Pioneer Plant, As Such, Ends Its Operation

The Pioneer Gasoline Plant, as such, ceased to be this month. It has been changed to a booster station to pump raw gas from the Pioneer Star seven miles west of Rising Star to the Blake plant, eight miles southwest of Rising Star.

The consolidation is designed to affect economies in the manufacture of hydrocarbons from natural gas in the fields west and southwest of Rising Star. With the change-over, the Ike Ruman Pioneer Gasoline Co. has been dissolved, and its properties assigned to its sister company, the Rudeo Oil and Gas Co., which owns and operates the Blake plant.

Most of the eight employees at Pioneer are being transferred to the Blake Plant. Charles Watson of Rising Star is superintendent of the Blake plant and of the Rudeo Oil and Gas Co. production in the area.

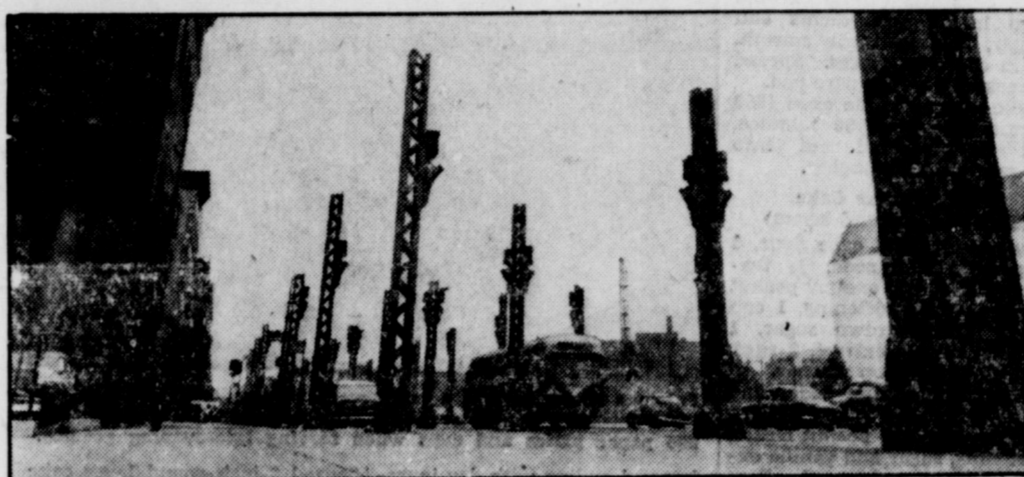

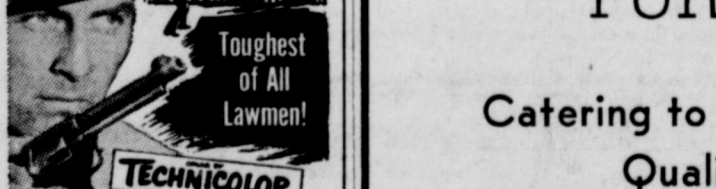

Navy Submarine Duty Offered To Young Men

The U.S. Navy recently "threw open the gates," so to speak on the Submarine Service. The Navy states that there are unlimited opportunities now available to qualified young men between the ages of seventeen and thirty-one for the U.S. Navy's undersea fleets. Heretofore, only a select few were allowed to qualify for the chance to wear the twin dolphin pin (signifying qualified submarine men), on their uniform.

Submarine duty offers numerous interesting possibilities. The most lucrative of these perhaps is the extra pay allowances. Men on submarine duty receive as much as a third more in total pay than those stationed on surface or shore duty. There, too, are skilled trades to be learned, and intricate machinery to be operated. Food is another good reason for choosing the submarine service.

Submarine cooking can't be beat, just ask any sailor you see with the twin dolphins pinned on his uniform. Submarines are normally based upon and operate from: New London, Connecticut; Key West, Florida; Norfolk, Virginia; San Diego, California; and Honolulu, T.H. Submarine operations often include cruises to the Far East, Europe, Arctic and Antarctic waters and South America.

The most interesting fact about submarine duty is the concentration on the education and training of the individual. A submariner is always advancing in his particular rating or vocation. There is no space aboard a submarine for a man who is marking time.

