## Engineers Hired To Prepare Plans For Water Pipe Line

An Abilene engineering firm has been authorized to proceed with plans and specifications for the construction of a pipeline that would serve water customers between Lake Leon 10 miles southeast of Eastland to Putnam in Callahan County.

The Abilene firm of Yates and Decker was given the go-ahead Thursday after officials of the Desert Water Supply Corporation held a meeting in Cisco. Secretary Charles Clark of Cisco

said the water corporation has signed up 331 potential customers for the proposed pipeline.

Ronnie White and Fred Brown both of near Eastland are president and vice president, respectively, of the water organization that was launched about a year ago. Each of the 331 persons who have had applications for water paid in \$100, according to Clark.

The corporation has made contact with the Farm Home

Administration, a government agency that finances rural community projects, and has followed FHA guidelines in all phases of the project. A formal application for financing will be made to FHA as soon as engineering planning is complete, he added.

Tentative plans call for a pipeline to run from Lake Leon to Highway 80 and then follow the highway to Putnam, a distance of between 30 and 35 miles. Lateral lines would drop off the main line to serve as many rural customers as possible. Size of the main line will be determined by the engineers in their study, Clark said.

A general membership meeting of the 331 people who have signed for the water will be held at the Victor Hotel in Cisco on Tuesday night, Sept. 10. Engineers are expected to be present to provide as much detail of the project as possible, Clark said.

Lake Leon was built by a water district created by the cities of Eastland and Ranger.

## Jerry Lewis Telethon For Muscular Dystrophy On Labor Day Weekend

The Jerry Lewis Telethon for Muscular Dystrophy is a Labor Day weekend tradition. Many people stay awake for hours to watch as volunteers entertain the television viewers and appeal to them for their support and donations. Rarely does the general public know where the money goes or what MDA does during the remainder of the year. This summer as a volunteer camp nurse at Athens, Texas, I had the rewarding experience of seeing MDA in action.

During the week of June 30th to July 6th I was "nursic" to 62 kids in various stages of MD. I worked in the infirmary along with another R.N. and an L.V.N. We did the usual camp nurse activities of medicating insect bites and sunburns. And conducting bed check at 3:00 a.m. We had one major problem when one child had to be rushed to a local hospital for an emergency appendectomy.

The M.D. campers ranged from age six to early twenties. Attendants and Jr. Counselors were high school and college students. These young people and adult staff were full of warmth, courage, laughter and love. I have never seen so many young people give of themselves for someone else. They all gave a week of summer vacation to take care of a handicapped child—and I do mean care for him! Attendants had to attend to personal hygiene as well as encourage participation in all camp activities. This wasn't an easy task if you happened to have a homesick child or if you had to lift a 175 lb. camper in and out of a wheelchair all daylong.

Activities included horseback riding, provided by a local riding club, swimming and boating in the lake, volleyball, baseball, arts and crafts. Swimming was enjoyed most of all because in the water they were almost free of this horrible crippling disease. Campers with braces could run bases while

playing baseball but those in wheelchairs made their attendants run for them by hoppin on one leg.

Many attendants and campers brought guitars and sang morning, noon and night. Each evening had a theme: Hawaiian night with leis and grass skirts, Mexican night with tortillas, a hot pepper eating contest (attendants only!) and a pinata. July 4th brought watermelons, hot dogs and a fantastic fireworks display on the lake. Christmas in July had Santa Claus passing out presents that everyone had made in arts and crafts. For some, this would be their last Christmas celebration, for M.D. takes the lives of many children every year.

M.D. is an inherited disease, characterized by progressive weakness due to degeneration of muscle fibers. Pathological changes affect skeletal muscle primarily, but cardiac muscle may also be involved. Not all cases are the same—many will have only a slight limp which becomes progressively worse while others will lose all use of their arms and legs and even a slight respiratory infection may cause death. Many at camp were grossly deformed, some wore braces, while others could still run and play freely. One mature 12 year old told a reporter that he was "luckier" than most because he had been crippled since birth and had never known the "thrill of walking". He said "it would be worse to have known that thrill and then to have lost it." We take all of our abilities for granted until we find ourselves without them. Many of the campers had a "normal" brother or sister who was an attendant. One often asked why one child in a family was affected and the other was not. Since M.D. is hereditary, many families had two or three children at camp. There were even two sets of twins. One mother wrote that her twins were shy and wouldn't talk to anyone but each other and God. I wondered what a seven year old crippled with M.D. would say to God. Most of these kids were happy, always laughing and teasing, giving love to everyone. The attendants were equally ready to give their love to these precious children. I loved them all because they weren't afraid to show their emotions or express their love for one another.

