

## Bob Bullock Campaigns In Eastland

Bob Bullock, former Secretary of State, and now a candidate for State Comptroller, campaigned in Eastland this week. Bullock, 44, was the first Democratic candidate to announce for state office.

Born in Hillsboro, Bullock received his bachelors degree from Texas Tech in 1955 and earned his law degree in 1958 from Baylor Law School.

He served two terms as a

member of the Texas House of Representatives, Chief of the Anti-Trust and Consumer Protection Division of the Attorney General's Office and Chief Legal Counsel for the Governor.

Most noteworthy, however, was Bullock's tenure as Secretary of State of Texas. There, he worked hard to clean up campaign financing in Texas and developed a fair and economical elections system.

Initial distribution of the 1974 Texas Official Highway Travel Map was announced today by the Texas Highway Department.

During the year some one million copies will be distributed to Texas drivers.

making the map one of the most popular publications in the state.

In this era of fuel conservation, an accurate, up-to-date map is valuable tool in charting short-line distances, a Highway spokesman said.

Although other means of transit are much in the news, the spokesman emphasized that highway travel by all types of motor vehicles will remain the dominant mode of transportation because of the state's sprawling geography.

Travelers are reminded that the map offers far more than most users realize. Study of the 1974 map legend shows that may typography indicates relative sizes of all cities and towns. Each type of highway is scribed differently, from Interstate routes to Farm Roads. Convenient red mileage figures tabulate total miles between major points.

Every rest along Texas high ways is indicated, those with rest rooms are shown by a different symbol. All state parks are pinpointed by number, symbol, and grid coordinates. There are even altitude readings for each county seat.

The back of the map is devoted to enlarged of all major population areas with main-line "through routes" clearly shown. On the Dallas-Fort Worth diagram, the immense new regional airport appears for the first time.

For travelers who wish more help in planning the Texas trips, the map pinpoints the Highway Department's 11 tourist information bureaus and visitor centers, where personal assistance by trained travel counselors is available.

Copies of the free map can be obtained at the tourist information centers, Highway Department district offices, or by mail from the Texas Highway Department, Travel and Information Division, P.O. Box 5064, Austin, Texas 78763.

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# Gordon Spot

It's been a long time since clouds have been seen over Eastland County. That is - - until last Wednesday when a few low clouds appeared. People got excited and many were standing and looking into the sky hoping for rain.

The warm clear weather may be good for the energy crisis, but it sure doesn't help the grass and crop prospects. One farmer was overheard saying, "This beautiful wintery weather caused me to go broke once before."

James Dabney, Eastland weather observer, called Tuesday evening to report that the relative humidity was 7½ percent at 7:30 p.m. That is just about desert conditions.

This dry condition points out the necessity to water lawns, trees, and ornamentals. It should also remind us of the need to prevent and look out for grass fires.

If you are a home gardener or home fruit grower I hope you have planned to attend the vegetable and fruit meeting in Cisco Tuesday. It will be in the American Legion Hall at 2:00 p.m.

Small, light, green leaves and short shoot growth on trees usually indicate a need for fertilizer.

If the terminal growth is good and the leaves are a healthy green, the trees are getting enough nutrients from the soil and from lawn fertilizer. Such trees will grow faster and withstand drought, insects, and disease much better than undernourished trees.

If you need to fertilize, the time to do it is late winter or early spring, between now and April. Do not fertilize newly planted trees since the soil filled in around the roots has adequate nutrients for a year's growth.

Nitrogen fertilizer is scarce this year, but nitrogen is the most important element for trees. Ammonium nitrate and ammonium sulfate are two good tree fertilizers that are high in Nitrogen. If you can't buy these, other forms of fertilizer may be used. The first number in the analysis is the percent of Nitrogen. In general apply one to two pounds of fertilizer per inch of the tree trunk's diameter at four feet above the ground. The amount may vary depending on the age and vigor of the tree.

Apply the fertilizer to the feeder root zone so that it can be absorbed. This zone usually begins about two feet from the

area. Lawn damage may occur if the fertilizer is applied to the surface at high rates.

Peanut producers in Eastland County will have an opportunity to attend a peanut short course in Gorman, February 25, 26, and 27th. The short course will be held in the Forman High School Auditorium beginning at 7:30 p.m. each evening.

Eight speakers have been secured for the three night short course. Topics will include seed bed preparation, seeding, varieties, fertilizing, insect and disease control, irrigation, economics of production, situation of the peanut program and a report from the peanut producers board.

A lawn spreader can also be used to spread fertilizer over the feeder roots. Scatter the material evenly at a rate up to 20 pounds of ammonium nitrate per 1000 square feet of surface

**MASTER MIX RECIPE**  
9 cups sifted all purpose flour  
one third cup double acting baking powder  
1 tbs. salt  
2 tps. cream of tartar  
¾ cup sugar  
2 cups shortening

Stir baking powder, salt, cream of tartar and sugar into flour. Sift together 3 times into a large mixing bowl. Cut in shortening with a pastry blender until the mix is the consistency of corn meal. Store in covered containers at room temperature. To measure themaster mix, pile it lightly into cup and level off with a spatula.

