Essex Challenger Week Demonstration Real Local Success

Lamont Gives Reason Joined Anti-Prohi Asso.

WASHINGTON, March 9 — Secretary of Commerce Lamont believes prohibition created an intolerable situation and that a bad crime situation still exists, he said in discussing his action in becoming a director of the association against the prohibition amendment some time ago.

Lamont explained, upon leaving the White House after the first cabinet meeting, that he has submitted his resignation as a director in the association through the friend who had requested him to join it.

"We all are inclined to do things out of friendship, and it was at the request of a friend that I joined the association against the prohibition amendment," Lamont said. "He was asked if he still held the views sponsored by the association. 'I am playing the game with this administration,' he said. 'I think that at that time,' Lamont said, referring to his joining the association, 'that I felt that the situation was intolerable and that something effective might be done to enforce it.'

STOCKS

NEW YORK, March 9 — Stocks displayed remarkable buoyancy today in the face of heavy weekend profit-taking and short selling. Yesterday's sharp comeback in the general list encouraged further bullish operations today and sharp advances were made in many sections of the list. Radio corporation was again the outstanding feature of strength, the old stock scoring 19 points on top of its 38 point advance of the previous session. The new radio stock was also in urgent demand as shorts were trapped. It was traded in tremendous blocks, rising to a new record high at 93.

OIL NEWS

National Cash register was another sensational performer, rising nearly 5 points on heavy trading. Western Union moved up 5 points simultaneously with the rise in radio. Victor talking machine was also firm. Prices in the general market were less violent, although good advances took place in steel, General Motors, Chrysler and other recent leaders. Rails were quiet, as were petroleum issues.

Following is a partial drilling report for Eastland county: J. W. Haynes No. 1 Riddle has completed a fishing job and is drilling again. Rex Outlaw's No. 1 Terrell, a test for the Parsons' sand, is drilling. Superior Oil Company's No. 2 McClelland is making 500,000 cubic feet of gas at a depth of between 3190-3405.

SEMINOLE, Ok., March 9 — A telling effect of the recent production orders in the Seminole fields had an inning Friday when a decline of 12,100 barrels was registered. Total production was 282,162 barrels from 1,449 wells, Little River being the biggest factor with a drop of 4,797 barrels. Earlsboro had a loss of 3,386 barrels. The St. Louis area south of Shawnee, gained 675 barrels, production from 314 wells being 99,125 barrels.

The gauges for Friday: Little River 79,718; Earlsboro 55,266; Mission 35,342; Bow Legs 34,692; Seminole City 32,820; Maud 35,009; Seagrift 8,715.

