**TFWC Head Says TFWC Wants  
 Driver Education In Schools**

The Texas Federation of Women's Clubs is continuing its effort to have Driver Education included in the curriculum of every high school in Texas.

The Federation wants Driver Education made a part of the Gilmer-Aikin Minimum Foundation

School Program by legislation, although not as a compulsory program.

"We want it offered in the 9th grade, and we want the classroom training made available to every student and the behind-the-wheel to every student who is likely to drive. We propose to set high course and teacher standards. We want and intend to have a Driver Education program which will instill in our boys and girls right attitudes and habits as well as skills; we are not content for them to know just how to start, steer and stop a car," wrote Mrs. L. E. Dudley of Abilene, president of Texas Federation of Women's Clubs.

The Insurance Commission of Texas has acknowledged the benefits of Driver Education by declaring, effective last May 1 a 10 percent insurance credit for those drivers under 25 years of age who have completed an approved course in Driver Education.

"We find parents whose children have completed an approved course in Driver Education who are not claiming the 10 per cent reduction. As for the others, we feel that when parents over the state wake up to what is happening to them on their insurance, they will demand an opportunity for their children to take an approved course in Driver Education and then will require their children to take such a course when it is offered," said Mrs. Dudley.

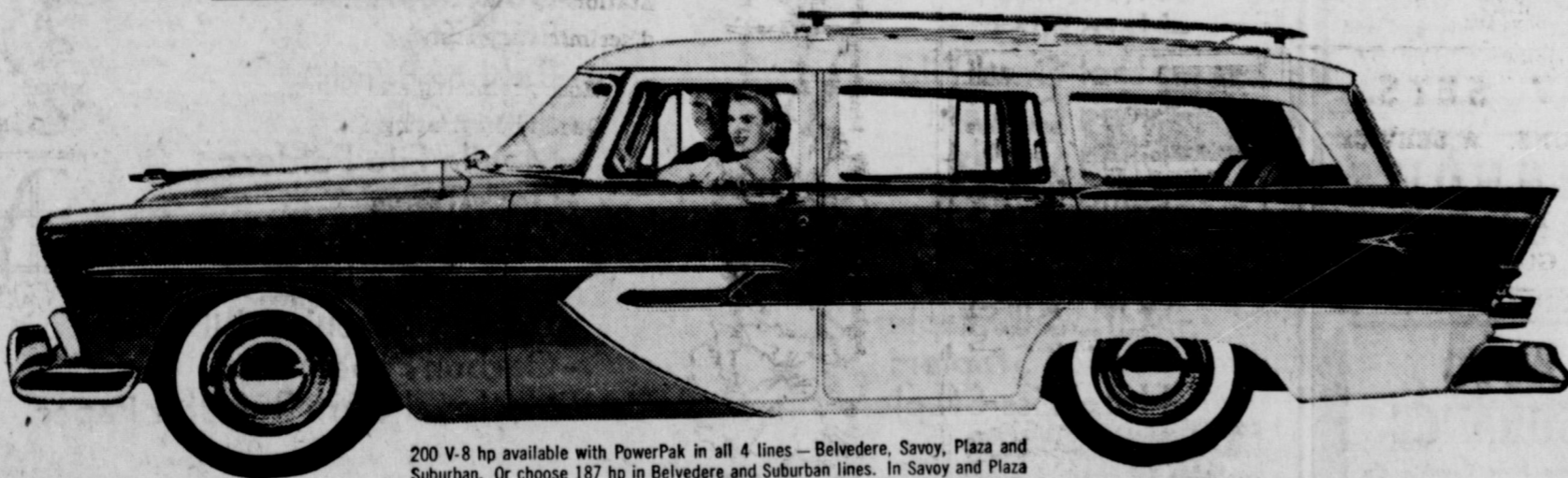

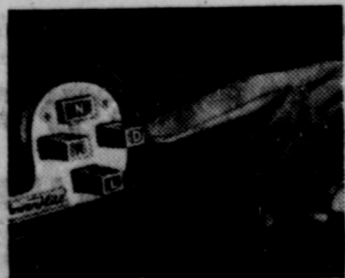

**HOLIDAY HISTORY**

When the Pilgrim fathers set apart a day for thanksgiving after their first harvest in 1621, they were perpetuating a custom that dates back even beyond Christianity, according to Encyclopaedia Britannica.

The ancient Greek philosophers, and the patriarchs of the Old Testament considered that "the most appropriate offering to God is that of a pure and penitent heart," but also felt that thanksgiving, or "gratitude in praise," was acceptable. The religious idea of thanksgiving is an outgrowth of the ritual of sacrifice.

