

Big Day For Eastland Is Wednesday In Austin -- Everbody Welcome

BIG DAY at the Capitol Wednesday for Eastland and her sons and daughters are invited and urged to be present there for the celebration!

Many are already planning to be in Austin for the big event—and all others are welcome. It's to be a noon luncheon

event, with some extra special treats in store for the city.

Joining in to help tell the Eastland story will be the Texas State Peanut Producers Board, according to Executive Director Wayne Eaves, which will furnish bags of Eastland County peanuts for visitors

Also of prominence in the Suite, reserved especially to proclaim Eastland's assets, will be displays and samples of Eastland-made products, as well as an excellent color slide presentation which will show the beauties that abound in Eastland.

Preparations are developing on many fronts for Eastland's Big Day in Austin on Wednesday, June 19.

One of the outstanding features of the day will be the attendance of Eastland Boy Scouts at the Capitol event. Scouts will be at Summer

Camp at Camp Billy Gibbons, but under the direction of Scoutmaster Winston Boles of Troop 6 and Scoutmaster Richard Johnson of Troop 103, most of the Scouters will be going in to Austin that day to meet Gov. Dolph Briscoe and join in the Eastland celebration. The Scouts were instrumental in helping achieve Eastland's Beautification accomplishments and will participate in the Austin activities and then return to Scout Camp.

Mrs. Marene Johnson-Johnson is compiling a special display book on Eastland, to join the other exhibits which will be prominently displayed in Austin.

EVERYONE WELCOME
On that date a large delegation will go in caravan to the state capitol in Austin for special events.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe will be host to the Eastland visitors and an outstanding celebration is on tap for the city.

Heading up the Eastland entourage will be members of the Eastland Civic League and Garden Club with League President Mrs. Austin McCloud in charge.

All Eastland will be represented with special exhibits of Eastland-made products on prominent display in Austin, and the presence of local citizens at the exhibit will enhance project, it is reported.

The Eastland Chamber of Commerce through the efforts of President Bruce Pipkin, Manager James T. Wright and Vice President Emmett Asater are assisting with arrangements for the special day. Mrs. Beverly Nicholson is helping with arrangements.

Mrs. E.A. Connel was chairman of the Civic League's Beautification Committee.

All Eastland citizens are urged and invited to attend and participate in the day of helping tell the state about this wonderful city. Details may be secured from the chamber office or from either of parties named.

"We hope that as many of our citizens as can, will go to Austin to help us officially mark the day," Mrs. McCloud said.

A permanent list of memorials and an added listing of persons who have accepted the responsibility for providing care and maintenance for the plantings is being assembled.

The League was instrumental in a most successful campaign last fall which saw the planting of hundreds of trees and shrubs throughout the town, and has established a perpetual program of memorials which will maintain and carry on the tradition of keeping the city the beautiful place it is, as well as furthering the green spaces.

"THOROUGHLY MODERN MILLIE" A Gay, Romantic Comedy With Music.

A gay, lulling romantic comedy with music, Ross Hunter's "Thoroughly Modern Millie", comes Monday, June 24, at 7:32 p.m. to the Majestic Theatre as the first entry in the Film Festival. The Technicolor romp, which won an Academy Award for best music score, stars Julie Andrews, Mary Tyler Moore and Carol Channing and co-stars James Fox, John Gavin and Beatrice Lillie as Mrs. Meers.

"Thoroughly Modern Millie" is a hilarious blending of story and music of the Twenties—the flapper era—set in New York. Miss Andrews, a small town girl, arrives there determined to get a job with a boss she can marry, and rooms with Miss Moore, another newcomer, at a hotel for single young ladies. Miss Lillie, the operator of the hotel, is engaged in the white slave traffic and decides to abduct the girls.

