STOCK LAW STATUTE IS SUGGESTED

Would Make Application State-wide, Allowing Counties Not Desiring it to Vote it Down—Lawmakers Doubt Chance to Pass Bill.

A State-wide stock law was suggested by the county attorney's department of Eastland county in letters to State Senator Oliver Cunningham of Abilene, Representative O. F. Chastain of Eastland, and Representative Victor Gilbert of Cisco.

Numerous reports are made to County Attorney Joe H. Jones of damage done to crops by roaming livestock and as it is one of the duties of the prosecuting attorney's department to suggest changes in existing laws which from his observation he deems advisable, Assistant County Attorney W. B. Collier drafted letters to the lawmakers.

Collier suggested that instead of the present law which requires a county desiring to have a stock law to hold an election that a statute be enacted which would be just the reverse — In other words, a county would hold an election in order not to have a stock law.

However, the tone of the letters from the legislators is not hopeful. Cunningham and Chastain have replied. An answer had not yet been received from Gilbert.

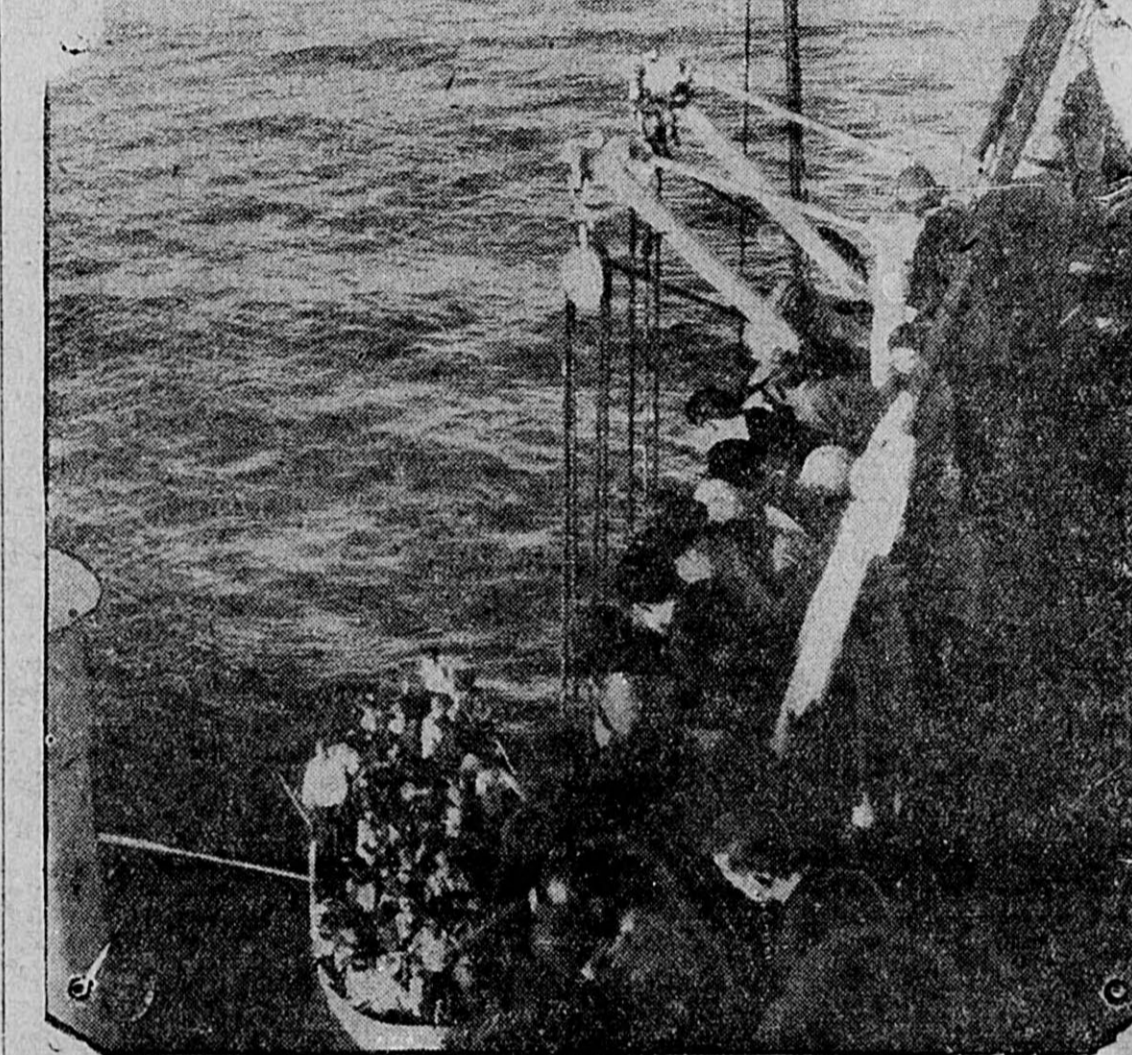
The letter written by Collier to the three lawmakers follows: "This office has received, since the first of the year, numerous inquiries and complaints about the present stock and hog laws. It seems that stock in this county is permitted to run at large, often times getting into other people's pastures and premises and destroying fences and other valuable property."

