AUSTIN - Texas Highway Department tourist survey figures released today show that 15,975,000 auto visitors from other states and nations toured Texas during 1973. They spent a total of 1,500,665,000 including \$133,560,000 paid directly to state taxes.

Eastland County is sitting right on the "main line" of Texas visitors. Is enough being done to lure the visitors into our town?

The Highway Department has made no survey of the number of visitors to Texas who came by commercial carrier; however, recent surveys show that a minimum of 86 percent of all travel is by auto and 14 percent is by airplane, bus, train, etc. Using these percentages, an estimated 2.6 million additional visitors came to Texas in 1973 by commercial carrier, for a total out-of-state visitor figure of 18,575,000.

Although no interviews have been conducted on those who came by commercial carrier, it can be figured conservatively that they spent at least as much proportionately as auto visitors, or \$244.8 million. This means out-of-state visitors in 1973 spent in Texas some \$1,745,465,000.

A summer of fuel uncertainty and a winter of energy crisis headlines were reflected in the fact that the total number of auto visitors in 1973 decreased 3.9 percent from the all-time high set the previous year. The visitor spending that totaled more than \$1.5 billion, while representing an immensely valuable addition to the Texas economy, was a decline of 5.6 percent compared to the previous year. It resulted from a combination of three factors - fewer visitors, smaller tourist parties, and a shorter average length of stay.

The average auto visitor party to Texas during 1973 consisted of 2.74 persons, down from 2.83, in 1972. Likewise, the average visitor stay, an even six days in 1972, declined to 5.7 days last year. On the other hand, the visitors drove farther in Texas last year, an average of 1,294 miles compared to 1,222 miles in 1972.

As they have for decades, the three primary essentials in modern auto travel - food, lodging and auto expenses - consumed nearly three fourths of the average travel dollar. Food took the largest portion, 26 percent, while lodging accounted for 25 percent of the travel dollar, and auto expenses another 22 percent. Out-of-state visitors spent 10 cents of each travel dollar on entertainment and 17 cents on miscellaneous items.

Pure vacationing continues to bring slightly more than half, 51 percent, of all auto visitors to Texas, but the sum of business, conventions, and combination business-vacation trips adds to a very impressive 43 percent. Another two percent of out-of-state visitors came to visit friends and relatives, and four percent were moving to Texas.

According to the Highway Department survey, motels are the most favored accommodations among Texas auto travelers, hosting 45 percent of them during 1973. Another third, 33 percent, either camped or stayed in a trailer, while 14 percent used hotels. Private homes had four percent and "other" accommodations accounted for another four percent of visitor stays.

Visitors answer the question "Where did you go in Texas?" many different ways. Some give a specific city, some mention a region, many say they just "toured". The cities mentioned most often as destinations were Dallas and Houston (7 percent), El Paso (6 percent), San Antonio (5 percent), Austin, Brownsville and Fort Worth (2 percent), and Amarillo, Arlington, Corpus Christi, Galveston, Laredo, McAllen, and Wichita Falls (each mentioned by 1 percent of the visitors). As to regions, a whopping 31 percent listed general touring, while 5 percent said they were heading for the Lower Rio Grande Valley; 4 percent to the coastal region; 4 percent north Texas; Big Bend, central and east Texas each were the destinations of 2 percent of auto visitors, while the Hill Country, the Panhandle, south Texas, and Mexico each registered 1 percent.

California contributed the largest volume of visitors with 11 percent. Second was Oklahoma with 8 percent. Florida, Illinois, Louisiana, and Michigan each added 5 percent of out-of-state auto visitors, while 4 percent each came from Kansas, Ohio and Mexico.

Exhibiting a trend opposite that of U.S. travelers, visitors from Mexico showed a sharp upsurge during 1973. The U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service reported 645,000 Mexican auto visitors to Texas last year, a 23 percent increase over 1972. Mexican air travelers also increased. Nearly 189,000, 21 percent more than the previous year, arrived at eight Texas airports that serve direct flights from Mexico. Only Mexican visitors who stayed longer than 72 hours or traveled more than 24 miles from the border were included in this survey. The many shoppers who stayed a shorter time and did not leave the border area were not counted in the visitor totals.

The Texas Highway Department's annual survey, based on decades of practical experience plus the precision of computer technology, is a model by which other state surveys are compared. All information about where visitors come from, what they do, where they go, and how much they spend during Texas trips is reported by the visitors themselves on postcard questionnaires given them in Highway Department tourist bureaus. The visitors are asked to return the cards at the conclusion of their trip.

During 1973, more than 48,000 out-of-state travel parties responded to that request, reflecting the travel experiences of nearly 132,000 individuals.

To project the answers of 48,000 travel parties for total visitors from out of state, the Highway Department employs a system of daily traffic counts which includes both visual license plate surveys and automatic vehicle tabulators. More than 10,000 hours of counting were required for this report. To exclude commuters, visual counts ignore vehicles with license plates from adjacent counties in other states.

The report does not include intrastate recreational travel by Texans. To measure this "native" segment of the tourist industry, the Highway Department currently is conducting the first scientific study of Texans' own travel habits.

