The Ringmaster

Rests Blamed For Bad Business

EARLE JOHNSON and the adjoining counties feel hard hit by recent depression conditions. We are primarily affected by the depression of prices of listed lands, but we are hard on conditions of our farms. Ten years ago there were good farming conditions in this county, but not today. The value of lands in this county has constantly declined since 1917, slowly but surely. The adjoining counties are in the same condition. We are not an industry. We have but few manufacturing plants in this county, nearly all of them are in no connected lines.

We need primarily is the need of our farms along constructive lines—to wit, fertilizing, cattle raising, and crop raising and small farms to be supported by the government. We have but few manufacturing plants in this county, nearly all of them are in no connected lines.

Sheep and goats are a considerable business in this county. Information was obtained at a meeting of the Eastland and Palo Pinto Counties and Palo Pinto Sheep and Goats Association a few Saturdays ago. There were 10,000 head of sheep and a like number of goats. This industry is conducted with but little assistance by any banks or lenders, and is of considerable importance to farming. Property conducted the sheep and goats will render themselves not to consider that when pastured either on goats or milk cattle, the general run of our pasture is trampled, fertilized, and a crop kept growing on lands would otherwise grow up in weeds, and other obnoxious plants. It is a fact that in McCombs County, where Borden & Co. have invested a half million in a milk plant, and set some million and a half dollars guarantee the ultimate of that plant, the pasture is a great deal more expensive than our grass in that county, beautiful lands that are suitable for agriculture, have to be used for pasture purposes, for the fact that they are infected with the disease of Rot, and the raising of it is no longer possible. They find it profitable to run 50 per acre to \$125 per year in cattle pasture, for years of this sort of thing, the back to those lands to sit where crops can be again raised. The land which used to be pasture, not only gets rid of its strength through fertilization at that time, some other of the same farm may be an advantage of proper fallowing the same program.

Milk and Cattle are a number of points which are well worth considering which are the following: The milk business is one of the oldest businesses known. The milk has changed less in the last twenty years than the cotton has in one day. The output of milk is so nearly constant. If farmers over-plant a buyer can handle and never is required to take it. He has not the loss that



would be occasioned in the usual run of business for he can feed it to chickens, pigs and get the benefit of his product.

The time required in the milk business, which means early morning and late at night, every day in the year, should mean more profit to the man performing the labor, and inculcates in his mind well ordered ideas of the value and worth of time well spent.

The fertilization to the land, on which cattle feed is far beyond the average man's mind. The tonnage dropped by ten cows per year will astound the ordinary mind. Then too, the land on which milk cattle run is allowed to fallow, builds up a cover that will result in great increase in future production.

The folks in Tennessee who have experienced the wearing out of land, followed by the introduction of the milk cattle business have realized to the fullest degree the prosperity that results from such practice and concrete examples are many and well known.

It behooves the people in this and adjoining counties to look to it that the milk business is allowed a chance to expand, and the banks and bankers and sensible business men will see that some definite action is taken in this section which depends almost entirely upon, oil, gas and agriculture.

Credit Banks
A Federal Intermediate Credit Bank should be organized to finance the needs of cattle, both beef and milk, sheep, goats and stable agricultural products in bonded warehouses. A bank of this nature does not interfere with the customary banks of commercial practices, but makes loans on longer terms and smaller rates of interest than can be found elsewhere. This bank is managed and officered by the officers and directors of the Federal Land Bank of Houston, which is saving to its borrowers some two million and a quarter dollars, besides the intense savings value that is derived from its financing program. As and when it puts into effect its fertilization program, The Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston during the month of May 1928 made loans of approximately one million two hundred thousand dollars to cattle dealers, milk-herd owners, sheep, goat men and the owners of cotton and wool, thus enabling them to hold their farm products for orderly marketing and not dump them on sale at improper times and without precision. It has approximately 13 million dollars of loans in force in Texas the last day of 1928. Its loans are made at the call money rate plus 2 1/2 per cent and for terms as long as thirty-six months.

Peanut hulls, now regarded as a farm waste and worth only \$2 a ton for fuel, may soon be a commercially valuable produce through the researches of two Agriculture Department scientists.

Research has revealed the peanut hulls, of which 70,000 tons are accumulated annually, as a source of cellulose. It is considered probable they may be utilized to supplement cotton linters and wood pulp in America's rapidly growing cellulose industries.

It is only a matter of time, the chemists declare, until depletion of the forests and resultant scarcity of wood pulp, together with the rapidly increasing demand for a cheap, high-grade cellulose, will make present sources of cellulose inadequate. Peanut hulls, because of their cheapness and availability, are believed to offer a promising source of cellulose for the future.

