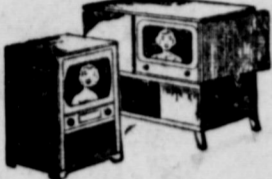
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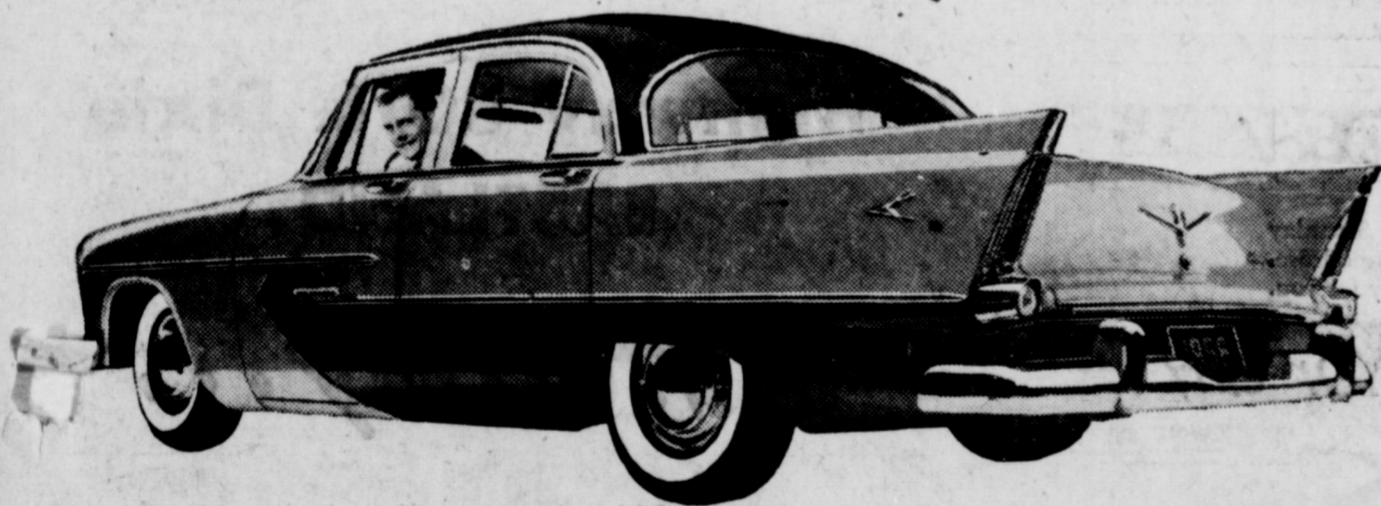

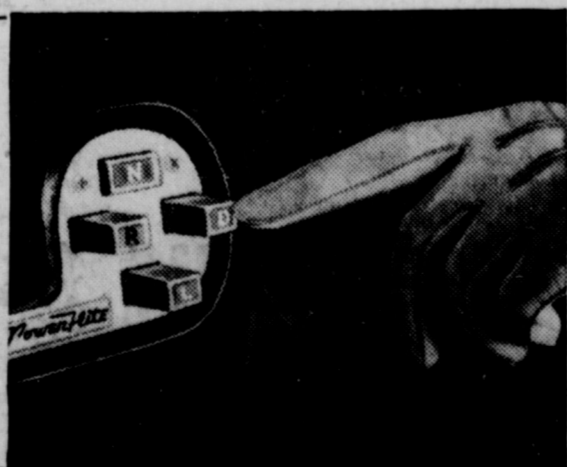

Those without tickets are going to show up early at the gate, but that will leave a lot of people showing up early, and it is only hoped they are all early enough to get the line whittled down by game time.

What we're worried about is the weather, which could certainly have a lot of bearing on the game.

Use Your 'Noodle'---Economize With Noodle-Base Dishes

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

EGG noodles combine well with protein foods such as frankfurters and frozen fish fillets. Use these combinations to produce bountiful, one-dish meals.

Noodle-Star Casserole (Makes 4-6 servings)

One tablespoon salt, 3 quarts boiling water, 8 ounces medium egg noodles (about 4 cups), 2 10 1/2-ounce cans condensed tomato soup, 1/2 cup milk, 1 cup grated, processed American cheese (about 1/4 pound), 1 small head cauliflower, broken into flowerets and cooked; 6 frankfurters, cut into quarters.
 Add 1 tablespoon salt to rapidly boiling water. Gradually add noodles so that water continues to boil. Cook uncovered, stirring occasionally, until tender. Drain in colander.
 Combine noodles, soup, milk and cheese; mix well. Turn half of noodle mixture into greased 2-quart casserole; place cauliflower in center of noodles.
 Add half of frankfurters. Cover with remaining noodle mixture. Place remaining frankfurters on top in attractive arrangement.
 Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 30 to 40 minutes, or until frankfurters are done.

