Paleface Brownies (16)

One cup sifted, all-purpose flour; 1/4 teaspoon baking soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup shortening, melted and cooled; 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar, 2 eggs, beaten; 1 teaspoon vanilla extract, 1 tablespoon vinegar, 1/2 cup chocolate pieces (3 ounces). Sift together flour, baking soda and salt. Combine shortening,

sugar, eggs and vanilla extract Blend in dry ingredients and vinegar, mixing until smooth Stir in chocolate pieces. Spread in greased, 8-inch square pan.

Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 30 minutes. Cool slightly and cut into squares. Cool thoroughly.

Peanut Butter Cake

(Two 8-inch round layers) Two cups sifted cake flour, 1 teaspoon baking soda, 3/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup creamy peanut butter, ¼ cup shortening, 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla extract, 2 eggs, ½ cup milk, ¼ cup vinegar.

Sift flour, baking soda, and salt together.

Cream together peanut butter, shortening, sugar and vanilla extract until soft and smooth. Beat

Barley Casserole Warms Appetites on Chill Autumn Days

HERE'S a recipe for a dish of "something different"—
a wholesome, flavorful mushroom-barley casserole.
It's a perfect complement for roast fowl, or will stand on its own sturdy, nutrition-packed legs as a main dish in

Mushroom-Barley Casserole (4 generous servings) Two tablespoons butter or margarine, 1 tablespoon minced green pepper, 1 tablespoon minced onion, 2 cups chicken consomme or bouillon, 1% cups medium-grain pearl barley, 3-ounce can chopped,

Melt butter or margarine in frying pan over moderate heat. Add green pepper and onion and let cook for about 1 minute. Add 1 cp bouillon and let come to boil.


Special Corn Pudding (6 servings)
