HIGHWAYS ARE important to Eastland - all good ones lead here!

And during the National Highway Week, it's a good time to tip the hat to the men who make and keep our superior highways.

The folks out at the Resident Engineer Office on East Main St. will be extending special invitations to come by and visit Thursday. 'Course you're always welcome, but they've set aside Thursday as a good day to visit. There'll probably be a coffee pot around, and Resident Engineer R. P. Haun will be on hand to visit.

There's quite a bit of highway in progress in the county right now. The Interstate 20 leg between Ranger and Eastland is a building and Spur 490 which will link Int. 20 to Old 80, west of Eastland could be open in some six weeks, affording Eastlanders another access at the West Gate.

Mr. Haun says the route through Cisco where the old overpass is being removed is progressing nicely and barring bad weather, as highway men always have to, could be open in a couple or three weeks.

It was as recently as 1961 that the celebration called Highway Week became an official thing. That year Congress passed a House resolution designating a week for observance. Lorne Greene Hollywood actor of "Bonanza" fame is honorary chairman of this year's National Highway Week. In Texas the week is jointly sponsored by the Texas Highway Department and the Texas Good Roads Association.

At the Ramada Inn kickoff in a joint meeting between the Lions and Rotary Clubs, a surprise honor came when President Lasater, last year's drive chairman, called James Reid forward and presented him a plaque, given by the past drive chairmen for his 14 years service as treasurer for the United Fund in Eastland.

"There's no way of knowing how many crippled children are walking or how many youngsters are playing baseball today, thanks to James' dedication in helping the drive chairmen live through the campaigns." Reid is assisting Treasurer Richard Watson this year.

Last year the Eastland United Fund was first in the state in percent of goal reached and second in the state in per capita giving.

Lasater called the effort the best alternate ever to having your evening meal interrupted on 16 different occasions by 16 different agencies.

He urged a swift and generous wrap-up.

The 1972 budget was \$8,875 and the drive resulted in a \$12,055 victory, for \$3.54 per capita giving.

The goal for 1971 resulted 102.7 percent effort.

This year's goal has been set at \$9,425.00.

The following 1973 budget has been announced: Camp Fire Girls \$200; Teenage League \$1100.00; Boy Scouts \$1500, an increase of \$100 over last year;

Salvation Army \$775; Muscular Dystrophy \$450; Red Cross \$1,000; U.S.O. \$200; Little League \$1300; an increase of \$200 over last year; Birth Defects and Arthritis \$100; Cancer \$100; Heart \$100; Texas United Fund \$50.00; Eastland Welfare Association \$500; West Texas Rehabilitation Center \$1400, an increase of \$1100 over last year; Local Contingency Fund \$100, a decrease of \$200 from last year; Girls' Softball \$500; and Campaign Expenses \$50, a decrease of \$150 from last year.

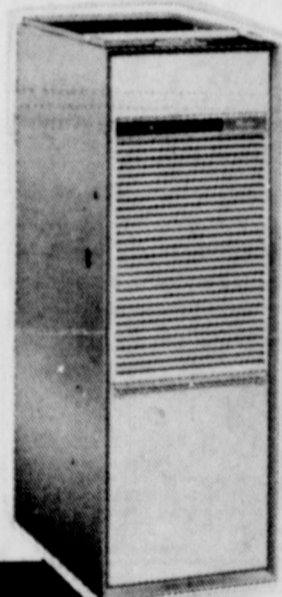

T.S.T.A. Urge Support Of Voters On Nov. 6

AUSTIN - The Texas State Teachers association is urging its 157,000 members to vote for passage of constitutional amendment No. 1 on Nov. 6.

Amendment No. 1, if approved by a majority of Texas voters, would authorize annual sessions of the Legislature and a pay raise for its members, from the present \$4,800 per year to a constitutional limit of \$15,000 per year.

TSTA support for the amendment was recommended by its legislative committee and approved by its executive committee, governing body of elected representatives from the 20 TSTA district organizations.

