Rev. Back From Holy Land

Rev. Ben Marney of the First United Methodist Church is back to Eastland from the Holy Land.

In fact, he beat a post card mailed the 7th of January from Jerusalem; it arrived Tuesday the 15th.

He arrived back Thursday the 10th in the early morning, 35 hours after he left Israel.

"I was busy all the time," said Marney. "It was a once in a lifetime thing and I figured I could sleep after I got home."

Marney traveled on the regular Holy Land tour with a group of professors, students and other interested persons from Texas Wesleyan College in Fort Worth.

He left Dallas early in the morning of Jan. 1 and never seemed to get to sleep until returning home. During that time he lived a dream he'd had for a long time - visiting the Holy Land.

Jan. 2 and 3 he spent in Athens. The outstanding thing there was the Acropolis, where the Greeks had temples to their pagan gods. And the preacher was impressed by Mars Hill where Paul preached his sermon to the Athenians, saying the Lord was the only God. And he visited Corinth, one of the main places Paul visited, where he had some of his greatest success.

Thursday, Jan. 4, Marney flew to Israel where he spent the next five days touring the Holy Land. Marney compared the trip to going back to where he was born. In a religious sense, he went back to the beginning of his faith, to where it came from.

There were so many places and so much fast travel, he found it difficult to get an impression.

"There were too many places and things to grasp and comprehend at once," he admitted, "for here were all the significant things that I had read about in the Bible since I was a child."

To him it was a very good experience, for he saw firsthand all the places he had read and preached about so

many times.

FIRST DAY The first day the group visited around Jerusalem at Bethany and Bethlehem. They toured the Hebrew University where the Dead Sea Scrolls are kept. And they climbed Mt. Zion, and saw the Mount of Olives in Gethsemane, the traditional site of the Last Supper.

THE SECOND DAY Marney spent in a walking tour of old Jerusalem. The group wound up outside the Damascus gate at the place called Golgotha and the Garden tomb. There they observed the "Lord's Supper."

THIRD DAY SUNDAY Marney took a guided bus north. The group held their morning worship service at Jacob's Well near the town of Sychar. Then they drove across the Plains of Sharon to the ruins of the ancient Roman City, Caesera. There they toured the 28 levels of ancient Megiddo and walked through its water tunnels which were built 700 years before Christ was born. They passed the modern town of Haifa on the Mediterranean which is next to Mt. Carmel.

The warm weather last week reminds us that spring is not very far away. However, we know there will be several more weeks of winter and plenty of time to transplant ornamentals, fruit trees, and nut trees.

The supply of fruit and nut trees are low so we suggest that you order your trees now if you have not already done so. By ordering early, you may get the pick of the best trees and varieties available.

All trees should be ordered from reliable nurseries. Always insist on disease-free stock. And, for satisfactory performance, order trees that are adapted to our locality. Just because trees are available, don't assume that they are adapted to the local area.

For peach and plum trees, select year-old plants that are three to five feet high. Apple and pear trees should be four to six feet tall. Such trees will transplant easily and will become established quickly. Excessively large, bare-rooted trees should not be purchased.

When selecting peach and plum trees, get trees that are on nemaguard rootstock if they are available. This rootstock is resistant to rootknot nematodes.

At present, fruit trees with dwarfing rootstocks, other than apple trees, are not suitable for growing conditions in Eastland County. Plants with dwarfing rootstocks are available in other states but do not produce quality fruit when planted here. Apple trees with dwarfing rootstock bear fruit earlier than standard trees and can be sprayed and cared for more easily.

Making necessary preparations for planting the trees before you get them so there will be no delay in getting the trees transplanted when you get them home.

Proper planting is also very important when transplanting pecan trees. The three keys to success in transplanting this popalut tree are starting with vigorous and fresh pecan nursery stock; keeping the root system moist at all times, and

fourths full of the top soil and water should be added to settle the soil, eliminate air pockets and to keep the roots moist. After watering, loose soil should be added to complete the hole filling. It's a good idea to leave a basin around the tree to facilitate future waterings.

The training of the young tree should start after the second growing season. The tree should be pruned so that it will grow into a strong tree capable of holding up well under heavy nut crops and will not be subject to storm damage.

Publications on transplanting woody plants and on planting and training pecan trees are available at the County Extension Office.

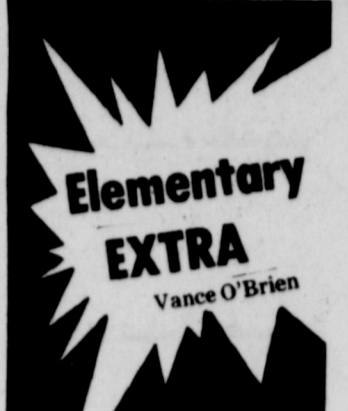

Proposed Peanut Program Changes Catastrophic To Texas Peanut Farmers

A farm leader told Denton County peanut farmers that proposed legislative changes to the peanut program would be catastrophic to Texas Peanut Farmers.

Texas Farmers Union President, Jay Naman of Waco, addressing a chili supper in the community center at Pilot Point, Texas, Thursday night, lashed out at the Administration in what he called, "Phony spokesmen for peanut producers" who have endorsed radical legislative changes to the price support program for peanuts.

Naman said, "The Administration has announced six proposed administrative changes in the peanut program that would impose great hardship on peanut producers. These changes have been carefully designed by USDA to create such resentment among farmers that they will go along with efforts by the Department of Agriculture to change the peanut program legislatively. This is clearly unconscionable coercion."