Among primitive cults sacrifices tend to be interpreted as gifts to the god and food is often given to a god because he is believed to take pleasure in eating; it is probable that among Christians, as among Jews, every meal, and especially every social meal, was regarded as be-

### How To Candy Pineapple

What fun... what a saving... what feeling of accomplishment... and, on top of that, how easy it is to make your Candied Pineapple from canned pineapple. **Candied Pineapple**  
1 can (1 lb. 4 oz.) sliced pineapple    1 1/2 cups granulated sugar  
Confectioners (powdered) sugar

Drain syrup from pineapple thoroughly. (Allow to drain in a colander several minutes.) Cover bottom and top of slices with the granulated sugar; store about 24 hours at room temperature. Empty into large skillet and boil 5 minutes; reduce heat and simmer 15 minutes. Turn occasionally during the cooking, taking care that it does not scorch or burn. Remove slices to a wire rack to dry about 24 hours. Pat turn brown. Remove slices to a wire rack to dry about 24 hours. Pat sides and edges of slices heavily with sifted confectioners sugar. A crusty glaze will form after standing on the wire rack overnight. To retain crusty glaze, store in loosely covered container.

**IT'S THE LAW**  
in Texas

**REAL ESTATE TITLE SAFEGUARDS OUTLINED**

How can you determine whether the title you are receiving in a real estate transaction is good, bad or indifferent? Although at first glance there may appear to be more than one alternative method, purchasers usually find that all roads of complete title security lead to a lawyer chosen by the prospective buyer to represent his interests.

In the first place, the Contract of Sale should state the QUALITY OF TITLE to be conveyed to the purchaser. If the contract does not so state, then the seller may be obligated to sell — and the purchaser bound to buy — only whatever title the seller happens to possess, which may actually be quite defective. This may be true in spite of the fact that the seller is in possession, has a deed to the property, has been paying taxes, etc.

A real estate title is a claim of ownership or right to land and to the improvements, such as houses and other structures, located thereon. It may be partial or complete, as determined by the numerous facts in each case. If it is

complete and superior to any other person's claim — if you can prove your right thereto — against all the world, it is a GOOD TITLE. If, in addition, the evidence of your claim of ownership is contained in the proper public records, it is a GOOD RECORD TITLE. Ordinarily, only a GOOD RECORD TITLE is considered salable, being sometimes referred to as a GOOD MARKETABLE TITLE.

When you buy a house, you want a title which is good, so that you and your heirs will not be troubled while enjoying the use of the premises. You also want that title to be marketable, in other words, that it can be sold when you are ready to sell — without the expense of perfecting title before your buyer will complete his purchase.

Having made certain that your contract of sale indicates the exact nature of the title to be conveyed to you by the seller, how do you go about assuring yourself that you will receive the specified quality of title? People have varied ideas about this matter.

Some consider themselves safe when they gain possession of an Abstract of Title or a General

Warranty Deed. But an Abstract is merely an outline of public records on the tract of land — a history of the title — which anyone may purchase, regardless of ownership.

A General Warranty Deed from a responsible seller is comforting to have, but is a poor substitute for a careful title examination. True, it entitles you to sue the seller for damages caused by defects in the title. But serious title defects may not come to light until long after the seller is dead, has moved to an unknown address, or

is bankrupt.

Safer procedures include your attorney's examination of the Abstract tendered by the seller, and the purchase of a Title Insurance Policy indemnifying you as the insured for the full amount of your investment. In any event you will want your attorney's advice when closing a real estate transaction.

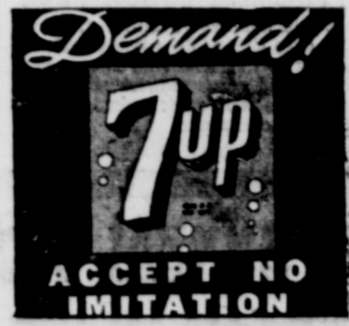
This nicely engraved invitation bears at the top of it the Eagle in gold and the engraved return address on the envelope is simply "The White House."

