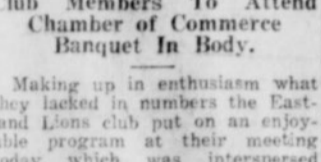
EASTLAND LIONS WILL SEND FLOAT TO CISCO RALLY

G. O. P. RALLY ENDS WITH EGGS, OIL AND RIOT

Ten Seriously Injured In Free-For-All Tilt After Parade.

WORCHESTER, Mass., Nov. 6.—Nearly 60 were injured, 19 seriously enough to require hospital treatment here last night when a Republican election eve parade ended in rioting.

Several thousand spectators, some armed with sticks and bricks, charged into the ranks of the 10,000 marchers and a free-for-all battle ensued.

Several eggs were dragged from a float and their clothing torn. Another marcher, Mrs. Josephine Byrd, was blowing a horn when a heckler shoved it down her throat. In her excitement, she swallowed the horn's wooden mouthpiece.

Patrolman Harry Hyde was beaten insensible and several of his teeth were knocked out when he attempted to break up a fight.

Clinton P. Rowe, secretary to Mayor Michael O'Hara, filed a formal complaint with police officials claiming that policemen stood by and allowed eggs to be thrown by spectators.

McALLEN, Texas, Nov. 6.—Citizens of Hidalgo county held themselves in suspense today as thousands of voters assembled at the polls to close the bitterest political fight this county as ever seen.

Although strife and disorders had been feared, owing to the heat of the campaign, leaders of both factions gave out last-minute statements being maintained.

Department of Justice men ordered to the county to preserve peace made the rounds of polling places to see that there were no violations of the federal election laws. They reported that everything was quiet so far.

The children were dead in their beds where they had been consoled with scarlet fever. The body of the nursemaid Miss Violet Hultberg of Long Lake, Minn., was found, fully clothed, lying on a lounge.

A note signed by the girl and addressed to Moreau was found near the body. It asked forgiveness of the father and expressed confidence that "God will forgive me."

PIONEER OIL WORKERS' FUND IS ADVOCATED

Special to the Telegram. TULSA, Okla.—In his final report concerning his stewardship of the International Petroleum Exposition, which closed on its tenth day here, October 29, J. Burr Gibbons, general manager, advocated the conversion of ultimate profits of the oil show into a fund for the benefit of the pioneers of the oil industry who are now destitute, at a meeting of the directors today.

Pointing out that there are in this country alone some 3600 firms which can profit by participation in the exposition, Gibbons advanced the proposition of making the petroleum event an annual affair. Showing clearly in the report that the exposition in attracting seventy-one delegates from twenty-one foreign nations and in presenting a \$10,000,000 exhibition of all the latest equipment in the industry to 168,000 visitors, merits the highest national recognition, Gibbons urged that the next exposition be opened by the President of the United States in person.

"In the final analysis I know of nothing finer in purpose or sentiment than to convert the ultimate profits of the exposition into a fund for the benefit of those pioneers of the industry who in the declining years of their life find themselves without home or funds for the care of relatives and interested friends. Sympathy and human understanding is an inherent characteristic of the men who make up the great oil fraternity, and it would be a splendid thing if the exposition could prove to be the agency through which the veterans and pioneers of the industry may receive shelter, medical attention, financial aid, and finally, avoid the potters field," Gibbons said.
