

CHICAGO, June 30.—The body of Mike Gallichio, member of the notorious '42" gang, who apparently was the victim of a gangland 'Tide,' was found today, face down in a muddy ditch along the Joliet highway in Cook county.

Gallichio had been riddled with bullets and his body tossed into the ditch, half burying his head in the mud and water. When the body was picked up a nickel dropped from the clenched fist.

Police said Gallichio, who had a long record, probably was the vice tim of a gang feud. The murder was the second gang killing since.