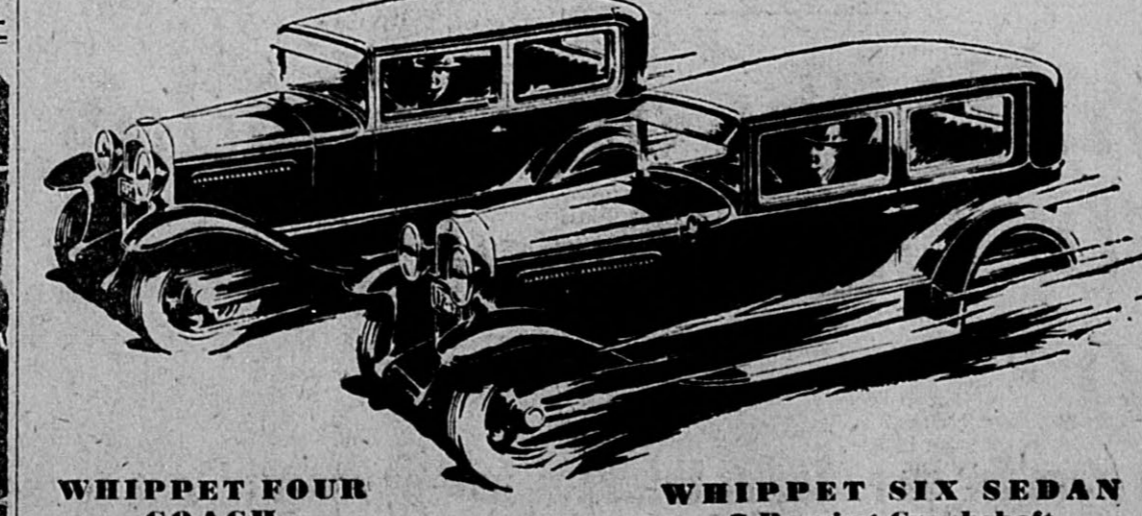

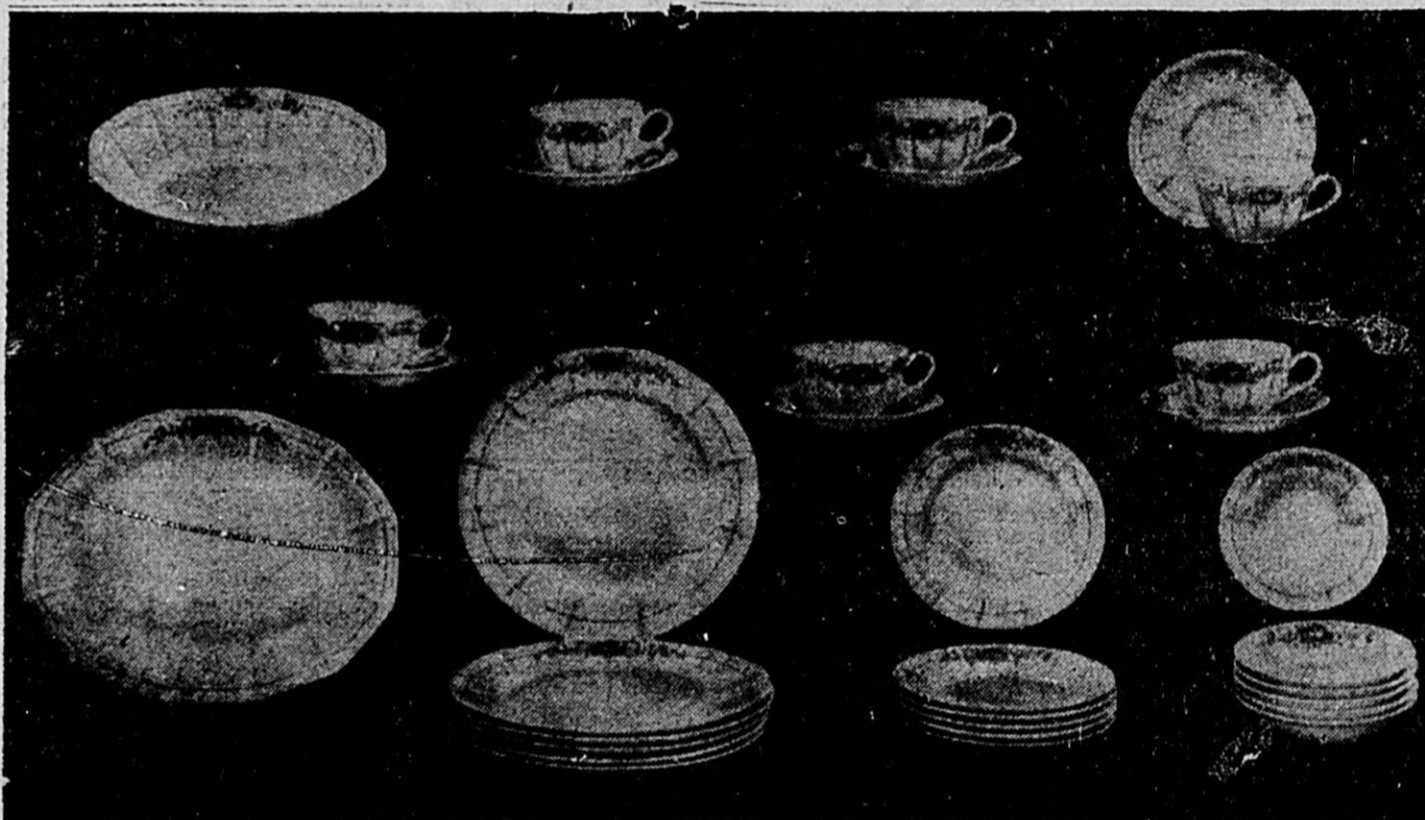

Eastland Boy Is Making Good As Athletic Coach

The many Eastland friends of Maurice Stallter, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Stallter of Eastland, and former Eastland high school football star, and later a brilliant athlete at the Texas State University, will be interested in articles concerning him which have appeared in the newspaper at Kerrville where Stallter is coach of the team at Schreiner Institute. Following are some of the items:

"Here's to 'Rosey'." "Our basketball team, like our football representative, has made a record this year for us that is seldom won for any school. Throughout the entire season only three games were lost. Two of these went to the San Marcos Bobcats, and the other was won by the Elks Club of San Antonio. Schreiner was able to defeat the Elks two games out of a series of three, but the boys from San Marcos won two consecutive contests.

"The season was ended with two games with Austin College from Sherman. Last year the visitors won both games by a very small margin and the contests last Wednesday and Thursday nights were greatly looked forward to by the student body here.

"To Coach Stallter we owe all that our team is and has been. He has worked tirelessly with the boys and we are proud of the team that he has developed and the record that it has made. It would be almost an impossibility for any coach to make a better record with practically all new men at the beginning of the season, and working under the discouraging conditions that often prevailed.

"We are proud of our basketball team and of the man that has devoted his all to its development. Coach M. T. 'Rosey' Stallter."

"When the basketball season opened just before the Christmas holidays, the first games were not encouraging. They were ragged, unscientific affairs characterized by plenty of offense and combativeness, but not much science.

Aggressiveness, air-tight defense, shiftness, continuous alertness, intricate play perfectly executed, swift action united to swift thought—all of the factors which make for fine basketball were conspicuously present.

