## Mavericks Open Season In Dublin Friday Nite

For many it didn't seem as though it could be football time in Eastland again. That is, until Monday when a cold front swept through and left a trail of bewildered faces, stemming from the fact that cool weather means football time, and with a quick look at the schedule it shows that the Mavericks will open their ten game run Friday night in Dublin.

It will be a great honor for me to be able to cover the Maverick games again this year, and I hope you will enjoy keeping up with the Mavericks in the Eastland Telegram, and seeing and reading the action packed stories and photographs which we will feature in the Telegram each Sunday.

We'll start by telling you that after talking to coach Doug Dallas, we feel assured that the Mavericks will be in store for a bright and promising season.

Coach Dallas said: "The team looks very very good this year, maybe even more so than last year, with twelve lettermen back and all playing key positions. And combined with the fact that all twelve had a great deal of experience last

year, as all of them were starters for the Mavs".

Coach Dallas also stated that the execution of the team was much more improved over last year both offensively and defensively, and also that since most of the boys on the team have played together through their football days in high school this will better enable them to play as a whole.

The Mavs offensive formation will still be running out of the "I" as in the past, and the defensive will still be out of the five man set up.

Another prime factor for the Mavericks' good outlook for the 1974 season comes from new defense and offensive line coach Jerry McPherson who comes to Eastland from Andrews where he has been a coach for the past few years. The Telegram will feature a picture and story about Jerry in the Sunday issue.

The offensive line-up for the Mavericks goes as follows: Left end: Randy Wharton. Left tackle: Dennis Lopez. Left guard: Isaac Orozco. Center: Bert Elliott. Right guard: John Hart. Right tackle: Billy Daniels. Right end: Mike Lewis. Quarterback: Gary Wheat. Fullback: John Marshall. Tailback: Tommy Morren. Back: Brent Parker.

Defensively for the Mavs: Left end: Billy Daniels. Left Tackle: Bryce Garrett. Nose guard: Clay Wheat. Right tackle: John Hart. Right end: Charles Harvey. Corner backs will be Bryan Haun and Brent Parker and Safeties will be Rex Morgan and Randy Wharton.

In the game Friday night against Dublin, the Mavs will be going against a team with a 9-1 1973 season. And from the looks of things Eastland's prime concern will be from running back Mike Journey, a 3,000 yard career rusher, and others like guards, Mikey Henneidy and Pat Leatherwood, and tackles

Darwin Hester and Vernon Scales. Dublin's ball team has a good size and good speed.

Head coach Dallas said also that he felt that the game Friday night would be one which would be mainly concentrated on running and not as much on a passing game. But if his predictions did turn, the Mavs would have the arm of

Quarterback Gary Wheat and receivers like Brent Parker, Randy Wharton, Mike Stutts and Mike Lewis to keep the Mavericks in a number one position.

Don't forget full coverage of the game in the Sunday issue of the Telegram and remember kick-off time is 8:00 p.m. Friday in Dublin.

