Merit Raises Given City Employees

Priorities Set In City Work-Load

Nine city employees will receive merit pay raises as the result of action by the City Commission meeting in regular ession this week.

City Manager Lewis Tiner was given a vote of confidence for his faithful work for the

Mayor Durel Reid presided in lengthy meeting which also saw careful study given to a proposal for city cooperation in sewer line extension westward to the Camp Inspiration

The camp was annexed into the city last year, and the Rev. H.E. Hallenbeck and Darrell Basham, former Eastlander now of Graham and executive of the Church of God West Texas District which adasking assistance from the city in extending the sewer line from the Crestwood Addition by some 800 feet into the camp.

During a long discussion, it was agreed that the city would offer all help possible but within the bounds of the present work - load schedule. The church group would furnish the materials, but would ask that the city open the ditch and lay the pipe. Commissioners, in their effort to keep current projects on schedule, could not guarantee a time - limit promise on the project, but agreed to assist as possible.

Later, the commission asked that City Manager Lewis Tiner make up a current list of projects including the sewer plant development, the possible extension of sewer service northward to serve the airport area, completion work in the

Crestwood Addition. All future requests for city assistance will have to come before the commission on regular meeting nights to be considered for possible addition to the workload list. These are course extra - curricular projects and are handled by the city in addition to the city's other normal service functions.

The camp is presently using septic tanks but plans expansion which would call for additional sewer service. Of necessity, the ammerterzation would be long in that the camp presently is using some 65,000 gallons of water in three hot months, and about 10,000 gallons monthly the rest of the

It is hoped that the city can install the sewer line north in about four months in conjunction with the development of the new sewer plant project, which will probably be let for bids in January.
In a prepared statement, Mr.

Basham told the Commission: "It has been almost a year since District representatives met the Commission about annexation of Camp Inspiration. We were graciously accepted by you and our relationship of working

together has been very satisfactory in every respect. Mr. Tiner is to be commended for this fine relationship we have experienced.

Santa Claus

"We have seen many changes in growth this past year for the City and Camp Inspiration. Along with growth comes growing pains as we adjust to new and changing needs. At the Camp we have grown to need additional rest rooms and bath house facilities. These items have caused us to take another look at our sewer

We presently are using one 12,500 gallon and one 500 gallon septic tanks. During heavy summer use these have been loaded. With the approval this year to build the new rest rooms, we have decided to investigate the possibilities and expenses of tying to city

"As you recall, we requested that the 8" sewer main on Crestwood drive be extended to our property line whenever the line was laid in the new Crestwood addition. This extension was completed to the Camp in July this year. The Camp paid for the material and the City installed this ex-

"We started at the level of the 8" main at our property and made elevation shots into our camp area. These . elevations as shown on the attached sketch shows that our entire system sewer needs can be served by tying to City sewer.

"In our annexation meeting in January 1973, the City stated we, City and Camp, would continue to work together to serve the needs of the Camp along the lines of water and sewer. With this possibility we would like to discuss the size, location, costs, work involved, and fees for the project.