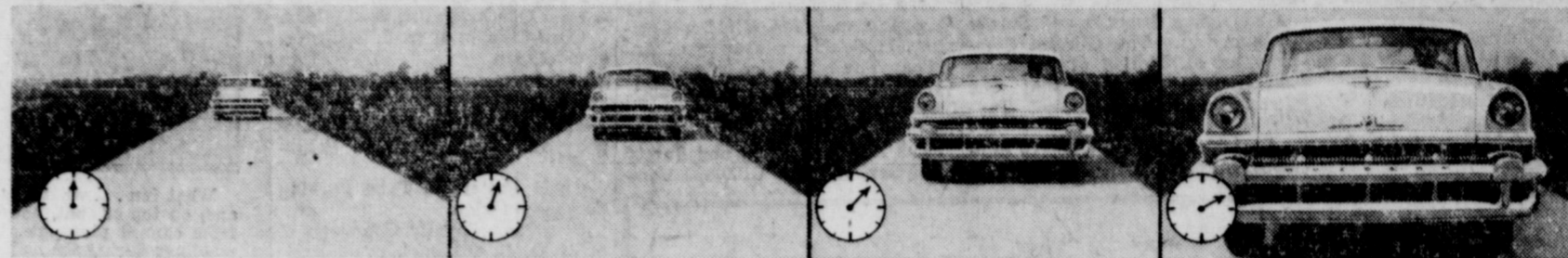

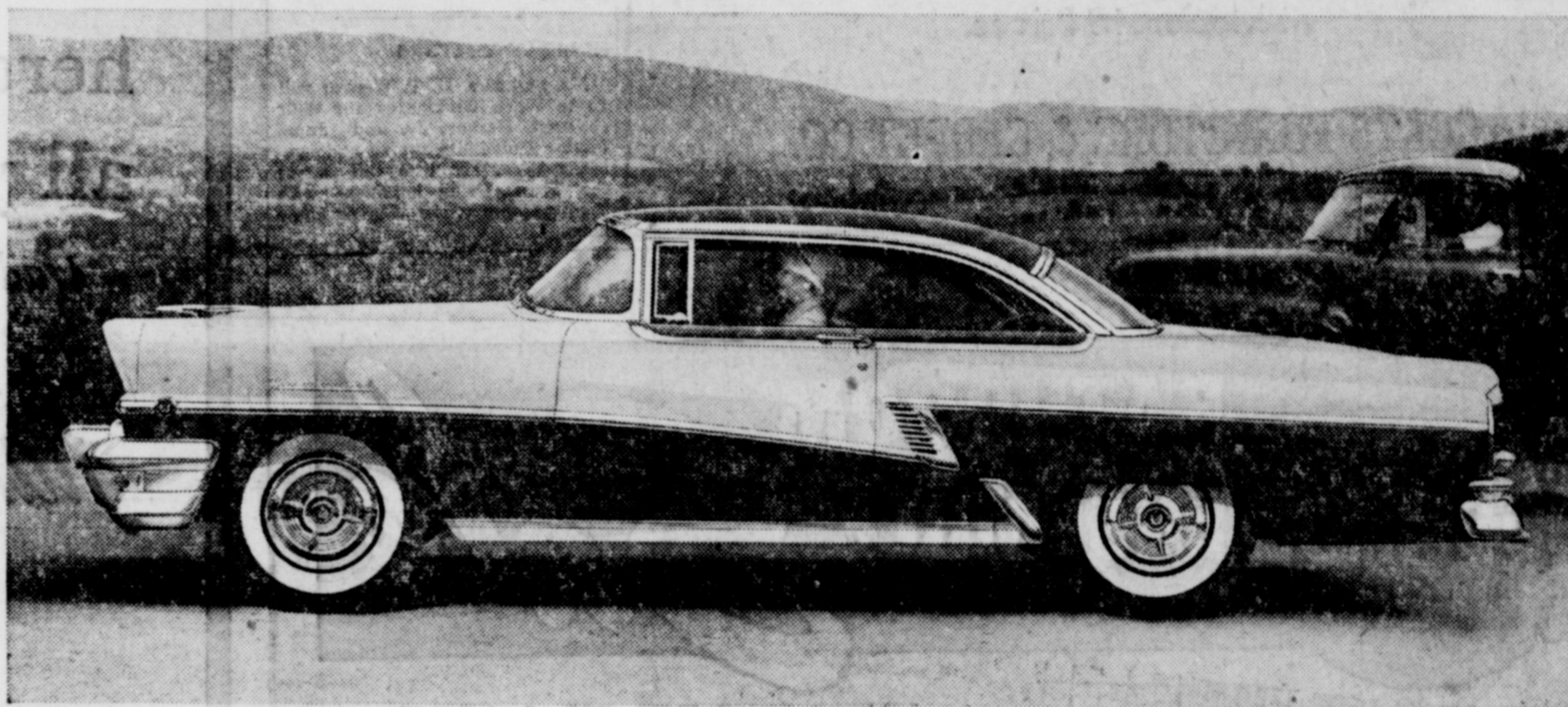
