WHEREAS the day of Thanksgiving has been established by national decree and tradition; and WHEREAS it is fitting that at this time of bountiful harvest; and

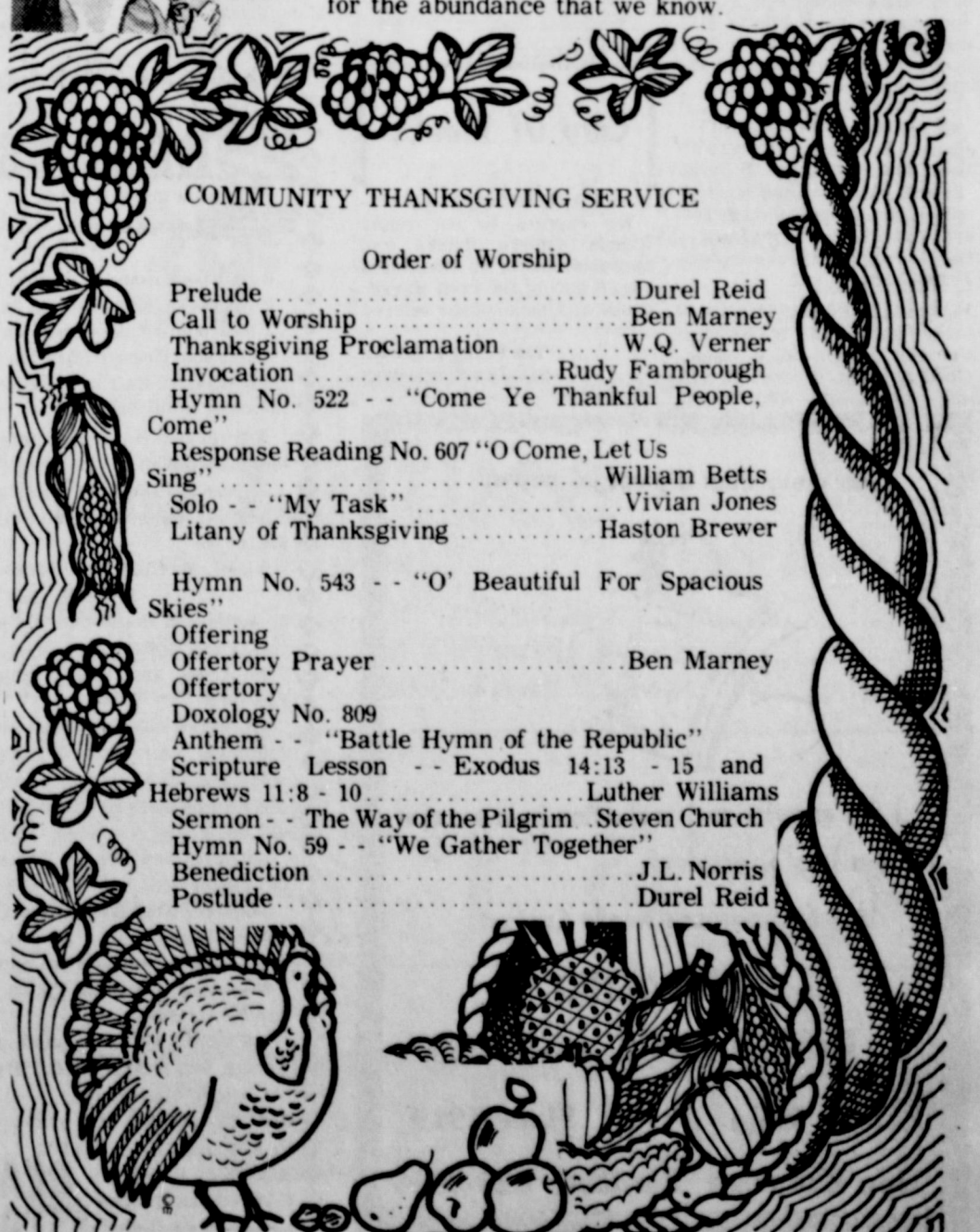
WHEREAS it is the nature of God - fearing and God - loving human beings to appoint special times to express sincere appreciation for the manifold blessings; and

Merit Raises Given City Employees

Priorities Set In City Work-Load

Nine city employees will receive merit pay raises as the result of action by the City Commission meeting in regular session this week.

City Manager Lewis Tiner was given a vote of confidence for his faithful work for the city.

Mayor Durel Reid presided in a lengthy meeting which also saw careful study given to a proposal for city cooperation in a sewer line extension westward to the Camp Inspiration grounds.

The camp was annexed into the city last year, and the Rev. H.E. Hallenbeck and Darrell Basham, former Eastlander now of Graham and executive of the Church of God West Texas District which administers the camp, appeared asking assistance from the city in extending the sewer line from the Crestwood Addition by some 800 feet into the camp.

During a long discussion, it was agreed that the city would offer all help possible but within the bounds of the present work - load schedule. The church group would furnish the materials, but would ask that the city open the ditch and lay the pipe. Commissioners, in their effort to keep current projects on schedule, could not guarantee a time - limit promise on the project, but agreed to assist as possible.

Later, the commission asked that City Manager Lewis Tiner make up a current list of projects including the sewer plant development, the possible extension of sewer service northward to serve the airport area, completion work in the Crestwood Addition.

All future requests for city assistance will have to come before the commission on regular meeting nights to be considered for possible addition to the workload list. These are of course extra - curricular projects and are handled by the city in addition to the city's other normal service functions.

The camp is presently using septic tanks but plans expansion which would call for additional sewer service. Of necessity, the ammeterization would be long in that the camp presently is using some 65,000 gallons of water in three hot months, and about 10,000 gallons monthly the rest of the year.

