## H. Pullman, Metal Dealer, Describes Work to Rotarians

Henry Pullman, proprietor of Eastland Iron & Metal Company, who has been in the metals business for thirty years, described his vocation as the program feature of Rotary at its Monday meeting at the Connelles.

Each Rotarian and guest was provided with a descriptive letter, also. "The metal business," Mr. Pullman said, "is as good today as it was in War II or better."

As one phase of the program, he showed colored motion pictures of operations at Sheffield Steel, one of whose plants is situated in Houston. This pictorial gave considerable emphasis to the importance of metals' being according to specifications, and showed methods of inspection.

"In the thirty years, I've been in this business," said Mr. Pullman, "I have shipped literally thousands of cars of metal — and I've never had a single car rejected. I always give them exactly what they ask for."

"We carry on the major part of our business elsewhere and are often forgotten by homefolks," Mr. Pullman said, in the letter he distributed. "We pay cash for what generally was considered worthless materials. The distribution of this money has meant much to our local merchants."

## Pasture Aid Also Is Given

Spotted showers about Eastland County ranging from .35 inch to nearly an inch, in some localities, Saturday night will be of benefit to late peanuts and the moisture has also brightened grazing lands, a agricultural observers declare.

In and near Eastland, gauges showed from .60 to .81 inch. North, in the Morton Valley community, reports were that .7 fell. At some points south of Ranger, in the Cheaney and Alameda localities, nearly an inch was reported. South, in the Gorman area, the moisture ranged from .35 to .7.

Melvin Shell, manager of the Gorman Peanut Company, said that the showers would be helpful to the soon-to-mature peanut crop which is the county's main source of agricultural income.

"The peanut crop is not yet ready to harvest," said Mr. Shell. "As a matter of fact, I know of only one crop around here that is in."

"During the last ten or twelve days, the drought caused the crop to go 'down hill', but these showers will prove of benefit to the late peanuts, all right."

The rain came too late for the cotton crop but it will freshen up the pastures somewhat in most parts of the country.

 In this country oil is a free enterprise. It's also one of the most intensely competitive of enterprises—all the way from risky wildcatting operations in search of new oil supplies to the corner service station. We, the American people enjoy the fruits of that competition. Since 1925, as everyone knows, the cost of living in general has soared. Yet the cost of gasoline, aside from the special taxes the industry can't do anything about, has risen only about seven per cent—and it's far better gasoline, that does far more work.  
 The average American, believe it or not, uses 739 gallons of oil products a year. The average Russian—in a country where the oil business is an arm of the government and there is no competition—uses a mere 76 gallons. Every American community has excellent service stations providing all manner of services in addition to selling its wares. But in Moscow, one of the world's biggest cities, there are only five service stations. And at these customer, when he buys inferior rationed gas, does the customer himself. All the attendant does is watch the meter and collect the rubles.

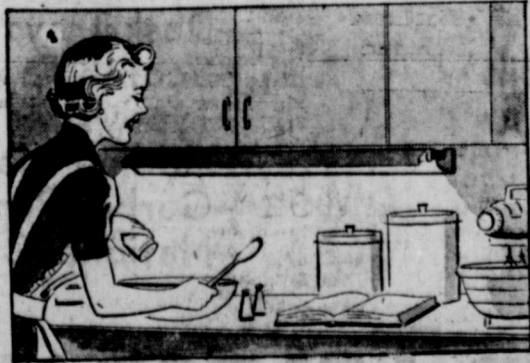

Arlington, Tarleton Pre-Season Choices

Tarleton State, champions of 1954 and Arlington State, appear to be the pre-season choices of sportscasters for another two-team scrap in the Pioneer Conference junior college football championship.

The Plowboys, who hung up three wins against one tie in conference play last year are returning strong this year with 18 returning lettermen and three squadmen.

On the other hand, Arlington's Rebels have 13 returning lettermen which includes Alton Grimes, a 170-pounder from Grand Prairie who was second team all-conference last year in his freshman year.

The teams both fell heir to a host of new material in the form of high school stars who bypassed the major colleges.

The team most likely to offer a stiffer challenge to the top-ranked two some is San Angelo, which finished second in conference standings with a 2-1-1 mark. Ram Coach Max Baumgardner, a former pro player has designed a series of new offensive formations, styled from pro play, with returning lettermen Wade Turner and Charley Martin expected to be figuring heavily in the Ram attack.

San Angelo has prospects for another point-a-stingy defense. The Rams were the circuit's leading defensive unit last season, yielding but 92 points in nine full-season engagements.

Schreiner Institute, cellar occupant last year in the conference, may improve enough to vacate the ladder's bottom spot. The Mountaineers have 10 returning lettermen which will undoubtedly bolster the front line, which was a perennial weak spot last year.

The big question mark still falls on Ranger Junior College, which has only six returning lettermen, but who also have acquired much new talent from the high school football ranks.

Under the guidance of new coach Stanley Burnham, this season, the Rangers fell to fourth place in conference standings last year after placing second place in full season activity.

All conference teams except Schreiner go into action this week.

Arlington and Ranger have Thursday night performances. The Rebels collide with Wharton JC at Arlington and Ranger goes to Tarleton Junior College for a skirmish. Tarleton opens its season Friday night at Bryan against Allen Academy and San Angelo plays Tyler JC Saturday night in Tyler.

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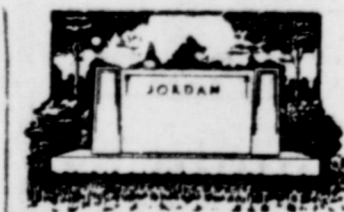


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