"I have made an attempt to investigate our stock and hog law and find that the statute (Articles 1241 to 1251 penal code) refers only to counties that have adopted the law. In order words, as I understand it, an election is required in every county desiring the stock law and there must first be circulated and signed a petition to the Commissioners' Court by a requisite number of signers in each precinct of said county to call said election. I am of the opinion that an effort along this line has been attempted here several times but it continues to fail to get the desired results."

"I am writing you this letter for the purpose of requesting, if you deem advisable after investigation, you to introduce a bill repealing the present stock and hog law and make the law State-wide. I

Charges Creager Gave Hotels Wet Protection

Lower House of Congress Ends Session

Democrats Are Voted Down When They Try to Hold Session on Until Vote Could be had on Senate Acts.

UNITED PRESS STAFF CORRESPONDENT WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 — Republican leaders forced adjournment of the House today after Democrats had unsuccessfully demanded assurances that the House be allowed to vote on the controversial Senate amendments to the first deficiency appropriation bill.

After a sharp 45 minute debate, Republican Leader Tilson moved adjournment and, after Democrats had shouted the motion down, it was passed by a standing vote, 195 to 93.

Democratic leaders united in demanding assurance that the proposed conference committee would report back the appropriation bill in a form which would allow the House to vote on the Senate riders, one of which adds \$24,000,000 to the annual prohibition enforcement budget and another providing for publicity of all large tax refunds.

Will Appeal Death Case to Highest Court

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29. — Five justices, a majority of the Supreme court, today denied an appeal for a stay of execution of Ada Bonner Le Boeuf and Dr. T. E. Dresher, scheduled to take place at Franklin, La., Friday.

Their lawyers announced they would file an appeal for a writ of habeas corpus with Federal Judge Borah at New Orleans probably this afternoon, supported by affidavits of two trial jurors alleging prejudice and intimidation.

By United Press. WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 — Col. Lloyd Hill, Fort Worth postal employe, charged before a Senate postoffice sub committee today that R. B. Creager, Republican national committeeman from Texas, has protected hotels in Fort Worth and Dallas from prohibition raids by controlling the appointment of federal enforcement agents.

The committee is investigating alleged sale of federal patronage in Southern States. Senator Brookhart, Republican, Iowa, is chairman of the committee.

Hill said Creager protected the Metropolitan Hotel in Fort Worth and the Adolphus hotel in Dallas, and that P. V. Petty, then director of the prohibition enforcement unit in Texas, was ousted from the service because he raided the Metropolitan in defiance of its immunity.

Creager also charged that the Republican State convention held at the Metropolitan in 1921, was reported to have been a "wet" affair, supposedly because of Creager's orders to prohibition agents not to interfere. Some of the agents attended the meeting, he added.

