By the Way...

Newspapers of the nation chronicled Sunday the death of old Rip, the famed frog of Eastland county. His death revived memories of his 31-year slumber and telegraph wires were busy with dispatches to the great associations serving the hundreds of daily newspapers throughout the United States. On Monday wires were received, asking for additional developments, which indicated the great interest of the country in Rip.

As far as news is concerned, his career is ended. He now belongs to literature and legend. Ballads and volumes of Western lore tell his story.

It is to be hoped that the body, prepared so that it will endure for many years, will be placed in the center of the lobby of the courthouse, which stands on the site of the old courthouse within one cornerstone Rip drowned unawakened to world-wide fame. Thousands of tourists in the years come will pause to view the less form of the frog.

CHARGE MADE AGAINST STATE LAND OFFICE

3,500 Arrests In Chicago Cleanup

Some Wearing Tuxedos Some In Rags Held

Biggest Police Cleanup in City's History Brings in Host of Underworld Characters. Many with Bodyguards.

CHICAGO, Jan. 21 — Thirty-five hundred inhabitants of the Chicago underworld, some in rags and some in tuxedos and evening gowns, were in jail today after the biggest police cleanup in the city's history.

Smashing through cabarets, beer flats and speakeasies of the South and North Sides and invading hotels and theatres, the entire Chicago police force worked double time over the week end in an attempt to halt the wave of lawlessness which had resulted in 102 robberies and four murders in the last week.

The entire city, long accustomed to promised cleanups which somehow failed to materialize, hardly could believe that Police Commissioner William Russell actually had arrested 3,500 men and women whose fingerprints, photographs and records adorn the archives of police files.

Forty police stations were jammed and overflowing with scowling prisoners. Even the higher-ups, protected by bodyguards, were caught in the city-wide cleanup. Among the prominent guests behind the bars today were "West Side" Frankie Pope, Ralph and Frank Buglio, Sammy Kaplan, Nathan "Bunk" Goldberg, Joe Glaser and four lieutenants of "Polack Joe" Saltis. Bondsmen and attorneys seeking to free their clients were unable to locate them amid the confusion at the stations. The few bondsmen who did penetrate as far as the sergeant's desk were informed that no prisoners would be released until after the "show up" today.

TUSON, Ariz., Jan. 21 — The Army Endurance plane Question Mark took off from Davis Monthan airport at 7:55 a. m. Mountain time today for Midland, Tex., on the second leg of its return flight from San Diego to Washington, D. C.

The plane, in charge of Major Carl Spatz, made a perfect take off. It was followed by its refueling ship which will deliver gasoline to the Question Mark in a contact between Tucson and Midland.

There was a note of sorrow in the departure. Captain Ira Eaker, who piloted the big tri-motored plane a great part of the time on its record breaking flight over Southern California, was on his way home to attend the funeral of his mother, who died yesterday in Eden, Texas.

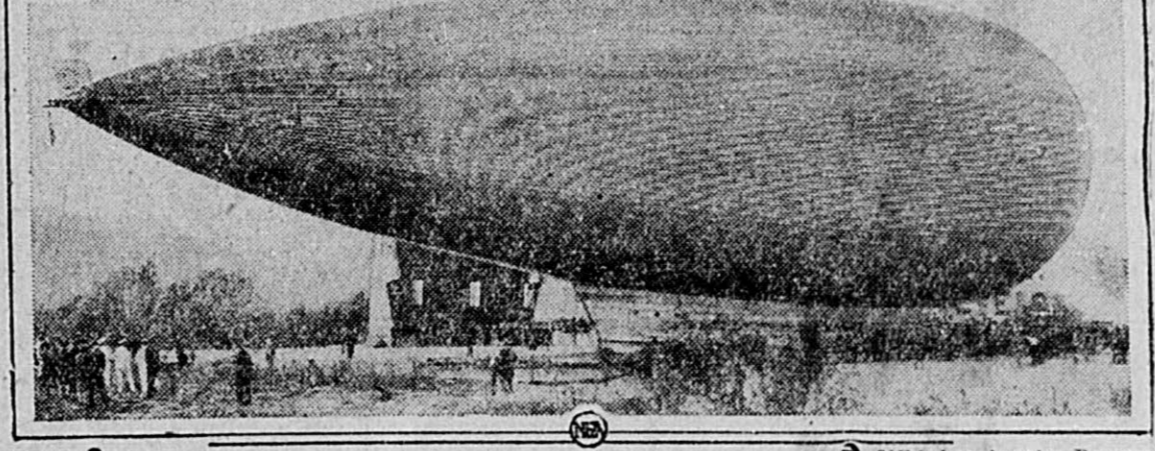
Safe Robbers Obtain \$142.00 From Laundry

AWAIT THE GHOST CAR WEDNESDAY

Scientific Wonder Will Draw Large Crowds, Much Interest Is Being Manifested in Radio-Controlled Ghost Dodge.

