J.E. Pennington of 307 South Daugherty, received the Master of Divinity Degree in Graduation exercises at Abilene Christian College, on May 5, 1974. Mr. Pennington has been minister of the Plummer and Daugherty Church of Christ for the past three years while completing residence work for the degree.

Before coming to Eastland the Pennington family lived in Canada where both Mr. and Mrs. Pennington were on the faculty of Western Christian College, Weyburn, Saskatchewan. Following the summer session at ACC, during which additional classes will be taken by Mr. Pennington, the family will return to their college work in Canada. There Mr. Pennington will assume duties as Assistant to the Dean of the College. The family will move from Eastland in August.

Mr. Pennington also holds the Bachelor's Degree (1958) and Master's Degree (1965) from ACC, and has done post-graduate work at the University of British Columbia and a summer workshop at Baylor University. Prior to their ministry at Eastland Mr. Pennington served churches at Burkett and Haskell, Texas, and in Estevan, Saskatchewan before assuming teaching duties at Western Christian College in 1968.

Mr. and Mrs. Pennington have five children, four of which are enrolled in the local schools. Their oldest son, David, will enroll in the High School Department of Western Christian College in the fall term of

Services For Rev. R.B. (Dick) Murray Held Saturday

Rev. R.B. (Dick) Murray, 73, retired Baptist minister of Carbon, was pronounced dead upon arrival at Eastland Memorial Hospital at 11:35 p.m. Thursday, May 9.

Funeral services were held at 4 p.m. Saturday, May 11, at the Carbon Baptist Church with Rev. Delbert Smith, pastor of Carbon Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in Murray Cemetery in Carbon.

Rev. Murray was born July 20, 1900, at Webberville, Texas. He married Ersia L. Nowlin on August 22, 1923, in Hamlin. He was called to the ministry in 1942. He served churches in Sheffield, Blackwell, Lamesa, Colorado City, Paint Rock, Big Spring. He retired from the ministry in Carbon in 1965. He was a member of the First Baptist Church in Carbon.

Rev. Murray is survived by his wife; two brothers, Aubrey L. Smith of Stamford, and Worth Smith of Rotan; four sisters, Mrs. Mary Emerson of Gorman, Mrs. Finis Tolleson of Anson, Mrs. Sally Spillers of Sweetwater and Mrs. Ray Emerson of Anson; and a host of nieces and nephews.

Thursday Afternoon Club Places Second At State Meeting

Due to the fact that the Eastland women of the Thursday Afternoon Club were dedicated to providing a first class library facility for Eastland through their concentrated efforts and all-out cooperation, of the community they were recognized on the State level at the 77th annual convention of Texas Federated Women's Clubs in San Antonio on Wednesday night, May 8.

For "Continuing Education and Libraries" a first place Certificate of Award was presented the Thursday Afternoon Club.

First prize was awarded Houston Junior Study Club. Their project included establishing several half-way houses for handicapped mentally disturbed people and retarded children, completely decorating and landscaping them.

Man Charged With Death In Rising Star

A 19-year old man was charged about 9:20 p.m. Thursday with the death of an elderly Rising Star woman who was found Thursday morning badly beaten and suffocated.

Mrs. H.B. (Johnnie) Wilson, 79, was found by two nieces, Mrs. Ed Terrell of Brownwood and Mrs. Maxine Novack of Rising Star. She was lying in the blood-soaked bed and had been beaten about the face, according to Justice of the Peace B.A. Butler. She had cuts and bruises on both arms, he said.

Jimmy Ervin Christian, 19, was charged with the murder in Butler's court. The murder was investigated by Eastland County Sheriff L.E. Sublett, Dist. Atty. Emory Walton and Butler.

Butler said Christian had been a resident of Rising Star about a year. He said bail was denied and Christian was taken to the Eastland County jail by Sublett.

Butler said death appeared to be caused by suffocation because a pillow had been pressed against Mrs. Wilson's face with such force that her nose had been broken.

He said the widow of six years lived alone and had no children.

Butler officially declared her dead at noon, but he said the murder probably occurred sometime Wednesday night or early Thursday morning.

