Today the full story of the terrific battle which Hawks and Grubb waged against seemingly impossible odds became known. It was a tale largely of Grubb, the mechanic, jammed into a narrow cockpit, Groggy from gasoline fumes cutting up empty fuel cans with a pair of tinners' shears so that he might have room enough to pump gasoline into the tanks.

When the plane came to a stop on the Long Island field, Grubb staggered from the cabin cramped and still dazed from the gasoline fumes. He gulped air into his lungs and soon was normal again. Hawks clamped his lips on a cigarette, swung his leg over the cockpit, and delivered the following terse, prosaic account of the 2,700 mile flight.

"We had bad winds almost all the way across - wind, clouds, rain, sleet and snow. We hit the weather at Roswell, N. M., and never got out of it until we hit West Virginia. All the time, I was flying between 8,000 and 14,000 feet trying to get away from the weather.

"My wings had begun to coat with sleet when I was over New Jersey and I veered south of my course in an effort to fly around the rain and between the cloud layer where I could fly safely.

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 6 - Harry J. Leahy lost his gamble with death this morning when the court of criminal appeals refused him a rehearing and made final his death verdict for the killing of Dr. J. A. Ramsey of Mathis, Tex.

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Jimm Ferguson Speaks Before a Committee

Opposes Proposed Milk Law Favored by State Department of Health - Others Appear in Opposition to the Bill.

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 6—Former Governor James E. Ferguson appeared before a joint session of the state and house committees on public health last night, opposed to the milk section of the proposed new state sanitary code.

Former Governor Ferguson asserted that under the code, the state could order a two- or three-cow farmer to install a pasteurizing plant that would cost \$1,000.

Ferguson asked what the bill meant by "processing." Anderson said it was separating milk and cream and then forcing air into the cream.

When they got to talking about bacteria, said Ferguson, "they made figures that will scare a politician. But don't get scared, it's the same old kind of milk we have been using for a life time."

He argued that the cities should be left to control their individual supplies as at present.

House bill offered at the close of yesterday's sessions included a county civil service bill proposed by Port Wort representatives, an occupation tax on chain stores, and reciprocal exemption of auto registration fees for motor tourists.

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 6—Testimony in the legislative investigation into conduct of the state highway department and board of controls to be resumed this afternoon with John Morris of Dallas and Jack Jones of Austin called to tell of reported payment of freight on prepaid road machinery.

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 6—District Judge George Calhoun here today refused a new trial and entered judgment for the state in its suit against Phillips Petroleum company and other defendants for 525 acres of oil land in Hutchinson county.

SPARROW IS TAUGHT TO BE SINGER

Environment is Reason Other Sparrows Do Not Warble Like Canaries, Declares a University Professor Who Trained Bird.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Feb. 6—Science has accomplished another "improvement on nature" here by educating an ordinary street gam variety English sparrow to sing, look, and act like a canary.

Father Hubert Gruender, professor of psychology at St. Louis University did it in six months, and proved his contention that sparrows acquire their harsh voices and ungente behavior from slum environments and not inherited unsocial tendencies.

According to Father Gruender six months association with two pure-bred German canaries has enabled the sparrow to warble in a most unsparrowlike manner and the bird has become gentle and refined with clean neat plumage so immaculate that none of its brothers in the slums would recognize it.

"The sparrow has the same capacity to sing that the canary has," Father Gruender claims, "but it lacks the chance to hear good singing. Canaries have to be taught to sing by other canaries, or they would never attain perfection in song. Sparrows never hear musical notes in the noisy life of the gutters, and therefore have no incentive to abandon harsh, strident tones."

The psychologist admits his subject does not sing as well as its canary mentor, but he declares that is due to lack of technique and not in the ability of the sparrow. He expects to remedy that by having a canary hatch sparrow eggs next time and thus control the sparrow's environment from the very beginning.

Latch on the Outside for Newspapermen

Some Legislators Don't Want Them on Floor of the House But They Are Voted a Welcome Anyway.

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 6—An attempt to bar members of the Texas Press Association from the floor of the House of Representatives when they visit Austin Friday was defeated by Rep. Frank Baldwin of Waco, publisher - member.

Baldwin cleverly outmaneuvered the opponents of extending floor privileges to the publishers by announcing that he will procure floor cards showing them representatives of their papers, such as are required of capital correspondents.

Harold Keyton of San Antonio, leader of the fight against admitting the publishers. Finally withdrew his opposition. Keyton declared he acted solely in the interest of saving time. The present legislature, he said, has done less than any of the last three and more visitors will mean more delay.

Baldwin asserted that while there are other possible ways for the public to become acquainted with what the legislature does, the only practical way is by means of the newspaper reports, not only the dailies but rural papers.

"They are the true messengers," he said, "between you and the people."

Corn and cotton champions of the South were admitted this morning at a joint sitting held by the House and Senate. The champions, touring under auspices of nitrate interests, were introduced.

The morning House session was marked by introduction of a few chiropractic bills. Efforts to pass the bill, which calls for a separate board of Chiropractic examiners, has been defeated at two previous sessions.

Easterwood confers with Italy Chief. ROME, Feb. 6—Col. William Easterwood of Dallas, Texas, conferred with Italo Balbo, undersecretary for aviation, on plans for an air race from Rome to Dallas via New York, for which Easterwood has offered a prize of \$25,000.

Riot Victims Turn And Kill Hindus

BOMBAY, India, Feb. 6—Twenty-two lives had been taken today in the rioting which started Monday when Hindu mill workers sought revenge on high caste Pathans whom they believed guilty of kidnaping young Hindus for offerings to the gods.

Fifteen Pathans and a British policeman were among the dead. Local Mahomedans in the mill area joined the Hindus today in attacking the Hindus in a bloody fight which resulted in death for three Hindus while a number of others were injured seriously.

British troops continued to patrol the affected areas. Although the fights were attributed to the Hindus' belief that Pathans were kidnaping young Hindus children to be buried alive in newly constructed temples in the provinces, some here believed that was merely a pretext.

A number of Pathans recently were used as strike breakers when the Hindu mill workers left their places in the cotton factories here, and a desire for revenge because of that was given by some as the actual cause.

Ratliff to Remain In Death Row Cell

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 6— Marshall Ratliff, Santa Claus bank robber, who robbed the Cisco bank dressed as kris kringle the day before Christmas, must stay in the death cell at Huntsville, the court of criminal appeals ruled today.

Chief Justice Morrow filed a dissenting opinion. Habeas corpus proceedings brought by Ratliff's mother complained that he should be returned to Taylor county jail to await the appeal from the death penalty.

Instead, she charged, he was being kept in a six foot square death cell, despite endangered health. The majority opinion held that the court cannot supervise the management of the prison; that Ratliff is properly in the penitentiary under the Jones county life sentence and cannot be ordered back to Taylor county.

Judge Morrow's dissenting opinion says that pending appeal of the death sentence case, Ratliff is entitled to be treated as a "life term", kept at work like other life termers, and not be subjected to additional punishment.

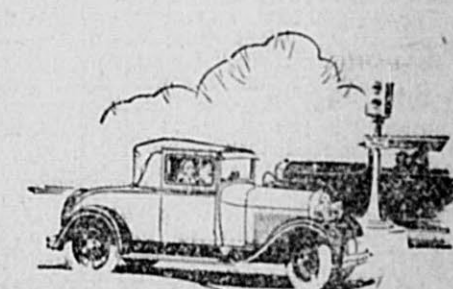
