OIL NEWS

SAN ANGELO, Tex., Jan. 15.—The Howard county oil pool has been extended more than a mile west by the completion of the Plymouth Oil company's No. 7 Kloh, which is thirty feet in the line pay. Oil of 33.5 gravity is standing 1,000 feet deep in the hole, the well being down to 2,294 feet.

DALLAS, Tex., Jan. 15.—Contracts have been let for the drilling of four new test wells in the immediate future by the Simms Oil Company of Dallas.

The first will be a 3,200 foot test on the Elkwood lease in Mitchell county, just east of the Howard county chalk pool. The contract has been let for drilling a 1,200 foot hole near the town of Guadalupe county, north-south-southwest of the field. Location has been staked on a 5,000 acre tract.

ABILENE, Tex., Jan. 15.—The Marland Production Company completed its No. 5 Mason and No. 9 Mason Monday for 200 and 300 barrels a day respectively. The two wells are in Jones county in the north part of the Noodle Creek pool.

Edwards Evens Up With Gashouse Wop

DALLAS, Jan. 15.—Promoter Bert Willoughby's weekly "neck twisting match", a return bout between Little Rock and Billy Edwards, "Chiropractic Headlock" king of Kansas City, ended with a victory for Edwards, when, after halving the first two falls, Bernardi was unable to return to the ring for the final round. Their bout last week ended with a decision for Bernardi, when Edwards was disqualified in the third round for kicking.

The wop took the first fall with a combination of body scissors and his patented Japanese chinlock. Rogers' back was badly wrenched, and he was carried to the emergency hospital on a stretcher.

I hope that you who constitute the legislative department of this government and I may join hands in a united effort so to serve the interest of our citizenship. The people of Texas expect much of this administration. They are conscious of new necessities created by the ever-changing conditions of this fast developing age. Our time is 1929. We have been chosen as their officers and entrusted with power to act for them in the present matters which concern their welfare. Therefore it is our duty to assume our thinking and our doing to their existing needs. Our attitude toward public problems should not be reactionary, but progressive and in keeping with the times of which our lives form a part. From the legislative halls of this State and the executive office, we should send forth measures of law that are written by hands and minds which are devoted to mankind's material and spiritual betterment and advancement. I see opportunity is great and this beautiful country which thought and toil have transformed from wooded wilderness and arid plains into the home of five million happy people demands the best of which we are capable. The people appreciate the difficulties and intricacies of the issue before us, and they will patiently but interestedly wait for our action. Unselfish devotion upon our part of their service will earn their approval. Throughout my life, I have been the beneficiary of this State and her citizens. PARIS, Jan. 15.— Marshal Ferdinand Foch, who is gravely ill at his home here, passed an extremely agitated night and was unable to sleep, Dr. Heitzbeyer, one of his physicians, told the United Press today. The marshal was able to take slight nourishment this morning however. "I must be very reserved in my opinion, but I am optimistic now, I have some hope," Dr. Heitzbeyer said. The physician spent the night at Marshal Foch's bedside with Mme. Foch and her two daughters, Mme. Becourt and Mme. Fournier. Dr. Daveniere, another of the six heart specialists called in consultation with the Marshal, arrived at the Foch home near the Hotel Des Invalides and conferred with Dr. Heitzbeyer. Together they drafted the morning bulletin which read: "There is a slight diminution in the symptoms. The condition of the heart and kidneys at present shows a slight amelioration. Signed, Heitzbeyer, Daveniere. Foch, brilliant commander of the Allied armies during the latter part of the World War, realized the gravity of his condition, it was said, but, despite of his weakness, attempts to raise his hands to assure Mine Foch that he is improving."

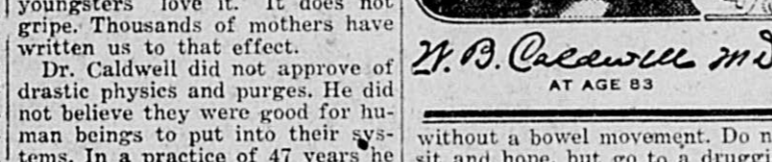

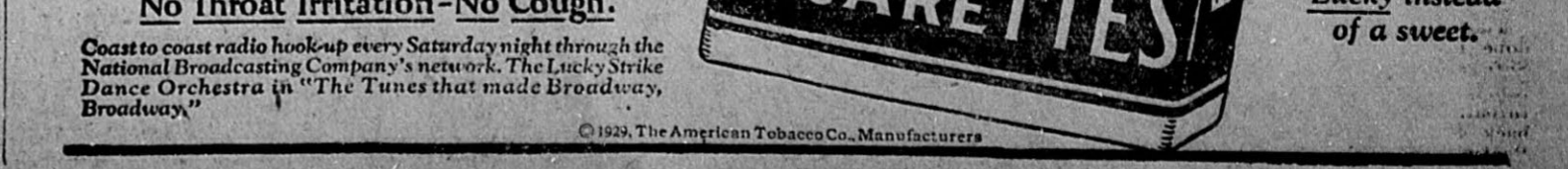
