Skull Cracked; Bones Of The Body Are Broken

St. Jo Man Is Seen to Jump
From Window in Dallas
Hotel. Coroner Returns
Verdict of Suicide

DALLAS, Tex., May 29—Dr. C. Moore, 35, of St. Jo, Texas, was killed instantly today when he jumped from his room on the 15th floor of the Baker Hotel to the street below.

His skull cracked with a loud report and almost every bone in his body was broken.

After an investigation, Justice of the Peace E. John Baldwin returned a verdict of suicide.

Miss Inez Verbeck, who is employed in the office of the American Bonding Company on the 15th floor of the Santa Fe building, one block west of the hotel, told police she saw Moore climb out on the window ledge and leap into space.

His body narrowly missed striking members of the Magnolia Band from Beaumont. The band was entering the hotel lobby to play when the body crashed to the street a few feet away.

Moore was clad only in his underclothes and a pair of trousers.

Moody's Address Is Feature Of WTCC Session

ABILENE, Tex., May 29.—"Glorious inequality" in the taxation for highway construction which places a "large and poorly proportioned burden upon agriculture" was lamented by Governor Dan Moody in addressing the West Texas Chamber of Commerce here today.

Highways serving a general need should be built from funds raised by taxes imposed upon the traffic because the traffic receives the chief benefit from road construction and the cost of the road can under this system be paid without inequalities in taxation, in the governor's opinion.

He further lamented the existence of state statutes which make "unjust" levies the only medium by which the highway system can be improved at the present.

Highway development in Texas still depends upon local initiative, he said, supporting the view with quotations of how counties must vote bonds to receive apportionments from state and federal funds.

Oldest Veteran Walks a Mile To Attend Reunion

FAIRMONT, W. Va., May 29.—Though slightly hampered by rheumatism, John L. Skinner, 103, the oldest living Civil War veteran, got out his cane today and walked a mile to town to reminisce with "the boys."

"The boys" were Skinner's cronies, comrades in blue who fought with him 66 years ago. Unlike the centennarian, most of them were enfeebled.

Skinner walked erect and his blue eyes were bright.

Occasionally he winced as a rheumatic pain shot through his limbs.

Skinner, who claims to have seen the first box of matches ever brought to America, expressed himself in favor of a world court or "a union," he said, "whereby brotherhood might be developed."

Republicans To Plan Campaign For Governor

DALLAS, Tex., May 29.—Republican party leaders, including members of the state committee and county and congressional chairmen, will hold a conference at the Baker Hotel here Saturday to discuss plans for the Republican activities in Texas in 1930 and to arrange for the primaries that must be held this year.

Hugh E. Exum, Amarillo cattleman, has announced as a candidate for governor on the Republican ticket, and will receive the organization's support, it was indicated here today. Exum is a member of the state committee at the present time. Capt. Jack Elgin of San Antonio, who has been at odds with party leaders from time to time, has formally filed as a candidate for governor.

Heat And Smoke Overcomes Them

Were Warned of Fire By
Landlady. Bodies, Slightly
Burned, Were Partially
Dressed

ABILENE, Tex., May 29.—Three young men were overcome by smoke and died when fire raged through a rooming house here early today. The dead are: Harvey Sprinkle, 21; Bernard Love 19, and Roy Thomas, 28.

Sprinkles and Love had come to Abilene from Melrose in Neacoches county and would have graduated from a business college next week. Thomas was an employee of a country club.

Four other young men and Mr. and Mrs. Ray Simmons and two small children escaped when Mrs. Maude Parker, operator of the rooming house, gave the alarm.

The three victims were aroused and had begun to put on their clothes when they were overcome. Their bodies were burned only slightly and firemen said it was evident they had died of suffocation.

The others who escaped were Ralph Graham, 16; L. Clarkson, Lowell Burch and L. Nelson.

Baptist Church Vacation Bible School June 2nd

A Vacation Bible School will be conducted by the Baptist Church beginning Monday, June 2nd. Sessions will be held daily for two weeks from 8:30 to 11:00 a. m. The work will be adapted to boys and girls from four to sixteen years of age.

