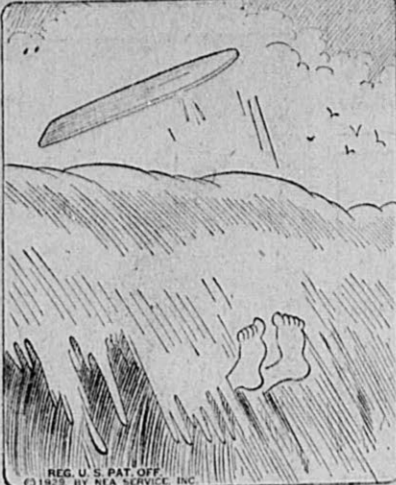
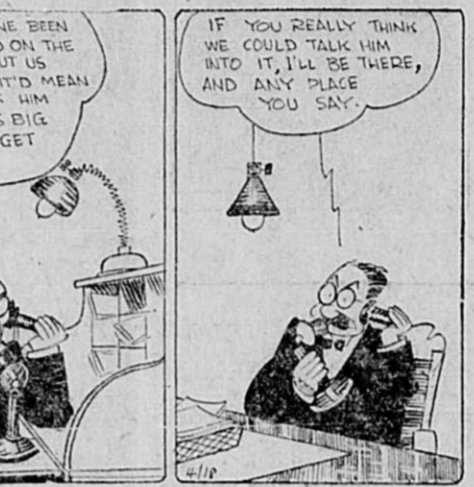
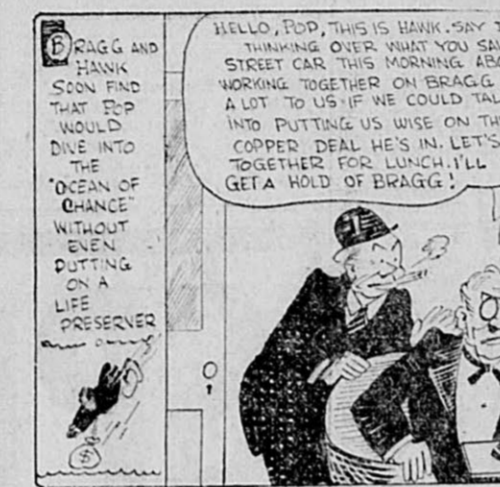

Eastland's entry is a very fast bird and a picture of a prominent citizen of Eastland holding the pigeon will be seen in the Eastland Telegram columns soon.

One of the entries in this race is a famous bird from New Jersey, "Blue Streak," who has a national reputation as a racing pigeon with several real records behind him, one of them in particular, his flight from Newark, N. J. to San Antonio, Texas, an airline flying distance of over two thousand miles, in record time.

The Flying Homer The present day racing homer has its origin in Belgium and was so named about thirty years ago. It is not a carrier pigeon, as it is often styled, but a distinct strain possessing many points of superiority over the once popular Carrier, Antwerp, Dragon and Heronian varieties.

In England there are 90,000 to 100,000 keen enthusiasts racing pigeons each week. In America the sport has grown in popularity each succeeding year until today it ranks second in England alone in number of pure bred racing birds raised each year and those participating in this popular pastime. Racing pigeons rendered great service and saved many lives during the world war and their breeding is to be encouraged.

Winged Heroes Back from War At the Signal Corps pigeon cotes in Washington are many winged heroes of the great war men who appreciate what these birds did in bringing victory to our gallant fighters. Some of the birds have been wounded and nearly all of them have records of faithful service at the front. One of them, "Cher Ami," delivered a message telling of the plight of the famous "Lost Battalion" of the 77th Division when that brave band of fighters were surrounded in the Argonne Forest. Cher Ami's left leg was shot off by a German sharpshooter, but the courageous bird returned to the American headquarters with the message. For instance, "Le Poile," and "Cher Ami," "Spike" and "Forty-Forty," "Spike" carried 52 messages and never received a wound.

Garlic Odor Inhaled by Cows Flavors the Milk

Milk containing objectionable flavors probably cause as serious losses to the American dairy industry as the production of milk that sours, according to C. J. Babcock of the United States Department of Agriculture. Dairy men, he says, are giving considerable attention to keeping their products sweet, but are not paying as much attention to the flavor and odor. Yet a pleasing flavor will have a tendency to extend their market through increased consumption.