## BIG GAS SYSTEM AND PLANT ANNOUNCED

A gas gathering system and processing plant representing an investment of approximately \$5,750,000 has been announced for this West Central Texas region by Louis A. Beecher, Jr., chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Texas Oil & Gas Corporation.

The firm has purchased a 20-acre tract of land from the Fred Heyser Estate for the processing plant. The land is located in Callahan County some 20 miles southwest of Cisco on FM Road 880 between Putnam and Cross Plains.

Kenneth White has moved to Cisco from Pecos and is supervising construction work on the plant. He said the plant and gathering system are expected to be ready to begin operating about Jan. 1, 1975. Mr. White, who will be the firm's superintendent, said some eight families would be moved to Cisco to handle the plant.

The plans call for constructing an 80-mile intrastate gas gathering system and a 30,000 MCF per day capacity gas processing plant. The gathering system will have initial deliveries of more than 20,000 MCF per day.

The gas gathering system will have connections to 52 wells in Shackelford, Callahan, Stephens and Throckmorton Counties initially. Mr. Beecher's announcement said. The wells are on leases covering more than 200,000 acres.

The Texas Oil & Gas Corp.'s system will gather and transport gas under a major gas purchase contract with a group of independent oil and gas producers led by A.V. Jones and Sons of Albany. The sales contract provides for the dedication of the gas reserves from the acreage without any fixed volume obligations other than the delivery of such reserves, the announcement said. Proven gas reserves on the acreage presently exceed 25 billion cubic feet, and it is anticipated that additional reserves will be developed through further exploration and drilling on the properties. Mr. Beecher said.

Gas liquid products including

ethane, propane, butane and natural gasoline will be recovered by the processing plant and sold under short-term contracts, according to Mr. Beecher. The plant will deliver the gas as well as the products to pipelines after it goes through processing.

Mr. White lives with his wife and 13 year old daughter at the Royal Oaks Apartments in Cisco.

## Eddie Gallagher Takes Over In Ballanger, Ed Cox Retires

Ed F. Cox, who has spent 41 years in a career at the News Printing Co. has retired. A native of Missouri, he was a medical student at Columbia University from 1907 until 1911. He practiced medicine for several years and during World War I shipped out with a U.S. Construction Co. to Brazil where he contacted an illness after serving medical needs for two and a half years.

While recuperating from his South American illness, he changed his career and took up printing.

He went to Ballinger in 1933 and began a free circulation weekly that was financed by the ads the weekly carried. This business continued until 1945 when it was changed to the News Printing Co.

For 29 years Cox featured commercial and job printing, including the printing of year books for clubs, schools and churches.

Eddie Gallagher took over as owner and manager on July 1. He has been in the printing business since 1939, having worked in printing continually except when he was serving in the U.S. Navy from 1943 until 1947. Eddie met his wife Johnnie in Washington, D.C. They went to Ballinger where they were married. They moved to Abilene where he was

employed with Feewiler Printing Co. He joined the Typographical Union in 1947 receiving his apprenticeship in 1949. Eddie was employed with Cornelius Printing Co. from 1951 until 1966. The last eight years he was in the Insurance Business in addition to doing his job printing work.

## Authorizes Increase

Lone Star Gas Company received a Texas Railroad Commission order authorizing an increase in the intra-company charge for gas ultimately sold to residential and commercial customers and for distribution unaccounted-for gas.

Based on a 1972 volume of 130 billion cubic feet for such gas, Lone Star requested in May of 1973, an increase of 8.1 per thousand cubic feet. The request was for the recovery of a return and other costs associated with the company's 400-mile West Texas pipeline, a return on \$9.6 million for advance payments and prepayments as of the date of filing to obtain new gas supplies and to recover the cost the company had incurred to purchase gas, as of the date of filing. The Commission authorized a return on the investments and recovery of the cost of purchased gas. An earlier examiner's report recommended no return on the pipeline. A 3.56c increase was granted by the Commission in this proceeding.