A standard stock model automobile that requires no driver, will give six exhibitions on downtown streets Wednesday. This mysterious machine is operated and controlled entirely by radio and will carry neither driver nor passenger.

Yet it starts, stops, and steers its way through traffic just as if a driver were at the wheel. It will blow three large automobile horns at intervals to attract the attention of passers-by or anyone that might be in its path. The car will even stop and start its own motor without the touch of a human hand.

This driverless machine the "Ghost Dodge" has appeared in America's largest cities and astonished millions by its uncanny performances. Since this latest development of radio engineering has been shown the public several so called driverless cars and radio operated automobiles have been exhibited in different parts of the country but were quickly exposed by the press as having a concealed driver. The operators of the "Ghost Dodge" which will be seen here Wednesday have posted \$1,000 reward for proof that a driver is concealed in the machine and the public will be allowed to (Continued on Page 2)

SOLON OFFERS A BILL

Resolution Offered by Representative Petsch Lists Nine Charges to the Effect that State Loses Millions of Dollars.

AUSTIN, Tex., Jan. 21 — Nine charges against conduct of the State Land office were listed in a resolution offered in the House of Representatives this morning by Representative Albert Petsch of Fredericksburg. Investigation of the charge is requested. Petsch asked that the resolution be printed in the House Journal before any action upon it.

- The actions he asked investigated are:
- (1) Lease of 431,360 acres of land in Reagan, Crockett and Irion counties.
 - (2) Lease of 16 sections to Texas Oil and Land Company, seven months after alleged expiration of discovery time.
 - (3) Similar lease after 10 months.
 - (4) Failing to forfeit same company's right to its "group 2" after failure to complete producing well.
 - (5) Late leasing of 16 sections in two instances to Big Lake Oil Company.
 - (6) Instance of patent to 1280 acres in Winkler county contrary to advice of attorney general and in violation of reappraisal act, "depriving the State of Mineral rights of the probable value of millions."
 - (7) Issuing 283 acres as "scrap land" to Ira G. Yates with (Continued on Page 2)

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NOT DONE YET.

The courts at York, Pa., have lost time in fixing the guilt of the men accused of those famous "witchcraft murders." All three defendants have been tried and convicted.

But it occurs to us that the authorities at York have one more job to do.

A dispatch to a New York newspaper reports that the "witch doctors" in that vicinity who persuaded these three unfortunates that they were bewitched are still practicing. They are continuing to perform "cures," weave "spells," and give all kinds of superstitious and ignorant advice. And it strikes us that York's job won't really be finished until all of these people who profess mastery of the black art are thrown in jail. If they are allowed to continue to practice, York may find itself with another strange murder some day.

HOW AVIATION IS GROWING.

The aviation business may in the near future take rank with the giants of American industry. Its growth during the past half decade has been amazing; production schedules of manufacturers are advancing so rapidly that the volume of business which will be reached a few years from now can only be guessed.

In 1928 American manufacturers sold slightly more than 4,000 airplanes with a total market value of \$75,000,000. During the present year, according to a survey made by the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce, production will be between 10,000 and 12,000 planes, valued at over \$100,000,000.

Yet that tells only part of the story. In 1921, the year in which the chamber was organized, there was only \$5,000,000 invested in the airplane business in this country. The few plants that existed managed to keep going chiefly by virtue of government contracts, and large-scale production for commercial purposes seemed very remote.

It was not until 1924, when day and night transcontinental airmail service was started, that the industry began to pick up. By 1927 the industry's total commercial sales were a little better than \$5,000,000, with military sales swelling the total to around \$20,000,000.

The pick-up experienced in 1928, which apparently is going to go ahead at an even faster rate this year, however, is the first real "boom" that the industry has felt. The chamber's survey reports jubilantly:

"Additional capital appears to be available as needed. The requirement for more schools in which to train plane purchasers to fly is being met. The shipments of airmail and package freight mount each month. Operators of air transport lines report such increasing patronage as to warrant extensions and more frequent service."

