AUSTIN, Tex., Jan. 10 — The State Senate this morning passed a bill repealing the present oil lease law and directing the land commissioner to consider none of the bids on University land on January 2 and to make no record of them.

Rules were suspended and the bill finally passed the Senate, 27 to 0.

It now goes to the house which held no morning session.

In case of any of the provisions of the law are held invalid, a clause keeps in force other sections.

Admittedly designed to prevent the transfer of oil leases on 103,000 acres prospective oil land in Ward, Winkler, Andrews and Crane counties, the bill also orders stoppage of leases on 1,400,000 more acres that have been advertised for award at various dates from Jan. 15 to Jan. 31.

Attorney Lloyd Price, representing Abilene bidders who offered \$348,000 on 50,000 acres said that the act if passed cannot affect his clients' rights, which he claims are vested.

Another step was taken in the oil land controversy by introduction of the bill prepared at the request of University of Texas regents to place the control of the leasing of University lands in their hands.

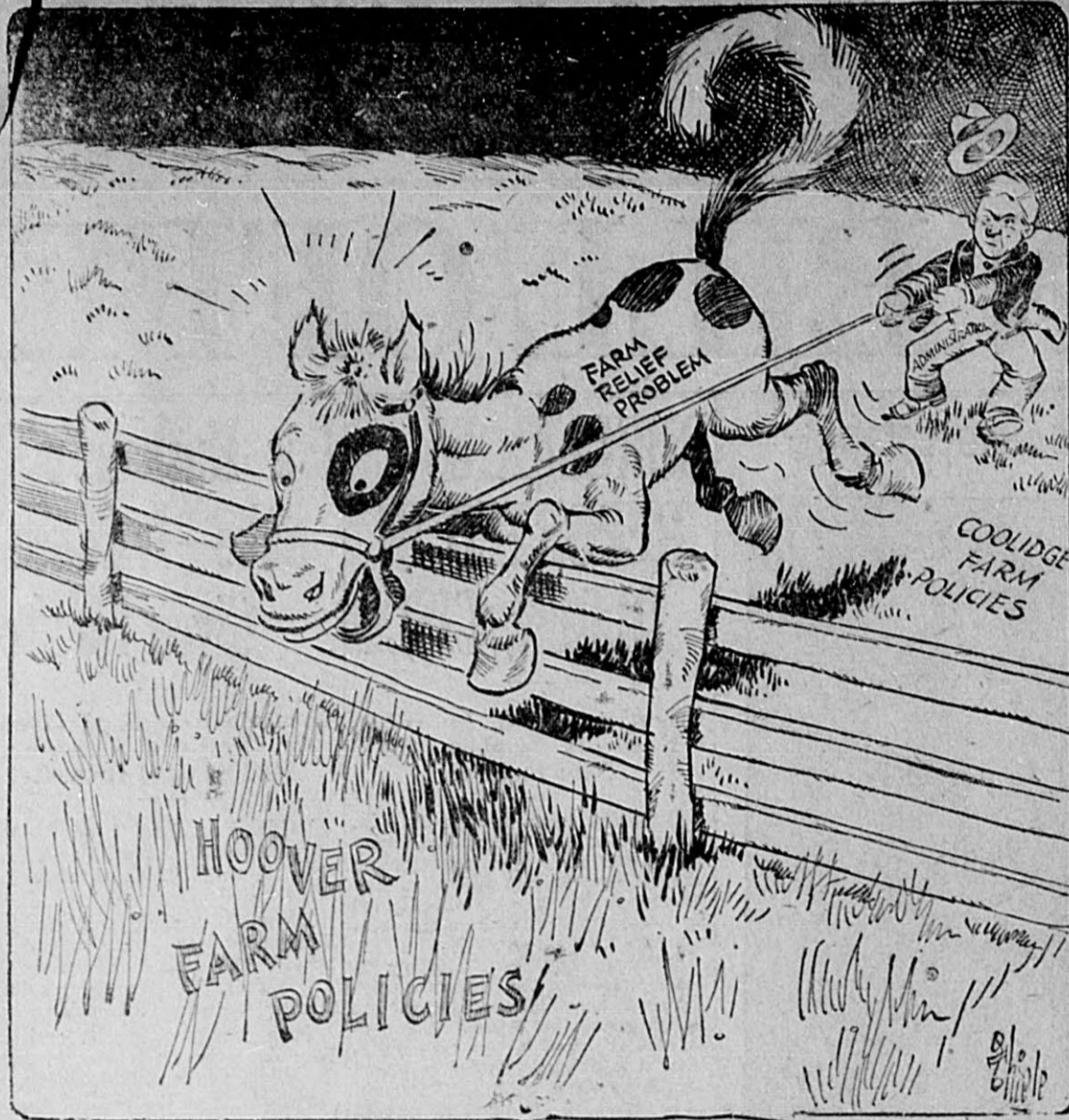

Murder Plot Being Probed by Officers

DETROIT, Jan. 10.—Faced with the confessions of two youth whose companion was killed in an attempt to murder Ralph A. Wood, 33, last night, Mrs. Grace Wood, 46, denied today any part in an alleged murder plot against her wealthy husband who had sued her for divorce.

