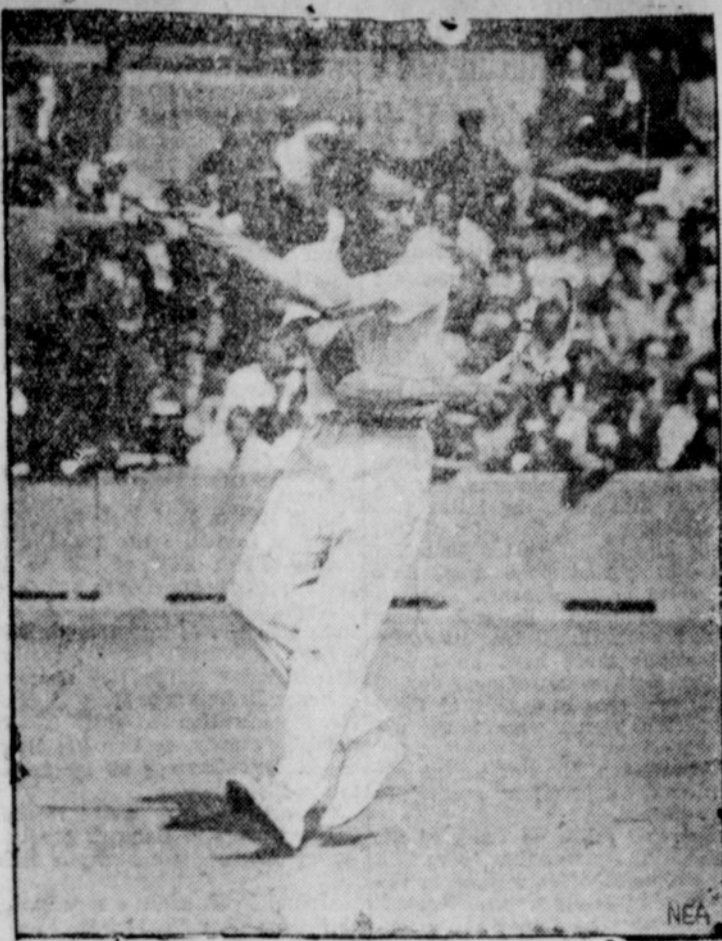

HOLLYWOOD'S FILM SHOP

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 7.—Economists and efficiency experts who have sought to put into film studios the familiar Chicago packing house methods of "using everything but the squeal," have found themselves balked by the fact that absolute destruction remains one of drama's greatest punches.

Ways have been discovered to reclaim tons of silver from the old developers of film laboratories. Gowns first worn by stars are remade for six or more further appearances or perhaps sold at pub-

lic auction. Sets are "shot" facing one way, turned and used the other and revamped to appear in half a dozen pictures.

But when the script says, "destroy it"—there is nothing to be done but charge the article in question off the books. Autos that leap from cliffs, houses that burn and airplanes that crash into mountain sides—they are just destroyed—that's all!

The American playgoer demands realism and while trick camera angles and camouflage can do a lot if a holocaust depends upon a town—then that holocaust must do its worst thoroughly.

When Sam Goldwyn recently spent a good many thousand dollars for a full-rigged schooner—he just placed it in the loss column. At the conclusion of "The Res-

cue," starring Ronald Colman, the schooner will go up in smoke. Sam Goldwyn feels badly about the schooner but there is nothing he can do about it.

Another tough one that the economists have never been able to crack is the salary paid box office attractions.

More than a year ago the colony was thrown into the wildest confusion when the motion picture producers announced an economy program that meant reduced money for everyone connected with the industry.

The producers really "took one on the chin" for that effort. The colony figuratively was up on its heels when the Motion Picture Academy offered a compromise plan which let everyone out with-

out many hurt feelings but left salaries just where they were.

The Wall street influence was held responsible for the original move—an asserted attempt to place the industry on a business basis.

