hearing Is Off Until Tuesday

AUSTIN, June 17.—With the legislature on a trip to Mason, Texas, today to attend the meeting of the Hill county chamber of commerce, the hearing of charges against Land Commissioner J. T. Robison has gone over until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning. Governor Moody's testimony Saturday afternoon closed the presentation except for the testimony of C. W. Truehart, former assistant attorney general who is to testify tomorrow. Attorneys for Robison will then begin presentation of the land commissioner's side of the controversy.

TWO HURT AT ABILENE

ABILENE, June 17.—Week end automobile accidents resulted in the death here Sunday of Mrs. M. J. Casey, 50, of Belton. Mrs. Casey's husband was seriously hurt. The couple was en route to Belton when the accident occurred.

Oklahoma Reports Seven Fatalities Over the Week-End

OKLAHOMA CITY, June 17.—Automobile accidents and drownings over the week end claimed at least seven Oklahoma lives and caused injury to a score.

Tablequah officials today had before them the mystery of how Newton Thompson, a full blooded Indian, met his death on a highway east of the Cherokee county seat. Newton was picked up on the highway Sunday and taken to a hospital where he died a few hours later. Officers believe he had been beaten and left upon the highway where a motor car ran over him.

Ed Fernan, Huco, was killed and Tom Lain and Hal Welch were seriously injured late Saturday night when their car ran into a ditch ten miles north of Sulphur. A. E. Quicke, 66, Ochelata farmer, was killed late Saturday when a car driven by Mrs. May Hodges, a negro, struck him.

W. B. Warner, ranch employe, was drowned at Cleveland late Friday. Mrs. Frank Boggs, 48, of Norman was killed and her husband was seriously injured and three others were injured when the car driven by Boggs crashed into a truck north of Norman Sunday.

Board Reports On X-Ray Films Which Exude Poison Gas

WASHINGTON, June 15.—X-ray films such as those which exuded death-dealing gases in the Cleveland clinic disaster last month should be stored outside or in a vault built on the roofs of buildings where they are to be used, an army board which has just completed experiments with similar films reported to the war department today.

FORMER SALVATION ARMY HEAD IS DEAD

LONDON, June 17.—Ben. William Bramwell Booth, son of the founder of the Salvation Army and its second general, died at his home at Hadleywood, near London last night. Gen. Booth was 73 years old last March 8, and had been in ill health for some time. He was ousted as commander-in-chief last winter by the high council of the Salvation Army and that action was believed to have contributed to his failure to withstand the illness from which he had suffered for almost a year.

VOLCANO ACTIVE

HAKODATE, Japan, June 17.—Violent volcanic eruptions near here threw the whole district into a panic early today. Refugees were evacuating the countryside. The electricity here has been cut off as a safeguard against damage. Factories were closed down. Special trains were put into operation to help the population evacuate the danger zone.

MOTHER AND 3 CHILDREN ARE SLAIN

Bodies Found In Their Home; One Child Was Still Breathing When Found.

DETROIT, June 17.—The bodies of Mrs. Anna Podlaski and two of her three small children were found in their home at River Rouge, near here late today. Apparently they had been slain with a hammer which was found in the rear of the house. A third child still was breathing when police discovered the bodies and was taken to a hospital in a dying condition. The children all are less than four years old. River Rouge police are seeking the slain woman's present and former husbands.

FLASHES

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., June 17.—One of the hottest debates in years in the Florida house of representatives today resulted in the passing of a resolution condemning the republican policy of entertaining the negro republican congressman's wife at a white house tea. The name of Mrs. Hoover was successfully eliminated from the caustically worded resolution.

NORTH HEAD, Wash., June 17.—All members of the crew of the wrecked steamer Laurel were removed today except Captain Louis Johnson, who refused to leave the derelict. The vessel was pounded in two just outside the Columbia river.

MAUD, Ok., June 17.—A counterfeiter, who operated in this oil field town but fell into the hands of the law because he got drunk, today was the object of an extensive search by Pottawatomie and Seminole county officers after a sensational jail break early today. Two armed men entered the jail here early today, knocked Jailer Vaughn over the head and covered the constable with a pistol, then they went to the cell of C. S. Wilson, the alleged counterfeiter, and took him to a car waiting outside in which they made their escape.

WASHINGTON, June 17.—The house today passed a resolution authorizing the president to invite the various states and foreign governments to participate and attend the international petroleum exposition to be held at Tulsa, Ok., on Oct. 5, 1939.

NORTHAMPTON, Mass., June 17.—Mrs. Grace Goodrich Coolidge, former first lady of the land, was one of four recipients of honorary degrees at the 51st commencement exercises of Smith college here today.

ENID, Ok., June 17.—Two children were burned to death here today when their mother left them to visit a neighbor's house across the street. The victims were Helen Lopp, 9, and her brother Arthur Lopp, 3. Explosion of a kerosene stove was believed to have caused the fire.

TULSA, Ok., June 17.—Limited service on Tulsa's street car and bus lines was maintained today with the help of volunteer private cars as the second day of the Oklahoma Union railway employes strike began. The 228 motormen, bus drivers and mechanics who demanded a three cent an hour increase and a seven day vacation with pay, walked out early Sunday morning.

WASHINGTON, June 17.—Entertainment of the wife of Oscar De Priest, negro congressman from Illinois, at the White House last week was condemned in a resolution introduced in the Senate today by Sen. Blaine, Dem., South Carolina. The resolution asked Mrs. Hoover to be "careful" whom she entertains. Introduction of the resolution caused an uproar in the Senate with Republicans attempting to have the resolution expunged from the Congressional Record.

May Name A Place for Hamilton Trial Today

AMARILLO, June 17.—Further conferences between opposing counsel in an effort to agree upon a trial site were scheduled for today in the case of R. H. Hamilton, prominent Amarillo attorney, who is charged with murder in the fatal shooting of Tom Walton, Jr., his son-in-law, last May 4.

Three Are Killed As Car Crashes Under A House

TOPEKA, Kas., June 15.—When the automobile in which they were riding crashed under a house, elevated and being moved through the city streets, Richard Wahle and Sheldon Hozebloom were nearly decapitated here early today. Both were killed. Harold Broughton was taken to a hospital in a critical condition and died on the operating table.

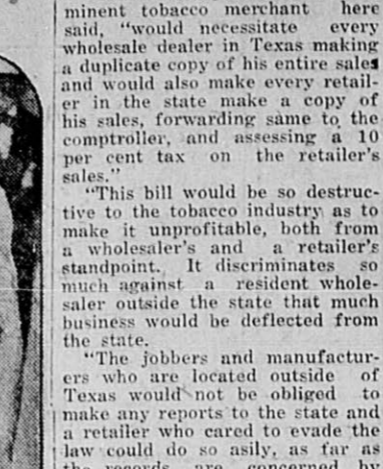
