

## THREE MEN ARE KILLED BY HIGH VOLTAGE WIRE

### New Wells Revive Oil Development Interest Here

**Hoover and Oil Conservation**  
Pres. Hoover has about-faced. He has recalled his oil conservation order of March 12. Pressure brought to bear from seven western states which insisted that the order placed havoc with their development without aiding conservation to any appreciable extent "apparently was the cause of the change," wires a Washington correspondent.

A committee of the department of the interior created to carry out the March 12 order, issued by the president, made a ruling largely nullifying the effect of his order. Although the ruling was issued by the commission it is announced that the commission did so as the result of instructions from the White House.

It was a victory for the oil men of seven western states. They appealed to the president and the president lent a listening ear. Petroleum is a power in the world. Now why should foreign oil be kept on the free list?

Demands of the U. S. C. C. Remands of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States are interesting. They call for united congressional support of the federal reserve system, repeal of the national origins provision of the immigration act, reduction of corporate income taxes, continuation of railroad rate making by the interstate commerce commission without congressional interference, and the right of federal judges at all times to issue injunctions in labor disputes. First and last, the national chamber declared its confidence in the federal reserve system and that basic industries, large or small, should not be burdened with "unusually high interest rates resulting from security excesses." A potshot, so to speak, at Wall Street and the high class gamblers of America.

'Should be Left to Congress'  
In the shadow of the Alamo, the San Antonio Express prints this trite observation, "States are repealing and not enacting income tax laws." This is another shot at the Mauteritz income tax bill: "Double taxation and multiple taxation are recognized everywhere as pernicious in principle and mal-economic in effect."

This is a third shot at the gentleman under the big dome: "This is a world problem, to which the International Chamber of Commerce will give attention at its Amsterdam meeting in July. Through treaties and laws the chamber seeks to eliminate the practice of two nations taxing the same property or income."

And this is the advice of the editor of the Alamo newspaper: "Federal and state governments certainly should avoid that imposing wherever practicable. The income tax should be left to congress."

Experts say a few years ago Florida placed in their state constitution a prohibition amendment against both income and inheritance taxes. Florida became one of the best known fields of investment under American skies. Its villages became cities. Its population more than doubled. Its wild lands became productive fields. It won its proper place on the map of states.

**DAMAGE SUIT DROPPED**  
DALLAS, Tex., May 14.—The \$25,000 damage suit against Art Shires, Chicago "White Sox" baseball player, brought by Mrs. Ida Lawson, widow of Walter Lawson, Shires' partner, was dismissed by Judge William A. Atwell in United States district court today for lack of prosecution. Lawson was a ball thrown into the grandstand at Shreveport by Shires last night and died December 19, 1928.

### THREE NEW PRODUCERS ON TOP PAY

Territory Northwest, South and East of Eastland Scene of New Production. Other Wells May Be Drilled Soon.

A revival of interest in oil development here was seen today when three new wells in widely separated territories appeared on the horizon. While none of the tests are in wildcat territory, some of them are in the deep pay and are in territory long ago proven and to some extent abandoned.

The Belva Oil company, drilling deeper what is known as the old Braden Oil company well on the Stinnette lease, northwest of Eastland, struck a 4,000,000 cubic feet flow of wet gas at a depth of 3,498 feet, which is in the Marble Falls pay. The well had formerly been drilled to the Caddo line, which was reached at a depth of 3,261 feet. The well is now shut down for storage and as soon as this is supplied will be drilled in.

W. T. (Jinks) Garrett and N. A. Moore's No. 1 T. J. Adams, lot 61, McLennan county school land and three and one-half miles east of Eastland, struck the pay early this morning at a depth of 3,570 feet and within a few hours had spouted oil over the crownblock three or four times. No gauge had been made and the amount of production is not known. It is to be drilled in as soon as arrangements for storage can be made.

E. Lewis and others of Eastland are also interested in the lease and well. Kirk & Whitesides struck the pay in their No. 1 J. S. Turner, H. & T. C. Ry. company survey, section 30, which is making 50 barrels per day from a depth of 1,298 to 1,319 feet. The pay is from a 25 foot sand. This well is 1 1/2 or 5 miles south of Eastland.

### Skies Brighten In Livingston Flood Areas

LIVINGSTON, Tex., May 14.—A shakily, hastily built foot-bridge over a creek which a few hours before had been a raging torrent was Polk county's only outlet today, while a flood which hit this area continued to menace a wide situation.

Though no bodies had been reported recovered at noon, several persons along swollen creeks and the flooded Trinity river were reported to have been drowned.