Two weeds—garlic, or wild onion, and bitterweed—are of considerable economic importance in affecting milk flavor in many dairy regions. Garlic, or wild onion, has almost instantaneous effect. Experiments carried on by the Bureau of Dairy Industry show that garlic flavor can be detected in milk drawn from a cow one minute after she has consumed one-half pound of garlic tops, and in milk drawn two minutes after she has inhaled garlic odor for ten minutes. It is necessary to remove cows from garlic-infested pastures from four to seven hours before milking to prevent the garlic flavor in the milk. Bitterweed, found particularly in the south, makes the milk bitter and, unlike most feeds, the effect of eating bitterweed does not pass

away between milkings.

"The only method of preventing bitter-milk in sections where this weed is abundant," says Mr. Babcock, "is to keep cows off infested pasture until the weeds can be exterminated."

"The best way to control off flavors in milk is to prevent them," says Mr. Babcock. "In the production of palatable milk preventative measures are always

best. Therefore dairymen should (1) feed milk-tainting feeds just after milking, (2) keep cows and barns clean, (3) properly ventilate cow stables, and (4) aerate milk in order to decrease the intensity of feed and barn taints. Finally, prompt cooling and storing of milk at a low temperature will retard the development of flavors and odors from biological action."

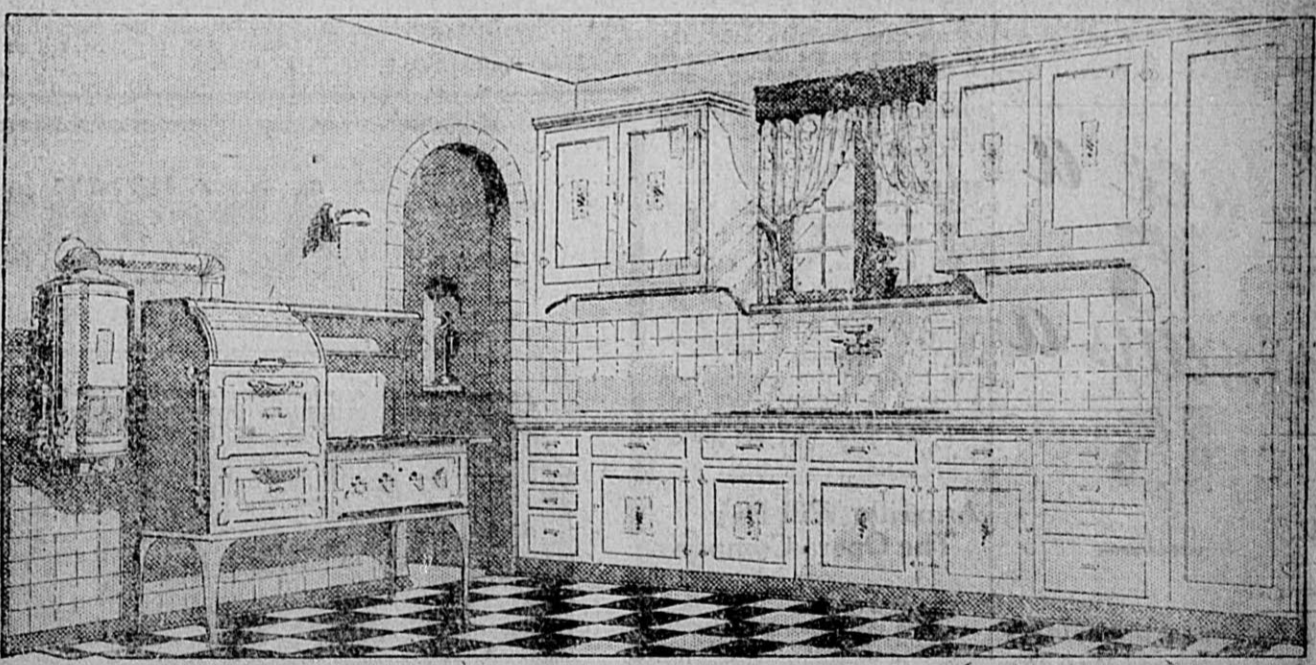