We are beginning, at last, to reap the full benefit of the ocean flights of the past two years. They made the nation "air minded" and proved the airplane possibilities. America is sprouting wings as a result.

14 Bullets End Life of Wichita Man

Man Is Arrested, on Murder Charge—Woman, also Held in Critical Condition with Crushed Glass in Stomach.

WICHITA FALLS, Tex., Jan. 21.—A complaint signed by District Attorney Sam B. Spence charges O. C. Heither with murder in connection with the fatal shooting of Clifford E. Wood, 28, who died in a local hospital Sunday of 14 bullet wounds in his body.

In a statement to the District attorney before he died, Wood said that he and Mrs. Heither and another woman had gone to a picture show and the shooting took place after they had returned home.

His statement ascribed jealousy as the reason for the shooting, according to the district attorney.

Mrs. Heither was arrested and placed in jail with her husband but later she was removed from her cell to a hospital, where physicians made efforts to remove crushed glass from her stomach.

Her condition was reported critical. Police officials said they found a broken water bottle in the cell which Mrs. Heither had occupied.

Jawaraki was pronounced dead by the prison physician at 7:06 a. m. He was executed for the slaying of I. L. Gump, payroll guard who was fatally shot during a \$48,000 holdup of the Pittsburg Terminal Coal Company at Mollersburg, Pa., December 23, 1925.

This was only one of the bandit's many murders and payroll robberies in western Pennsylvania.

Another murderer, Calvin E. Jones, of Bucks County, followed Jawaraki to the electric chair by a few minutes.

HOUSTON, Tex., Jan. 21.—On Jan. 1 stocks of crude oil in Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas totaled 127,124,022 barrels, increasing 2,180,556 barrels since Dec. 1. Compared to stocks on hand estimated at 100,027,737 barrels on Jan. 1, 1928, stocks in storage Jan. 1, 1929 were 27,161,285 barrels greater.

The greatest increase in any of the districts in the three states was found in the northern district of Texas, which on Jan. 1, 1928, had stocks estimated at 47,491,477 barrels and one year later totaled 73,000,011 barrels.

LAND TITLE ATTACKS TO BE OPPOSED
W. T. C. C. President Will Deliver Addresses in West Tex. About Vacancy Strips and Navigable Streams.

A "swing around the circle" will be made by A. M. Bourland, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, in behalf of West Texans whose rights to land are being attacked through navigable streams suits and vacancy strip proceedings, E. H. Whitehead, publicity manager of the W. T. C. C. told this newspaper by long distance telephone from Ft. Worth Monday.

A Coleman farmer lost the land on which his house, barn and well were located when another man, finding an error in the surveying

on the tract, Whitehead declared, and the farmer had to pay to get his land back from the other individual.

Pending legislation at Austin would give the man holding the land the first chance to buy vacancy strips and would apply a broader interpretation to the navigable stream statute.

Bourland will speak Tuesday night in Albany. Addresses in Bullinger and San Angelo will follow. On Thursday, he will speak in Marfa, where he will meet the governor of Chihuahua, Mexico. Then Bourland will speak at Pecos, Big Spring and Sweetwater. He will also discuss the Colorado river question.

Whitehead will accompany the W. T. C. C. president on the tour.

In the event that he upsets the best laid plans for the \$500,000 venture by disposing of one of its two proposed principals, the former rubber puddler will be offered the position of alternate against Young Stribbling, who apparently does not care whom he fights.