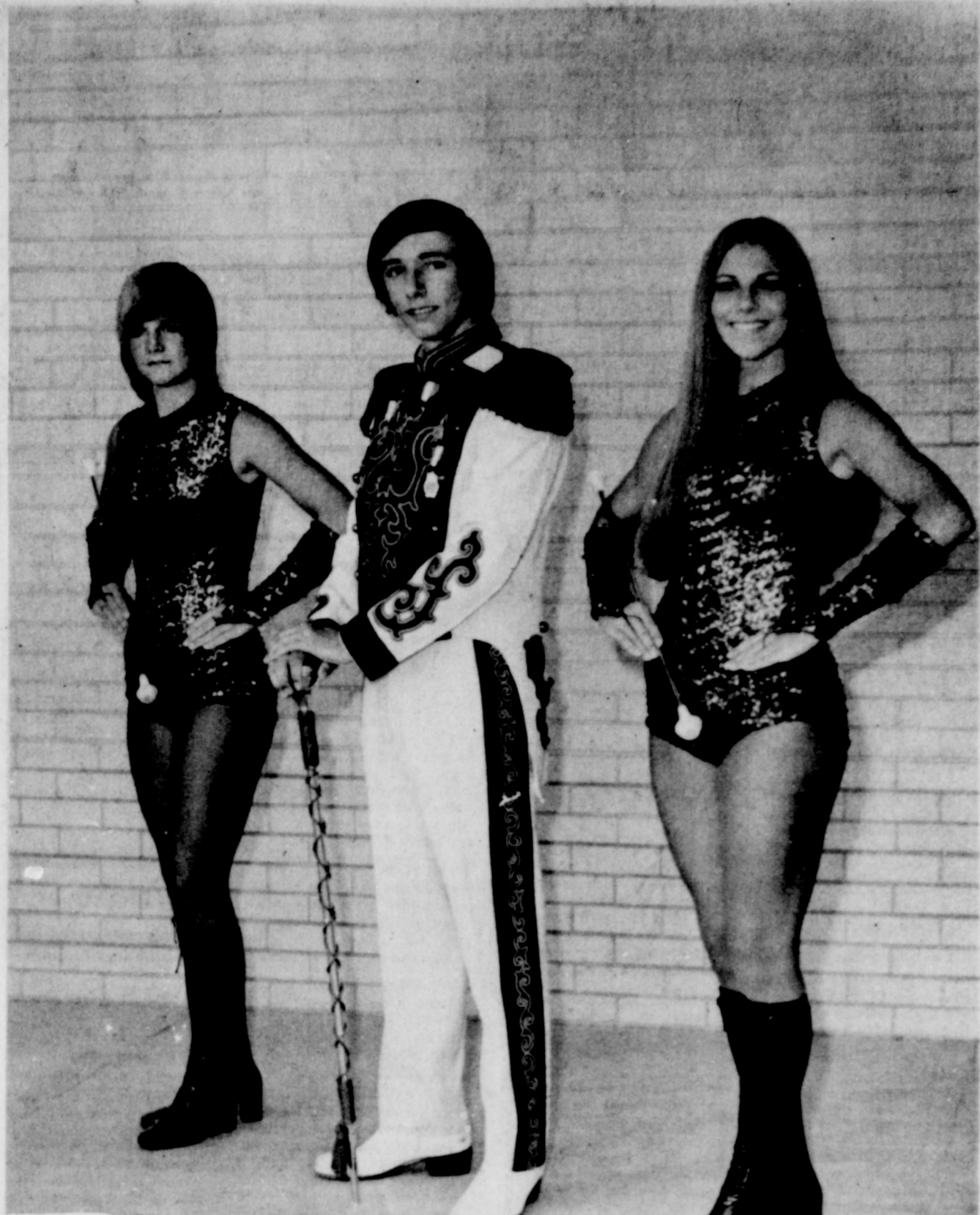
Proceeds from the sale will go toward QB project benefiting public schools' athletic program.

## Telephone Co. Turns First Shovel

Eastland Mayor W.Q. Verner and Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. Manager Burnice Gorr officially turned the first shovels of dirt Tuesday signifying the beginning of construction for the telephone company's building expansion in Eastland.

Other telephone company personnel were on hand as work got underway on the project west of the Eastland office at the corner of West Commerce

and S. Daugherty Sts. J.J. Thomas Construction Co. of Fort Worth is general contractor for the project which will include a one-story addition to be 82 by 25 feet, adding more than 2,000 square feet of space to the present structure.

The addition will provide space for new switching equipment to serve Eastland's growing local and long distance telephone needs. Mrs. Gorr

reports. As the symbolic shovels were turned, in the background giant earth drills were sinking 42 feet holes for piers for the building. "The present building is filled to capacity", Mrs. Gorr said, and the building addition is one of several projects designed to improve and keep pace with Eastland's communications needs, the manager said.

## Tour Of SCS Plant Sept. 18

A field day and tour will be held at the Soil Conservation Service plant materials center at Knox City Sept. 18. State Conservationist Edward E. Thomas announced today.

