HOOVER IS BUSY WITH NEW TASKS

Confers With Secretary of State Kellogg on Mexican Situation — Begins First Complete Day As President of U. S.

WASHINGTON, March 5.—The Senate today confirmed the cabinet nominations of President Hoover. The cabinet slate follows:
Secretary of State — Henry L. Stimson, of New York — lawyer, 61; Secretary of war under President Taft, until recently governor - General of Philippines.
Secretary of War — James W. Good, of Iowa, lawyer, 62; member of Congress 14 years until 1923.
Attorney General — William D. Mitchell, of Minnesota, lawyer, 44; solicitor - general of the United States since 1925; endorsed by entire Supreme court.
Secretary of Treasury — Andrew W. Mellon, of Pennsylvania, banker, 74, this month; secretary of treasury from beginning of Harding administration; understood to be planning to remain in cabinet only one year.
Postmaster General — Walter Davis.

WILMAN SUIT ON ELECTION IS DROPPED

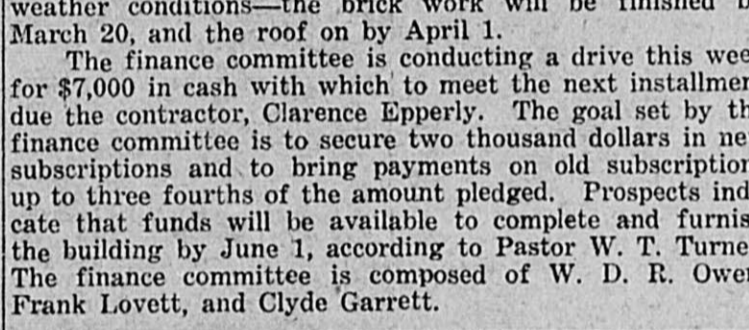
Action Filed to Contest Election of Governor Moody Will Not Be Tried.

AUSTIN, Tex., March 5.—The suit filed by Mrs. Edith Wilmans of Dallas, unsuccessful candidate for governor, contesting the election of Governor Dan Moody was dismissed this afternoon in 53rd District court for want of prosecution. Mrs. Wilmans had attacked legality of the method of collecting election returns.
Last week Mrs. Wilmans married a Chicago manufacturer. While setting has not begun yet made on the week beginning March 18 for the trial of the injunction sought by Gordon Griffin of Hidalgo county to prevent the secretary of State certifying the election of Judge J. E. Leslie as District Judge.

ONE KILLED, ONE WOUNDED IN HOLD - UP

Voice of Would Be Hijacker May Lead to His Arrest—Shots Follow Command. "Stick 'Em Up."

HOUSTON, Tex., March 5.—A voice that barked commands from behind a white mask may lead to the arrest of the hijacker who, early today, caused the killing of Leonard W. Hight, 33, sick war veteran, and who seriously wounded S. W. Clifton, about 40, Missouri Pacific employe.
Hight was instantly killed when a charge from a .20 gauge shotgun struck him in the back. Clifton was struck in the face with a slug, probably from a .45 pistol. The bullet ranged downward and came out below his chin, knocking out most of his upper teeth. He has a chance to recover.
Hight was shot by A. Ruddle, cook for a suburban cafe. Clifton was shot by the bandit. No charges have been filed against Ruddle and none is probable.
Several customers, including Hight, Clifton and J. C. Brunet, and the cook and Miss Edna Parsons, waitress, were in the cafe, when the bandit entered. "Stick 'em up, everybody," he commanded.
Miss Parsons recognized the voice. She and the others thought he was joking.
"Hey, you in the serge suit," he barked at Hight, "open up that cash register. Make it snappy."
Hight reached over to open the cash register.
Ruddle, the cook, looked out his window.
He grabbed up his shotgun and fired twice. One charge struck Hight, the other crashed through the front cafe door.
The bandit returned the fire. One bullet found Clifton's face.

Developments Rapid In The Mexico Crisis

Two Large Forces of Rebels Converging on Nuevo Laredo—U. S. Will Allow Gilt to Import Arms, Ammunition.

LAREDO, Tex., March 5.—With General Gorostieta, former military commander of the Guana Juanto garrison in command of the rebel forces at Monterrey, and Colonel Zenon Avila in command of a force of 2,000 rebels at Rosiquez, and this large force marching toward Nuevo Laredo, it is probable Nuevo Laredo will soon be in the hands of rebels also.
The garrison of Nuevo Laredo in command of General E. Torres marched out of that city this morning ostensibly for Villadama, where a skirmish between rebels and federals took place Monday, but reports now current are that the Nuevo Laredo force has halted at La Jariva, only fifteen miles south of Nuevo Laredo.