FACTORS IN FARMING

WASHINGTON, June 12.—Radio is playing an increasingly important part in the help extended to the 6,000,000 American farmers by the United States Agriculture Department.
Through broadcasts over national and regional hook-ups, reaching virtually every farm home with a radio receiving set, the department is able to make immediately available to growers everywhere the latest discoveries by its scientific experts.

In addition many items of homey advice on care of the home and farm, including preparing meals and raising vegetable gardens, are broadcast daily to thousands of eager farm listeners. Programs are broadcast daily from Washington over the National Broadcasting Company's circuit from 12:45 to 1:30 eastern standard time.
Three methods are used in presenting information by radio to the nation's farm population: 1 Direct from Washington over a national hook-up; 2 By syndicate, i. e., material is mailed local stations who broadcast for their particular regions; 3 Through branch offices of the department who maintain close relations with their local radio station.
The department maintains 12,000 miles of private leased telegraph wires for the gathering of information relative to production of all leading crops and issues, crops reports from time to time estimating the production, telling stocks on hand and acres planted. In placing this vital information in the hands of farmers promptly so it may be utilized to best advantage radio has proved of inestimable value, officials said.
Programs broadcast consist, in addition to crop and weather reports, of scientific data of all varieties, methods of preventing pests, information about caring for livestock, etc. The broadcasts are arranged so as to be absolutely up to date, and are adapted to the seasonal work on the farm. Cleveland Bust To Have Place In Buffalo Hall

BUFFALO, N. Y., June 11.—The only bust for which President Cleveland ever posed will be placed on public display for the first time when Buffalo's new city hall, now under construction, is formally opened.

For 42 years the marble bust, the work of Pierre Brusseleers, Italian sculptor, has stood, shrouded in wrapping paper, in the corner of a monument works here. This, despite the judgment of connoisseurs, that it is an artistic achievement as well as an excellent likeness of the Buffalo mayor who rose to the presidency.

The explanation for the bust's strange neglect, according to historians, goes back to Cleveland's pre-presidential career. The Ten Buffalo citizens, all friends

and associates of Cleveland organized a syndicate when political fortune began to smile so broadly upon Buffalo's first citizen that it seemed apparent he would become president of the United States. The purpose of the organization was to engage the best artist available to preserve for posterity a likeness of Cleveland.

Those who joined in the enterprise secured the services of Brusseleers and agreed to pay him \$100 each when his work was completed. Meanwhile, Cleveland became president and his 10 admirers waited, with graceful statements of appreciation, ready to accept cabinet appointments, or, at the very least, judgeships and diplomatic posts. But the anticipated lightning refused to strike. The president overlooked them all.