Much of the light-hearted entertainment comes from the complications of romance. Miss Andrews finds Gavin, the boss fitting her specifications, but he immediately falls in love with her roommate. Then Fox comes along, borrows an automobile complete with rumble seat (for Miss Moore) and that brings them in touch with the world's richest widow, Miss Channing, who is proficient in everything. Intrigue and romance are the cross plots that are finally resolved, hilariously.

Four original songs are an integral part of the picture and are combined with almost a dozen hit tunes, "standards", of the Twenties. Elmer Bernstein did the music score, Andre

Plant Work Begins Monday

Work will begin Monday on Eastland's new sewer treatment plant, after a number of delays.

The City received word Friday from the Environmental Protection Agency office in Dallas that final plans have been approved and that the word is "go" for the beginning of construction.

Contractor approved by EPA is the West-Tex Construction Co., Inc., of Borger, officials for whom are already in Eastland preparing to begin the job.

EPA turned down the appar-

ent low bidder, a Brownwood firm, because it had included a 30-day start-up provision which the agency held to be a provisional bid.

So the city turned to the next low bidder, West-Tex, and the move has been approved by EPA, so the way should be clear now for the development of the modern facility.

A spokesman for the contracting firm said that they probably will be in the area on the job about nine months.

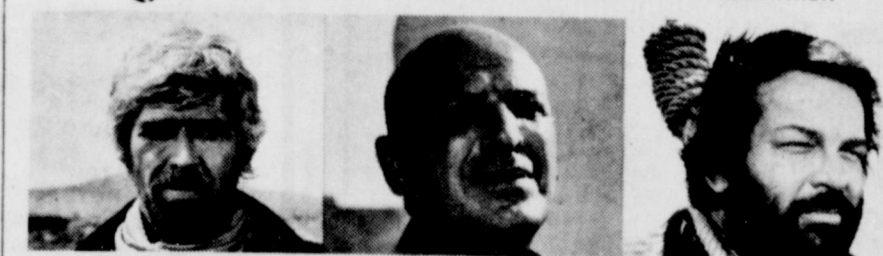

HD NEWS

There will be an officer training workshop for all Home Demonstration Club and Council officers on Wednesday, June 19, at 2 p.m. in the Eastland National Bank Civic Room. The program will be on officer responsibilities and parliamentary procedure.

Everyone who will hold an office next year is encouraged to attend. Officer materials will be distributed at this time.

Gardeners are now beginning to harvest cucumbers. I have received several questions this week on causes of failure in pickling. Some of the failures and causes that are common are:

Soft, Slippery Pickles--results when pickles are exposed above the brine. Brine too weak. Pickles stored in too warm a place. Pickles cooked too long. Soft pickles cannot be made

firm again.

Darkened Pickles--result from using hard water. Using ground spices. Food coming in contact with iron in water or utensils.

Hollow Pickles--means faulty development of cucumber. Hollow ones usually float. Cucumbers stand too long after gathering before brining-should not stand more than 24 hours. Hollow cucumbers may be used in sliced or chopped pickles with good results.

Shriveled Pickles--result from placing pickles in too strong salt or sugar solution or too strong vinegar. Put in weaker solution first, increasing strength if later desired.

A good quick recipe is Bread

and Butter Pickles:
25 large cucumbers
12 medium white onions
1/2 cup salt
1 quart vinegar
2 cups sugar
2 tablespoons white mustard seed
2 tablespoons celery seed
2 tablespoons turmeric
Soak unpeeled cucumbers in water overnight. Slice cucumbers and onions and place in pan and sprinkle with salt; let stand 1 hour and rinse. Add vinegar, sugar, mustard seed, celery seed and turmeric powder. Boil all ingredients until peel turns yellow, about 40 minutes. Pack pickles in hot jars. Close. Process in boiling water bath 5 minutes. Start to