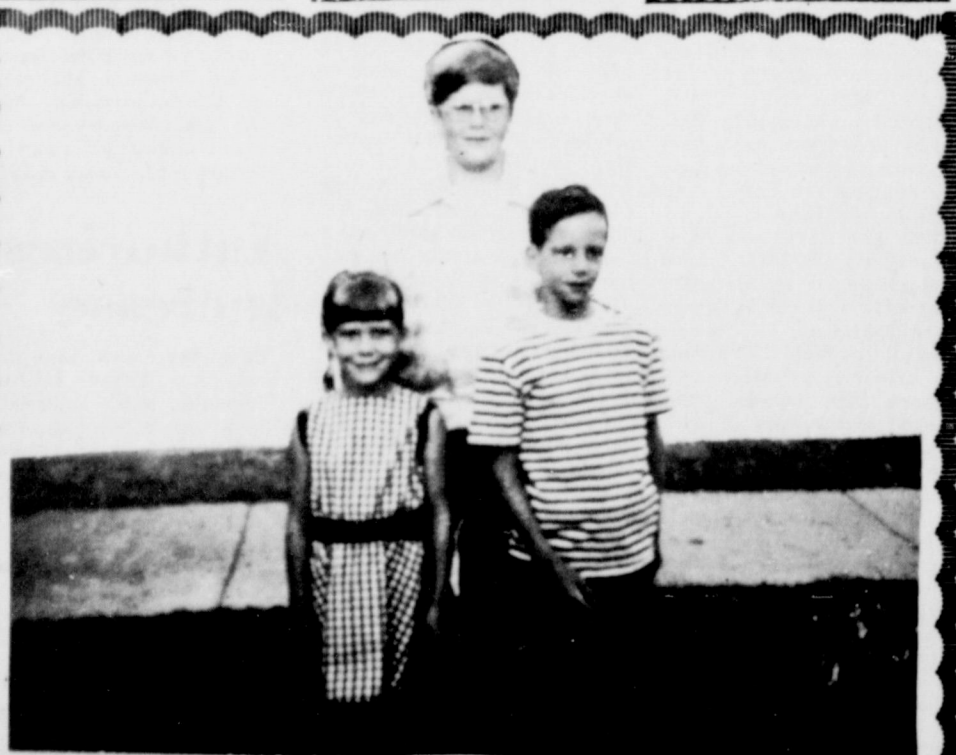

**Hay Show Is Planned September 25**

Eastland County's second annual hay show is planned for September 25. All hay producers are urged to enter the hay show which is sponsored by the Eastland County Rural Development Committee.

Committee members emphasize that it will cost the producer only one bale of hay and in return will get a protein analysis of his hay and will find out how it classifies in terms of quality. This will help the stockmen know how much protein supplement will be needed with his hay feeding this winter.

Hay will be entered by 5:00 p.m. September 4. He can leave the hay entries at any one of the farm and ranch supply stores in Eastland County. These include Jobe Implement Co. and Brown's Feed Store in Gorman; Squires Farm Store, Perkins Implement Co., C&D Feed Store, and Eastland Grain and Seed in Eastland; Clyde Johnson Store in Desdemona; Ratliff Feed and Seed in Ranger; Carbon Farm Supply in Carbon; Winfrey Feed and Peanut Plant, Jones Feed and Seed and Shults Implement Co. in Rising Star; Thornton's Feed Mill and Farm and Ranch Supply in Cisco.

There will be two divisions of hay--one for home grown hay and the other for purchased hay. In each division the hay will be divided into the following classes: Coastal bermuda grass, Love grass, Sudan and Sudan hybrids, Johnson grass, oat hay, and Alfalfa. If a producer has hay that does not fit into these classes he is encouraged to enter it and a new class will be set up. Any producer or owner may enter one bale in each class.

The hay show will be held at the Eastland County Livestock Show barn. A.C. Novosad and Dr. John Chapin, Extension Specialists, will classify the hay and award ribbons for hay that scores over 50 points. All hay will be judged against a standard for its variety.