MEXICO'S TROUBLE IS SUSPECTED

As Cause of Bomb Being Planted — Events Seem Moving Toward Decisive Battle Between Insurgents And Government.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., March 5.—A plot to blow up the Southern Pacific railroad bridge here across the San Antonio river in Roosevelt Park was discovered today when two small boys playing in the river found a hand-made bomb containing almost a quart of nitroglycerin.
Planted in the water under the trestle, the bomb had been made water proof with a copper fuse eight feet long leading from it to the river bank.
Police were checking railroad reservations today to determine if any celebrities or Mexican officials were scheduled to pass through San Antonio at this time or in the near future.
The central government of Mexico launched a vigorous military campaign against rebels in the Vera Cruz area today as reports from American border points told of further rebel successes in the northern states centering around the insurgent State of Sonora.
At the same time the religious question was injected into the struggle with the prospect that it would create added bitterness.
Late reports from Nogales, Arizona, said federal troops were destroying railroad bridges in Sinaloa as they retire before rebel forces. The rebels removed all religious restrictions in the Sonora district, bidding for favor of religious factions.
President Emilio Portes Gil, in an official statement issued at Mexico City, admitted the extension of the subversive movement to the State of Chihuahua and indicated that the government also was preparing for operations in Oaxaca, which has been reported in the hands of the rebels. The government previously has maintained that only Vera Cruz and Sonora were involved.
The federal government, under direction of Plutarco Elias Calles as minister of war, was rushing troops both north and south, but it was announced the operations in the northern area would be delayed until a strong force could be placed at strategic points.
The rebel leaders claimed a total of eleven out of the 30 States of the republic.
President Portes Gil expressed confidence in the ability of the army to suppress the rebellion, charging that the only cause for the uprising was the desire for "personal gain" on the part of the insurgent leaders.
The exact cause of the uprising remained obscure, however, as rebel leaders were reported to have said they were acting to overthrow the power of former president Calles, whom they accused of deserting the National Revolutionary party's principles.
Bishop Daniel J. Cereki, of the Tucson diocese where the roman catholic church controlled the Catholic churches there, issued a statement denying emphatically that the tumor was spread in any way by the Bishop of Sonora.
Federal troops were reported to have been sent to Nuevo Laredo, Monterrey, there, and that they had been self-sufficiently in the south.

Secretary of Labor — James J. Davis, of Pennsylvania, former iron puddler now head of fraternal order, 55; secretary of labor from first of Harding administration; has consented to serve one year under Mr. Hoover.
Favorable action was taken 15 minutes after the list had been submitted. Immediate confirmation had not been expected, it having been previously reported the nominations would be referred to committees because of threatened opposition to some of the appointees.

Baby, Playing In Back Yard, Is Drowned In Pool

HOUSTON, Tex., March 5.—Edward Nelson, 18-months old, toddled out into the back yard of his home Monday.
The sun shining on a little pool of water attracted his attention, baby fingers grasped a stick and he scrambled up to the edge of the pool and began to dabble in the water.
The pool was a half - barrel that Edward's father, W. R. Nelson, had buried in the yard for the use of his Mallard call ducks.
Somehow the baby lost his balance and fell head first into the pool.
Ten or fifteen minutes later the mother looked into the yard and saw her baby with his head in the pool. Horrified she ran to him. The little body was still warm, but that was the only sign of life. She called an ambulance.
At emergency hospital attendants administered artificial respiration worked with the lung motor, but in vain.

\$30,000 FIRE DAMAGE AT ALBANY, TEX.

Oil Train Ignites and Thousands of Barrels of Oil Burn.

ALBANY, Tex., March 5.—One of the worst blazes in years broke out here during the night, causing damage estimated at \$30,000.
The Humble Auto train that makes its daily trip overland to its agents and carrying 4,000 gallons of gasoline, became ignited about midnight while servicing storage tanks and in an instant the entire train was enveloped in flames.
Local firemen fought to confine the fire to the truck but the close proximity of the motor train to large elevated storage tanks soon caused them to become ignited.
A stiff northwest breeze fanned the flames away from the business district and no damage resulted to stores or homes.

