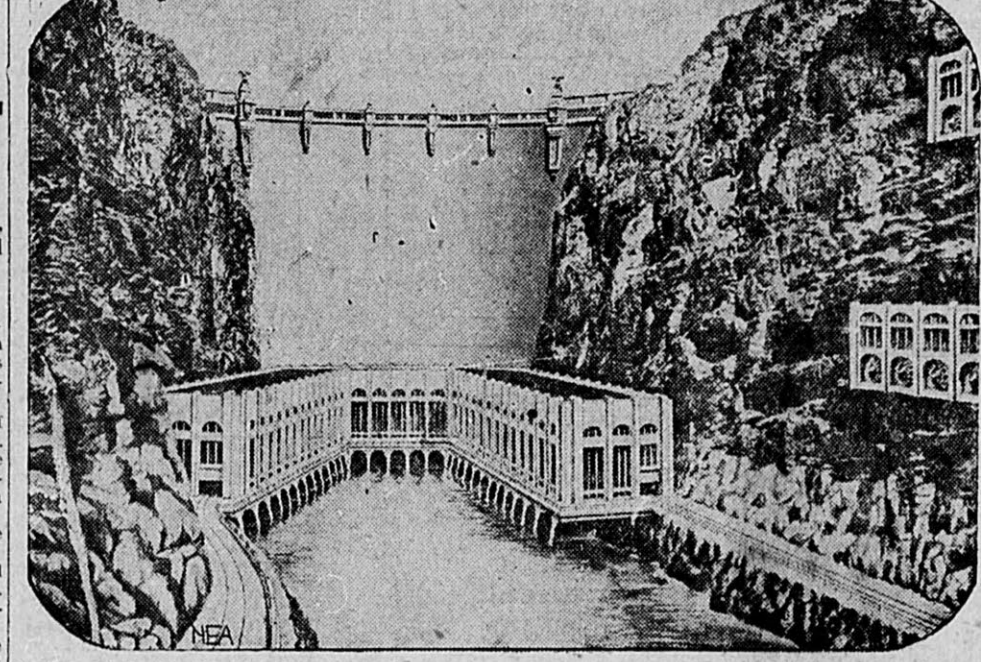

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#### MUST ANSWER 20 CHARGES INCLUDING ONE THAT HE IS INCOMPETENT AND UNFIT

If the House Decides That the Charges Can Likely Be Sustained, They Will Vote Articles of Impeachment to Be Tried By the Senate.

AUSTIN, Tex., June 13.—Hearing of the charges against State Land Commissioner J. T. Robison began in the House of Representatives this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. First proceeding was calling the list of witnesses. Under rules of procedure each side will make a preliminary statement before the testimony is taken. Appeal will be allowed from ruling on admissibility of evidence when the appeal is seconded by 15 members.

AUSTIN, Tex., June 13.—J. T. Robison, a gray haired, semi-invalid man of 68, today faced charges which, if sustained, will remove him from a public office in which he has spent exactly one half of his life. The Texas House of Representatives has decided that he must answer 20 allegations against his official conduct, made by Rep. Grady Woodruff of Wise county.

The Charges Are:  
(1) That he paid \$827 of state money to a motor company in violation of law and without proper voucher.  
(2) That he paid \$78.86 state money to satisfy a personal obligation.  
(3) That he paid \$19.30 state money to satisfy a personal obligation.  
(4) That he paid \$24.75 to satisfy a personal obligation.  
(5) That he appropriated to his personal use \$200 state money.  
(6) That he permitted Mrs. J. T. Robison to receive \$100 state money without proper warrant.  
(7) That he paid Claude Crover \$54 without authority.  
(8) That he paid Dr. Chas. S. Venables \$300 state money to satisfy a personal obligation.  
(9) That he paid J. M. Robison of Houston \$1,000 without proper warrant.  
(10) That he paid the National Bank of Commerce of San Antonio \$500 for private personal purposes.  
(11) That he paid the Alvarado Bulletin, Luikin Daily News and Comanche Chief from 75 cents to \$5 for political and personal advertising out of state funds.  
(12) That he converted \$1,000 state money to his own use.  
(13) That he converted \$500 state money to his own use.  
(14) That he converted another \$500 state money to his own use.  
(15) That he kept \$25,454.18 of state money in his possession without accounting for same.  
(16) That \$20,325.51 collected as a reappraisal fund was placed in bank and checked out without any sort of record to show purposes for which expended.  
(17) That the public free school fund of the state was depreciated \$1,902,185.93 under the reappraisal act of 1913, and depreciated \$5,133,517.18 under the reappraisal act of 1927, through gross negligence and incompetence.  
(18) That a joint legislative investigating committee found evidence of "gross negligence, official misconduct, incompetence and unfaithfulness."  
(19) That state land commissioner Robison is officially incompetent, grossly negligent and careless and wholly unfit and unqualified to render further service to this state as such official.  
(20) That an additional resolution by blind Representative Olin Van Zandt recited that the investigating committee Robison has been unable to account for \$82,797.29 received in an official capacity; that he used some of this for private purposes and made payments out of it to various members of his family; that he received numerous gifts in lands and money including \$6,786.70 refund checks of the reappraisal expense assessment.  
To these charges Commissioner Robison already has answered before the investigating committee. The committee recommended suit for the \$32,797.

The money upon which the charges are based, Robison contends, was not a public fund. The expenditures from it were in preparation for an automobile trip he made over the tracts of land to be reappraised and the expenses incurred at all times, he contends, are borne by such trips. There has been no money left in the bank to meet all outstanding claims for refunds against reappraisal assessment.

Expenditures from the fund which are attacked, Robison testified he considers legitimate. They include hospital, medical and surgical services incurred when he was stricken while engaged in the reappraisal work.

In a half comatose condition, he testified, he heard the physicians in consultation say he could hardly survive an operation. He drew a check to pay his necessary funeral expense.

"I never received a cent," he said "from persons who had matters pending in the land office." Refund of the reappraisal money, he said, was in appreciation of the way the work had been handled at low expense.

WHILE BE DEFENDED.  
For him will be heard more than a hundred defenders of his handling of land affairs.

Robert B. Allen Sr., of Dallas and C. T. Freeman of Sherman, who were employed to present the charges had not decided this morning whom they will call first.

They were in conference with the auditors who only reached Austin this morning. "We will be ready to start at 11 o'clock," said Allen. Dayton Moses of Fort Worth, one of the counsel for Robison said they will seek no delay.

If the house decides the charges can likely be sustained they will vote articles of impeachment. Trial of the impeachment charges, if voted, will be held by the state senate.