Perch and Noodles Amandine (Makes 4-6 servings)

One-quarter cup butter or margarine, 1/2 cup chopped, blanched almonds; 1 pound frozen perch fillets, thawed; salt and pepper, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 tablespoon salt, 3 quarts boiling water, 8 ounces wide egg noodles (about 4 cups).
 Melt butter or margarine; add almonds and cook over medium heat until browned. Remove almonds. Sprinkle perch with salt, pepper and lemon juice; pan-fry in almond butter until browned on both sides.
 Meanwhile, add 1 tablespoon salt to rapidly boiling water. Gradually add noodles so that water continues to boil. Cook uncovered, stirring occasionally, until tender.
 Drain in colander. Combine noodles and almonds; mix well. Arrange noodle mixture and fish on serving dish; sprinkle with chopped parsley, if desired.

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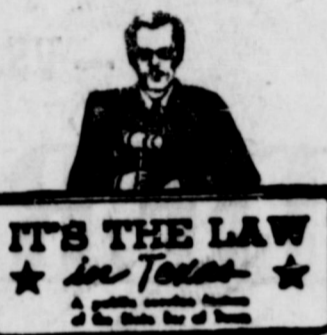
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LEGAL VERBIAGE SOMETIMES JUSTIFIED

Many persons feel that the "whereases," "aforesaid," and other legal verbiage is used by the lawyer for the purpose of confounding the layman.

Nothing could be further from the truth. In drafting legal documents, the lawyer attempts to draft them in such a way as to exclude all ambiguities. In the last analysis, a legal document means what some court at some future time shall declare that it means. As a consequence, it is the lawyer's duty to his client to attempt to draft the instrument in such a way that it can mean only one thing.

Most any paragraph of non-legal language contains numerous ambiguities. When a lawyer refers to the "deed aforesaid," he is attempting to make it clear

beyond question that the deed he is referring to is the deed mentioned in a prior portion of the instrument. Likewise, when he prefaces a legal document with a long list of "whereases," he is simply reciting pertinent facts for the benefit of the court to show the facts of the situation that lead to the execution of the instrument.

The difficulty with drafting a document in layman's language is that to the trained analyst such language is susceptible of several meanings, and consequently is likely to lead to litigation. It is the draftsman's purpose to avoid

litigation which is usually expensive for the client.

Another reason why lawyers use legal language is historical in nature. Thus most deeds declare that the grantor "by these presents does grant, sell, and convey" the land in question to the grantee. Each of the words recited have a technical meaning. The words together have frequently been construed by the courts and consequently the lawyer knows in using them that their meaning is settled, and that they will operate to properly transfer the title. He would be inviting litigation for his client, if instead of using those

words, he devised new language to express the same purpose. He could only say, "While I think the language that I have used will accomplish the purpose, I cannot be sure of it."

As a consequence, the lawyer, in the interest of his client, naturally uses the time-tested language.