Counties Near Bankrupt Due to Road Bonds

Governor Moody Says Some Other Method Must be Found to Build System and Legislature Should Submit State Bond Plan

AUSTIN, Tex., Jan. 29 — Asserting that many counties have brought themselves to the verge of bankruptcy in issuing road bonds to build State highways, Governor Moody declared today that a different system must be found if the State is to continue to build highways and erect a connected system.

This address was made by the governor speaking before members of the legislature, which had adjourned last Monday for the special purpose of hearing the governor and others on the proposed State road bond issue.

HOTEL HELD UP; MAN SHOT

SAN ANGELO, Texas, Jan. 29 — Shades of the Wild West, with the shooting up of a town in reality, came to Rankin, on the West Texas oil fields near here today. A man giving his name as William Campbell, formerly of Fort Worth but who has been living at Best, is in the Rankin jail charged with doing the trigger-pulling. He has two bullet wounds in his body, received in an exchange of shots with Deputy Sheriff Clarence Shannon, after allegedly holding up a clerk in the Yates Hotel here and robbing it of a pistol and ransacking the hotel desk for other valuables.

RANGER WOMAN VICTIM

Standing in Front of Fire When Her Clothing Ignites — She Runs Screaming Into Street — Is In City County Hospital.

Special to the Telegram. RANGER, Tex., Jan. 29 — Mrs. T. C. Weekes, 40, Desdemona boulevard, Ranger, was critically if not fatally burned this morning when her clothing caught fire as she stood in front of a lighted gas stove, with her back to the fire. Little hope is had for her recovery.

Mrs. Weekes was alone in her home when the accident happened. Her husband, who is night clerk at the Paramount Hotel in Ranger, had not arrived from his work.

When Mrs. Weekes discovered her clothing was on fire and felt the pain from the flames, she ran screaming into the street. H. Ethridge, a Ranger contractor, heard her screams and ran to her. He ripped off the burning clothing and carried her into the house and telephoned an ambulance. She was taken to the City-County hospital where she was given medical attention.

STORE IS DESTROYED

BRAYAN, Tex., Jan. 29 — More than \$8,000 worth of damage was done here Monday by fire which destroyed the cotton office and grocery store of J. M. Schladner and the restaurant of N. J. Saladiner in the same building. The fire started in a coal heater near some cotton samples.