Pastor W. T. Turner who will direct the school announces that children from other churches, where no Bible school will be held are welcome to enter without cost of any kind.

The daily program will consist of songs, missions, stories, habit and character stories, and hand work, recreation and other activities. This will be the first Vacation Bible School to be held by the local Baptist church, but Rev. and Mrs. Turner have been conducting such schools since 1919, being among the first Baptists to hold Vacation Schools in Texas.

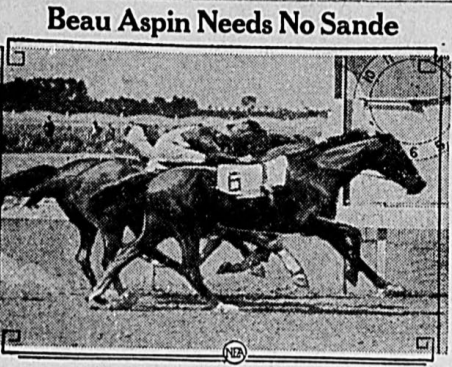
38 Cars Ready For Indianapolis Race

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 29.—Thirty-eight drivers today planned final trial runs over the Indianapolis speedway to put their cars in top condition for the annual 500-mile Memorial Day race tomorrow.

The entry list was completed yesterday when eight cars qualified for the race by maintaining an average speed of 85 miles an hour for 10 miles. Tomorrow's race is the first event on the Indianapolis course in which more than 33 cars have been allowed to compete.

Predictions of a record crowd were made by race officials after the Memorial Day weather was forecast as "cloudy but no rains." The advance ticket sale indicates an attendance of 16,000, it was said.

NEW YORK, May 28.—A king's ransom in stolen jewels lay in city vaults today as police continued their investigation of a gang of gem thieves which had been operating throughout the East from Buffalo, N. Beau Aspin unseateded Jockey Logan and left him at the post, so to speak, going on alone to finish first ahead of 10 others in a six-furlong dash. It happened at Aurora, Ill., with a camera man handy to photograph the unusual finish.

AMONG THE MAJOR LEAGUES

Manager Wilbert Robinson sent his slugging Brooklyn Robins against the New York Giants at Ebbetts Field today in an attempt to regain a tie for first place in the National League pennant race.

The Robins, who were a hopeless seventh at this stage of the 1929 race, are in second place, 1/2 game behind the St. Louis Cardinals and can tie for the lead by winning today.

The Chicago-Cincinnati game today was cancelled in respect to the memory of pitcher Harold Carlson who died yesterday.

Walter Stewart pitched the St. Louis Browns to a 4 to 2 win over Detroit in the only American League contest. The Chicago Cubs pounded out a 6 to 5 victory over Cincinnati and Philadelphia lost to Boston, 5 to 1, in the National League title.

Detroit got to Stewart for three hits and two runs in the opening inning but were unable to score again. Whitehill worked well for the Tigers but weakened in the eighth and the Browns tallied the winning runs on singles by Blue Manush, Kress and Schulte.

A four-run attack in the first inning enabled the Cubs to beat Cincinnati. Guy Bush was batted from the mound in the sixth when the Reds scored three runs, but Malone was effective in the relief role.