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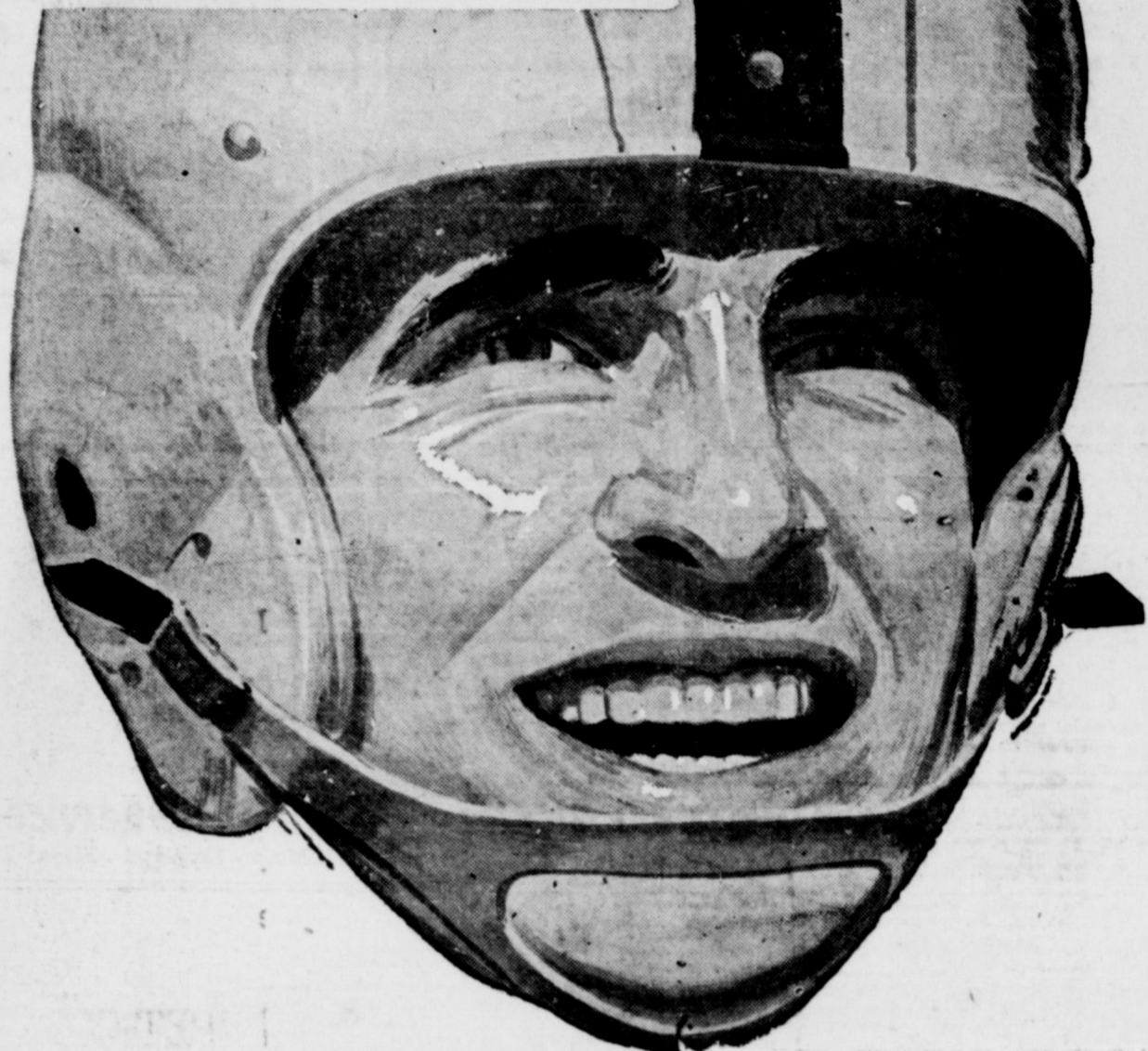

MOTOR MAIDS What to Do About a Flat Tire

By Betty Skelton, Dodge Test Driver

Don't just stand there and look helplessly at a flat tire. Change it! Except for handling a heavy wheel, which most women can do by rolling it, changing a tire is no more complex than threading a sewing machine bobbin. You can even do it without chipping your nail polish or soiling your clothes.

Tubeless tires on today's cars mean fewer punctures. Still, many a woman must drive alone or with small children on country lanes and highways where there are few knights errant and no phones within walking distance. If she has a puncture, she is helpless.

The solution—learn to change a tire.

To be prepared, keep the following items stored in the trunk: (1) A cheap smack and work gloves to avoid grimy hands and clothing, (2) pliers and a screw driver, and (3) two pieces of 2"x4", about 10 inches long. One of these should be tapered at one end.

Take Nine Steps
The actual tire change can be accomplished in 9 steps:

1. Apply the parking brake. Block the wheel diagonally opposite the puncture, using the wooden chock or heavy stone. (Certain makes of cars are equipped with special blocks.)

2. Pry off hub cap with a screw driver. Loosen the wheel nuts one turn with socket end of the bumper jack handle, an angled metal bar tapered at one end and equipped with a socket at the other.

3. Place jack under the bumper at point directly behind the flat tire. To raise the car, fasten the lever on the jack. Insert the handle, and work it up and down

until wheel is two inches from the ground.

4. Unwind the wheel nuts with your fingers, placing them inside the upturned hub cap. The wheel will slip off easily. Roll it toward the trunk. After the spare is removed, shove it into the trunk. Never mind securing it, because it will have to be removed for repair.

Roll the Tire
5. Loosen the bolt securing the spare tire, which may require the use of pliers. Roll the tire to the ground, then up onto the 2"x4" which has been placed, tapered end first, on the ground below the wheel hub.

6. Adjust the wheel until center holes are in position to slip over the bolts. Fasten one of the wheel nuts, tapered end first.

7. After wheel nuts are replaced, tighten them with bumper jack handle's socket end. Be sure they are tightened to the absolute limit.

8. Lower the jack by first releasing the lever, then pumping the handle.

9. Return the hub cap to position, then shove with the palm of your hand.

10. Now that the job is done, give yourself a pat on the back. You deserve it.