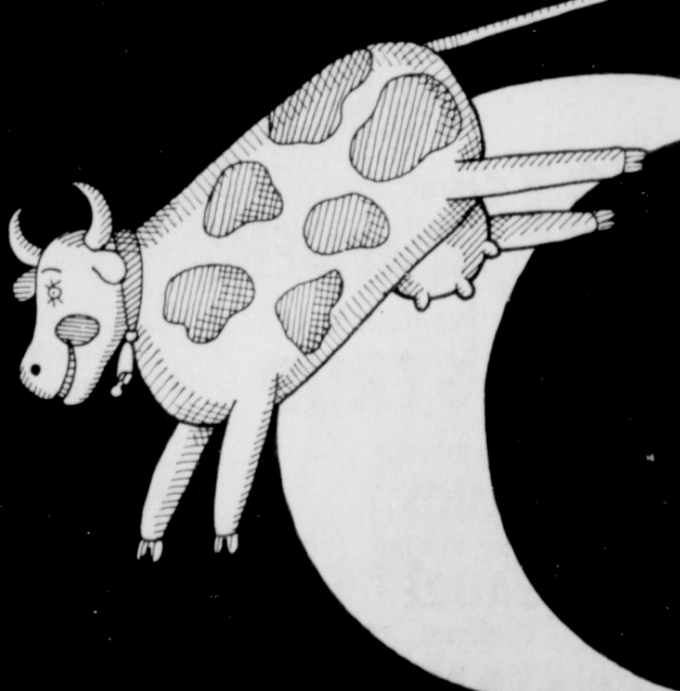

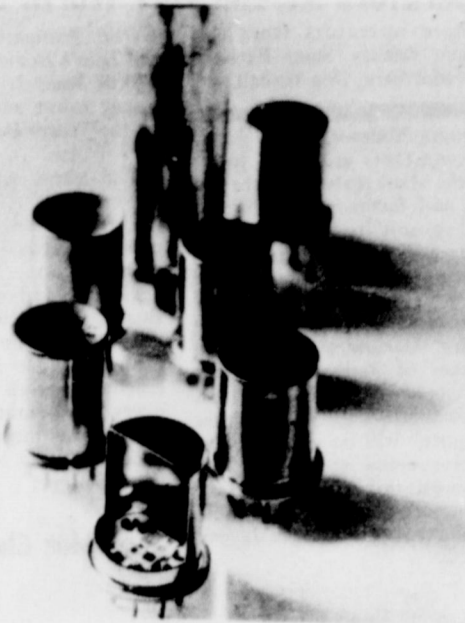

BIRDS

EASTLAND MEMO:

The Cardinal was named for the red hat and robes worn by the Cardinals of the Roman Catholic Church. His stout, coral red bill is highlighted by the black mask around it. The top knot, red plumage, and down to dark red feet reflect the strength of song in the male, while the female and young have subdued colors of olive, pinkish and dull red.

This 8-9 inch songster fiercely defends his territory warning intruders with attacks and angry cries. Generally the pair are together and in the spring you hear their most exuberant songs. Nest building takes place anywhere, but they prefer open woodlands. Material used includes bark strips, rootlets, grass and hair, etc. The male feeds his mate during incubation of 3 or 4 greenish or bluish white eggs spotted with brown. Once hatched, the male feeds the brood, while mama prepares for a second.

The Cardinal has his share of enemies; snakes, owls, and cats raid the nest, house wrens puncture the eggs, mockingbirds compete for nesting sites. Cowbirds leave their eggs in his nest and blue jays attack his young. Thus the Cardinal's stamina is evidenced by his adequate population. Although non-migratory, the Cardinal does wander some during winter. Cardinals can be attracted with sunflower seed, raisins, scratch feed, millet, nuts, wheat and corn bread. When the sharp "Tsip" around you, seeming to follow everywhere, it is the Cardinal. Both male and female are great singers, and during mating season the richness of song seems at its peak. With water and sunflower seed you can hardly miss having Cardinals pay you a visit, exhibiting astounding, brilliant colors and elegance of motion.