"Contact your Navy recruiter for further information regarding this program, he will be in Eastland at the court house each Tuesday," it was urged.

Dope Users Arrested; Unravel Sordid, Twisted Tale

One of two drug and dope users arrested in Ranger, told a sordid story of narcotics, jail and prison in an interview with local police and Times reporter last night.

Joe Davison of Dallas, and K. W. Duke, of Eupora, Miss., were taken into custody by Patrolman John Shook after a phone call tipped the police last night.

Both Davison and Duke told conflicting stories of their association, their destination and their whereabouts in the past few days.

Duke readily admitted his addiction to dope while Davison said "he had fooled around with it but hadn't used any since 1948 except what the doctor prescribed."

Bruises and needle marks on the arms and legs of both, however, mutely testified to recent use.

Davison, 39, small, wary and slightly graying, told of prison sentences in both Tennessee and Texas. Beginning in 1949, he served 2½ years of a three to five year sentence for grand larceny in Tennessee and was an inmate of the Texas Prison System at Sugarland after being convicted of burglary. The burglary involved the theft of narcotics from a drug store in Cooper, 15 miles from Commerce, where he was living at the time.

He said two others were involved but that he took "the rap" by himself. The story is nearly the same on the grand larceny conviction. "I beat a fellow out of some money gamblin', it was kinda a frameup," he said.

As far as the burglary, "Davison surmised, 'I didn't go over there (to Cooper) with the idea of robbing the store, but we got to drinking and I took some kind of a capsule (evidently some form of a narcotic) and went crazy. They picked me up the next morning.' His voice faded, 'I didn't know how they found out it was me.'"

Davison also told of spending many nights in the jails in Dallas and other cities throughout the Southwest, "three or four times in the last two or three months."

A house painter by trade, Davison evidently feels that he's the home type as he plans to be married next month.

Duke, on the other hand, definitely showing the signs of more recent use, was not nearly so informative and contradicted his story time after time.

From his person, police took a syringe, needle, sterile water, unidentified tablets and other items related to the dope user. The syringe and needle alone amount

to a felony under the state's newest drug laws.

Davison also had two syringe needles in a suitcase, several wrappers such as those used in banks and depositories for strapping paper currency, and a paper "play money."

Davison said that he had fooled around with drugs up to 1948, but had not used any since that time. He only took heroin, he said and "I wouldn't give a nickle for a whole room full of marijuana to smoke—it makes me sick."

That dope has many affects on the user was evident in Davison's testimony. "Every time I used the stuff I wanted to go hide some place," he said.

Both gave different accounts of their first meeting. Davison said their friendship was began in Mobile, Ala., five or six years ago. Duke said it was Dallas.

Davison said that he had seen Duke on and off since that time and that often he would not see the Mississippian for two or three months and then he would run across him in "a cafe or somewhere" in Dallas without any pre-set rendezvous.

Duke, evidently a son of a wealthy Mississippi lumberman, left a wife and two children in his home state and was "going to Lubbock to see a girl friend." Remorsefully he confessed, "I try to be true to both of them."

Charges of narcotics violation were to be filed against the pair today and a complete record check was to be filed with state on both Davison and Duke and the car they were driving.

