Mavericks Face Bulldogs Friday

Football will fill the air in and near Eastland this weekend as the second stanza in the county-race continues, when the Mavericks go to Ranger to battle the Bulldogs.

Bulldog duel will be at 8 p.m. at Bulldog Stadium in Ranger. Eastland sounded down the Dublin Lions in the season opener last Friday night and Ranger lost to powerful Cisco the same night, but records

sometimes go out the window when neighbors play football. The 15th Annual Peanut Bowl will light up Maverick Stadium Saturday night when the CJC Wranglers and RJC Rangers go for the Bowl Trophy in Eastland.

Actually the Maverick Stadium lights will come on for the first time when the Eastland B team hosts a Clyde B team here Thursday night beginning at 7 p.m.

The same night, the Eastland Seventh and Eighth Grade teams will be in Clyde for games there.

The Thursday games will be season openers for the younger teams.

Coach Doug Dallas calls his Mavericks ready to go and

almost as full of strength, with the exception of Jace Staggs who is recovering satisfactorily from an injury of the summer.

The Mavericks whipped the Lions 29-16 and the Lobos bested the Bulldogs 44-12 last week. The Eastland-Cisco teams meet later in the season during district play.

The Mavericks had a good night in Dublin and their coaching staff called their overall performance good. Quarterback Gary Wheat completed eight of 14 passes for 214 yards and rushed for 70 yards. Back Tommy Morren racked up a most impressive 155 yards during the evening.

The game Friday with Ranger should be a fan pleaser.

BUSY SCHEDULE FOR MAVERICKS

"It never stops" - is the way EHS Head Coach Doug Dallas describes the schedule of footballers here once the season begins.

Speaking for the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday at the Ramada Inn, Coach Dallas complimented the Mavericks, pointing out that there are an even 100 boys in the program: 24 Seventh Graders; 26 Eighth Graders; 22 Freshmen; 22 Sophomores; seven Juniors; and ten seniors, who are starters.

Dr. Ferhman Lund was program chairman and introduced the No. One Maverick, David Martin who has the program next week.

A typical week is football busy, Dallas said, with the coaches getting the Seventh and Eighth Graders about 1 p.m. on Monday and the high schools about 2:30. Taping takes some 45 minutes, followed by a skull session of

from 30 minutes to an hour. Half is on the previous game and half on the upcoming game.

The B squad gets the data on the upcoming opponent and goes to the field first to practice performing as the opponent will perform. When the Varsity goes to the field a specialty period opens the workout, then the gridders go into a four-point practice - group defense, team defense, group offense, team offense. In a school this size, the boys double in both areas.

On the Monday schedule there's a lot of running with only some five minutes of live scrimmage. From the field the team goes to the old Tin Gym for their continuing weight-lifting program for tone-up and work on the mats. Then after a shower, the team sees the previous game film, leaving the gym on Monday maybe at 8 p.m.

Tuesday workouts sees more contact with Wednesday being polish day. On Thursday the team goes to the stadium for an hours drill, and the Seventh and Eighth Grades have Thursday night games.

Everybody knows that the Mavericks play for real on Friday nights and Saturday morning the players get to view the film of their performance for the first time.

Sunday's fall into schedule too, with work from about 1 to church time, then back later for more work.

In all the coaches and players see the game films each week a minimum of 15 times, Dallas said, as he told how Mr. Maverick is picked each week based on performance during the last game. Big Hits and Big Plays, Mrs. Offense and Mr. Defense are cited for performance.

Beginning his seventh season in the local system, Coach Dallas said that he's proud of the program here and of the participants.

15th Annual Peanut Bowl Ready For Saturday

Parade At 3 p.m.

Peanut bowl, Fifteenth Edition, will unfold in Eastland this Saturday, with indications being right now that it will indeed be bigger and better in every way.

Top feature of the event for the past 14 years and expected to be a stellar event Saturday, will be the class between the Ranger Junior College Rangers and the Cisco Junior College Wranglers.

Kickoff time at Maverick Stadium on East Highway 80 will be 8 p.m., with big pre-game and half-time activities on schedule.

Launched in 1961 by the Eastland Jaycees, the Peanut Bowl's main purpose is to pay tribute to the importance of the Peanut Industry in this county. Scope of the event has grown over the years as cooperation and participation broadens.