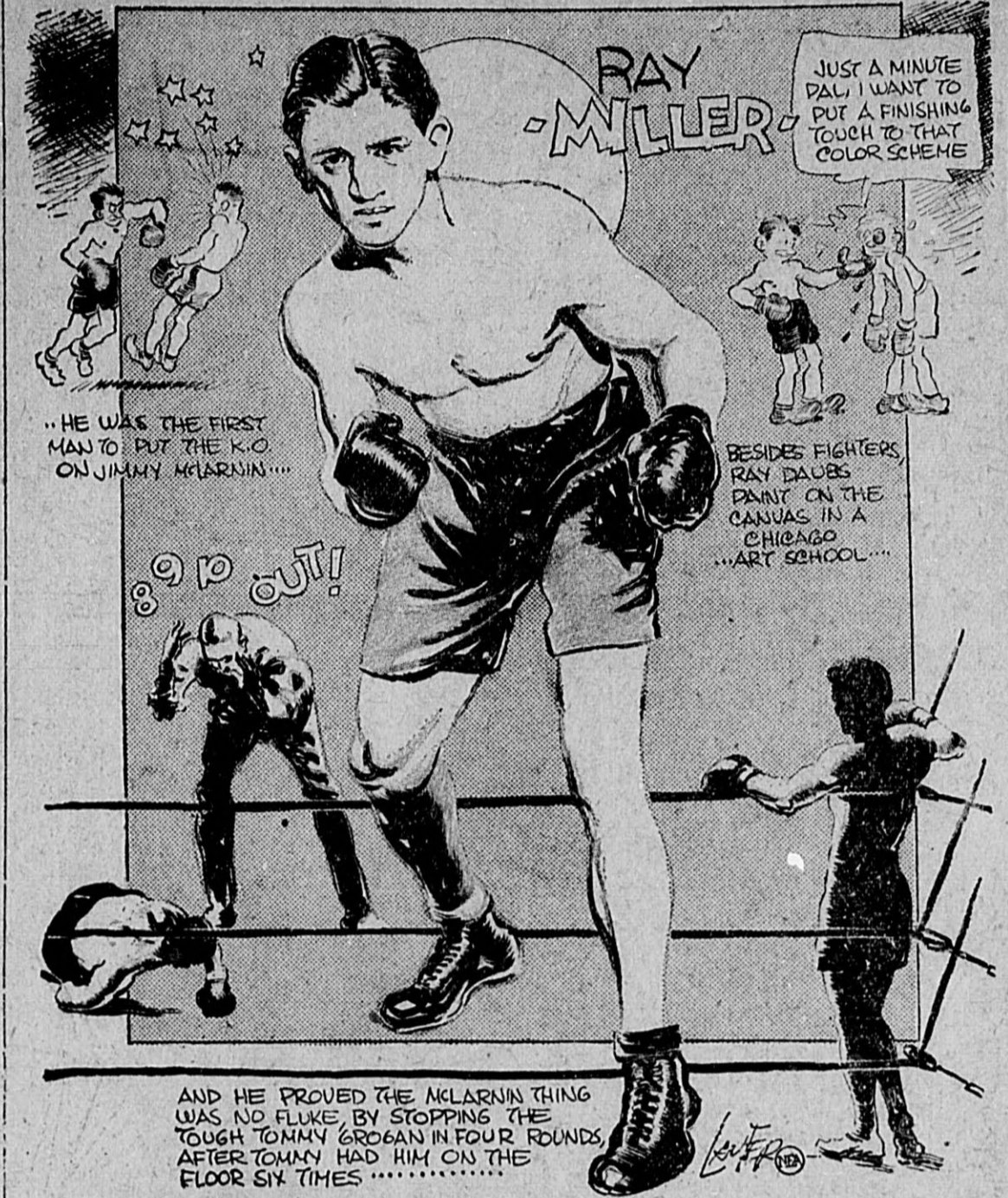

## Are Cutting Down 10-Foot Snow Wall

EARVILLE, Ia., Jan. 29 — A motor plow, aided by horse teams and shovel crews, today attacked the ten foot snow barrier which for ten days has isolated the village of Colesburg, 11 miles east of here.

The rescue workers were handicapped by temperatures ranging from zero to ten degrees below as they set out to re-establish communication with the snow-bound village.

Through a single telephone line, Colesburg's sole means of communication with the outside world, Mayor W. F. Hoot told authorities at Petersburg, Earville and Cedar Rapids that unless food and fuel reached the village within 24 hours, serious suffering would result. The mayor reported that illness had been confined to a minimum, and that there was little danger of deaths from disease.

## LEON TROTSKY LEAVES RUSSIA

LONDON, Jan. 29 — Leon Trotsky, whose loyalty to his own principles of communism was greater than his desire for security within the highest circles of the Soviet government, has left his place of exile in the desolate heart of Siberia and is en route to Constantinople, according to authoritative advices received here today.

The dynamic, tireless leader who stood next to Nikolai Lenin in the early days of the Soviet union only to lose his power to the Stalin group in 1926, plans eventually to reach Berlin. He left the little village of Alma-Ata, in the Turkestan foothills, accompanied by his wife and son after little more than a year in exile, the advices said.

Trotsky was reported anxious to leave and the Soviet government was said to have granted permission.

## CRUDE REACHES A NEW RECORD

NEW YORK, Jan. 29 — Daily average domestic crude oil production was 2,667,056 barrels in the week ended January 25, a new high record and 17,526 barrels daily over the preceding week, the previous high, according to the oil and gas journal.

The production for the week is the fourth record in as many weeks.

The light oil increase for the week was 8,165 barrels. Oklahoma dropped 140 barrels to 723,365 barrels while West Texas climbed 2,000 barrels to 371,040 barrels. Mid-Continent daily average was 1,255,076 barrels, an increase of 1,258 barrels.