Basketters, Schreiner appreciates your untiring work, your excellent training, and your splendid execution. But first honors go to 'Rosey', your untiring coach who has so splendidly developed and guided your ability."

"On Trial" Is A Great "Talkie"

Elmer Rice's famous court room melodrama, "On Trial", which thrilled audiences some years ago when it appeared as a stage play, has been made into an absorbing all-talking picture by Warner Brothers. The distinguished actress of the legitimate stage, Pauline Frederick, is starred in this all-talking version. Supporting Miss Frederick are such well known players as Bert Lytell and Lois Wilson, both of whom give splendid performances.

When a court room scene is well handled, there can be little doubt that it furnishes a fascinating setting for effective drama. It is to court that human frailties and desires are laid bare by opposing attorneys. Facts are unvarnished revealing the inner emotions and reactions of people who have committed crimes against the state in moments of wild despair. One lawyer demands the letter of the law be enforced to the full penalty; the other pleads for a more liberal interpretation on the grounds that human beings are not machines; that all are subject to weaknesses when facing seemingly insurmountable obstacles. In "On Trial", such a situation is developed with great dramatic skill, a stirring story of love and hate that builds up to one of the most powerful climaxes ever brought to the screen. The suspense is heightened by effective throwbacks in which scenes are enacted as described by witnesses on the stand.

Pauline Frederick gives a highly capable performance as the widow of the murdered man. Bert Lytell as the accused, and Lois Wilson as his wife, also do exceptionally fine work. "On Trial", which was directed by Archie Mayo, opens a 5 day engagement at the Arcadia theatre today.

BLAST DEATH TOLL IS SIX

By United Press. SCRIBNER, Neb., March 9 — While a grief stricken and stunned village prepared today to bury its dead, Mayor Ranslem was endeavoring to fix responsibility for the dynamiting blast that has taken a toll of six lives and injured about thirty five.

The death list was brought to six last night with the deaths of William F. Strube, 3, garage owner, and Arthur Schoeneck, 25, truck driver. Four others were either killed outright or died soon after the explosion, late Thursday night, of ten cases of dynamite in the burning barn of Carl Hollander, county supervisor. The dynamite had been intended for use to blast ice in the Elkhorn river near here.

LEVIATHAN QUIVERS

CHEEBOUQUE.—Four passengers were injured on board the Leviathan in a terrific storm which the big liner battled during most of the entire eastern voyage from New York, arriving here 12 hours late. The climax of the storm came Sunday night when the hull room was full of dancers. An enormous wave struck the ship jumbling the dancers in a heap against the walls. 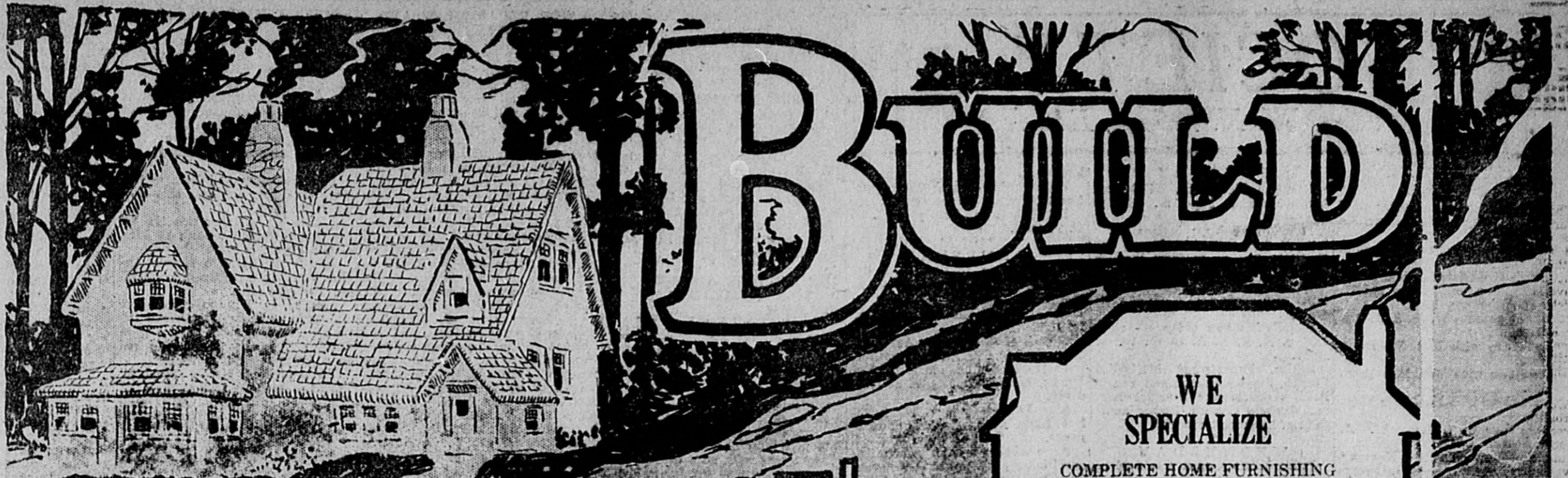