Nearly 1.7 million visitors sought travel assistance in the 11 Texas Highway Department tourist bureaus last year, a 3.9 percent increase in the number of visitors over 1972 and a record high. Services to visitors from the Austin office of the Department's Travel and Information Division, primarily responses to mail and telephone requests for travel literature, showed an increase of 16 percent, with the number of services totaling 426,837.

These sources accounted for the distribution in 1973 of 6.5 million pieces of Texas travel literature, of which 3.4 million were published by the Highway Department, and another 3.1 million by other sources - chambers of commerce, visitor attractions, and other state agencies. Literature published by the Highway Department includes the Official Highway Travel Map, brochures, posters, folders on the 10 Texas Travel Trails, slide programs, travel films and a handsome, lavishly illustrated travel "wish book", Texas - Land of Contrast.

The latest concept for dispensing Texas travel information is the InfoBord. These bulletin boards are being erected and maintained by the Highway Department in rest areas along Interstate and some U.S. highways. They provide accurate, inviting information about nearby points of scenic, historic and recreational interest. When all InfoBords have been placed at 188 planned sites, more than 124,000 people every day will have an opportunity to discover attractions that are near at hand. At the 1973 U.S. Travel Conference, the nation's travel industry honored Texas InfoBords with the 1973 Discover America Award and described them as "the most significant development in highway travel information since Texas established the nation's first tourist bureaus in 1936."

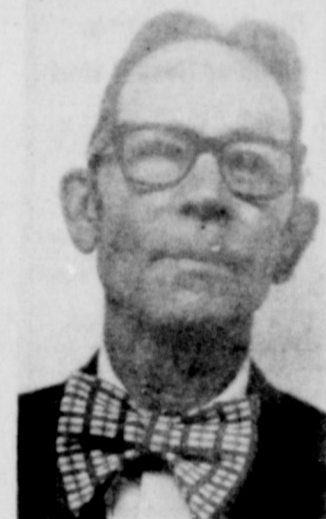
RJC Rodeo Planned April 23

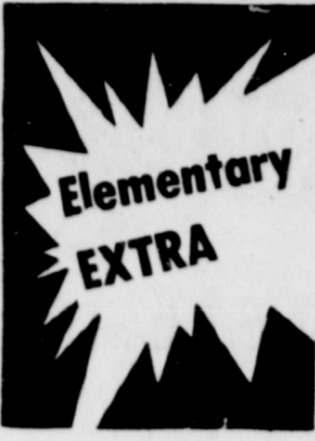

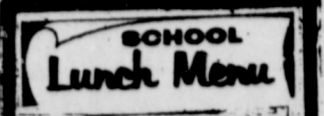

Don't be fuelish.

If we don't use our heads now we may freeze our tails later.

Here are a few cold facts for you:

Texas Department Of Public Safety Now Accepting Applications

Major E.K. Browning, Jr., Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety in Midland, announced that the Texas Department of Public Safety is now accepting applications for appointment for the position of Patrolman. General qualifications for DPS Patrolmen and DPS Patrolwomen are these: Applicants must be 20 through 35 years of age (inclusive); good moral character; excellent physical condition; height not less than 68 inches nor more than 76 inches; weight not less than 20 pounds nor more than 3 1/2 pounds per inch of height; visual acuity no worse than 20 - 40 correctable to 20 - 20; and a citizen of the United States. Persons selected as Cadets will be assigned to Austin for an 18 week Training School beginning June 11, 1974, at the DPS Academy. Qualified female applicants are now being accepted for the Uniformed Services of the DPS, and the Department has been increasingly successful in recruiting persons from minority groups.

During the Training School, Cadets will receive a salary of \$630.00 per month. After graduation, Cadets will be commissioned as Probationary Patrolman I at a salary of \$719.00 per month and assigned to the Highway Patrol, License and Weight Service, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service or Driver License Service according to the needs of DPS and consideration of personal preference. The salary automatically increases to \$743.00 per month after six months and to \$794.00 after 12 months. Officers are eligible to compete for promotion to Patrolman II after 60 months Commissioned Service.

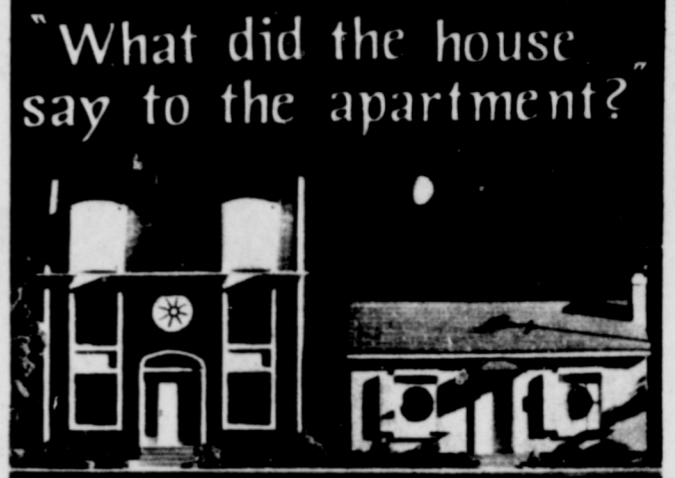


