Primary Figures Available Until Friday, But Few in Doubt.

FREIGHT TRAIN WRECKED, FOUR MEN MISSING

Score of Cars Filled With Crude Oil Derailed in Wyoming and Explosion Follows.

GUERNSEY, Wyo., July 30.—Four men were reported to have been killed in a freight train wreck on the Burlington railroad near here. Heavy storms over the week-end had loosened a rail and it gave way as the 96-car train passed over it. Twenty-seven cars, most of them filled with crude oil, were derailed. An explosion and fire followed, burning oil flowed for a mile and a half down the Platte river.

FLOOD WATERS DO DAMAGE IN KANSAS TOWN

One-Third of Hays Inundated, State Teachers' College Submerged, Wheat Damaged.

HAYS, Kans., July 30.—Hundreds of persons were forced to flee from their homes here early today when flood waters from Big Creek inundated a third of the town, including the campus and buildings of the Kansas State Teachers college. Water in the college building was from 3 to 6 feet deep. In many residences only the second story was visible. Between 6 and 8 inches of rain fell between midnight and dawn, causing the creek, usually a placid stream, to reach a flood stage. No lives were reported lost early today.

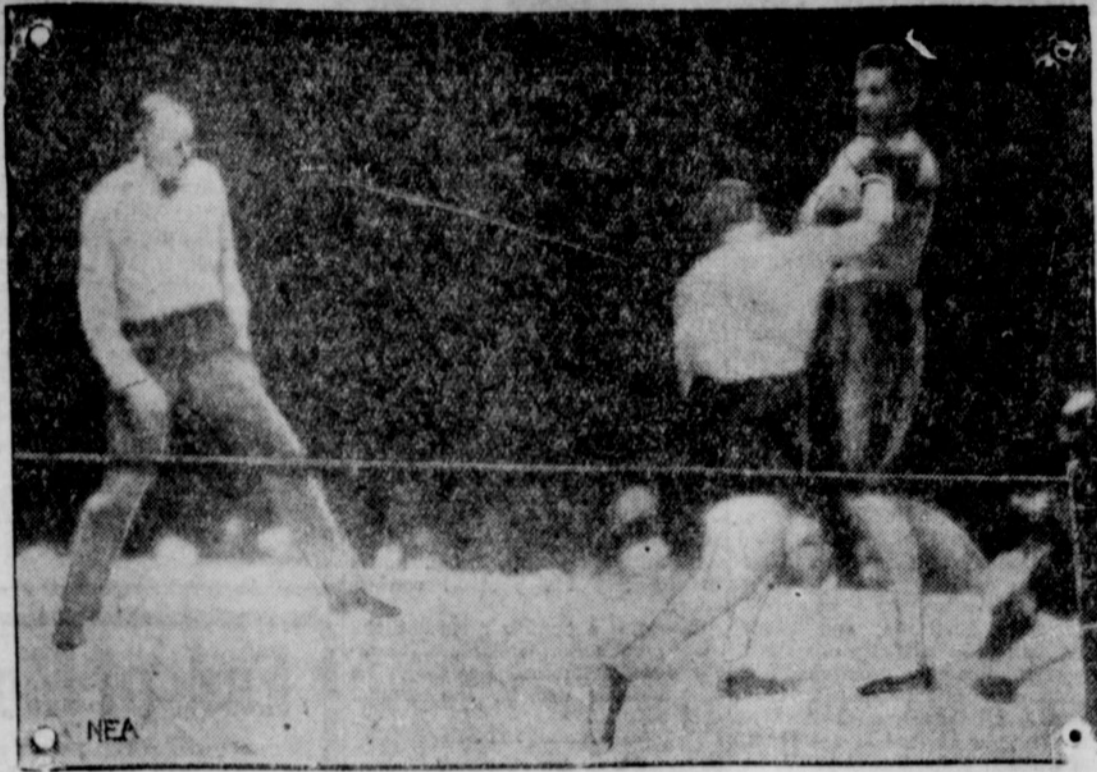

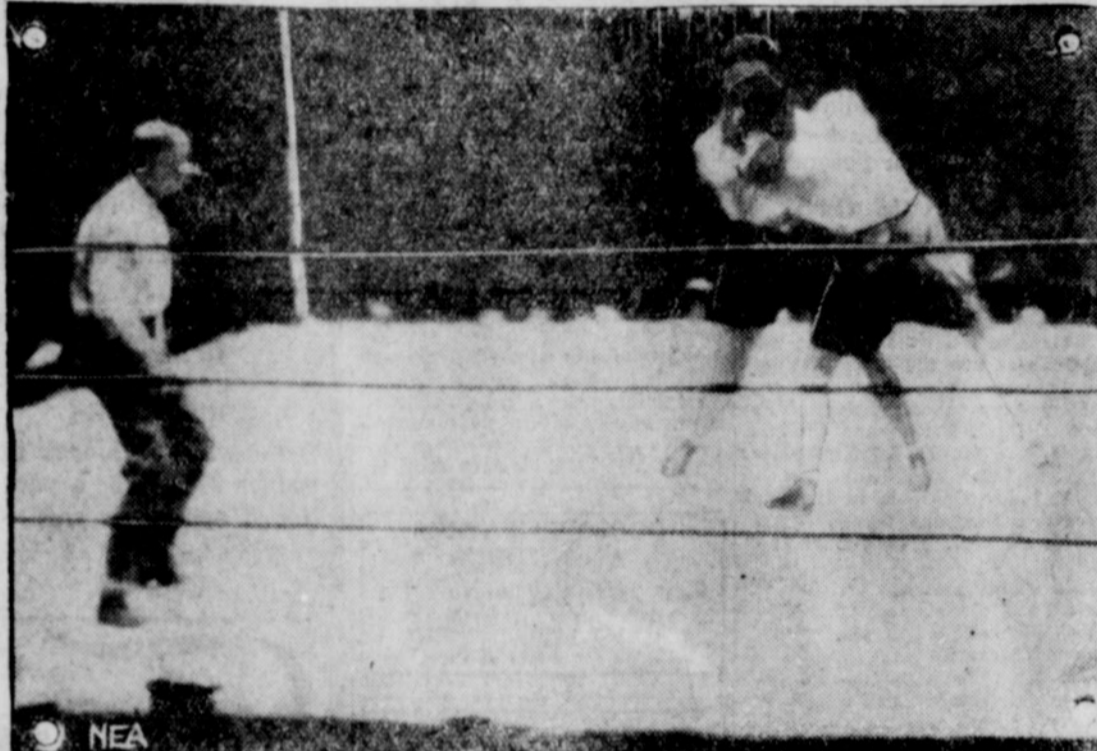

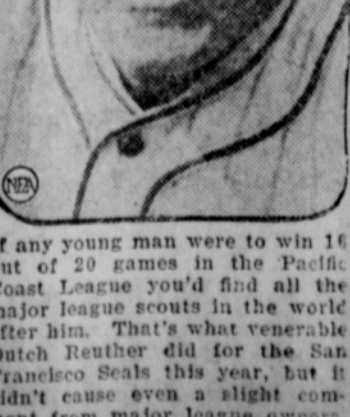

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STAR OF TURF WAS BELITTLED WHILE A COLT

PARIS, July 28.—The heaviest winner of the French turf this season, Mon Talisman, the marvel horse belonging to the Argentine millionaire, Martinez de Hoz, had, as a colt, such thin legs that one trainer after another declared they would snap into pieces if the horse was ever made to run.

Even such a master of horse flesh as the Aga Khan made a costly mistake when he appraised the colt at the Deauville sales. The little animal pleased him until Aga Khan looked at the thin legs. He stopped his bid right there, and Martinez de Hoz, adding a few francs to the price, purchased the colt for 450,000 francs, which was a low price at that sale of yearlings.

Since that day, Mon Talisman has turned in more than seven times his purchase price in fancy purses and he is not done yet. In his first year he won 2,000,000 francs in prize money and has already won a million this year with more to come.