Fear gripped this town last night as in darkness, dotted by sputtering lanterns and the sizzle of drift-filled water, inhabitants planned relief work. All parts of Polk county were inundated during the afternoon and as night fell fear was expressed that additional rains would drag from house-tops and trees the many who had taken refuge.

With dawn, however, and as the day wore on the tension was relieved. Relief work continued under direction of the Livingston fire department and others.

Creeks which sent their waters over all parts of the county, sometimes as deep as 20 feet, were down today.

It was over one of these streams, Melton creek, on the Livingston-Lufkin highway, that the temporary bridge was built. Buses from each of these towns began to operate, hauling food, bedding and relief supplies to the Livingston side of the creek. These were carried afoot over the bridge.

Rainfall here was estimated at 12 to 20 inches, there being no official report. It was the worst flood in a half century.

### FUNERAL FOR C. L. McRAE HELD TODAY

Younger Brother of Judge John D. McRae Dies in Helena, Ark.

C. L. McRae, younger brother of Judge John D. McRae of Eastland, died at his home in Helena, Ark., yesterday morning. Funeral services will be held today followed by burial at Helena.

Judge and Mrs. McRae received a message last Friday advising them of the serious illness of Mr. McRae and left immediately for Helena. They will attend the funeral today.

### SIX JURORS SECURED FOR BECKY'S CASE

Gen. Beaumont B. Buck of San Antonio, Brigadier General Jacob F. Wolters of Houston, Judge Nelson B. Phillips, former Chief Justice of the Texas Supreme Court, and Governor Dan Moody will be among the speakers on the program being arranged for the Memorial Day dedication services at which the new Eastland county courthouse will be dedicated to the memory of the Eastland county men who rendered service to the country during the recent world war, if invitation sent them by the program committee are accepted.

At a meeting of the various committees held last night in the county courtroom in Eastland, work of whipping the program into shape for May 30 was gotten well underway and a complete program will soon be announced.

It has already been determined that there will be a big parade, a number of speeches from men of state and national renown, and band concerts galore. The 124th Cavalry Band of Mineral Wells will be in the parade as will the bands of Cisco, Ranger, Olden, and Eastland. J. E. Spencer of Cisco is chairman of the band committee.

The decorations committee headed by H. O. Tatum, city manager of Eastland, announced at last night's meeting that the committee would begin at once to decorate the city and have everything in that respect in readiness before the date set.

The reception committee, headed by Mayor Williams of Cisco, and of which Mrs. M. H. Hagaman of Ranger and Dr. E. W. Kimble of Gorman, are members, reported that it was taking charge of the work allotted to them and would have important announcements to make within a short time.

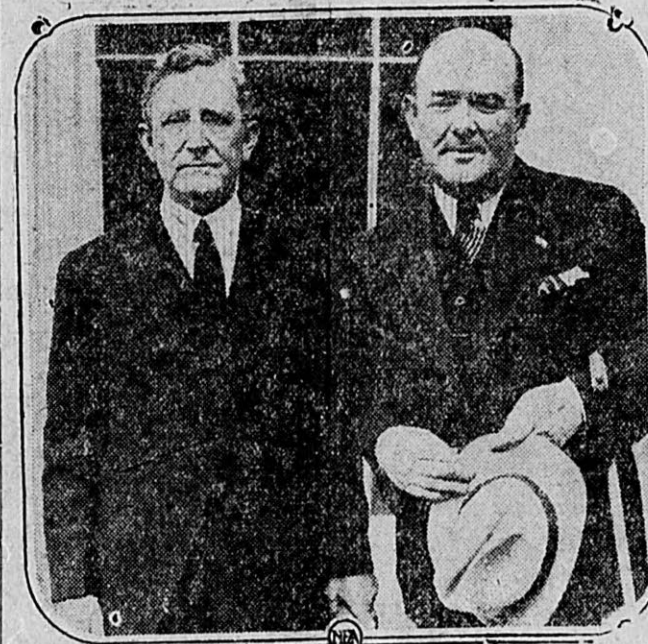

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### BANKHEAD IS UNDER NEW OWNERSHIP

Fort Worth Poultry and Egg Company Will Operate the Business Here. Box Continues As Manager.

A deal has been consummated by the terms of which the Fort Worth Poultry & Egg Company, a subsidiary of Armour & Company, has taken over the business of the Bankhead Poultry Producers' Association, with headquarters in Eastland, according to an announcement made Tuesday by I. E. Box, formerly manager of the Bankhead and who is the resident manager of the new concern.