California's increase was 13,000 barrels to 766,000 barrels, due largely to the Santa Fe Springs wells to 170,000 barrels.

## HEATED BATTLE STARTS

### Injunction Talk Rife as Highway Loop Shift Looms.

RANGER, Texas, January 29 — For the second time in a year's time, the Strawn Tribune, weekly newspaper, has launched an attack on the efforts of representatives of towns along the north loop of the Bankhead highway, to move the Metcalf Gap intersection.

In its regular edition appearing Friday, the paper severely criticized the efforts of the Breckenridge and Albany officials to change the route and strongly advocating a mass meeting, similar to the one held last year.

Under the title, "The Old Highway Argument Again," the Tribune has this to say:

"The Metcalf Gap road wrangle has opened up again and Breckenridge and Albany are going to make an effort to change the highway at the above place. The Tribune is carrying a number of news items from various places this week concerning this change and is also publishing a letter from the state highway engineer.

"The action of the chamber of commerce of Albany and Breckenridge is an insult to our county officials, also the entire citizenship. We elected a county judge and four county commissioners last fall to handle the affairs of this county and as we see it they are doing pretty well, and do not need the assistance of Breckenridge and Albany in them latter. The people of Breckenridge and Albany have purchased some high priced land at Metcalf Gap, and if the citizenship of Strawn and Palo Pinto county will only stand hitched and fight to keep outside interests out of our county affairs they will own this strip of land for several years to come.

"The proper procedure for the Strawn people to take is for some county taxpayer to file an injunction against these outsiders and tie up the changing of this road until the high courts can decide whether the state highway department is right in designating this highway, or a few people from Breckenridge and Albany.

"The proper method, as the Tribune sees it, is for the Citizens of Clyde, Bafd, Ciseo, Eastland, Ranger and Strawn to call a mass meeting in Strawn at an early date and thrash this matter out for all time, and employ legal talent to fight this underhand method of road building through the highest courts of our country.

Let's show these few towns on the north loop that Palo Pinto county is able to handle her county affairs without the aid of Stephens, Shackelford, Jones and Fisher counties."

