Goes Down Six Times, Then He Wins With K. O.

Ray Miller, Conqueror of
Jimmy McLarnin, Stages
Surprising Victory
Over Grogan.

DETROIT, Mich., Jan. 12 —
After being floored six times, Ray
Miller, Chicago slugger, came back
in the fourth round last night and
knocked out Tommy Grogan, of
Omaha, in one of the most spec-
tacular fights ever held at Olympia
arena.

The victory placed Miller, who
recently knocked out Jimmy Mc-
Larnin here, on the top rung of
the challengers for Sammy Man-
dell's lightweight title. Miller al-
ready has signed to meet Mandell
here.

The first round was fought cau-
tiously by both, Miller having a
slight edge. Grogan caught the
Chicago Jewish boy early in the
second, sending him to the ropes
with a vicious right to the head.
Miller smiled, but a second later
was sent to the canvass with an-

other right.
Reeling drunkenly, Miller was up
in two seconds. Six times in all, he
hit the deck and rebounded, with-
out taking a full nine count, which
was handily excitedly were yell-
ing for him to do. The frame
ended with Miller staggering to the
wrong corner.

Apparently refreshed, Miller
was not in difficulty during the
third round. In the fourth, af-
ter taking a hard crack on the
head, he retreated to a neutral
corner.

Grogan followed and caught a
wicked left hook flush on the jaw.
He fell like lead and lay on his
back desperately attempting to
turn over while the referee tolled
the ten counts.

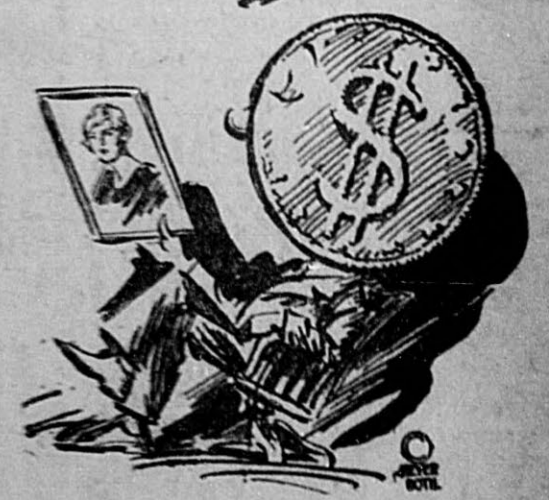

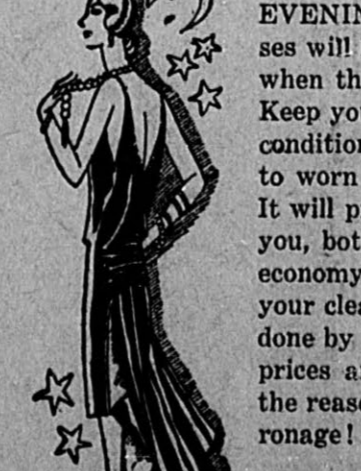

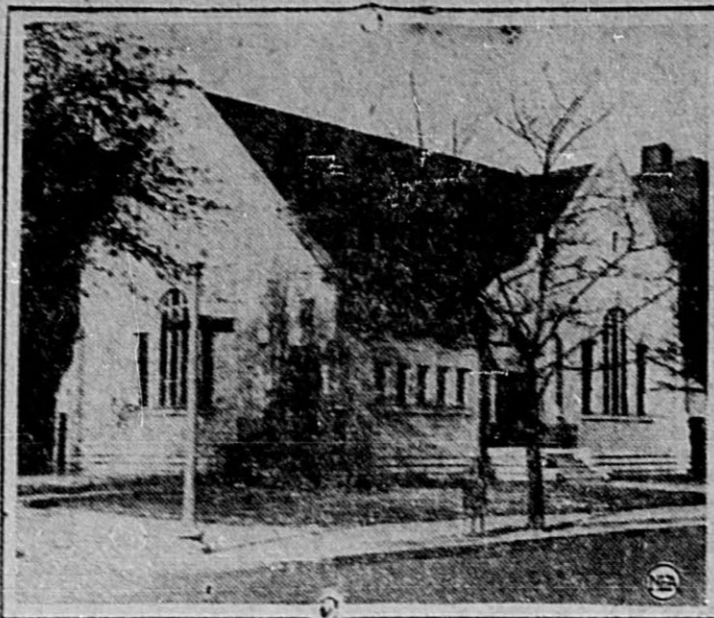