It is hoped that the city can install the sewer line north in about four months in conjunction with the development of the new sewer plant project, which will probably be let for bids in January.

In a prepared statement, Mr. Basham told the Commission: "It has been almost a year since District representatives met the Commission about annexation of Camp Inspiration. We were graciously accepted by you and our relationship of working

together has been very satisfactory in every respect. Mr. Tiner is to be commended for this fine relationship we have experienced.

"We have seen many changes in growth this past year for the City and Camp Inspiration. Along with growth comes growing pains as we adjust to new and changing needs. At the Camp we have grown to need additional rest rooms and bath house facilities. These items have caused us to take another look at our sewer system.

"We presently are using one 12,500 gallon and one 500 gallon septic tanks. During heavy summer use these have been loaded. With the approval this year to build the new rest rooms, we have decided to investigate the possibilities and expenses of tying to city sewer.

"As you recall, we requested that the 8" sewer main on Crestwood drive be extended to our property line whenever the line was laid in the new Crestwood addition. This extension was completed to the Camp in July this year. The Camp paid for the material and the City installed this extension.

"We started at the level of the 8" main at our property and made elevation shots into our camp area. These elevations as shown on the attached sketch shows that our entire system sewer needs can be served by tying to City sewer. "In our annexation meeting in January 1973, the City stated we, City and Camp, would continue to work together to serve the needs of the Camp along the lines of water and sewer. With this possibility we would like to discuss the size, location, costs, work involved, and fees for the project.

FARM BUREAU

The President of the Eastland County Farm Bureau said this week that some farmers in the county are unable to buy diesel and mother middle distillate fuels because of red tape in the mandatory allocation system.

Mr. Cozart said the county Farm Bureau sent a telegram to Eli T. Reich administrator of Petroleum Allocation in Washington, D.C. asking for relief.

Text of the telegram follows: "Fuel shortage has created a major crisis for Texas Agriculture. Farmers and Ranchers urgently need fuel now to finish harvesting this year's crop, and to prepare land for next year. To delay any longer is to invite economic disaster."

The local farm leader said the governments program allocates these fuels on the basis of purchases made 12 months ago. This rigid formula makes the program unworkable, Mr. Cozart said.

He explained that many farmers did not buy diesel, butane and propane fuels this time last year because it was too wet to get in the fields. Also, he said, better prices this year enabled some farmers to trade in their old gasoline-powered equipment for new diesels. Since they have no history on buying diesel fuel, it is not available to them now.

Mr. Cozart said although the government had issued so-called "common sense" directive for distributors to assist in hardship cases, the distributors are afraid of making a decision that could cost them a heavy fine.

"Therefore", Cozart said, "Farm Bureau in Texas and across the nation is calling upon the Interior Department to assure distributors they will not be punished for selling to hardship cases."

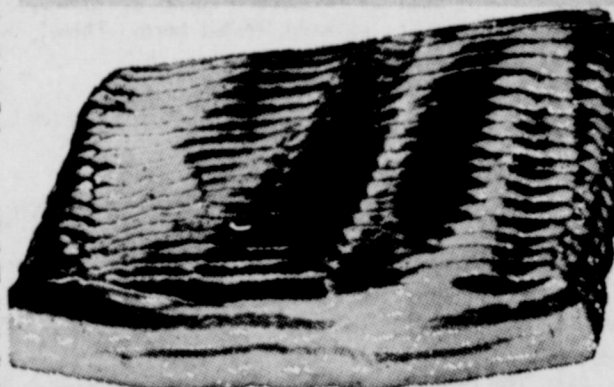

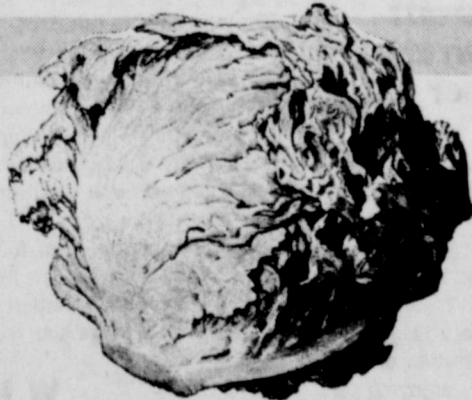

Dear Dr. Butz:
The members of the Eastland County Republican Executive Committee express urprise and

shock at the announcement from your office of proposed changes in the 1974 Peanut Price Program.

To us, the idea of changing the administration from the Grower Associations to the ASCS is poor business as past studies have disclosed that they can do the job better for less money than the ASCS.

We fully realize that peanuts containing A Flavus should not be permitted on the market, but we also believe that in order to assure the proper direction of these peanuts, the price should be supported at some level with strict enforcement.

It is also our opinion that the sale or leasing of peanut allotment within the county should be continued. Further, we think that the No. 2 Program should be re - instated in order that all buyers will be required to pay the full loan price. This also will serve to improve the quality by removing lower grade peanuts from the market, without any appreciable cost to the grower.

We feel that the producers can live with the proposed change in the mearasured acreage but do not think that it is a good idea. We also think

that there is to be very little outcry due to the increase in the storage and warehouse charges to the producer, but again, we feel that his is not right.

For your information, the Republican Party of Texas has made big strides in the last few years, and we were looking forward to gaining two - party status in Texas in the 1974 and 1976 election years. It is not likely that we can gain much in the union - labor section of Texas and therefore we had hoped to gain the rural and conservative sections. Figures will bear us out on this. John Connally has come over to our

side, and w34 certainly feel that he will bring a lot of voters will him.

We urge you to take another look at the peanut program and hopefully come up with a solution that is fair and just, and one that the producers will not be able to say was engineered by the Department in order to help the big manufacturer.