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HUNDRED EYES ARE NEEDED TO SEE OLYMPICS

Worse Than Three-Ring Circus —Events 6 A. M. to Midnight.

AMSTERDAM, July 28.—Competitors in the Olympic Games beginning here July 28 will be working virtually around the clock. Spectators will find it impossible to see everything and watching a three ring circus becomes simple compared with attending the Olympic Games.

The old hallyhoo of "Something doing every minute" might well be applied to the program, for some of the events begin as early as 6 a. m. and others are not scheduled to end before midnight.

The pentathlon event on Aug. 4 will call for some early rising. The competitors must be ready at six in the morning. On the opening day, the weight-lifting begins at 6 p. m. and continues until midnight. Most of the morning events begin at 9 o'clock, and the afternoon programs at 2 o'clock. Wrestling will be held from 6 p. m. until 11.

Even the most ambitious spectator can not see it all. While track and field events are proceeding at the stadium, swimming will be going on in the pool, the rowers will be rowing on their courses, cross country events will be held in another section; a second stadium will present another attraction and the equestrian sports will be in progress 20 miles from Amsterdam. And a few more events will be going on at the same time.

LIMA, Peru.—A stranger who tries to find his way around Lima immediately gets lost. Every block downtown has a different name, and there is an additional name for each street. Furthermore, when the city was re-numbered some years ago, many houses retained the old numbers and simply added new and different ones.

Among plants, there are blocks named for Oranges, Pomegranates, Limes, Lettuce, and Watermelons. Recalling old market days, vendors' stalls named for Butter Sellers, Swordsmen, Scribes, Dyers and the Buttery. There must have been many unfortunate tourists, because the block names include the Helpless, Barefooted Afflicted, also Rags, Bitterness and Charity. One can go from the Street of the Poor to Money Street; from Health to the Little Cemetery, and back again to the Miracle.