The Fort Worth Poultry & Egg Company will either lease or build a building in Eastland suitable for the business, and will install a modern dressing plant, have cold storage facilities, and purchase poultry, eggs, cream and handle feed. Eastland will be a concentration point for carload shipments.

### Governor Sends New Message To The Legislature

AUSTIN, Tex., May 14.—Justice should be within the reach of the poorest man," Governor Moody said in a new message to the special session of the Legislature submitted today.

The governor urged that the legislature, which has but a week to remain in session, at once pass a bill providing that appeals may be taken in civil cases by paupers without posting of court costs.

Under a recent decision at San Antonio, Governor Moody says, a pauper has no chance to appeal. The governor also submitted as a topic for legislation, creation of Brazoria county drainage district No. 5.

Bills were offered also for water improvement district, 10, 11 and 12 in Cameron county.

With minister-members taking opposite sides in a theological debate, the Texas House of Representatives today voted favorably on such a bill 87 to 38.

The bill failed to muster enough votes to suspend rules so has little chance of final passage in the six remaining days of the session.

A similar bill was passed by the House at the regular session but failed to pass the Senate.

By agreement consideration of the automobile registration fee bill proposing a reduction, was put off until this afternoon.

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### JOHN WEAVER DIES AT HIS W. VA. HOME

Brother of Joseph M. and Frank Weaver of Eastland, Died Suddenly This Morning.

Message was received this morning in Eastland stating that John Weaver, brother of Frank and Joseph M. Weaver of Eastland, died suddenly today at his home in Wheeling, W. Va.

Immediately upon receipt of the message Frank Weaver and Mrs. Joseph M. Weaver left Eastland on the T. & P. Texan for Wheeling. They will be joined enroute by Joseph M. Weaver who is now in the East.

John Weaver had visited his brothers in Eastland often where he was very popular. The news of his death was a severe shock to his friends and relatives here.

### FLASHES

ELIZABETH, Tenn., May 14.—Disorders broke out afresh today in this strike-torn textile town, with national guardsmen arresting more than 200 picketing strikers. Several were injured, one believed fatally, in the clash.

CLEVELAND, O., May 14.—Emmet T. Ormsby, American league umpire who was injured here Saturday when struck by a pop bottle in the Cleveland-Philadelphia game, was reported to be improving today.

CHICAGO, May 14.—Gabby Hartnett, star catcher of the Chicago Cubs, returned here today for a tonsil operation. Hartnett's throwing arm has been bad all year and it was hoped his operation will remedy the trouble. The operation was advised by eastern surgeons who said they believed bad tonsils may have affected Hartnett's throwing.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 14.—When a bandit attempted to hold up and rob Howes' Pharmacy, Mrs. C. E. Howes, wife of the owner, engaged the bandit in an argument until her husband, behind the prescription counter, could load his pistol. Howes killed the bandit.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—A Senatorial investigation of labor conditions in the textile industry throughout the country appeared likely today following the announcement by Sen. Simmons, Dem., N. C., he has withdrawn his opposition to it.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., May 14.—The Tennessee federation of labor wired the secretary of war asking him if he had given permission to Gov. Horton of Tennessee to let state militia use equipment of the war department. "Such use is being made by Gov. Horton of Tennessee in an effort to break a strike," the telegram said.

BATON ROUGE, La., May 14.—Anti-administration leaders in the Louisiana Senate contemplated a long session of three weeks or more for the impeachment trial of Gov. Huey P. Long, scheduled to begin at noon today.

NEW YORK, May 14.—Jack Dempsey denied today reported claims of his former sparring partner, that Dempsey was in a fight with Benjamin Saturday night over two show girls. In branding Benjamin's story as "too ridiculous to even consider," Dempsey said that he had not even seen Benjamin Saturday evening.

### DOWN DURING STORM

Started For Gasoline For Stranded Car When They Came in Contact With The Wire.

WHITEWRIGHT, Tex., May 14.—Three men were killed here today when they came in contact with the Bells-Whitewright high voltage wires of the Texas-Louisiana Power company, which had fallen during an electrical storm. The victims: Dock Webster, 20; Tommie Webster, 23; Bowen Daniels, 21.

The men were walking across to a station for gasoline for their car when they encountered the low hanging electric wires.

### WOMAN KILLS ANOTHER AT AMARILLO

"She Took My Husband" Mother of Three Children Declared For Shooting.

AMARILLO, Tex., May 14.—Authorities today investigated the fatal shooting last night of Mrs. Grace Morrison, of Plainview, Tex., in front of a hotel here.

After the shooting, Mrs. Stallworth surrendered her gun to arresting officers with the statement that Mrs. Morrison had taken her husband from her.