Stir corn meal, salt and sugar into the mix. Combine milk and beaten egg. Add to the mix, stirring until blended. Bake in greased pan at 425 degrees about 30 minutes. Makes 10 by 10 inch pan of corn bread.

hot cakes or waffles  
3 cups mix

1½ cups milk  
1 egg, beaten

Stir the combined milk and beaten egg into the mix until well blended. Bake on hot griddle or in waffle iron. Makes 18 griddle cakes or 6 waffles.

An inexpensive way to clean the copper bottoms of pans is to scour them with 3 tablespoons of coarse salt and ½ cup white vinegar.

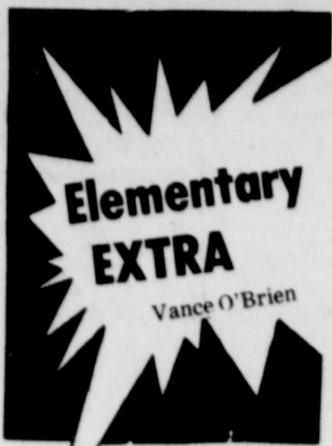

## Demands Contine For Government Take Over Health Facilities

The Demand continues for the federal government to take over the health facilities and medical profession in this country.

Last year the bill for personal health in America was \$83 billion, which was twice the total of 1967. Doctors are no better off personally. Inflation is the villain.

Sen. Ted Kennedy, who easily could be the next president of the United States, is pushing his own bill in the Senate. It would set up a compulsory system run by the federal government with broad benefits.

It would be financed by dipping into the federal Treasury, plus a 3.5 percent payroll tax on employers and a 1 percent levy on employees. A realistic estimate on the cost of Kennedy's plan is nearly four times the figure he projected originally. His plan is basically the same as Britain's "socialized" system.

An American medical educator now teaching in Britain, Dr. Paul Beeson, said that the government-supervised British system is working well, that the doctors - who originally fought it - now like it and U.S. doctors should voluntarily adopt certain aspects of it.

A Dallas doctor, who spent three weeks in London recently, said he was pleasantly surprised at the quality of medical care and impressed with how well the "socialistic" scheme works.

But a London surgeon, talking to a Dallas orthopedist recently, said that if an elderly Britisher broke his hip tomorrow, or had to have major hip repair, he would have to wait a year for a hospital bed.

These demands and a gradual shift in sentiment continue in spite of impressive advances in the quality and quantity of American health care. Consider this:

- Ninety-eight percent of all babies in America are now born in a hospital and between 25 and 35 - depending on the locality - are charity cases. No other country can match these figures, if you include, too, our low fatality rate.

- We are one of the few countries in the world where the ratio of doctors to patients is increasing. In 1960 there was one doctor for every 712 of us; today it is one for 630. This ratio is better than that of any other country in the world.

- Physicians' fees - a sore point with those always complaining about the cost in America - have not increased as much as the overall cost of living. Doctors have to eat, you know. Doctors' fees are less than 20 percent of the total cost of health care.

- As for the complaint that this country doesn't have enough doctors: In 1960, American medical schools were accepting 8,550 first-year students; eleven years later the figure had jumped to 12,360. In 1976, new students accepted will exceed 15,000 a year. Better distribution, geographically, is being sought by the profession.

- Hospitals are the item which have contributed most to the increase in health costs here. And they can't help that; inflation and the enormous item of overhead are the basic reasons. Wages and salaries account for 60 percent of the average hospital's budget.

This amazing comment was made not long ago in Fortune Magazine: "Whether poor or not, most Americans are badly served by an obsolete, over-strained medical system. The management of medical care has become too important to leave to doctors."

By the same reasoning, publishing has become too important to leave to publishers; farming too complicated to leave to farmers; banking too vital to leave to bankers; babies too numerous to leave to mothers; teaching too important to leave to teachers.

Doctors do not want total responsibility, but in any system of medical care they have t be the basic players. In final analysis, it is they and only they who determine the quality of care.

Finally, there is the element of justice and fairness; and it was expressed well recently in this question by Gov. Reagan of California: "By what right in this country can a government tell the men and women of any profession that in order to practice their art they have to become government em-

ployees?"

If Washington can take over a doctor's practice and career, it can also enter a man's restaurant and take over his cash register. It can tell the publisher of a newspaper to move out and take his staff with him. It can take over a bank and tell its board, executive staff and stockholders that they no longer run the institution.

If medical care is socialized, in brief, what about lawyers and accountants? Are they next? And where does it end?

Engineers usually recommend a minimum of six inches of insulation for the ceiling, four inches for the outside walls and, if construction is pier-and-beam, two inches under the floor. **Keep the filters clean.** Dirty filters restrict air flow and cause the equipment to work harder and use more electricity.

A lower thermostat setting will result in less energy use. The setting of 65°-68° has been recommended for energy conservation. If you are going to be away, turn your thermostat down to a lower setting or turn it off unless freezing weather could damage plumbing and appliances.

**Weatherstrip doors and windows** to help seal in the heat you're paying for. **Keep the damper tightly closed** when the fireplace is not in use to prevent air leakage.