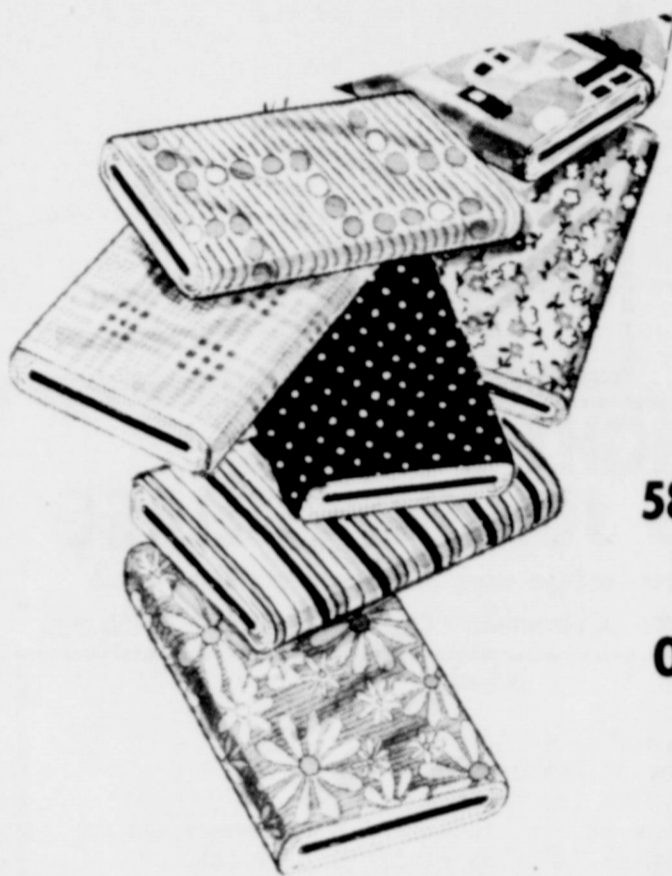

Are your pecans full of water? If so, they are normal. That is--except for the very early maturing varieties. They may be full of a dough like substance now.

Every year about this time a number of people get concerned because water runs from pecans when cut in half.

When pecans reach full size (about August) the kernel area fills with liquid that looks like water. About September 1 this liquid jells and soon turns into a dough like substance. As the pecan ripens and the shuck splits the dough kernel or meat of it becomes the kernel or meat of it. This is not exactly the way a Horticulturist would describe it, but basically this is the way it happens.

Eastland County stockmen are bewildered, because demand and price for their weaned calves are so low yet retail meat is at a very high price level.

There is hope for improvement, but not in the next three or four months according to livestock marketing specialists. Feedlot losses have continued since last August but daylight is now on the horizon. Some feedlots may already be in the breakeven zone. Unfortunately, much of the equity capital of the

commercial feeders has been used, so financing is still a real problem.

As a result, the loss situation of feedlots is being felt by cow-calf producers in the form of reduced prices for replacement calves. Demand for light weight calves is extremely low. Feedlots can buy the weight cheaper than they can put it on; consequently they are buying more larger type replacement animals.

Two things seem certain. First, cattle numbers on feed as of July 1 will not provide a very large marketing level for the fourth calendar quarter of this year. Marketing specialists estimate marketings at about 5.5 million head, or 15 percent less than last year. And, placements of cattle into feedlots during the April-June period were down about 29 percent from levels a year ago.

Secondly, a changed attitude toward refilling the lots is necessary before any price strength can develop in the feeder market. This might develop fairly soon if feeders see some profit opportunities, if government guaranteed loans can be made effective rapidly, and if marketing of feeders is not bunched because of drought conditions.

Cases of blackleg in cattle are increasing over Texas. Thus, cattlemen are urged to take the necessary precautions to protect young animals from the fatal disease.

Raising calves without immunization is hazardous. Most cattlemen realize the danger of blackleg and routinely vaccinate their calves. However, some become complacent because they don't hear of blackleg outbreaks and therefore fail to vaccinate.

Vaccinating calves too early can cause blackleg. Calves up to three months of age fail to develop a lasting immunity. Vaccination should be at the age of four months and should be repeated annually until the animal is at least two years old.

Before beginning a preventive vaccination program visit your local veterinarian for advice on disease problems in your particular area. Certain vaccine combinations are available at a relatively low cost that will protect calves from a series of diseases.

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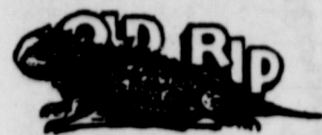

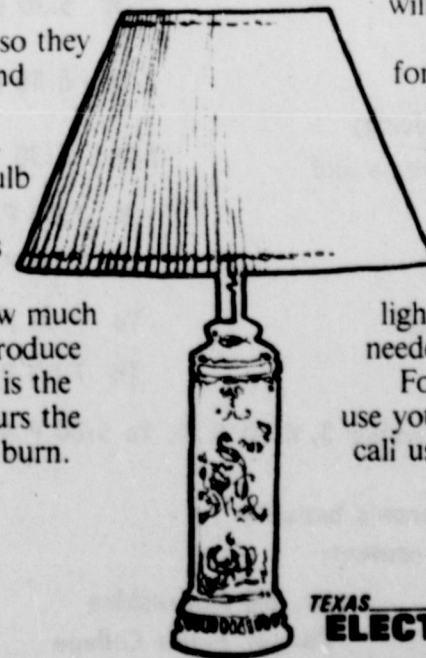