Tours of the center, which serves Texas and Oklahoma, will be held from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Livestock producers, seed dealers, sportsmen and others interested in the search for improved plants are being invited to attend.

Paul Kramer, director of the Texas Forest Service, will speak during the field day.

New grasses, forbs, legumes, shrubs and other plants under evaluation at the center will be discussed during the day. Some 1,500 strains of more than 300 different plants are being grown at Knox City.

Chief goal of SCS plant materials work is to find new strains of grasses, legumes, forbs, or shrubs that will solve specific conservation problems. Since livestock and wildlife co-exist on the same land, the search extends to those which have value for both livestock and wildlife. Such plants are needed for use in range seedings, travel lane plantings, or other uses.

Plants are also being sought which will thrive on high saline soils as well as those which will prevent wave action damage on shorelines.

Strains which appear promising at Knox City are then grown and evaluated under field conditions on farms of soil and water conservation district cooperators under a wide variety of conditions. Selections which prove superior to other plants available commercially are then released by conservation districts to seed growers. These producers then grow seed and sell it to the public.

Grass strains proven and put into use by SCS include Mason sandhill Dovegrass; Selection 75 kleingrass, El Reno, Uvalde and Vaughn sideoats grama; King Ranch bluestem, green sprangletop and Grenville switchgrass.

Some of the groups who cooperate with SCS include Agricultural Research Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas A&M University, Texas Tech University, Prairie View A&M, Abilene Christian College, U.S. Air Force, U.S. Corps of Engineers, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and soil and water conservation districts.