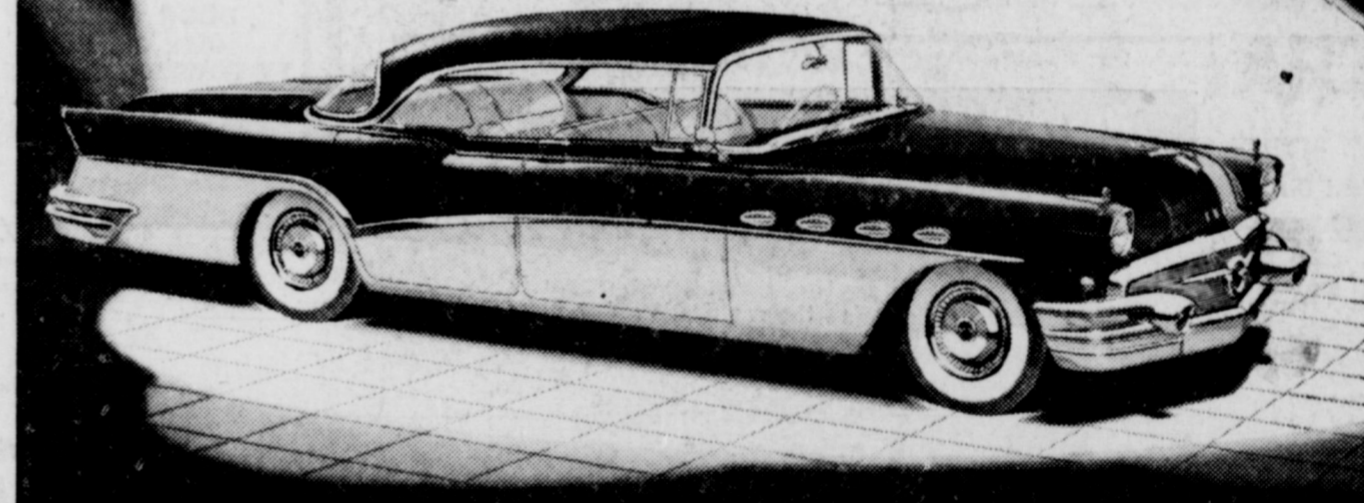

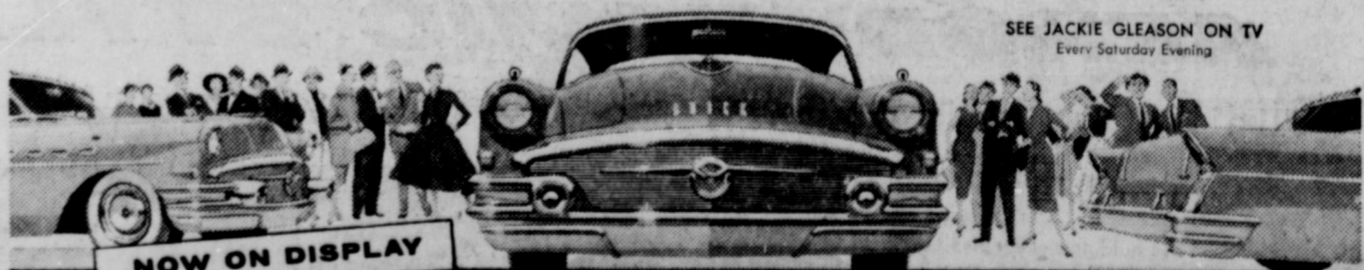

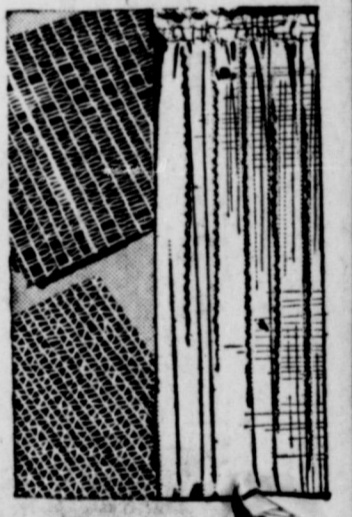

D Day, and will continue ten days afterwards. Published reports of the results will let the motorists know, state by state, county by county, how others behaved in preventing driving injuries and deaths just before and after S-D Day.

"Traffic accidents, nearly 10 million, brought death to more farm people last year than any other man-made killer," continued Sheriff Williams. "At the present rate, one million people in cities and towns like Eastland, Ranger and Cisco throughout the country will be killed in just 25 more years!"

"Not one person in this country has escaped having a relative or friend injured in a traffic accident. They're that frequent . . . and just as needless. The facts for 1954 show that every twenty-five seconds someone was injured. Killed were 36,000 people, while one-and-a-quarter million were maimed. Among industrial workers, vehicle accidents killed twice as many as non-vehicular occupational accidents.

"With the great religious event of Christmas just 25 days behind it, S-D Day highlights particularly the moral obligation in accident prevention. Every day on the highway drivers behave in a way that belies almost every principle of real religion. They disobey laws, ignore the golden rule, act rudely and selfishly. S-D Day gives them a pre-Christmas chance to be their own and their brothers' keeper by driving and walking sensibly."