Open the festivities will be a gigantic street parade which will begin at 3 p.m., and offer a multitude of sights and sounds for the benefit of the thousands who come to Eastland to participate and enjoy the autumn show.


Bicycles will be at the front of the parade and Pets will be at the back so there will be time for the kids to enter both divisions.

YOU'LL WANT to be in Eastland fulltime: It's Peanut Bowl Time, and the Eastland Jaycees invite you and yours for a weekend of fun in Eastland - town.

Located on the main thoroughfare, 6715 Colfax, they feature Mexican food for the entire family, with a special menu for children, live entertainment, a picturesque setting of waterfalls, palms, a sparkling pool, volcanic mountain caves, a mine, and a jail. Attractive "take - home" menus invite you to count the 300 smiling young people who are there to serve and entertain you. The bill board lists as entertainment cliff divers, gunfights, puppet show, magician, dancing monkeys, and strolling musicians. There were three strolling Mexican bands in the dining room at the time our Eastland friends were there. Mr. Fry was not in the restaurant, but they were given special attention when they inquired about him and let it be known they were from Texas.

As of August 16, there were 1,297 officially designated Bicentennial communities throughout the United States, with the number growing rapidly.

The Bicentennial Communities Program is sponsored by the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (ARBA) and formally endorsed by the Conference of Mayors, League of Cities and the Organization of County Officials.

The aim of the program is to encourage communities of all sizes and geo - political structure to help plan and carry out projects and events which, taken together, will be the major portion of the nation's Bicentennial commemoration.

There are four simple steps a community must take to receive Bicentennial Community status:

- (1) Organize a Bicentennial planning and coordinating committee which represents all segments of the community.
- (2) Plan a program which will have at least one reminder of the special effort the community undertook for the Bicentennial commemoration.
- (3) Obtain approval of the program from the Chief Executive Officer or governing body of the community.
- (4) Submit an application with planning details to THE ARBA through the appropriate State Bicentennial agency.

Examples of wide - ranging, vigorous plans to join wholeheartedly in the commemoration can be gleaned from five recent applications for official recognition.

The communities are: Osceola, Nebraska, population 900; Lennox, South Dakota, population 1,400; Prince Edward County, Virginia, population 14,000; Montgomery, Alabama, population 150,000; and Macomb County, Michigan, population 650,000.

The ambitious plans outlined by the Bicentennial Commissions of these five communities emphasize that:

- (1) The size of the community does not limit the scope of planning or the kind and quality of proposed projects, programs and events.
- (2) People named to the Commissions do indeed reflect a full cross section of each community, thus encouraging full participation in the planning aspects and total citizen involvement throughout the Bicentennial era.
- (3) There is every intention to insure that the Bicentennial commemoration will prove lasting effects into the nation's third century.

Each of the extensive outlines contained many - faceted plans for celebrations and festivals to be held during 1976, as well as educational programs and projects by youth and other groups within the community.

Some of the more pertinent projects listed would undoubtedly be carried out in any one but early planning for the Bicentennial is focusing the attention of the community on the need, and encouraging support.

Following are highlights of each community's plans and proposals for the Bicentennial.

Macomb County: Active program for the establishment of Bicentennial Commission in the 27 municipalities in the county; adoption of an Encyclopaedia of town and exchange of information, histories and cultural exhibits; regional touring groups of ethnic performers; a series of radio spot announcements on revolutionary history to heighten interest in the Bicentennial throughout the county.

Montgomery: Riverfront project which includes a new Civic Center, parks, elevated railroad station, and an historic street environment; a highway to link parks and historic areas; a book on the heritage of the city's history.

Prince Edward County: A Bicentennial park for future use; an historic Debtor's Prison; restoration of old cemeteries; a book on the bicentennial celebration and on a colonial village.

and collectively, these communities are a mirror image of the nation's past, present and future. They illustrate that the Bicentennial is a commemoration of the whole history and its hopes for the future, not just the self and the events of 200 years ago.



President Declares September Breath Of Life Month

President Gerald Ford has declared the month of September as Breath of Life Month in the United States. The Breath of Life Campaign is a yearly event of the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation during which it stages a nationwide educational campaign, as well as a request for donations.