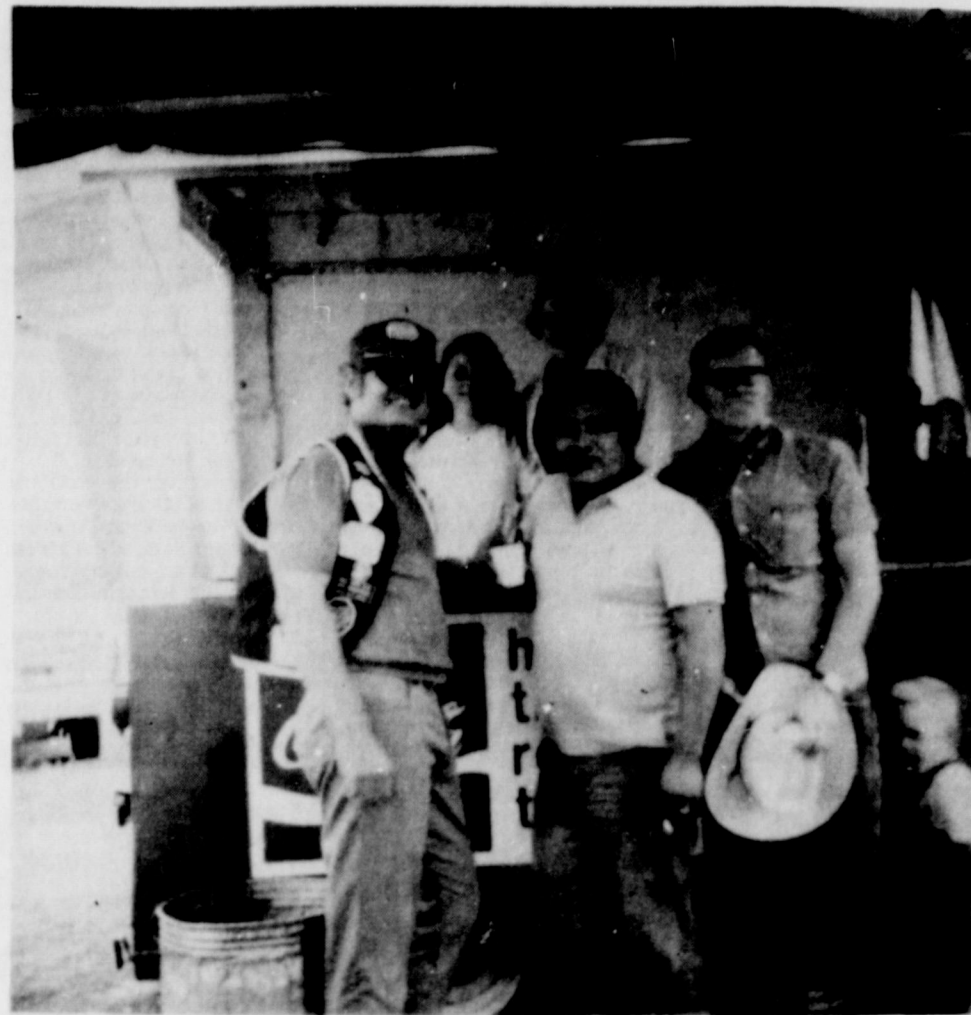

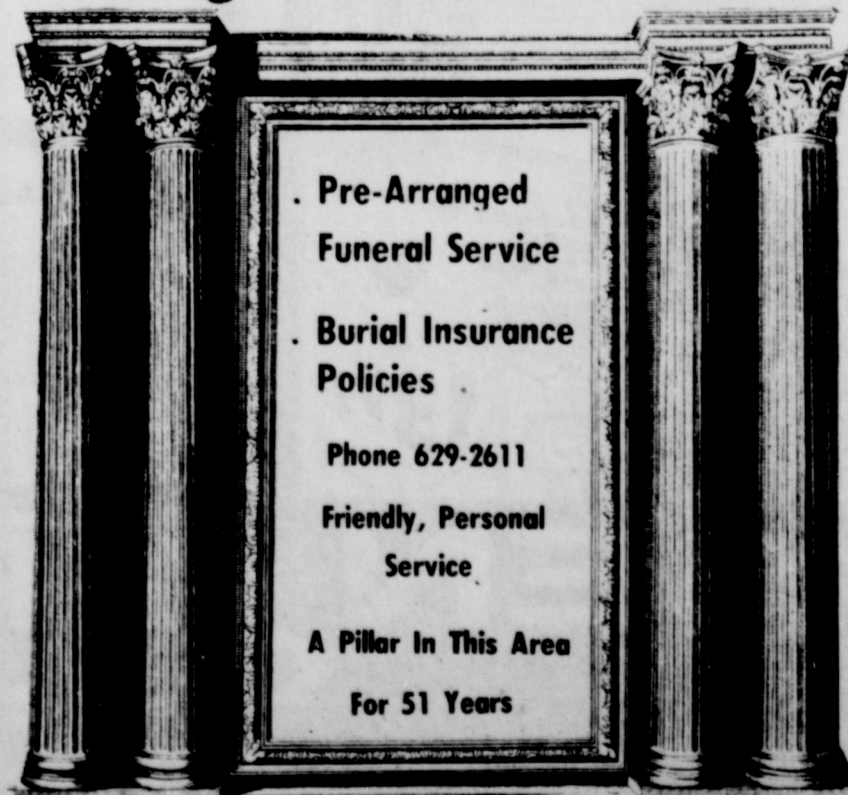

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, Tex. — Battle lines are drawn for the State Democratic Convention here September 17.

Liberal delegates, although apparently outnumbered, asserted their intentions at a recent meeting in San Antonio to claim their full share of convention plums.

— First, they made clear, they will fight for proportional representation on the State Democratic Executive Committee, the party's policy-making and house-

keeping body in Texas. — Second, they are demanding their share of the 76 delegates to the national Democratic mid-term mini-convention in Kansas City next December.

— The liberals also made preparations for expressing their views on the party platform, resolutions and rules.

— Finally, they indicated they may challenge Gov. Dolph Briscoe's choice for SDEC chairman and other top committee officers. Choices of incumbent governors for these posts tradition-

ally have gone unchallenged where they have majority control of conventions.

The "open party" Democrats at the San Antonio session adopted a platform committing themselves to a state party organization that will support Democratic candidates and principles at all levels rather than "promoting the policies of incumbent governors."

