Family Menu

BY SISTER MARY BREAKFAST - Grapes, cereal cream, rice and fish hash, rye bread toasted, milk, coffee. LUNCHTON - Open poached egg sandwich, buttered spinach, gray ham fig pudding, milk, tea. DINNER - Breaded veal cutlets, scalloped oyster plant, tomato and celery salad, peach and nut dessert, milk, coffee.

A thin slice of broiled ham is shaped to fit a split and toasted muffin. Above the ham is placed a poached egg and Hollandaise sauce is poured over the whole. This makes the open poached egg sandwich used in the luncheon menu.

Rice and fish hash is very good for breakfast.

One-half cup rice, 1-2 cup flaked salt codfish, 2 tablespoons grated cheese, 1-2 cups tomato juice, 1-2 teaspoon onion juice, pepper. The amount of salt used with it will depend on the saltiness of the fish. Wash rice and cook in boiling salted water for ten minutes. Drain and pour through rice. Drain and cook in tomato juice until ten-

der and juice is absorbed. Add onion juice and pepper. Add fish and mix lightly. Pile on a heat-proof platter and sprinkle with grated cheese. Slip into a hot oven to melt cheese and serve at once.

WILL HOLD TRIALS FOR OBREGON'S DEATH SOON

Toral is Almost Certain to Receive the Penalty of Death.

By GESFORD F. FINE,
United Press Staff Correspondent.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 11.—Jose de Leon Toral, the assassin of President-elect Alfaro Obregon, will go on trial soon with a death sentence the almost inevitable result. Sixteen others, men and women, also will be tried as accomplices and for all the prosecution is expected to ask the maximum penalty.

In the cases of the women, such as Madre Concepcion, the nun, charged with being the "intellectual author" of the murder, this will be 20 years imprisonment and for the men death by a firing squad. In some instances, there may be lighter penalties sought.

The number of arrests and the conflicting testimony already taken in the preliminary examinations augurs that the trial will be a complicated process. If before the trial begins the authorities succeed in arresting Manuel Trejo, alleged "key man" of the plot who is said to be hiding in New York,

the work of tying the evidence together may be much simpler.

In the case of Toral, of course, there is no doubt as to his guilt. Toral not only confessed his crime but insisted that he alone was responsible. He has so far as any one knows not varied from this stand since his arrest. The chief burden of the prosecution will be to connect his action with Madre Concepcion and the remainder of the "plotters."

Question One of Influence.
All evidence seems to indicate that when Toral shot Obregon in the Bombilla restaurant in San Angel, July 17, he accomplished what the 16 now under arrest had hoped would be accomplished for some months. The question is whether Toral acted, as he says, entirely on his own or whether the so-called Madre Concepcion group influenced him.

Upon the proof of the event of the nun's and the others' power over Toral will largely depend their culpability. Madre Concepcion has asserted repeatedly that she knew nothing of Toral's intentions although she admitted having told him it would be a good thing for the country if Calles and Obregon were killed.

Madre Concepcion also has denied knowledge of the poison hatpin plot which the conspirators allegedly were to carry out during the visit of Obregon and President Calles to the spring festival at Celaya. Likewise she says she knew nothing of the bomb factory maintained next door to her nursery by Carlos Castro Balda who has admitted responsibility for blowing up part of the chamber of deputies.

Because of the personality of Madre "Conchita" and her undoubted influence over the others, the investigation so far has largely centered around her. Like Toral, she is anxious to die a martyr and in all her talk expresses approximately the same feelings.

Confronted with the nun, the remaining members of the group during the course of the investigation have changed their statements regarding her part and contradicted their previous accusations against her which were made in the police headquarters. According to the system pursued in Mexico, it is customary to have prisoners confront each other in cases of this kind for examination.

Testimony Changed.
Whenever this has been tried with Madre Conchita it has almost invariably been to her advantage. Under her gaze and with her to correct them, the other members of the group have turned their accusing testimony about and admitted their first charges were inexact.

person most important is Balda, the bomb-maker. Balda is high-strung and has suffered more than the others during his imprisonment. He is not regarded as a religious fanatic and apparently has no martyr complex.

Balda has promised to make revelations at the trial "that will scandalize the civilized world." Possibly, this means that the so-called political phase of the plots against Obregon may be forthcoming. Castro is known to have been a professional political ringer in a clause for applause or to heckle and boo during a meeting.

Blood tests of Toral made at the request of his family have failed to reveal any insanity. Psychological examinations have been under way for some time, however, and it may be on the basis of these that the defense will plead insanity, although so far physicians have asserted no proof has been given of Toral's incapacity.

FORT WORTH.—Texas Christian University will take no chances with the strong Austin College team from Sherman Saturday when the teams meet for the Frogs' fourth scrap of the year. The Kangaroos have demonstrated the fact that they have a good crew and their play in their 36-0 victory over the Abilene Christian College at Dallas Tuesday has dispelled all thoughts of an easy victory in the minds of the Frog coaches.

The Frog fray will be the fourth indulged in by the Sherman school in nine days. Last Saturday the team was divided and two games were played on the same day. One of these battles was won 2-0 while the other was lost by a good margin. Then only three days later they defeated the Abilene team by a decisive score and had only four days to prepare for their battle at Fort Worth. Coach Matty Bell, who scouted the Tuesday scrap in person; came home with his whip unlash and has been driving his charges as though the biggest game of the year was in the offing.

The Frogs resumed heavy scrimmage work the first of the week, with plenty of action for the linemen on offensive play.