A squad of police, warned of the scheme by a fourth man whose courage failed, ambushed the men last night at Wood's office in Wyandotte, a suburb.

Ambrose Haggerty, 21, was killed. Police later arrested Taylor Pierce, 22, and William Thompson, 22. A fourth man is sought.

Wood is president of the Wood Construction company and his wife is head of the Grace-Land company with offices in Detroit.

City detectives, deputy sheriffs and Assistant Prosecutor Paul O. Buckley questioned the two men until seven o'clock this morning, obtaining complete confessions from them.

The investigators will question Mrs. Wood again today. Buckley refused to state how deeply Pierce and Thompson involved Mrs. Wood in their confession, but said they had admitted having several conferences with her.

Wood carried a \$100,000 life insurance policy with his wife as beneficiary.

Mrs. Wood and her 70-year old mother, Mrs. Mary C. Smith Baumgartner, are being held as police witnesses. When police reached the Wood home, Mrs. Wood was in bed and said she was suffering from influenza.

Detectives found she was almost fully clothed and brought her to a hospital for examination. Later she was removed to police headquarters. Her mother escaped by jumping from a window clad only in a nightgown while police were in another part of the house, but returned to the home this morning still wearing only the nightgown, a dressing gown and bedroom slippers.

She told officers she had "only been downtown."

"Witch Doctor" Is Calm After Trial

YORK, Pa., Jan. 10 — The witch doctor, John Blymyer, sat cheerfully in his cell today awaiting pronouncement of a life imprisonment sentence for killing the alleged "witch" Nelson Rehmyer, as John Curry, 14-year old companion in crime, prepared to face a jury for his part in the Rehmyer killing and burning.

Wilbert Hess, 18, last of the trio, later must stand trial.

Blymyer, found guilty by a jury last night, characterized the jury's recommendation of a life sentence as a "little stiff" but pictured himself as happy—free from the "spell" which he claimed caused him to slay Rehmyer.

Now he could eat and sleep, he said. Up to the time he killed Rehmyer in an effort to get a lock of hair for burial—part of the code for exorcising bad spirits—Blymyer had been "hexed," he claimed.

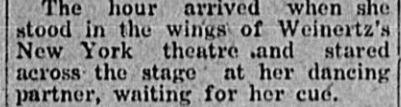

When the Lord spoke to Adam and Eve about their misconduct, instead of confessing their sin, they justified themselves by blaming God with their misfortune. Adam said "The woman whom thou gavest to be with me, she gave me of the tree, and I did eat." As if to say if God had not made a woman for him, he would still be innocent. The Lord noticed of the woman about the matter, and she promptly replied that the serpent was the cause of it. If God had not made a serpent and let it loose in Eden, Eve according to her contention would not have been led astray. In substance Adam and Eve maintained that they had committed no sin, and if they had, they were not to blame for it. Thus, in this lesson John says "If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us." Satan is a liar, and the father of lies. Therefore we see him defending his course in the hearts of the first pair by inspiring them to maintain innocence. John continues "If we confess our sins, he is just to forgive us... If we say we have not sinned, we make him a liar." The consequence of such conduct is eternal ruin. **WEEKLY SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON**

SIN  
 By H. W. Wrye  
 I John 1:5 to 2:6

**GOLDEN TEXT**—"If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." I Jn 1:8-9.

**INTRODUCTION**

SIN, just three letters, and they spell the Tragedy of the Universe. Sin blighted God's beautiful creation, filled man's heart with cruelty, the centuries with crime, the earth with carnage, the race with corruption, and broke the heart of the Son of God. Yea, "And it repented the Lord that he had made man on the earth, and it grieved him at his heart." All sighing, sorrow, grief, pain and pang, distress and despair, torture and tears, bitterness and death—all have come in the wake of sin. God made man in His own image, but sin marred it to such an extent that in 1600 years after the creation "every imagination of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually."

**THE BEGINNING OF SIN**

Back in beautiful Eden Adam and Eve were innocent and pure, and walked in fellowship with God. They were happy. They had one continual feast of heavenly pleasure under the control of their Creator. Man was authorized to have dominion over every living thing, but God reserved the right to command the man. Being made in the image of God, man stood next to Him in authority. Satan argued that if man would eat of the tree of knowledge of good and evil, he would be equal to God and live eternally. Sin entered into the world through yielding to Satan's temptation to disbelieve and disobey God. Sin is transgression. God is sovereign and His will is the source of authority. Defiance of authority is sin. In the social realm defiance of authority is called anarchy. In the moral field God calls it sin. Sin may be summarized as three fold: (1) An act, the violation of, or want of obedience to the revealed will of God. (2) A state, absence of righteousness. (3) A nature, enmity toward God. Sin originated with Satan (Isa. 14:12-14); entered the world through Adam (Rom 5:12); was, and is, universal, Christ alone exempted (Rom. 3:23, I Pet. 2:22); incurs the penalties of spiritual and physical death (Gen. 2:17; 3:19; Ezek. 18:4,20; Rom. 6:23); and has no remedy but in the sacrificial death of Christ (Heb. 9:26; Acts 4:12).