Bob Bullock of Austin, Democratic nominee for comptroller, is being urged to oppose incumbent SDEC Chairman Calvin Guest of Bryan, Governor Briscoe's choice for a second term.

Meanwhile, the national Democratic charter commission broke up in anger when party regulars and reformers clashed over reform measures in the proposed Democratic constitution.

GOVERNORS TO MEET — Governors of the southern states, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands will meet near here September 8-11 to dis-

cuss a wide range of problems, including economy and energy.

Governor Briscoe is host to the Southern Governors Conference which will meet at Lakeway, a luxury resort on Lake Travis 20 miles northwest of the Capital City.

About 300 reporters will join the 19 governors and their staffs for the three-day business meeting, and the social rounds of tennis, golf, sailing and parties.

Gov. Melvin Evans, governor of the Virgin Islands, is chairman of the Southern Governors Conference for 1973-74.

INSURANCE JARGON HIT — The State Board of Insurance is declaring war on "the fine print, double talk and gobbledy-gook" in insurance policies, according to Board Chairman Joe Christie.

Christie said the average policy holder cannot understand policy jargon, and recent tests show Einstein's

theory of relativity is more readable than an average hospital insurance plan.

Christie said efforts will be made in the next session of the legislature to improve "the readability factor" of insurance policies. He recommended that other state agencies give some attention to similar readability problems over which they have jurisdiction.

No-fault auto insurance will be another subject for legislative consideration in 1975, Christie told Texas Bankers Association at a conference here. He said a recent study on the subject by the Lyndon Baines Johnson School of Public Affairs will be of major help to lawmakers.

AG OPINIONS — The University of Texas must give a legislator access to files on UT land leases, but may keep confidential land appraisals and sealed bid contents, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

• Records of a city's exercise of licensing authority over electrical installations is public information and should be disclosed.

• Police supplementary reports of accidents, including witnesses' statements and photographs, although involving possible litigation against a city, are part of the official record and are not excepted from disclosure.

• A faculty member who fails to exercise the option to participate in the optional teacher retirement system does not have the right to a second opportunity to exercise that option on returning to teaching in Texas after terminating previous employment and leaving the state to seek an advanced degree.

• Whether a water pump and irrigation casing are fixtures within terms of taxation depends on facts in a particular case.

## Southern Agriculture Is Thriving

If there are any doubters still around who believe the agricultural south is disappearing, they probably haven't taken a good look at what's going on in crop production this year.

That's the opinion of Emory Cunningham, president and publisher of Progressive Farmer Magazine.

He says southern farmers have over a million and a half extra acres planted to major crops this year, compared to 1973. Cotton acreage in the south and southwest is up 13 percent and corn and rice plantings are up 10 percent each over a year ago.

States with significant increases in cotton acreage include Mississippi, 455,000; Arkansas, 380,000; Texas, 200,000; Tennessee, 120,000; and Alabama, 95,000. The south planted well over 90 percent of the nation's cotton,

with a total acreage of 12,670,000. Texas, alone, grows more than 5,600,000 acres of cotton.

Corn acreage increases were the largest in the following states: Texas, 230,000; North Carolina, 170,000; Georgia, 160,000; Kentucky, 130,000; and South Carolina, 100,000. This region planted well over 10,500,000 acres to corn in 1974. Southern states growing more than one million acres of corn each are Georgia, 2,000,000; North Carolina, 1,700,000; and Kentucky, 1,300,000.

North Carolina and Kentucky are the only states to grow more than 100,000 acres of tobacco, with North Carolina holding a commanding lead of 408,000 acres to Kentucky's 183,000.

Peanut acreage, a crop grown almost exclusively in the south, totals 1,530,000 acres for this year, up slightly from a year ago. Rice growing is concentra-

ted in Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas. The 2,000,000 acres planted this year represent a slight increase over 1973.

Soybean and sorghum acreages are down from last year. Soybeans is the south's most widely grown crop now, totaling 18,000,000 acres. Arkansas is the soybean acreage leader with 4,400,000 acres. Texas dominates the sorghum growing group of states with 7,600,000 acres.

