White Slavery Charges Filed

A 29-year-old woman faced charges under the Mann Act this morning in Federal Court in Abilene after she was charged in Ranger Friday of transportation of a second woman across a state line for immoral purposes.

Charges were filed against Mrs. Ann Hagler after Francis Louise Blackmon told the Ranger Police Department, Sheriff J. B. Williams and an FBI agent Friday that Mrs. Hagler had forced her into prostitution by threatening to have law officials take her children into protective custody.

In a statement to representatives of the three law offices Friday, Miss Blackmon said that she came willingly to Ranger with Mrs. Hagler about March 19. Two men took the two women to Sheffield, Alabama the following day. The children belonging to Miss Blackmon and a third belonging to Mrs. Hagler were left in Ranger.

On arrival at a hotel at Sheffield, Miss Blackmon said that Mrs. Hagler advised that they would have to go to "work" if she did not willingly obey her commands. She would report to authorities that Miss Blackmon's six month old daughter was born while she was married and that the baby would be taken away from her.

The following day, Mrs. Hagler left Sheffield and returned to Ranger, with a check for \$105. Miss Blackmon said that she did not know where the money had been obtained, leaving officials to believe that a vice syndicate had purchased the services of the 20-year-old woman.

Before Mrs. Hagler left Alabama, she secured from Miss Blackmon a release for the small daughter, which in substance said that the child was being given to Mrs. Hagler. The simple piece of paper was signed only by the two women involved.

Miss Blackmon returned to Ranger Friday to get her two children enroute to California after she had "worked" in Alabama long enough to gain bus fare.

Ranger police picked Miss Blackmon up here Friday when she returned for her children and later arrested Mrs. Hagler upon Miss Blackmon's statement.

A U. S. Marshall was expected to remove the attractive Mrs. Hagler from the Eastland County jail Saturday morning when she was lodged Friday night, to the federal jail in Abilene.

Officials feel that the arrest is likely to have repercussions over several states in the South.

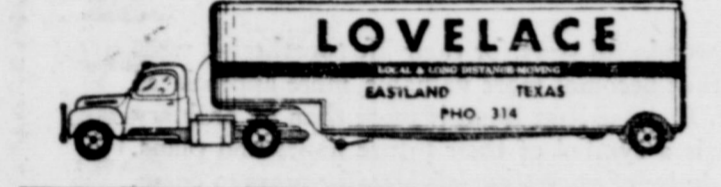
It will be the first time that prize money has been awarded at the show. The premiums were raised by the sponsoring association.