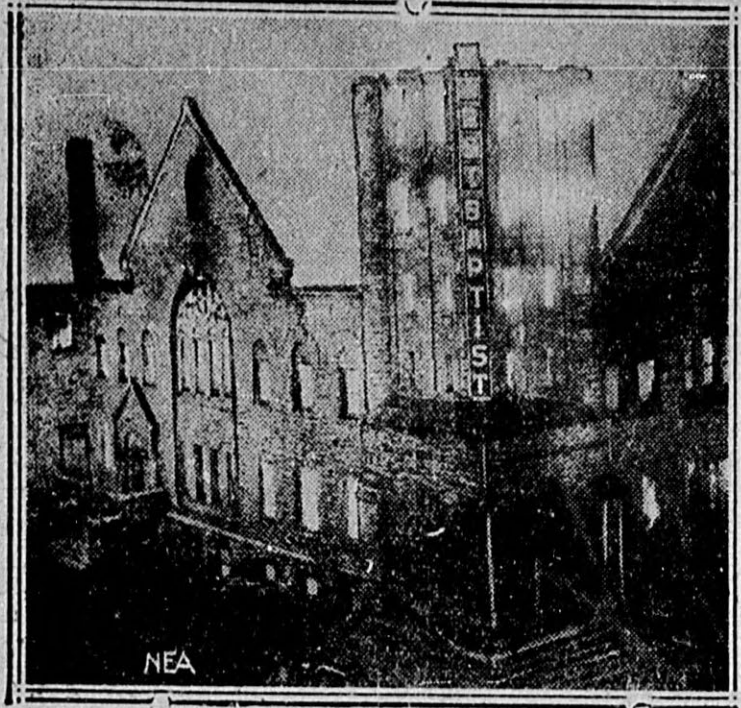

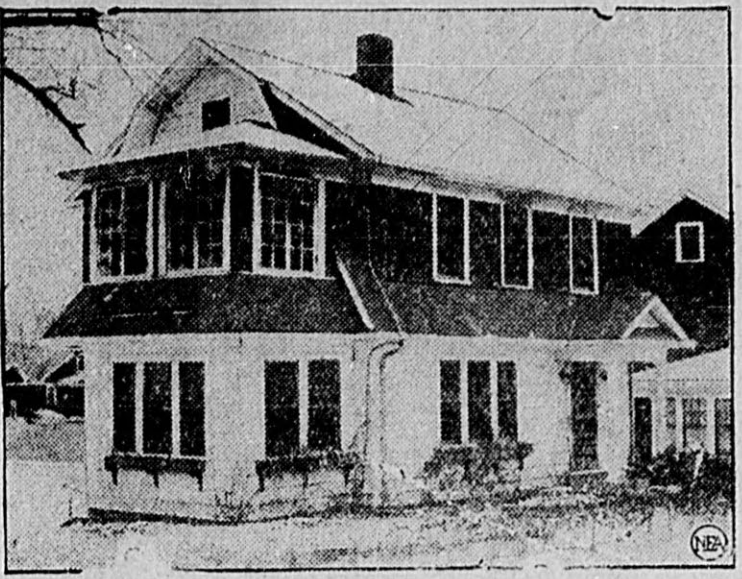

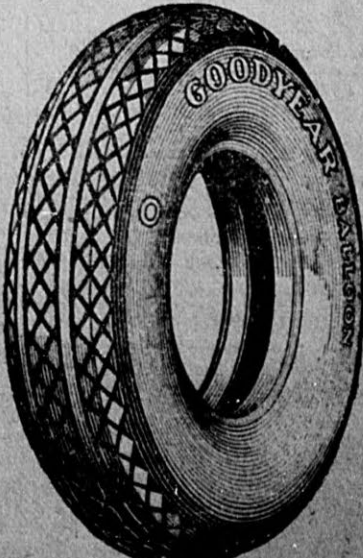

Because of that collar, the progressives and liberals go about with sober mien. It may really mean nothing; they may be over symbolizing, they admit. Still—this collar for 25 years, and that such a collar as no other man or horse ever wore!

Have you heard "Cheerio" on the radio? That little Pollyannaish geezer who, at the unholy hour of 8:30 a. m., reminds you how good it is to be alive and get up out of a nice warm bed and prance off to work in this great, big bustling happy world? Cheerio, you may be interested in knowing, whether you like him or whether you could slay him, is the creation of Herbert Hoover, next President of the United States.

The story goes that when Mr. Hoover had his office in New York a business neighbor used to stick his head inside the door each morning and yelp, "Cheerio, old thing."

Hoover himself, story has it, had the "cheerio" habit as a souvenir of "dear ole Lunnon" life. When he became secretary of commerce with certain official duties he suggested that "Cheerio" be put on the air. The real identity of Cheerio is not known. NAVAJO INDIANS BALK AT LIFE IN MODERN HOMES