Naman said that recent meetings of so called "peanut farmer representatives" in Washington are not legitimate farmer meetings. He said, "The Peanut Steering Committee that is promoting changes in the peanut program does not represent the thinking of Texas peanut producers and is in fact a coalition of peanut processors and representatives from commodity organizations that are controlled by Department of Agriculture policy." Naman said that Texas peanut farmers want no part of proposed changes in the peanut program and are willing to fight to preserve their program in tact.

The state farm leader pointed out that efforts to pattern the peanut program along the lines of the 1973 Farm Act would be unworkable. He defended the present peanut program as one that has protected the income of peanut producers and provide the consumer with an adequate supply of high quality, low cost peanuts. He said that efforts that are being made to relax

the marketing quotas and to permit excess acres will eventually destroy the effectiveness of the peanut program and move the production out of the hands of the family farmers in traditional peanut producing areas.

Naman said that Farmers Union would continue to fight to preserve the present price support and marketing quota program for peanuts.

Farmer's Income Tax Meet Will Be Conducted

A Farmer's Income Tax meeting will be conducted by the Agricultural Extension Service, Wednesday, Jan. 23. The meeting will be held in the Eastland County Farm Bureau building on Highway 80 East of Eastland, County Agent De Gordon said the meeting is being planned to help farm families with their income tax reporting.

James Denton Jr., will discuss the new changes in the income tax for the 1973 tax year. He will also answer questions about depreciation, capital gains, and losses, deductions and other items of importance on the tax forms.

The Farmer's Tax Guide will be available to everyone. The County Agent said he will also have farm record keeping books for anyone who wants to

use the record system. Gordon adds that everyone is welcome to attend all or any part of the meeting.

Insulation is important and can pay for itself by lowering your heating (and cooling) costs. You can save as much as 20% or more on energy consumption if your home is insulated to meet FHA standards. Engineers usually recommend a minimum of six inches of insulation for the ceiling, four inches for the outside walls and, if construction is pier-and-beam, two inches under the floor. Keep the filters clean. Dirty filters restrict air flow and cause the equipment to work harder and use more electricity.

A lower thermostat setting will result in less energy use. The setting of 65°-68° has been recommended for energy conservation. If you are going to be away, turn your thermostat down to a lower setting or turn it off unless freezing weather could damage plumbing and appliances. Weatherstrip doors and windows to help seal in the heat you're paying for. Keep the damper tightly closed when the fireplace is not in use to prevent air leakage.

He and Eastland School
Superintendent Wendell Seibert
have been working on the
vocational busing program for
the past few months.

"The busing is mainly for the
safety of the students", said
Hughes. However, it will also
be a great gas saver and
energy conserver, since
vocational students have had to
drive private cars to classes in
Cisco before.

More Qualified Engineers Needed

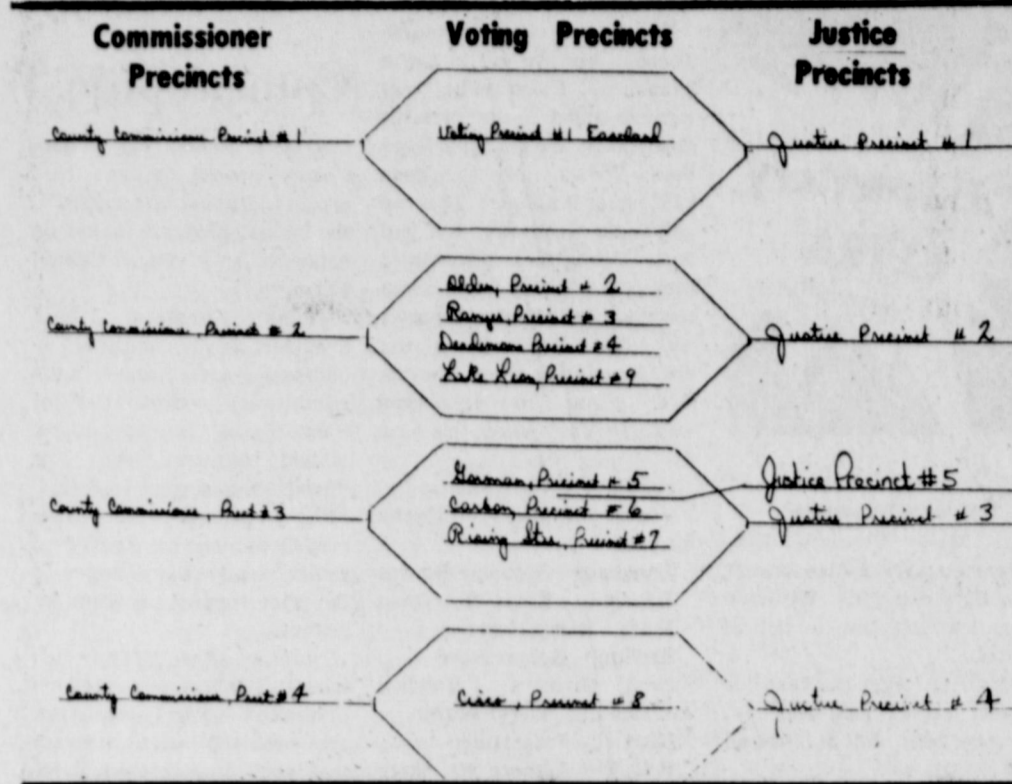
Qualified engineers