35 Indicted In 25 Hours By Grand Jury

Find Lifeless Body Dangling At An Oil Well

Charlie Cazod, Oil Field Worker, Is Found Dead, a Rope Around His Neck—Left a Note Says Justice of Peace.

The lifeless body of Charlie Cazod, 60, oil field worker, was found hanging to the limb of a tree near an oil rig on the Bond lease, seven miles north of Eastland, about 11:30 o'clock this morning by other employees of the Reclamation Oil Company, operators of the lease.
Justice of the Peace Jim Steele, who went to the scene and held an inquest, stated that evidence showed that Cazod was alive at 7:30 o'clock this morning. His body was stiff and cold when discovered at 11:30 o'clock.
A strand of rope cut out of a bull rope had been tied about Cazod's neck and one end tied around the limb of the tree. A fruit box was nearby, the body was hanging with 12 or 15 inches of the ground. Cazod had been in Eastland nine years and had been working on the Bond lease much of this time. He had been in ill health, and according to Justice of the Peace Jim Steele, left a note in which he stated that he was taking his own life. The note also mentioned a will Cazod had made.
Funeral arrangements will not be announced until relatives in Pennsylvania are heard from.

WASHINGTON, March 5.—The cheers of the crowds and the music of the bands have died away and President Hoover awoke in the White House today to face the stern realities of his office, a series of problems as acute and pressing as ever confronted a chief executive in peace time.

NORTHAMPTON, Mass., March 5.—The news in this quiet town today was that the Coolidges had come back home.
They came back as they left — over the twenty mile branch line that meanders down to Springfield. An engine, an empty day coach and a special car made up the unpretentious train that rattled into Northampton shortly after midnight, an hour and ten minutes late.
Even if Calvin Coolidge had been awake, he probably would not have worried about the delay, for it was apparent as he traveled up the Atlantic Seaboard last night that for the first time in eight years he was care free.
The former president and Mrs. Coolidge had been asleep for more than an hour when the special car was shunted onto a sidetrack through a thick new England fog. It was here, more than 30 years ago, that Coolidge was elected councilman and began his political career that culminated yesterday when citizens of seven States gathered along the route of his train to shout goodbye and good luck.