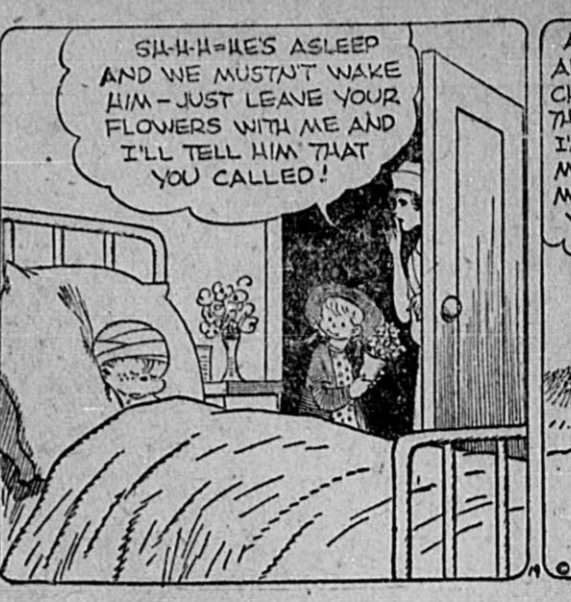
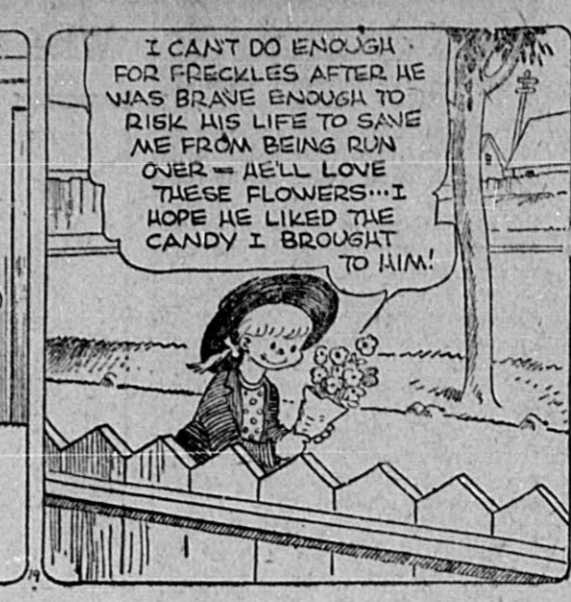
Burn Down Native Dwellings at Death of One of Family.

WASHINGTON—Arson laws mean nothing in the lives of Navajo Indians, for whenever one of the family dies they immediately burn their homes and build others.

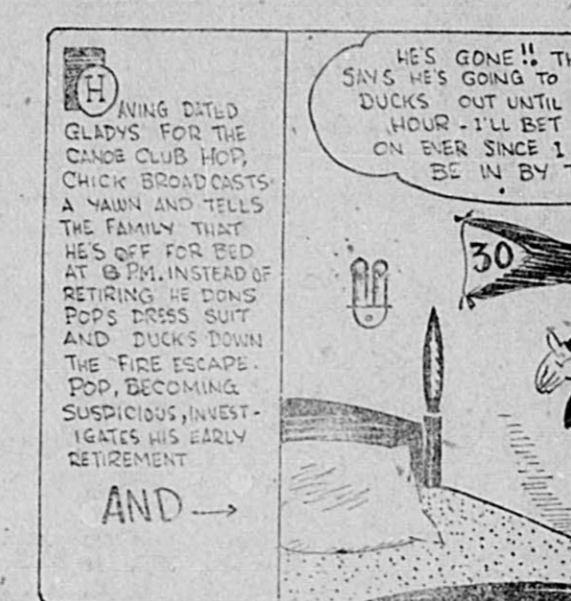
This practice was mentioned in a recent report to the superintendent of the Navajo Indian reservation in Arizona by the commissioner of Indian affairs.

"The dwelling of the Navajo Indian family," the superintendent explained, "is called a 'hogan.' It is not a house, or a home, or a dwelling in the sense in which the white man uses these terms. It is simply a shelter. The Navajo has no word that means home." Always built to face the east, these shelters are well lighted and give protection from the storms that invariably come from the west, the superintendent said. STATE AID TO ASSIST IN PAVING

Meeting of Property Owners Set For Thursday Night at Young School.

RANGER, Texas, January 21.—Strawn Road from Bundell street to the Hamon-Kell railroad crossing will be a 40-foot paved boulevard, it was announced Saturday by B. H. Peacock, chairman of the chamber of commerce committee, which has been working with the State Highway Department on the project for a number of months.

When it was announced several months ago that the department would widen the Bankhead Highway, chamber of commerce officials conceived the idea of making that stretch 22 feet wider than the ordinary streets.

The state department's plan was to leave the present 18 feet of pavement as it is, construct a 1-1/2 foot concrete shoulder on each side, and an additional five foot dirt shoulder on each side.

At that time accurate figures will be presented and it will be decided by the property owners whether it will be accepted. Peacock declared he had conferred with the majority of the property owners and found them in favor of making a boulevard out of the present street.