The move didn't succeed because a box-office attraction means money in the pocket and box-office attraction happens to know about it.

The natural intermediate action for the studios is to grab prospective buds and place them under long term contracts. The disadvantage of the system is that it usually takes five years to make a player a box-office attraction and the player wants salary in keeping with ability to please fans.

MAD CZAR WAS MAN OF HORROR TO HIS NATION

Russian Ruler as Ruthless as Nero of Ancient Rome—His Death Terrible.

(New York Times) Paul I of Russia was the son of the great Catherine. When she died he burned her will, which denied him succession, and then declared himself emperor. A description of him has been written by Edgar Saltus.

"Paul was Caligula in miniature. Like him, he was hideous, but, excessive in every form of hideousness, he was more hideous. He had the face of a cat, a dead cat, a dead Kalmuck skunk, and with that death's head on a short, pudgy body, he strutted. After Catherine's exit he strutted crowned. In his palaces he was the monarch that the old pictures show. On parade he was the drill-sergeant, but everywhere he was a bully; in behalf of some one, Alexander, his son, at the time but a boy, fell at his feet, begged him to be merciful. Paul kicked him in the face. When Catherine's crown passed to Paul, he spat on it and ordered another.

Catherine's Death. "The circumstances of his monarchial career may have prepared him to be what he had become, a tyrant, conceited, fantastic, implacable, mad as a hatter, his pocket stuffed with ukases about nothing at all. In holy Russia, a czar was sacrosanct, an abyss of knowledge, a star of truth. It was quite in that light that Paul regarded himself. "Catherine's reign had been a golden age. She had abolished the beautiful custom of throwing yourself from your conveyance and groveling in the mud to the sovereign who passed. With a ukase, Paul revised it.

Gradual Increase In The Demand For Farm Lands of U. S.

BALTIMORE.—Reports from every Federal Land Bank in the country show a gradual increasing demand throughout the country for farm lands. Without exception these reports indicate a change in the agricultural situation and a tendency toward improvement in the purchase of farm lands.

The president of the Federal Land Bank of Columbia, S. C., reports that since the latter part of October, 1927, the sales of this bank have been better than for any like period since they first began to acquire farms.

The Federal Land Bank of St. Paul, Minn., states that there is a large amount of farm land in the hands of investors who are not actual farmers, and that the offering of this land for sale under existing agricultural conditions has flooded the market, but judging from the number of inquiries received during the past few months there seems to be a revival of interest in the ownership of farm land.

The Federal Land Bank of St. Louis reports that in sections where crops have been good for the last two or three years the situation is very satisfactory, and where farms have been acquired by the bank a fairly ready sale has been obtained. The sales for 1927 were much ahead of 1926, and sales thus far for 1928 have been excellent. Less than three-fourths of one percent of its total loans are in real estate which has been acquired under foreclosure, against which a 100 percent reserve is carried.

The Federal Land Bank of Wichita reports a more active demand at somewhat higher prices for good land, and that farm lands are selling on a very attractive basis for any one who cares to invest in farms. This, the bank reports, is especially true for young men who wish to go into agriculture.

The Federal Land Bank of Omaha reports that lands are selling throughout that district more readily than last year, buyers are more plentiful and prices somewhat higher, with favorable crop conditions.

Not Many Forfeitures. The president of the Federal Land Bank of Baltimore reports that his organization has made loans aggregating approximately \$81,000,000, and has found it necessary to take over only a very few farms, and these were in sections where the one crop system prevailed. All the records of this bank it is said indicate that farming will be looked upon with more favor during the next five or ten years, and that the returns to the farmer for his labor will be quite favorable as

The Federal Land Bank of Spokane reports sales of land more frequent than a year ago. In the eleven years of its history the bank has acquired approximately 2900 farms, and during the last three years has sold 100 of them. The present situation is reported as much like the years following the panic of 1894, and the farm outlook in the four Northwestern states is reported as generally promising.