Cystic Fibrosis is the most serious of the lung-damaging diseases and is, to date, incurable. Cystic Fibrosis is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene for the disease. Just fifteen years ago, Cystic Fibrosis patients almost always died in infancy. Today, 50 per cent of these patients are living longer than 18 years of age. The strides in longevity are in part the result of the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation's programs to provide earlier diagnosis, improved methods

of treatment, and a better understanding of the disease. The Foundation has also proven effective in alleviating the suffering and often in curing children with other lung damaging diseases such as severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, and bronchiectasis. The Breath of Life Campaign in Eastland is under the direction of Mary Binham, wife of Bobby E. Binham, Eastland High School Band Director. She stresses that parents and prospective parents should be aware of the signs of lung damaging disease. These signs are recurrent wheezing; persistent coughing with excessive mucus; pneumonia more than once; excessive appetite but poor weight gain; and enlargement of fingertips. Knowing what to look for is essential, since early diagnosis and treatment are essential for prolonged life.

Seven Charged With Selling 'Pure' Heroin

Seven persons from Odessa were arrested Sunday morning at 12:55 at the El Rancho Motel and charged with selling heroin.

Nine narcotic agents from Fort Worth, along with the Ranger Police Department, officials of the Eastland County Sheriff's Department and State Highway Patrolmen, made the arrest.

Taken in the raid was one and one-half pounds of "pure heroin" valued at \$100,000.00. The agent paid \$20,000.00 for the heroin.

The suspects knew about Ranger and the area, the agents said, and made delivery to an undercover agent at the motel Sunday morning.

The narcotic agents had been working on the investigation for approximately one month and had spent over \$5,000 on the apprehension of the suspects.

The agents said the raid was the largest distribution of heroin in West Texas.

Arrested at the motel was Ester Molinar Hernandez, 22; Elias Salvador Hernandez, 24; Francisco T. Juarez, 22; Lupe T. Juarez, 24; Frank R. Nunez, 22; Carlos Cedillo, 23 and Chris V. Juarez, 24, all of Odessa.

The suspects were taken to the Eastland County jail where they were arraigned in the court of Justice of the Peace R.L. Rowch where bond was set at \$100,000 each on the suspects. Charges were drawn up by Emory Walton, District Attorney for Eastland County.

Additional charges were filed Tuesday against Guadalupe

Talmentes Juarez and Elias Salvador Hernandez on two felony charges of delivering controlled substance heroin in Ector County, Texas. Bond for both Juarez and Hernandez was set at \$500,000 and \$50,000 each on both counts.

Annual Report Of Texas Civil Judicial Council Shows 15 Percent More Filed

AUSTIN--The annual report of the Texas Civil Judicial Council, released today in Austin, shows that the number of cases filed in the district court of Eastland County during 1973 was 15 percent more than the number filed in 1972.

Cases filed during the last calendar year totaled 393, including 132 criminal and 261 civil.

Judge Earl Conner, Jr., of the 91st District Court has jurisdiction in Eastland County.

The local district court disposed of 392 cases during 1973, 47 percent of the cases filed during the year or carried over from 1972. At the end of the year, 434 cases were pending on the docket.

According to the Texas Civil Judicial Council report for 1973, statewide the 254 district, domestic relations and special juvenile courts experienced a 6 percent increase in filings during 1973 to 296,548 cases from 280,971 in 1972. Twenty six percent of these were criminal cases.

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- "Law and order" has been a favorite theme of politicians for the last several years. Until recently, the claim was made that there had been a considerable reduction in the crime rate across this Nation but reports now show crime on the rise at an alarming rate.

On all the reasons for crime increase, one is pretty obvious. In the more serious offenses, almost three-fourths of those arrested are repeaters. Imprisonment can be for only two purposes. One, of course, is for punishment and the other is rehabilitation but it seems the latter is, in most instances, woefully lacking. All sorts of studies are going on for prison reform but whatever has been done shows little result.

The dockets of both Federal and State Courts are terribly overcrowded. In most instances, both State and Federal Courts are overwhelmed by a growing backlog of untried criminal cases. The old adage applies; "Justice delayed is justice denied." If a person