EASTLAND'S B. & L. ASS'N. HAS ELECTION

Stockholders, At Thursday's Meeting, Re-Elected All Officers for Another Year.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Eastland Building & Loan association was held Thursday afternoon at which time the directors for the ensuing year were elected. The retiring board, consisting of T. L. Overbey, president, W. B. Smith, vice president, Earl Bender, vice president, K. B. Tanner, Guy Parker, J. L. The usual dividend were earned and declared by the directors and the secretory was instructed to credit the 10 per cent share and mail checks to those holding 8 per cent certificates.

Building and loan associations are now being recognized all over as being one of the big business institutions. The Dallas News in a recent issue, had the following editorial regarding building and loan:

Combined resources of building and loan societies in the United States now exceed eight billions. The increase during 1928 was almost a billion. There are said to be 12,000,000 stockholders in these institutions throughout the United States.

This means that somewhere between a third and a half of the total population of the country is directly or indirectly interested in this type of investment. For the building and loan account is very rarely a matter of family concern. Looked at in this light, the figures are significant in the highest degree. They tell of saving wage for a large section of American earners. They are something of a tribute to the American idea of credit and substantial saving. Because these things are true, alternative (and therefore to some degree) competitive investments have every reason to be tolerant of building and loan. Certainly every safeguard provided for such savings systems should have general support.

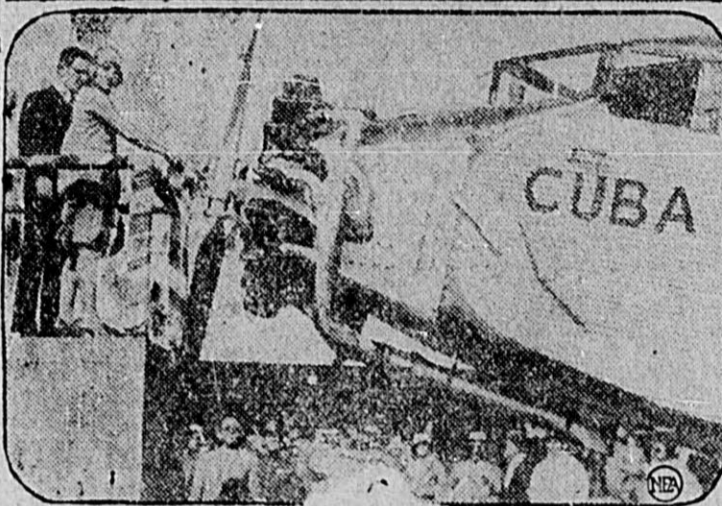

which large concerns tried to force small operators to the wall, thereby eliminating price cutting. The gangsters were employed, it is said, by both sides.

3.—What authorities term as "just plain arson." Men use dynamite to afford a means of collecting insurance instead of the old-time "fire brand" method.

The grand jury, with the overwhelming weight of public opinion back of it, has been investigating the outrages for several months. But even in the face of 10 indictments the bombings have continued.

One reason for the continued defiance of law and order, it is explained, is because Robert W.

Jackson, Chicago, was freed of an arson charge because of a technicality in the present law. He was with the "Cleaners and Dyers" complaint. It was alleged he was one of the organizers in Kansas City of "dynamite competition."

Immediately there aroused a cry for a new arson law—one eliminating the possibilities of such releases.

Those seeking change in the state arson law want one with the following foundation points:

1.—Providing for two to 20-year sentences for those convicted of first degree arson which shall be the destruction of a dwelling in which there are inhabitants.

2.—Providing for a two to 20-year sentence for destruction of a building used as a living place, regardless of whether it is occupied at the time of the arson or attempted arson. 3.—Providing for a two to 20-year sentence for those convicted of destruction of a building next to or adjoining a building used as a dwelling place. The above three points cover first, second and third degree arson in the order named. Enactment of such a law, it is pointed out, would eliminate many of the technical phases of such law violation now raised.

WEDDING SUPERSTITIONS

LONDON.—Wedding superstitions are dying out very slowly, according to an authority on matrimonial problems. Although the superstitious bride is now the exception rather than the rule, the question of lucky or unlucky hours, days or months still holds a place in the mind of many a young woman contemplating marriage, he said.

May is usually a lean month for weddings, and there are couples who hesitate to get married on Friday. Others have a dread of the thirteenth of the month. More remarkable still is the fact that 1 o'clock—the thirteenth hour—is very rarely chosen for the wedding ceremony.