L. P. Surgeon, executive secretary, noted that TSTA has a long record of support for past proposals for legislative pay raises.

"Legislative decisions have a vital effect on Texas citizens," Sturgeon said. "Texas should have full service from its lawmakers, and these men and women should have reasonable pay for their work. Their present pay does not permit them to work without financial sacrifice."

Under Amendment No. 1, legislators would be required to work longer. The legislative sessions in odd-numbered years would be increased from 140 to 180 days, and a 60-day session would be added in even-numbered years for budget making.

FARM NEWS

COLLEGE STATION - Use of improper equipment or equipment that is improperly adjusted costs the Southwestern peanut producer money due to reduced quality and grade of the crop.

"Losses due to excessive split kernels, loose shelled kernels and foreign material amounted to over \$6 per ton or almost \$1.5 million for Texas producers alone in 1972", says James S. Denton, area economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Excessive kernel splitting caused the average producer in Texas to be penalized a dollar per ton of peanuts in 1972. Some crop peanuts had as much as 12 percent split kernels and were penalized \$6.40 per ton. Total cost to the Texas farmers was over \$240,000 in 1972.

"Farmers' stock peanuts must be stored and held until they can be shelled and used", points out the Texas A&M University System specialist. "The number of splits increases as the storage time increases, transferring the problem from the farmer to the sheller. While drying during storage contributes to the splitting problem, the big causes are the harvesting and drying procedures used by producers."

The worst cause of splitting is excessive heat during the artificial drying operation. Other causes are excessive combine field speed, excessive combine cylinder speed, improper combine adjustments, rough handling and walking on loose or bagged peanuts. Rain and high temperatures during field curing also cause peanut kernels to split.

"Not much can be done about the last two items, but plenty can be done about the others," adds Denton.

proper combine adjustments and rough handling. Foreign material is another culprit which penalizes the peanut producers, says Denton.

V.A.T. Offers Preventions

Don Griffin, Vocational Agriculture Teacher at Eastland High School offers the following suggestions for preventing accidents and injuries around your home or on your farm or ranch. The information is provided by H. Cleve Walkup, Farm Electrification Specialist with the Agricultural Education Specialist Program at Texas A&M University.

Fires, drownings, firearms, falls, and tractors cause the largest number of deaths on farms. Animal accidents, machines, and suffocation rank next as killers. Animal accidents, mostly horses, kill as many as electricity, poisoning and lightning combined.

Careless handling of fuels, carelessness with matches, and smoking causes the most fires. Lightning causes many more fires than fatalities, and so does electricity and overloaded wiring. Drowning and suffocation accidents claim a staggering number of victims under five years of age.

You can help prevent fires by more careful handling of fuels, providing adequate wiring to prevent overloads, and providing lightning protection for buildings and equipment. Teaching children to swim early in life and learning water safety rules early could save many of these little people from drowning. Remember that stings from flying insects kill more people than snake bites and spider bites combined.

What have you done lately to eliminate a hazard, train an operator to protect himself, or change a habit to improve your own safety at work, at home or in recreation?

Fancy Figuring Was Called For Determining Rates

Fancy figuring was called for in determining a new city water rate, sufficient to meet the city's requirements for the increased Water District rate. City Manager Lewis Tiner, his efficient office staff and a certified public accountant worked to arrive at what is believed to be adequate rates.

In the research necessary to accomplish such a project, some interesting data turns up. It was decided to pick three representative months to estimate the total yearly usage; a low medium and high month were needed. December, March and July were selected.

There were 1,499 customers (both inside and outside the city but not including the adjoining water system customers) Naturally there are more customers who use the minimum of 3,000 gallons a month - except for the watering month of July, then the trend is reversed. In

December 677 customers used 3,000 or less; 137 used 10,000 or over. In July, 672 customers used over 10,000, and 272 used below the minimum 3,000. The city billed for \$7,935.79 in December; \$9,474.28 in March; and \$14,129.14 in July.