**FELLOWSHIP RESTORED**

THROUGH CHRIST  
 That happy state of man in the beginning being shattered by sin, and his fellowship with God broken off, it remained for Christ to restore that relationship by redeeming Adam's unfortunate race from death, the rightful penalty for sin. 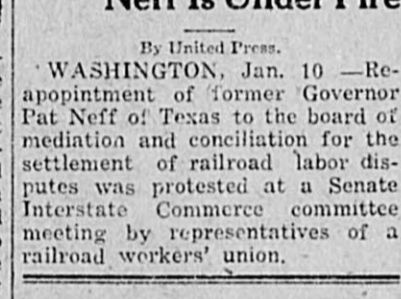

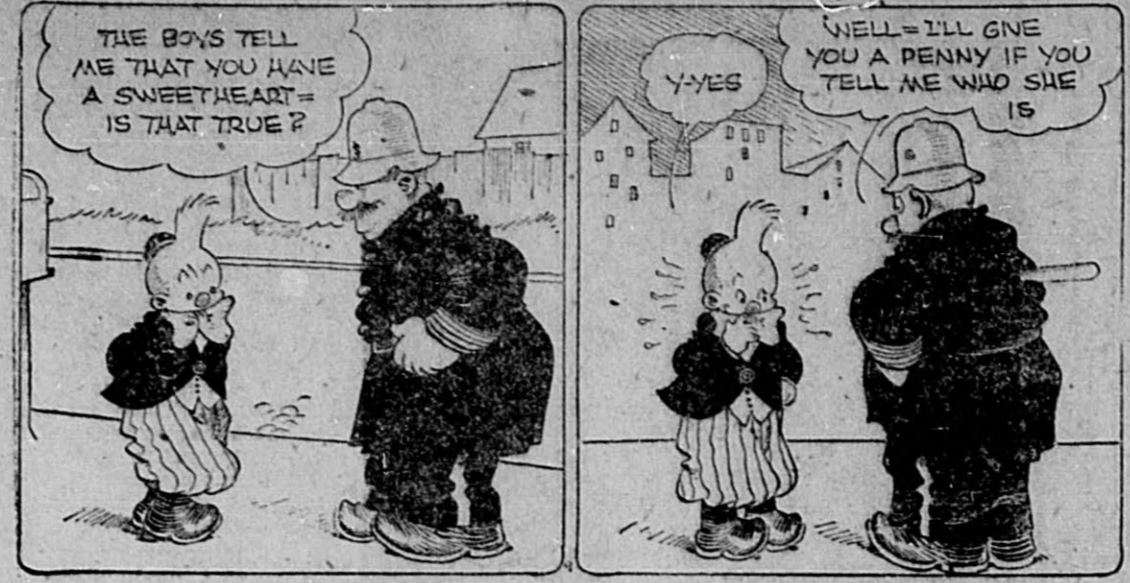

## Hope To Reach Vote Soon On Anti-War Pact

### Reservationists Must Obtain Concession or Talk On, Or the Treaty Will Be Adopted.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10—New efforts to hasten a vote on the anti-war treaty were made by Senate leaders today in the face of a hopeless deadlock which has encompassed the pact for the last week.

Talk was beginning to die down somewhat and a vote could be taken within a few hours if the adherents and opponents of the treaty could agree on a satisfactory way to state the American interpretation of the document. Secretary of State Kellogg and treaty advocates have refused to accede to any action which would put the Senate officially on record as expressing its interpretation of the pact.

Twelve Senators already have made speeches and only five more are scheduled, including that of Senator James A. Reed of Missouri who wants to close the debate with a vigorous presentation of the reservationists' attitude.

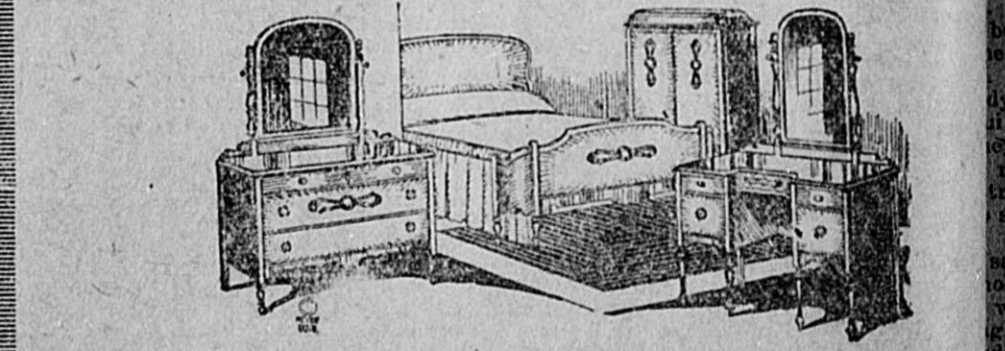
\$58,000 IN GOLD STILL MISSING