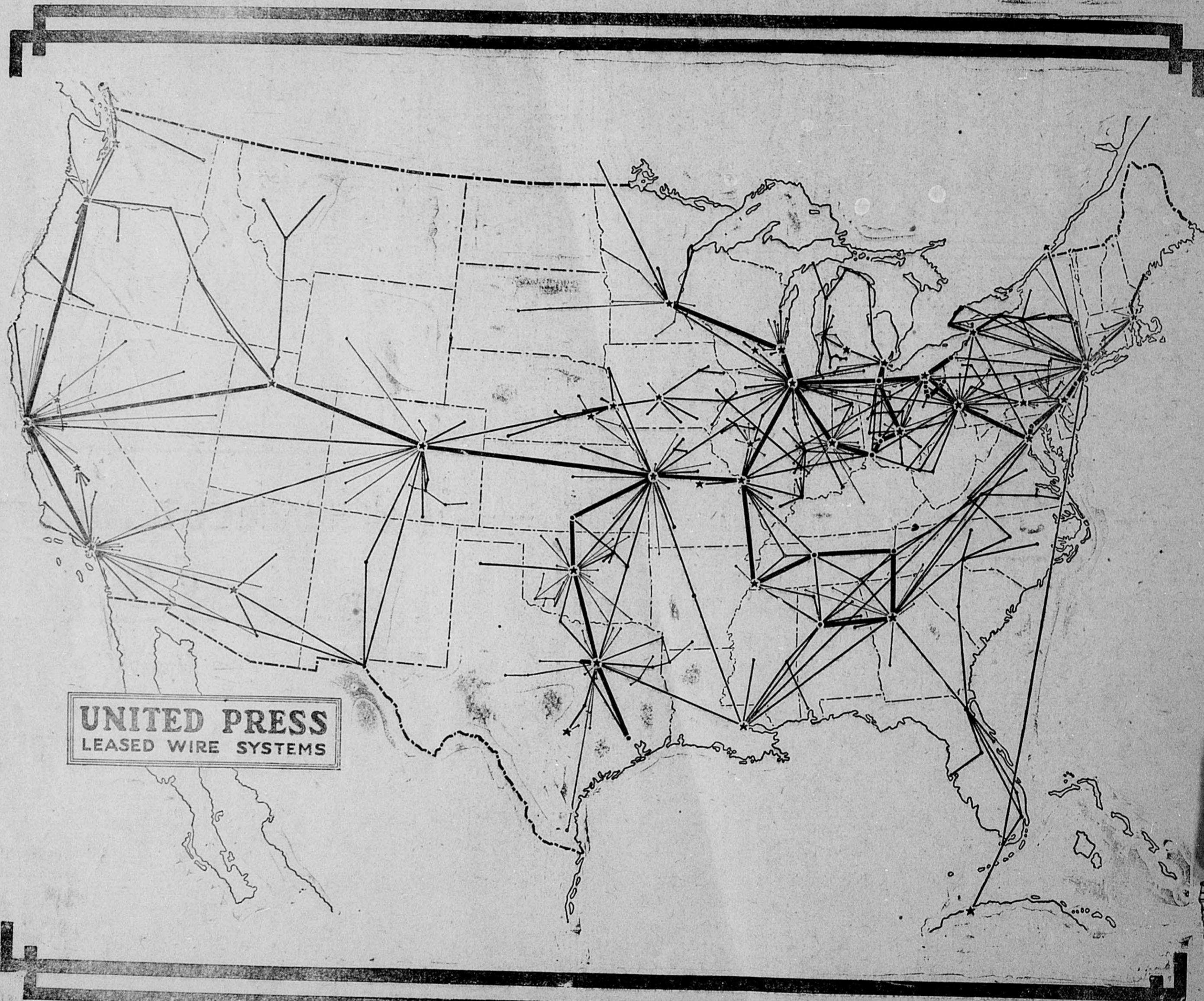

**PHILOSOPHER OF 90 TALKS OF PROGRESS**

Capt. Curry of Pioneer Writes about Inventions, Short Skirts, Witchcraft, and Other Subjects in an Interesting Manner.  
 Capt. A. M. Curry, of Pioneer, now getting well along to the century mark, and who favors the press with a very readable article occasionally, gives his views on the great changes that have taken place during the past century in the following article:  
 1839-1929—Jan. 22, 1839.  
 For nine-tenths of a century the momentous wheels of time have rolled beneath our feet.  
 In that lapse of time what has civilization wrought? More than we can recount, more than we know. Steam had not been utilized for commercial purposes, lightning had not been harnessed, the ocean had not been conquered, telegraphy was in the future, the telephone had not been dreamed of, the automobile had not entered the mind of man, railroads were few and far between, wireless telephony and radio had not been thought of. So on and so on ad infinitum.  
 What now? The prairie schooner has been driven from the western plains by the gas horse. The wild Indians that once inhabited the wild and woolly west have been subdued and made peaceful citizens of the United States. Man has laid his hand on the ocean's main, replacing the sailing vessel with floating palaces propelled by steam. He has dived beneath the ocean's briny depths and laid the great cables that enlighten the world, untraveled by his hisitorious waves. He sends his human voice over sea and land. He has entered the pyramids and catacombs and wung the secrets from antiquity. He has conquered the yellow fever and cholera and made vast areas inhabitable. He has preserved the human voice on records that can be repeated in its natural tone long after he or she has passed to the unknown. He has come to the aid of the overburdened housewife by giving her the sewing machine. He has conquered space by the telephone. Indeed, it would take a volume to recount the many blessings to man that have made this world better, wiser, and happier.  
 Not content with the conquest of land and sea man has entered the air and deduced the Great Conductor of the Andes who, though he was monarch of the upper deep, and bid defiance to cold and storm. The genius of man has solved the problem of aerial navigation. Airplanes have circumnavigated the globe and the end is not yet. Air navigation is in its infancy. The benefits to the human race are not yet known. But the indications are that it will mark one of the greatest epochs in the history of man. Today there is a reward of \$25,000 to the first man to establish communication with a planet. This is one of the impossibilities in the light of what has happened in the light of what has happened in no one's justified in questioning the feasibility of any proposition any one man offer.  
 While we are summing up the evolutions and revolutions of our time we must not overlook the salt of the earth—our women.  
 Our memory runs back to the fifties when we lived in southwest Missouri, then a frontier state of the Union, when all west of there was a howling wilderness occupied by wild Indians and vast herds of buffalo, when our women carded the cotton or wool, spun the yarn, wove the cloth and made their own wearing apparel, and when a lady when dressed in a neat suit of homespun considered herself well dressed. ### ONTARIO NETS \$10,000,000 IN LIQUOR TRADE