Three bullets struck Mrs. Morrison and she died on her way to a hospital.

Mrs. Stallworth is the mother of three children. Her victim has been living here with her 12-year-old daughter, who has been attending a local school.

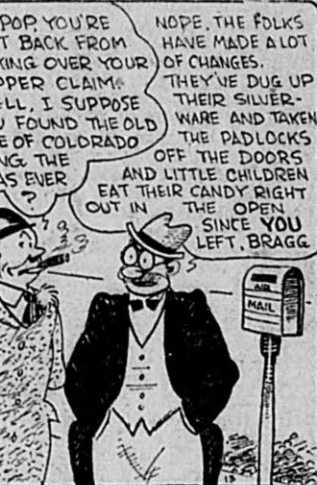

RANGER, Texas, May 14.—A stand of bees is worth \$100 declared Joe Calder, who lives near Ranger and who was in this city today with some early honey.

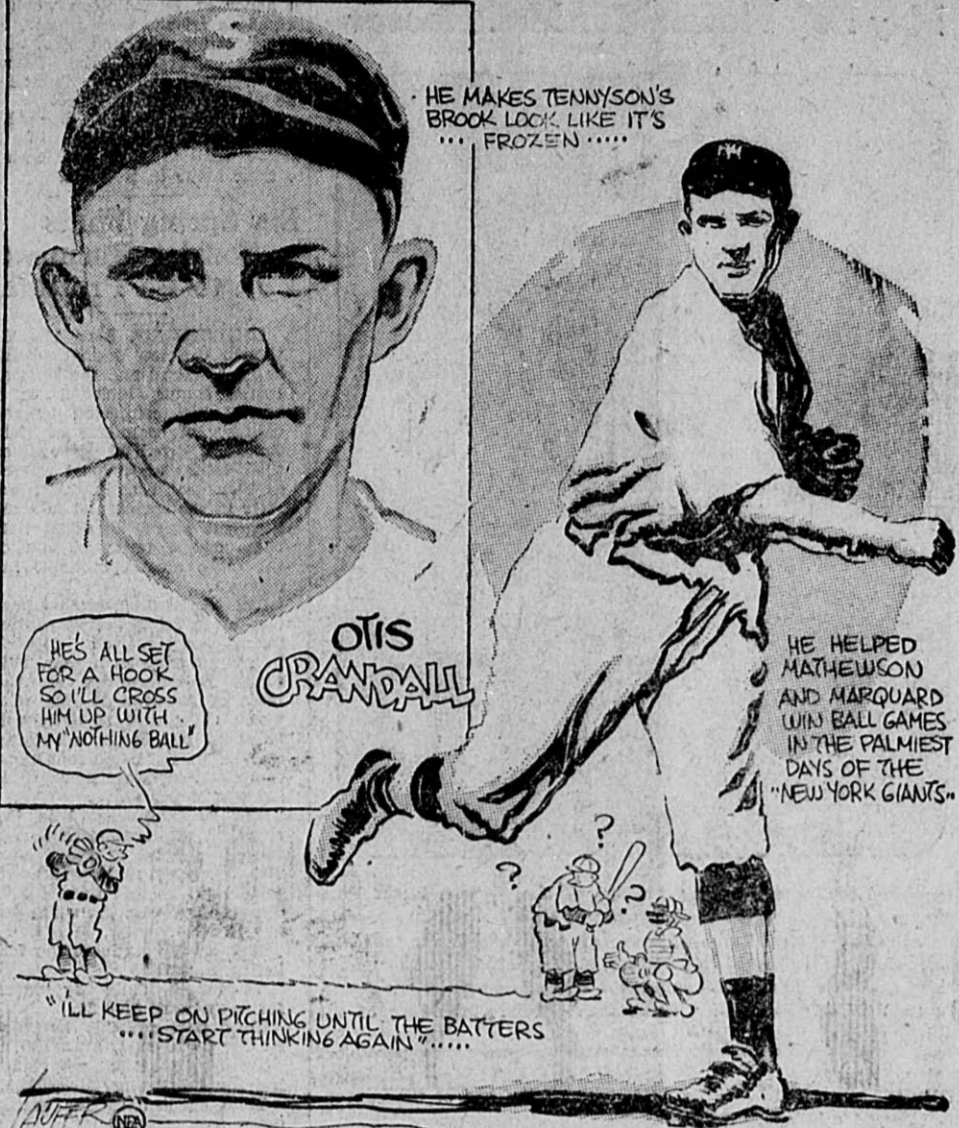