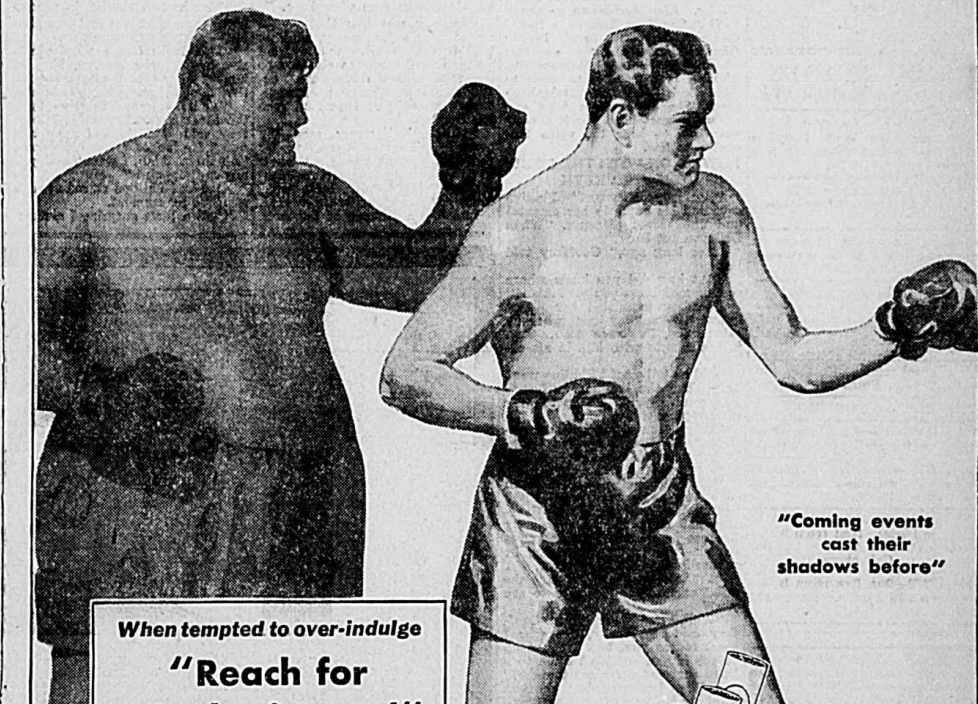

Police Dog Leads Blind Master To The Witness Stand

 OLATHE, Kas., June 11.—When Erich led his master into the courtroom here today it was probably with the full canine knowledge that he was furnishing mute and unimpeachable testimony in behalf of his profession.
 For Erich is very intelligent. Since he was a tiny German shepherd puppy he has undergone training for his life's work—that of leading the blind.
 Erich's master is F. R. Fitzpatrick, blind real estate dealer of Salina, Kas., called to testify in defense of a project to raise and train German shepherd dogs to be used as guides and companions by blinded world war veterans.
 On the face of things, the case involved a very routine matter. Residents of suburban Kansas City, Kas., are annoyed by the kennel being operated in the neighborhood by F. R. Gray, vice-president of the Sheffield Steel Corporation. They have asked the courts to force Gray either to discontinue his project or move his kennel.
 Fitzpatrick's testimony, however, given as he sat in the witness chair to which Erich had guided him, placed a different light on the matter, for it was calculated to touch the hearts of those who watched soldier boys go to France and return without their eyesight.
 Erich has delivered his master from a state of dependence. Never for a moment does he leave Fitzpatrick's side. He awakens his master in the morning. He retrieves lost articles of clothing.
 Gray has been engaged in training police dogs for less than a year. In another six months, he said, he will have several sufficiently schooled that they can be given out to war veterans. The dogs were all imported from Germany.

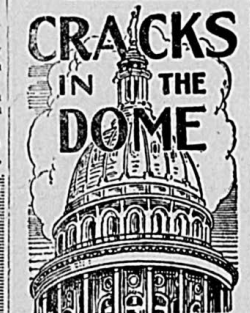

CRACKS IN THE DOME

 AUSTIN, Tex., June 12—A case of "might have been."
 Two if decided the make-up of the governor's race. They probably decided who will be the next governor—and who wouldn't be governor, with all the long train of unforeseen consequences, public and personal, that these involve.
 If—Tom Love's name had been left off the ticket Monday when he defied the state committee to leave it off, Dan Moody would now be in the race.
 If—R. S. Sterling, highway bond exponent, had not jumped into the governor's race, Dan Moody would now be in it.
 The state committee got up to the point of a vote on the exclusion of Love, on his own declaration that his present intention was to hold certain candidate if they became nominees. Had that vote been taken, Mr. Love's name would have been left off the ticket. If it had been taken, Dan Moody's name would have stayed on the ticket.
 First consequence of that would have been what Mr. Love wanted. He wanted an independent race against the democratic nominee. He has been bulldozing the democratic party all the year to throw him out. He and others regarded his best chance as having been the party. And expediency, plus widespread confusion and uncertainty among the state committee members over what the Love court decision meant, put him on the ticket.
 Gov. Moody is a lawyer. It is no secret that he considers the set of facts in Monday's meeting was an entirely different one from that passed on by the court, and that the committee was clearly within its legal right in excluding Mr. Love after Love's voluntary appearances and outspoken avowal of present intention NOT to support possible nominees of the party.
 But Moody is out.
 The biggest question in the state campaign right now is:
 Whom will Moody support?
 That will be answered within a few days, and when it is answered, the decision is to flow into action in support of the election of some of the candidates, someone who will be an exponent of clean, honest, efficient government, a government by morally responsible people.
 Moody's statement with respect to Mr. Sterling, whose entry into the race prevented Moody from announcing 10 days ago, said:
 "I have many loyal friends in Texas with whom I would not want

The robber chief is known as "Big Feet Li," and has employed a curio expert from Peiping to work for him in Honan, appraising the objects which he takes from Louyang.

The band has made very good hauls, the Chinese press reports, and has sent about 3,000 fine pieces of old bronze, jade, etc., to Peiping and Tientsin, for sale to foreign buyers.

Loyang is an ancient capital of China, having welcomed nine dynasties, and royal tombs are numerous in the vicinity. Few of them have been robbed before, because of the Chinese belief in ancestor worship, but apparently robbery is now taking place on a large scale.

According to foreign reports, "Big Feet Li" is not the only bandit chieftain concerned. Certain Kuomintang generals encamped in this region have shown great interest in the "excavations" and have received some of the finest pieces as gifts.

Leaving Garfield Park the Lingle funeral cortege was joined by military and naval units. Lingle was a member of several American Legion Posts, whose members turned out for the funeral with their drum and bugle corps.

Reporter Buried With High Honors. CHICAGO, June 12.—Alfred "Jake" Lingle, murdered by underworld gunmen whose escapades he had followed for 18 years as a police reporter for the Chicago Tribune, was buried with military honors today while civil authorities sent their expert marksmen out to end, with bullets if necessary, the perennial Lingle war which was climaxed on Monday by Lingle's assassination.