He said Mrs. Wilson had been seen by Mrs. Novak about 3 p.m. Wednesday when the woman's niece had come over to bring her some turnip greens.

Also, he said the Wednesday morning paper had been read, but the Thursday morning newspaper was still on the porch.

Butler said the beating was "apparently done with a fist", and that the person who beat the woman would not have to be especially strong because she appeared quite frail.

Mrs. Wilson's body was taken to Hendrick Memorial Hospital Thursday afternoon for an autopsy, and will be returned to Rising Star Friday.

Services are pending at Higginbotham Funeral Home in Rising Star.

He plans to schedule kiddy shows on Saturday mornings probably twice a month.

Mr. Morgan was sales representative for Columbia Pictures for 33 years, and looks forward to settling his family in Eastland, as an independent theatre operator.

For the most part there will be two films a week at the theatre, except for the big pictures which will be run for a week.

Mr. Wright emphasized the importance of the public's patronage for the theatre in being able to provide family entertainment here.

Other films booked by Mr. Morgan, who will pick his own features include a long list of popular attractions, including "Jeremiah Johnson" scheduled to open June 5.

"The Poseidon Adventure" is on tap, as is the just-released "Golden Voyage of Sinbad", (along with a Batman picture). Another big one set for June 16 is "A Reason to Live. A Reason to Die".

And on June 19, Walt Disney's current "Robin Hood", is set for the Majestic screen.

On June 23 "Sugarland Express", filmed at San Marcus, is planned to be followed on June 28 by the opening of "American Graffiti".

Mr. and Mrs. Morgan have one daughter and two grandchildren who live in Dallas.

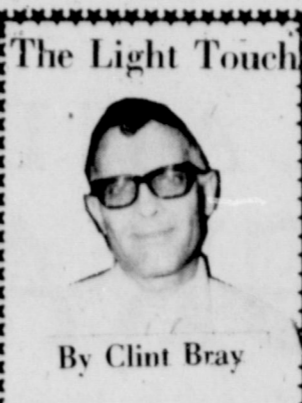

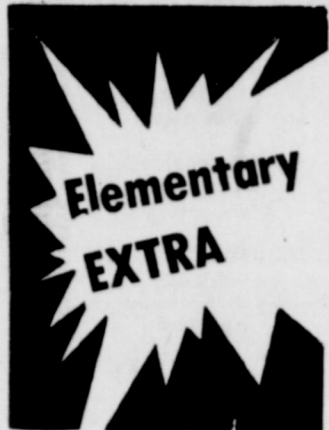

Dr. Moreton Awarded Gold Medal Of The TRA

For his outstanding contributions to the practice of radiology in Texas, Dr. Robert D. Moreton of Houston recently was awarded the Gold Medal of the Texas Radiological Association.

Dr. Moreton, a radiologist who serves as vice president for professional and public affairs at the University of Texas System Cancer Center, received the honor at the Association's annual meeting in San Antonio.

He holds a dual appointment as vice president for professional and developmental affairs with UT's Health Science Center at Houston.

This award, the highest honor given by the Association, is presented to members who have contributed significant service to the science of radiology.

Dr. Moreton is a member of the Texas State Board of Health and past president of the Radiological Society of North America, Texas Radiological Association, Southern Medical Association and Tarrant County (Texas) Medical Society.

He recently was appointed to a national advisory committee on radiation safety standards by the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.


Before assuming his current University posts, Dr. Moreton served as assistant director at UT's M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute. He also is a vice president of the University Cancer Foundation.

A native of Brookhaven, Mississippi, Dr. Moreton earned his medical degree at the University of Tennessee. He held a radiology fellowship at the Mayo Foundation, and later served as a staff radiologist at Scott & White Hospital and Clinic in Temple, Texas.

Prior to joining the Anderson staff in 1965, he was chairman and director of the department of radiology at Harris Hospital and Fort Worth Children's Hospital. He also has served as chairman and partner in Fort Worth's Bond Radiological Group.

As chairman of the Commission of Cancer Management of the American College of Radiology, Dr. Moreton directed the development of the Mary Bird Perkins Radiation Center in Baton Rouge, Louisiana.