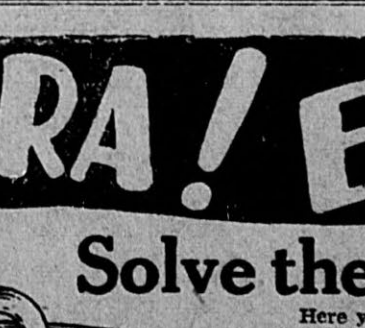

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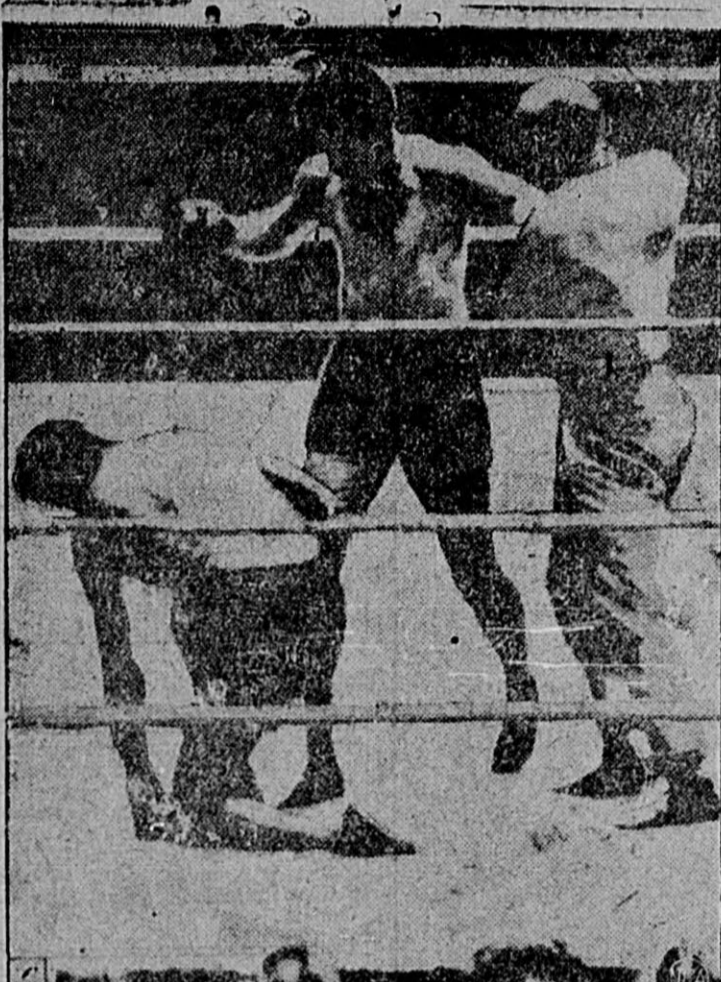
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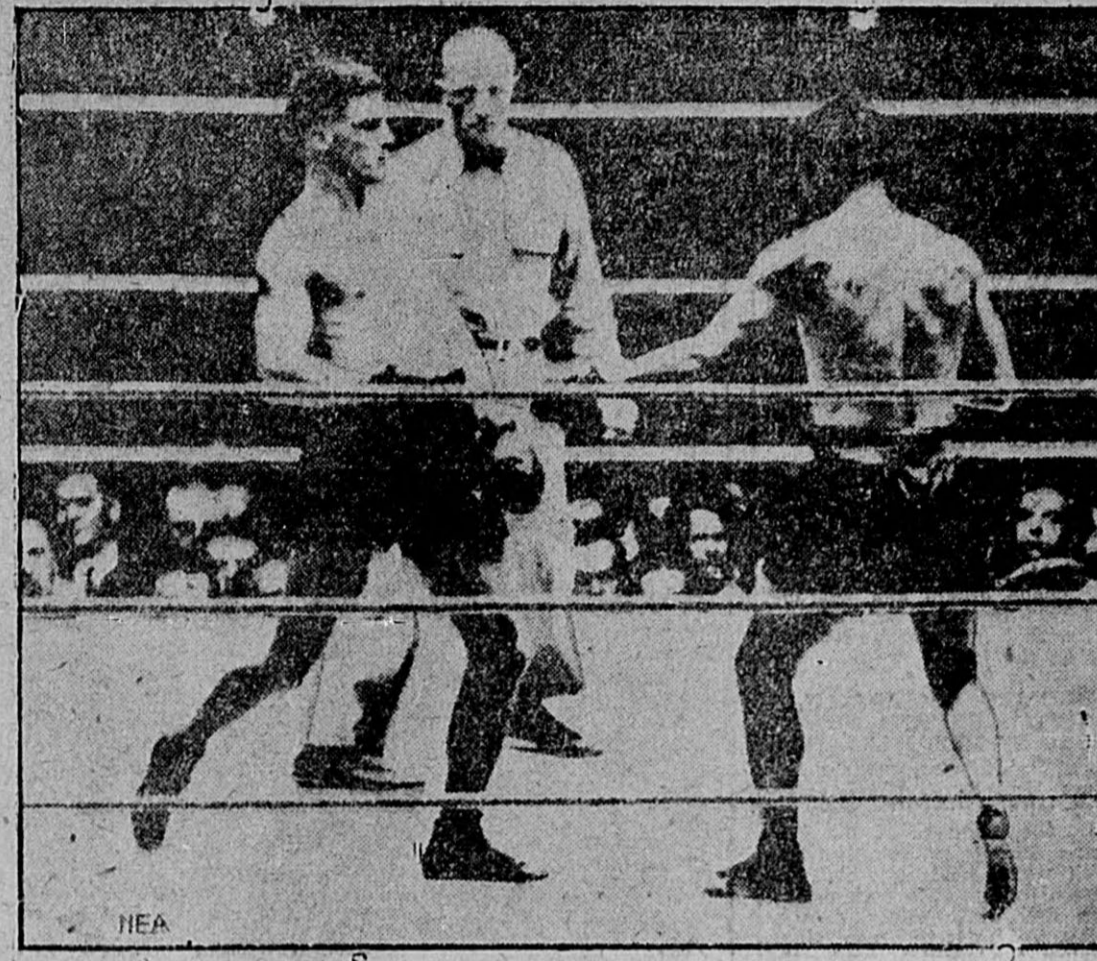

It was thought, after Rickard's death, that the gate receipts at Miami Beach would decrease considerably, but that was before Dempsey took charge of the fight and ran it in the manner he thought Rickard would have done. And the manner in which Jack successfully ran the show at Miami leads to the belief among experts that he will meet with great success if he continues in the role of promoter of big shows.