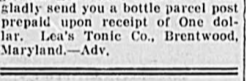

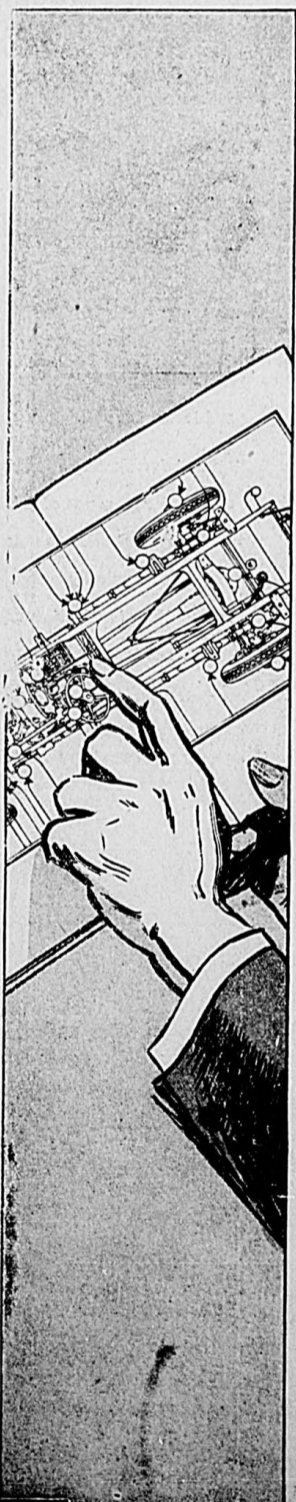

Not Sorry—I'm Proud!" Says Nations' First Gold Star Mother

Private Hay, 21, Still Lives in Mother's Memory

(of Pittsburgh)—Private Melre D. Hay (of Glidden). Worthy sons of their great and noble nation, they fought for Right, for Liberty, for Civilization, against German Imperialism, the scourge of mankind.

Mrs. Hay is the only surviving mother of the three. Enright's mother died before he enlisted; Gresham's mother passed on a few years ago.

Among her souvenirs that Merle Hay's mother treasures today is a tiny replica of this battlefield monument, presented to her by Ambassador Jusserand, war-time French envoy to the United States.

"Dad and I have all our boy's letters, his identification tag, his watch and trinkets," Mrs. Hay relates. "His last letter to us arrived the day after we received the news of his death. I treasure it more than I do my life."

"Dad keeps the watch with him, always. I gave it to Merle as a reward on his 16th birthday, for not smoking. But my boy did not want to accept the watch because, he said, he did not deserve it; he told me he had been smoking since he was 14."

Merle was no different from any other boy and Mrs. Hay no different from any other mother. As a youngster she made him comb his hair and wash behind his ears when he couldn't see any sense in such things, kissed him when she tucked him in bed at night, nursed him tenderly through those sicknesses of childhood, spanked him when he needed it, loved him, worshipped him, and watched with secret admiration as he grew toward sturdy manhood.

"My boy failed to come home on the night of May 2, 1917, telephoning me that he and eight others were on their way to Des Moines to enlist in the war," she relates.

Thrilled by the prospect of war, Merle came back to Glidden a few days later to say farewell to his mother, dad and younger brother. Then he departed for camp at Fort Worth, Tex., and on June 13 he sailed for France from Hoboken, N. J.

The last time his mother saw him was when he kissed her goodbye in Glidden that day in May 13 years ago.

It is not necessary for Mrs. Hay to go to France with other war mothers to visit her boy's grave, because his body was brought back long ago and now rests near the farm home that he left to go away to war. Just recently at Glidden, a little hamlet on the Lincoln Highway, a handsome memorial to Private Hay and his two companions was dedicated by the American Legion.

Private Hay now sleeps in a small cemetery near his monument. "No," says Mrs. Hay, "there's no need for me to go to France. I have my boy with me. He's buried just over yonder among those pines."

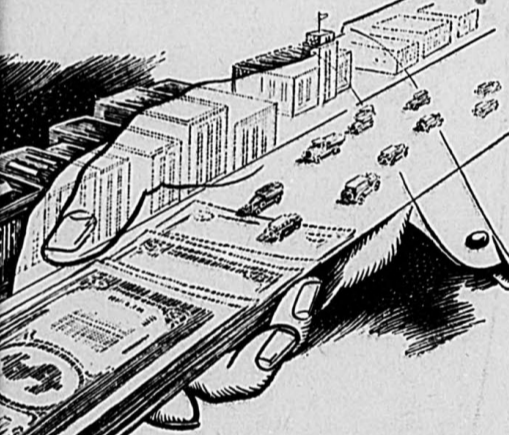