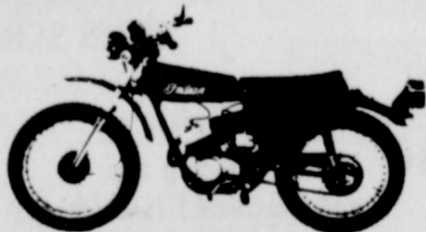

It is James E. Russell Petroleum Inc. of Abilene No. 1 Alma Dunning. The application to re-enter was originally filed by Joe Amason and J.J. Brian of Abilene.

Location is 375 feet from the north and 990 feet from the west lines of Section 81, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

Absolute open flow was 3,800,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 3,164-76 feet. The pay was treated with 500 gallons of 15 percent acid. The operator set the 4 1/2 inch casing at 3,256 feet. The hole was cleaned out to 3,325 feet and plugged back to 3,220 feet.

The venture was plugged in 1956 at 3,715 feet as E.P. Thomas No. 1-A R.H. Dunning.

# Route "6" - Fastest, Best Plains - To - Port

The way to go: Plains to Port-Highway 6, naturally. Eastland is the pivot point, and it's ideal.

Locals are joining in the discussion and letters to the State Highway Commission are in order, pointing out the natural route.

For the last several months talk about a new highway linking Lubbock and Amarillo with Houston has popped up in public hearings, in local chambers of commerce and local governmental sessions.

The need for such a route, a freeway if you please, to facilitate traffic from the agricultural empire of the West Texas plains to the port of Houston long has been recognized.

A concerted effort to persuade the Texas Highway Commission to do something about it flared up all along the proposed route in 1967-68. The proposed route, then, is the one that should be adopted now, and it simply would follow the present highways that run from Houston to Bryan-College Station, Waco, Abilene, to Lubbock and Amarillo.

The first concerted effort for the Port to Plains Freeway went into a pigeon hole at the Texas Highway Commission when lack of funds made it fruitless to try implementing the idea. In that pigeon hole are resolutions from Bryan, College Station, Waco, Abilene, Lubbock and Amarillo, urging the freeway to be designated and constructed along the most direct route, plus maps and other supporting data.

In the latest revival of the Port to Plains Freeway idea, a lot of other places have gotten into the act. The Houston-Austin lobby is plugging for the freeway to go to the state capital. San Angelo wants it doglegged down that way. San Antonio wants it curved around that way. Communities along Highway 36-Brownwood, gatesville, Temple, etc.-see that as the desirable basis for the Port to Plains freeway.

