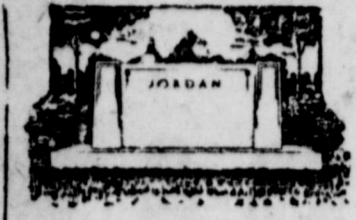

Security Rep. Coming To City Hall on Monday

E. Glen McNatt, field representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, who will be at the driver's license office at the Eastland City Hall at 10:30 a.m. has asked and answered a question posed frequently by farmers:

Question: If a farmer's average monthly income is determined by including the period back to January 1, 1951, will he not be penalized since he had no "covered" earnings until 1955?

Answer: Generally speaking, a person's average monthly earnings are figured by dividing his total covered earnings from 1951 to the date of his retirement or death by all the months in that period. However, under the new law, these four years from 1951 to 1955 can be dropped out in figuring his average monthly earnings on which his benefit will be based.

One additional year can be dropped out if the insured worker has five years or more of coverage. The years dropped out need not be consecutive ones. They can be any 4 or 5 years of low or no earnings, so long as they fall within the period used in determining his average income.

In this way the farmer gets the same consideration that was given the self-employed persons who were brought under the program in 1951.

An appreciated card, addressed to the editor and this writer, from Red River, N.M., says: "We are in the mountains above Red River — 9350 ft. elevation, but only 40 miles from Taos and go there frequently. We have found both Santa Fe and Taos most interesting and colorful because of the Indian environment and historic background. Thank you for sending the Telegram. Sincerely, Father Hartwell."

The card from FATHER ARTHUR E. HARTWELL, Rector, Holy Trinity Episcopal Church, is a colored picture of a Pueblo Indian woman baking bread in a primitive mud or adobe oven which is still used by the Pueblo Indians. A fire is built within, then when the oven is sufficiently heated the coals are withdrawn and the bread or other food put in to bake. Back of the large oven is an Indian village or settlement with square, flat-top dwellings, each with a ladder from the ground to the roof.

"I want to express my sincere thanks for the way your paper

handled the stories of my parties and wedding. Everything was in perfect taste, and I don't know anyone else who could have got so many details so correctly," to quote an excerpt from a letter in Thursday's mail. Needless to say we appreciate these kind words about our paper.

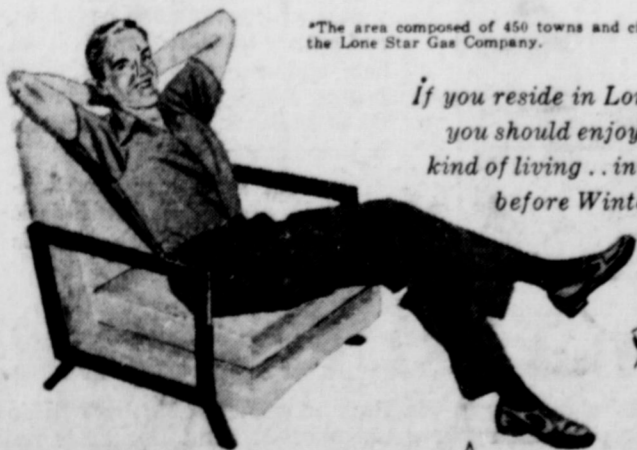
