Peanut Short Course

Peanut production for maximum profits will be discussed at a Peanut Short Course to be conducted in Gorman Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday nights, Feb. 25, 26 and 27. All three sessions will be in the Gorman High School Auditorium beginning at 7:30 each evening.

Eight peanut specialists and officials are scheduled for the program reports County Agent DeMarquis Gordon. The short course was planned by the peanut committee to help growers increase production efficiency.

The topics to be discussed on Monday night are peanut disease control, peanut insect control, and the peanut support program situation. The speakers will be Dr. Thomas Lee, Extension Plant Pathologist; Dr. Cliff

Hoelscher, Extension Entomologist; Ross Wilson, Manager of Southwestern Peanut Growers Association.

Three speakers will also be on the Tuesday night program. Wayne Keese, Extension Irrigation Specialist, will discuss irrigation and water management. James Denton will speak on economics of production. Wayne Eaves, Executive Secretary of Texas Peanut Producers Board, will give a report of the TPPB.

On Wednesday night two Extension Agronomists will speak. Ben Spears will cover soil preparation, seeding, and weed control. Dr. John Chapin will discuss varieties and soil fertility.

Gordon said all peanut growers are urged to attend all three sessions.

Electric Bill Increase And New Sewer Plant Top Subjects

Spring will bring increased electric bills and an important surge of environmental construction here.

Eastland customers will see an electric rate increase of about nine percent on the first bills received in April and construction on the city's new sewer plant should get underway soon thereafter.

Eastland City Commission gave Texas Electric Service Co. second reading on an ordinance okaying the hike.

Good news on the sewer plant came at the Monday night meeting with Engineer Billy Jacobs of the firm of Yeatts and Decker reporting that the Environmental Protection Agency had given verbal go-ahead to seek bids for building the city's treatment plant. Date set for the opening is March 22 at 1:30 p.m. at the City Hall, with bid advertising to begin immediately. Job is planned for 300 calendar days, Jacobs reports, and he guesses that Eastland should get from five to eight bidders.

The plant plans have been a long time in the making but apparently now appear ready for progress. Voters okayed

Mason W. Altman, 65, retired manager of accounting for West Texas Utilities Company was found dead about 8:30 p.m. Thursday at his home, 1850 Chestnut, after an apparent heart attack. Services were at 2:30 p.m. Saturday at St. Paul United Methodist Church in Abilene.

Dr. Frank D. Charlton, pastor, officiated with burial in Elmwood Memorial Park.

Mr. Altman retired Sept. 1, 1973, after more than 42 years of active service with WTU. His career began in 1930 when he joined the company as a clerk in the general office.

In 1943 he left WTU to enter the Air Force, returning two years later to become chief statistical clerk. He was promoted in 1960 to assistant statistician and in 1962 to manager of WTU's statistical section, and became manager of accounting in June of 1972.

Born Aug. 26, 1908, at Loraine, Mr. Altman attended public school in Arlington and graduated from Arlington High School in 1926. He attended the University of Texas at Arlington and received his BBA degree from UT at Austin in 1930, moving then to Abilene.

He and his wife, the former Avis Claire Graham, were married in Abilene on Oct. 14, 1933. She died April 21, 1970.

Survivors are a daughter, Mrs. Bill (Kay) Turney of Lawton, Okla.; two grandchildren; a brother, F.B. Altman of 1802 Sayles; and three sisters, Mrs. Sidney Lee Robertson of Eastland, Mrs. Edith Terry of Cisco and Miss Wanda Altman of Baird.

Commissioner Jay Staggs spoke in favoring of establishing a system of "good city business" practices, due to the city's continued growth, citing specifically the need for uniform building codes which would control zoning and building, and the establishment of standard operating procedures for the various city departments.

He displayed the SOP for the Police Dept. development by Chief John Morren, which spells out the duties and

responsibilities of each member of the department.

No action was taken but commissioners were generally in agreement with the need for standardization.

Commissioners went into executive session at the close of the meeting to discuss personnel matters.

Study On Radiation On Skin And Eyes To Be Conducted

COLLEGE STATION - A study on the effects of radiation on skin and eyes conducted at Texas A&M University has received additional funding from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. Directed by Dr. Dan Hightower, associate professor of veterinary physiology and pharmacology, the study is in its fifth year.

The \$9,000 extension grant brings the total research funding for the project to more than \$500,000. Co-principal investigator on the project is Dr. James B. Smathers of TAMU's Nuclear Engineering Department. The study deals with cataracts in dogs and rabbits formed by low energy protons like those found in outer space.