Barley Casserole Warms Appetites on Chill Autumn Days

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

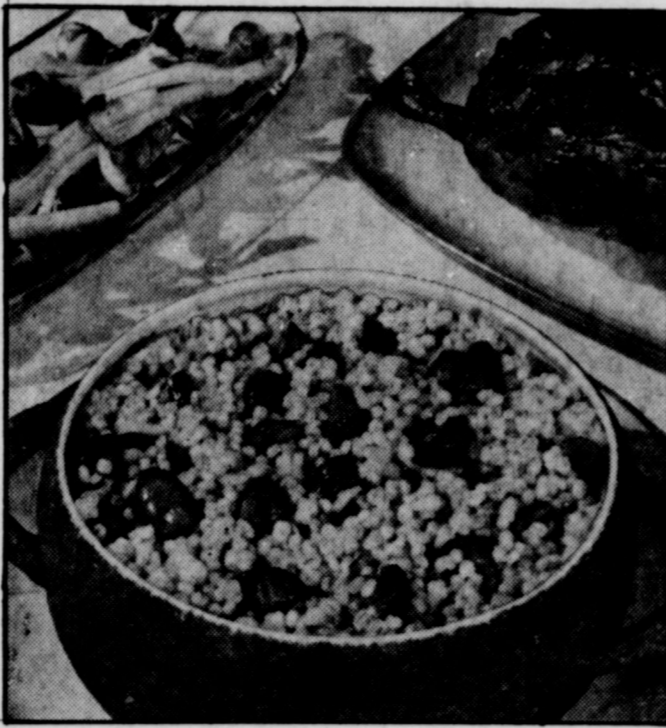
HERE'S a recipe for a dish of "something different"—a wholesome, flavorful mushroom-barley casserole. It's a perfect complement for roast fowl, or will stand on its own sturdy, nutrition-packed legs as a main dish in itself.

Mushroom-Barley Casserole (4 generous servings)

Two tablespoons butter or margarine, 1 tablespoon minced green pepper, 1 tablespoon minced onion, 2 cups chicken consommé or bouillon, 1 1/2 cups medium-grain pearl barley, 3-ounce can chopped, broiled-in-butter mushrooms.
Melt butter or margarine in frying pan over moderate heat. Add green pepper and onion and let cook for about 1 minute. Add 1 cup bouillon and let come to boil.
Meanwhile, place barley in 1-quart casserole. When bouillon has come to boil pour over barley, stirring to mix in cooked pepper and onion.
Cover casserole and place in slow oven (325 degrees F.) for 45 minutes. Add remaining cup bouillon, which should be heated, and contents of can of mushrooms, stirring mushrooms through barley.
Bake until grains are of the desired tenderness, about 1 hour longer.
Corn pudding is always a good autumn dish. But here is a new version that's very special.

Special Corn Pudding (6 servings)

Three-ounce can sliced, broiled-in-butter mushrooms; 7-ounce can minced clams, 12-ounce can whole kernel corn, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup quick-cooking rice cereal, 1/4 cup butter or margarine, 3 eggs, 1/2 cup light cream, 2 teaspoons baking powder.
Combine broths from mushrooms, clams and corn. Add enough water, if necessary, to make 1 1/2 cups liquid.
Place in saucepan, add salt and bring to boil. Sprinkle in rice cereal so that boiling does not stop. Cook, stirring constantly, until rice thickens, about 1/2 minute.
Remove from heat and let stand, covered, for 3 minutes. Add butter or margarine and stir until melted.
Beat together the eggs, cream and baking powder until just

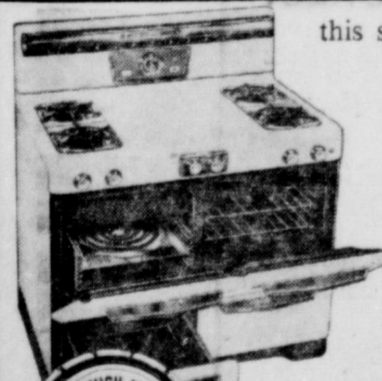
