

BOBCATS CRIPPLED FOR GAME WITH EASTLAND

Star Backfield Man Will Witness Game From The Sidelines

Red Massey declared ineligible for fray. Mavericks in good shape for fifth district game. Eastland players left this morning.

Loud cries of hard luck were broadcast from the camp of the San Angelo Bobcats on the eve of the Eastland-San Angelo game to be played at San Angelo Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

The Mavericks left this morning in order to have a day's rest before they enter their fifth district game of the season.

"It's a pretty crippled array San Angelo will send into its third conference game of the season," Blondy Cross, San Angelo sports writer, has to say about the game. He continues:

"Red Massey, star back, for one, will not participate. Massey has been declared scholastically ineligible for this game and unless Red cracks down hard in his studies he will not be ready for the Breckenridge melee the following week-end.

"Coach Bissett has been grooming Smokey Brothers to take Red's place, but Brothers came up with another injury in scrimmages on Tuesday and may not be able to

start the game. Tom Morrison, reserve back, also is injured. McCaney is worrying along with a damaged shoulder. If all these cripples are kept out, San Angelo will have only three backfield players, Baker, Russell and Hamberlin.

Guards Crippled.

Poteet and Raman Jones, guards are on the injured list. Lue Coach Crawford is tutoring T. B. Odam, a reformed backfielder, for one of the guard slots. Both Bernard and Young may see action at the other guard position if the injured boys don't come around in a hurry.

Haley, end, is a bit bunged up, but probably will start the game. Roberts appears in great shape for another try at the other terminal. The tackles, Jennings and Grimes, are in good shape. Jim Howard King, center, is in tip-top condition.

Up to Grimes and Jennings.

But Bissett isn't worrying so much about his line as he is his secondary. With only three backs ready for action the coach is so worried that he is speedily losing his great disposition. There lies a possibility the tackles, Grimes and Jennings, can stop the light Eastland team on line plays, but when it comes to end runs and passes, the latter being Eastland's strong forte, Brother Bill is wondering just what it is all about. With only three backs available, not only is the pass defense sorely wrecked, but our running and passing game is on the blink.

Eastland, on the other hand, is in good condition. Connie Smith will probably go into the game wearing his rubber nose guard, but outside of his nasal affliction, the team is in excellent shape.

It will be the fifth time this year that Coach Gibson has sent his fact little aggregation against the heavy teams of the Oilfield district. Contrary to opinion, the Bobcats are not midgets. The roster boasts of some nice sized raw boned youngsters.

Eastland has met Ranger, Breckenridge, Brownwood and Abilene, and after Saturday's game, has only one more game to play. That is with the title-craving Lobos of Cisco.

The San Angelo-Eastland game originally was scheduled to be staged here, but was moved to San Angelo when an attractive offer was made.

A number of Eastland high school students will go to San Angelo for the game, leaving Saturday.

CAVALRY CHIEF CITES STRIDES IN MOTORIZING

Crosby Says Men and Horses Never Will Be Replaced, However.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Motors and machines never will replace men on foot and horseback in the fighting of battles, according to Maj. Gen. Herbert B. Crosby, chief of cavalry, whose annual report to Secretary of War Davis was made public yesterday.

Crosby's report reveals tremendous strides in mechanization and motorization of cavalry units. All regular army cavalry units have been re-organized and with new organization and equipment, Crosby estimates that the new cavalry regiment has twice the fire power of the old regiment.

But as regards mechanization, Crosby reported, it is believed that the horse-soldier, like the foot-soldier, cannot be replaced by any machine as yet developed nor is it anticipated that any such machine will be developed. So long as there are marshes to cross, rivers to swim, woods to pass through or

climb, cavalrymen and infantrymen will be necessary.

Tanks, tankettes, armored cars, armored airplanes, smoke projectors, gas and all modern means of warfare in use or still to be adopted cannot take the place of the man and the horse. They supplement the efforts of the man and the horse but they do not replace them, says Crosby.

Changes Necessary.

The 1927 divisional maneuver, Crosby continued, demonstrated the necessity for certain changes in organization, both of cavalry units as then organized in certain of the auxiliary units. Among the points demonstrated were the following:

1. The value of aircraft co-operation.
2. The advisability of partial motorization of the division trains.
3. The desirability of complete motorization of the rear echelon of division headquarters.
4. The desirability of incorporating armored cars and light, fast tanks in the cavalry division.
5. The necessity for having anti-aircraft weapons and anti-tank weapons within cavalry units.
6. The necessity for technic signals and for completion of new cavalry regiments.
7. The feasibility of porting cavalry and other complete with their horses, and personnel by motor trucks in emergency.

WASHINGTON LETTER

BL. RODNEY DUTCHER
 WASHINGTON—Now that bank and blah are off the air, now that leaders of the politicians' union are rising from the depths of hypocrisy and dishonorable tactics to re-assume their shoddy mantles of statesmanship, it may not be amiss to tell what all the shooting was for.

One of the Republican leaders—Senator Moses, if memory serves—let the smelly little cat out of the bag in a publicity release a few weeks ago wherein he said that the only motive of the Democrats in making a campaign was their sordid greed for some 50,000 federal jobs.

That was all right as far as it went. But there's a lot more to it than that. In the first place, something more than 150,000 federal jobs were at stake in the tens of thousands of state, county and municipal jobs involved in the general campaign.

And it would have been only fair to say that if the Democrats were clawing greedily at the door for those jobs, then by similar token the Republicans were using feet, nails and teeth in an effort to fight to hold onto them for another four years. Anyone will fight just as bitterly and just as unfairly to hold his job as another will to get it.

That, of course, is what it all boils down to. That is what most politicians really mean when they rear in righteous wrath or plead piously of law enforcement, the poor farmer, the perit to prosperity or the sins of the opposition.

It is not fair to say, of course, that every politician active in an election is merely worrying about his job. Some hold their jobs securely and merely want more power, though power and patronage are almost inextricably bound together. Some of the more puissant gents merely want to stand in a little stronger with selfish interests on whom they depend for support or even to erect new bulwarks for the politico-economic system with which their own interests and those of their friends are identified.

And goodness knows how many of the dirty little boys of politics, unknown to fame, are in the business not for jobs, but simply for cold cash. Here and there are even some who yearn to serve firms of all the best interests of common, ordinary people, though of these one cannot recall more than a few.

Nor is it necessary, in questioning the professed motives of the politicians' union, to assume that the system is completely rotten. The fact is that the people sometimes get a break. That is, there is always a chance that an election result will make life a little happier and easier for many of them. Furthermore, politics is not a closed corporation; anyone can enter it and there is abundant evidence that it takes very little intelligence to succeed.

How many federal jobs depend on a presidential election? Well, one starts with the cabinet and diplomatic service and works down. There are, of course, some pretty swell jobs and some pretty soft ones; rewards of every degree, in fact, for the type of service rendered. But let's take the big bulk. The president appoints 60,000 first, second and third-class postmasters, internal revenue collectors and deputy collectors, marshals and deputy marshals, collectors of customs and similar officials. There salaries amount to nearly \$130,000,000 a year. Then there are 80,000 fourth-class postmasters and rural mail carriers, who in almost every case get their jobs through politics. They are paid more than \$100,000,000 a year.