TORONTO, Ont.—Ontario's liquor dispensing law, which places the sale of liquor into the hands of the provincial government, has, according to Sir Henry L. Drayton, head of the Liquor Control Board, solved the problem of achieving real temperance and respect for all laws.

"The opinion of the public in all parts of the province has been carefully solicited during the past six months," Sir Henry said in an exclusive interview with the United Press, "and universally, expressions of approval have been made with respecting the improved conditions under the present act as compared with the former prohibitory legislation. Bottlegging by any person to any great extent has been stopped.

"The revenue formerly obtained by these law-breakers is now received by the public treasury. The greatest advantage, however, and it is more important than any other is the fact that a wholesome respect for the law has been engendered in the minds of the people, whereas during the last previous prohibition regime a disregard for the temperance act had crept in, which was slowly but surely influencing adversely the attitude of the people in regards to other laws."

The liquor dispensing act was passed in 1926 and went into effect in 1927. The law limits the sale of liquor only to those having permits to purchase spirits and specifies that bottled goods must be sold only from government stores. Public drinking is prohibited.

The province has netted \$10,000,000 profit from the sale of liquor during the past 18 months, according to a report by the control board. Up to and including July 31, 1928, there were in operation in Ontario 100 liquor stores, 38 breweries, 99 brewers' warehouses and 61 wineries.

All profits accruing from the board's operations are paid into the provincial treasury. A large amount of this money has recently been expended in building new highways and repairing old ones, according to the report.

### Popular Author Turns Her Talent To Mystery Writing

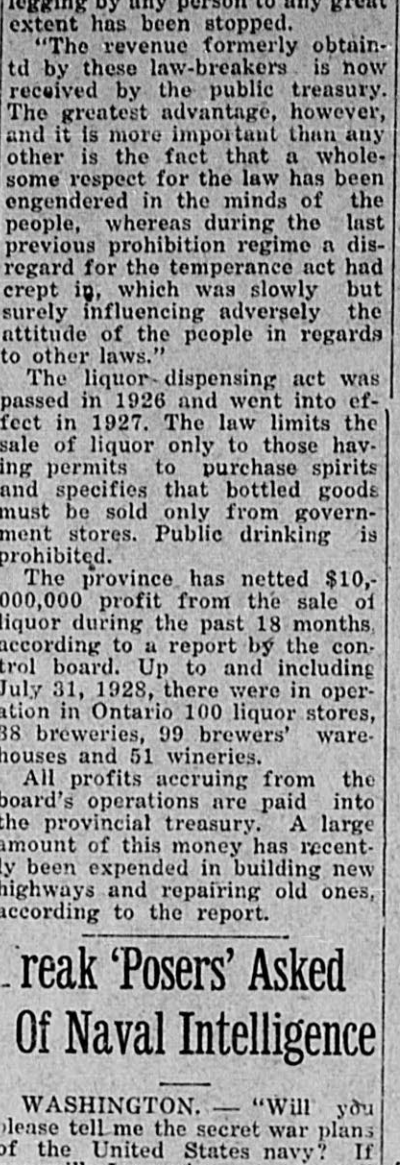


Anne Austin, author of "Saint and Sinner" and of several other sensational serial successes, has turned to the detective-mystery story for her latest serial.