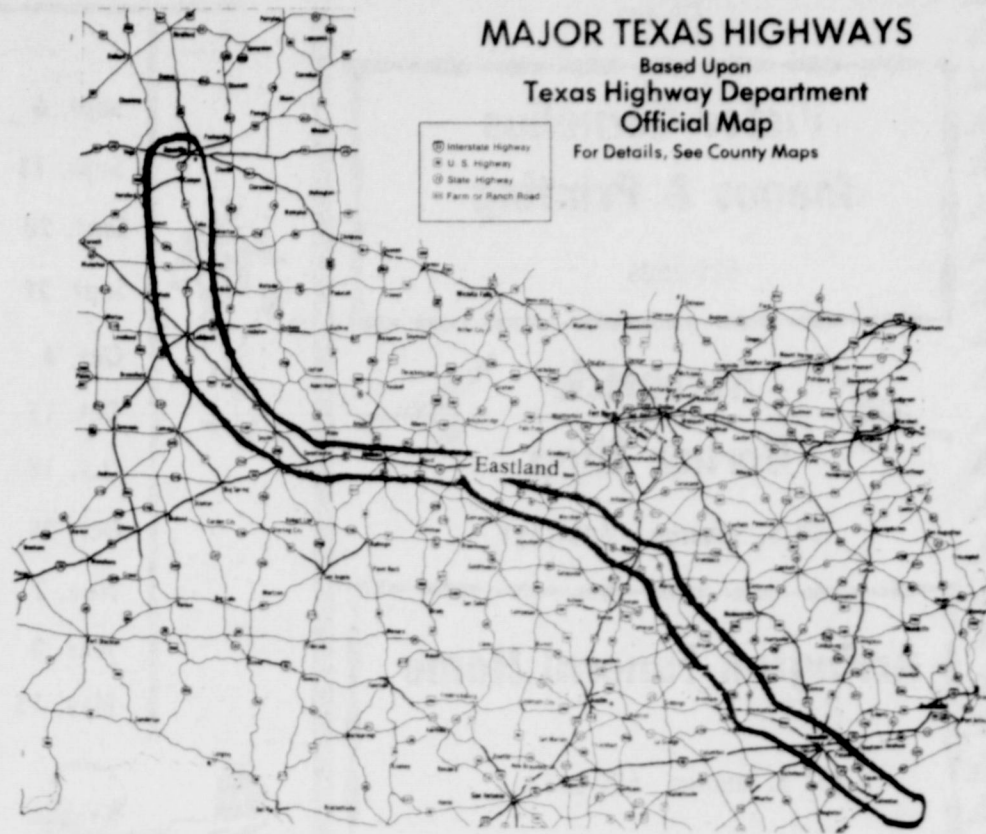
Without discounting the potency of all these late-blooming advocates, we can say unquestionably that money will be the main factor in the final decision. If Congress extends the funding of the Interstate highway system next year, and if Texas is successful in winning a share of that extended Interstate highway funding, then the highway commission will know what its resources are for a Port to Plains Freeway.

At that time, the most economical route, using improvements already in place and portions of existing interstate highways, will still be Houston-Bryan-Waco-Abilene-Lubbock.

Then is when we will find out what kind of a highway commission we really have. Eastland County, cities, chamber of commerce and individuals might consider using resolutions like this one:

**A SAMPLE RESOLUTION**  
WHEREAS, the Waco Chamber of Commerce as part of the Port-to-Plains Freeway Association has been vitally concerned with the need to establish a high standard multi-lane roadway between the high plains of Texas and the Houston-Gulf Coast for about ten years; and,

WHEREAS, the export of agricultural products is a major



factor in the balance of payments of the United States; and

WHEREAS, it is of great economic importance to Texas and the whole nation to develop the shortest and least expensive corridor from the Texas high plains through the Central Texas blacklands to the Texas Gulf Coast ports; and,

WHEREAS, the most direct route would connect Amarillo, Lubbock, Abilene, Waco, Bryan College Station, to Houston-Galveston; and,

WHEREAS, such a direct route would not only serve Texas agricultural heartland but a greater population density than any more southern or western route; and,

WHEREAS, the most direct route basically follows State Highway 6 and the Brazos River; and,

WHEREAS, on this route there is a greater potential for future economic development due to plans for a deep water port at the mouth of the Brazos River, which lends itself to the development of barge traffic; and,

WHEREAS, since only about 200 miles of this most direct route between Lubbock and Houston remains to be upgraded to four lanes, less time and money would be required for completion; and,

WHEREAS, the movement of cotton, grain and other agricultural products to the Gulf ports and the back haul of hardwoods and steel establishes criteria for not only the most direct route but the route over which it is most economical to operate; and,

WHEREAS, any route other than high plains-blacklands-

coastal plains would not only not meet these criteria but would be more expensive to construct;

**NOW\* THEREFORE**, Be It Resolved that the Waco Chamber of Commerce reaffirms its position as represented by the "Port-to-Plains Freeway" study presented before the Texas Highway Commission in July of 1967.

Be It Further Resolved, that highways should be designed and built by highway engineers and the recommendations in response to the provision of the 1973 Federal-Aid Highway Act be dictated on a rational basis of engineering and economic analysis.

Adopted this 14th day of August, 1974, by the Board of Directors of the Waco Chamber of Commerce in regular meeting.
