The annual analysis of the estatus of the Eastland County Farm Bureau was tabulated at a all meeting of the bureau directors Wednesday night in Eastland, Mitchell Campbell, president of the county farm group, introduced visiting personnel from the Texas Farm Bureau Board, B. J. Gist. District 7, Director, Abilene, and Leon M. Love, Field Representative, T. F. B. from Waco.