The researchers are trying to define latent periods, if any, in the formation time of the eye inflections. Dr. Hightower said his study has shown that rabbits are affected by the radiation sooner than dogs, but he added this is an expected trait. A 1947 graduate of TAMU in Veterinary Medicine, Dr. Hightower is a native of

Clerical Employees Wanted By The FBI

ATTENTION: High School Graduates, Business, Junior and Senior College Students

The Dallas Office of the FBI, through its Special Agent in Charge, Mr. J. Gordon Shanklin, has announced it is again in urgent need of clerical employees to fill the positions of Clerk and Typist at Bureau headquarters in Washington, D.C. To qualify for the Stenographer position applicants must pass a three minute dictation test at the rate of eighty words per minute; pass a five minute typing test at the rate of forty words per minute; pass a twenty word spelling test; and a twenty word vocabulary test.

Qualified stenographers must be willing to accept a Typist position until vacancies for the Stenographer position exist.

The FBI is only interested in above average young men and women. WASHINGTON, D.C. - IN THESE TIMES WHEN THE SLIGHTEST MORSEL of good news is likely to be pounced on as if it were a sirlon steak, it was a welcome sight to meet up with a couple of barn owls last week on our farm in Jones County.

NOW, THIS IS NO EARTH-SHAKING EVENT BUT, as

mundane as it may be, it was good to know that they were back after a two to three year absence. (Actually there is no certainty that there was a pair. It is possible that the same one was seen twice but it is better to assume they constitute a family and in the Spring there will be some owlets.)

WHAT MAKES THIS IN-

TERESTING, AT LEAST TO US, is the fact we used to think it sport and good riddance to shoot almost any wildlife with our 22 rifle, including barn owls, until there were few left. When the owls were gone, mice and other undesirables took over.

ANOTHER INTERESTING COINCIDENCE WITH MEETING UP with Jerry and Alice (again assuming there are two, one a boy and the other a girl) is that a pair of solemn, monkey-faced barn owls have just been installed in one of the topmost towers of the Smithsonian Institution's old red castle on the Mall in Washington.


AT ONE TIME THIS PINNACLE WAS OCCUPIED by a pair of falcons. Then there got to be several falcons and complaints were made that they were killing off the birds of the District of Columbia, Maryland and Virginia. They were ousted from their homes in the Smithsonian and the tower of the old Post Office Building.

IT HAS BEEN NEARLY 25 YEARS SINCE THE CASTLE last put up an owl. Earlier ones left when Dr. Alexander Wetmore, the noted ornithologist, retired at the age of 89 as Secretary of the Smithsonian. It was Dr. Wetmore who gave a hoot and each time the barn owls were accused of being a nuisance, he put up a hoot. The main complaint, so the story goes, was that at night the owl hoots spooked the guards and they insisted one or the other had to go.

WELL, NOW ONCE AGAIN A PAIR OF YOUNG OWLS HAVE BEEN ENSCONCED in the same old tower, a gift of the National Zoo, which it is said, is up to its hips in owls. The young hooters will be hand-fed there for several months until they have produced a brood (unlike most birds, according to the owlogists, the incubation starts with the first egg laid) and once the owlets have hatched, the window niches will be opened and the parents will be free to shop the city for meat just like everybody else.

IT'S KIND OF NICE THAT SOMEONE STILL GIVES A HOOT. AN AUTHOR, WHO REMAINS UNIDENTIFIED, has expressed his respect for the owl in a manner which may be more timely today than when written:

"A wise old owl lived in an oak;
The more he saw, the less he spoke;
The less he spoke, the more he heard;
Why can't we all be like that bird?"





From Lightning Bug To Mercury Vapor

From the lightning bug to the mercury vapor could have been title for James Smith as he talked of lights, modern and ancient, and why they're "lamps" and not "bulbs".

Speaking at the Tuesday Luncheon at the Ramada Inn, the Texas Electric Service Co. lighting specialist also put the "bee" on what he called the hocus - pocus of "long life" light bulbs - often sold at \$1.98 each by specialty houses.

He touched on voltage, watts, lumines, candlepower, extended life and long life lamps.

Going back, Smith explained that original man made

illumination was of the torch variety from about 4,000 BC, up until 1,000 BC when the oil lamp came into vogue. These, "of pork or mutton probably" served until about 1640 AD when whale oil came into its own, he explained.

Some unusual lights had to be the Shetland Islanders' "bird" flares (simply ignited dried birds on a stick), and the Danes' Great Auk (new extinct, for obvious reasons).

The American colonists came up with their bayberry candles, replaced in about 1800 by the tallow candle and in 1859 by oil candles. Development of oil

made kerosene and natural gas best lights in the 1870s and kerosene the chief product of Standard Oil Co. in 1880.

The electric lamp was developed in 1882, further developed in 1902, and in 1930, the fluorescent lamp came out. The popular street light mercury vapor was introduced in 1940.

Smith demonstrated many bulbs and suggested that for a long life selection, make it a 130 volt, which are available just about anywhere.
