### Oscar Wilson Is Dead, 89; Rites Held On Monday

Funeral services for Oscar Wilson, 89, a resident of Eastland for the past 35 years, were held Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Holy Trinity Episcopal Church here with Father Archer E. Hartwell officiating. Burial will be in Eastland Cemetery.

Palbearers were Hubert Toombs, Tom Harris, Guy Parker, Robert Moore of Cisco, Earl Conner Jr. and Carl Johnson.

Mr. Wilson passed away about 4 a.m. Sunday at Eastland Memorial Hospital, after having been in failing health for a number of months.

Mr. Wilson was born in Livingston County, Illinois, on March 5, 1866, the son of Nicholas and Nancy Wilson. He came to Texas in 1892 and bought a ranch ten miles southwest of Abilene. He was married to Edith Corneau, of Forrest, Ill., on January 22, 1895.

Mr. Wilson continued in the ranching business until 1908 when he entered banking with the First National Bank of San Angelo. He left there in 190 to come to Eastland where he became associated with the State Bank of Eastland and remained with that organization until it closed in 1931. Since that time Mr. Wilson has been in semi-retirement, owning considerable property here.

He was a member of the Holy Trinity Episcopal Church, the Knights of Pythias Lodge and the Men's Bible Class of the First Methodist Church.

Survivors include his widow and one son, Clifford, of Eastland.

### Hard Battle Looms For Local Stadium Coming Week-End

The Eastland High School Mavericks have everything to gain and nothing to lose as they take on the Ranger Bulldogs for the District 7-A football championship at Maverick Stadium Friday night.

Already the Mavericks have had a much better season and gone much farther in district play than anybody expected them to a month ago.

The win over Cross Plains last week cinched 2nd place in the standings for the boys in Red and Black. Practically everybody had the Mavs picked to lose this one except the Mavs themselves and they are the lads who have the final say-so in such matters.

The Abilene Reporter - News had them picked to lose 20-6, yet in the write-up of the game carried by the Abilene paper somebody got their signals crossed and reported that Cross Plains had been seeking an upset for their homecoming congregation.

Be that as it may, the Mavs played one whale of a marvelous ball game and no one can gainsay or deny that they are the most improved ball club not only in District 7-A but for many miles around.

The Mavs have played winning football all season with the exception of their three early losses to Cisco, DeLeon and Merkel, and we firmly believe if the Mavericks were playing those three clubs today they would win from them.

As far as having a victorious season is concerned the fans in Eastland could die happy right now. The Mavs already have their cake. An upset win over Ranger or even any kind of a good ball game would just be the frosting for it.

Ranger has been rated No. 1 in District 7-A since the word go and nobody has ever disputed it. They have one of the finest ball clubs in the state and they are two or three deep in strength and material. The only thing to mar their record is a 19-13 loss against Winters, and they had a 13-13 tie with Mineral Wells in their opening game.

The Bulldogs defeated DeLeon 49-13 after DeLeon defeated Eastland 19-0. Ranger beat Dublin 48-19 and the best the Mavericks could do with the Lions was a 6-6 tie. In conference play Ranger has beat Rising Star 45-0, Cross Plains 25-0, Gorman 39-0 and Wylie 58-0.

Ranger will be coming to Eastland next Friday night certain in their own minds of a great victory and they'll not pull any punches. They are a powerful aggregation. In their game with Cross Plains the entire Buff starting backfield was injured, and in the Bulldog game with Wylie four Wylie players had to be carried off the field.

The Bulldogs will be thoroughly prepared for the Mavs as their head coach Boone Yarbrough set in the press box at Cross Plains and wrote down every single play the Mavs made. You can rest assured there are marked men on the Maverick squad including Jimmy Martin, Harvey Lewis, Clyde Evatt, Benny Cates and a few more that will be singled out for special attention.

We don't suspect anybody in Ranger will be surprised if they win this ball game, but if they expect the Mavericks to roll over and play dead they've got the surprise of their lifetimes coming to them.

As we said before, win or lose, Eastland is already happy, but if the unsuspected should happen and the Mavs should win, there will be the sickest bunch of people in Ranger that the world has ever known.

Eastland can stand a loss and stay happy. Ranger can't.



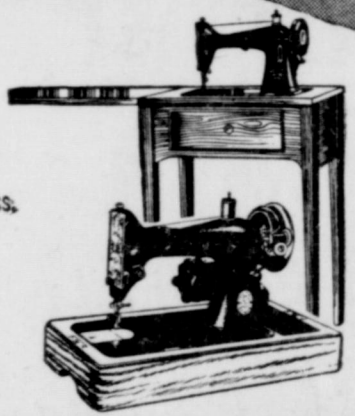

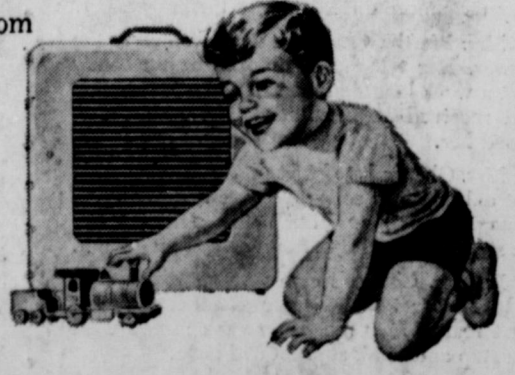
